New Method For Long Distance Calls

A new and improved method of placing long distance calls is being recommended by General Telephone Company of the Southwest for customers served from the company's Memphis long distance center

The new method which requires the use of the area code also eliminates the need for giving the name of the town being called, according to Wayne Goodrum, Manager of General's Memphis District

"The best way to place a long distance call," Goodrum said, "is to give the operator the information in five steps. First, the Area Code of the place being called; next the number you are calling; the person you are calling (but only if you are calling person-to-person); then wait until the operator asks for your number. Your name will not be needed unless the operator asks for it."

"With the new procedure the operator enters all the necessary information on an IBM card instead of the more familiar tickets. All handling is purely automatic operation once the card passes from the operator's hand" Goodrum explained. "IBM computers,

located at San Angelo, do all the rating of the calls automatically, eliminating possibilities of human errors"

"Beginning with the October bills details of most long distance calls will be printed directly on the customer's bill and will include the "from" and "to" points, called number, minutes talked and amount of call. A code will be used to indicate the type call and the rate class. This code is explained on the back of the bill"

General's Memphis long distance center serves as the "Master" office for 10 area communities. The exchanges are Clarendon, Dodson, Estelline, Flomot, Hedley, Lakeview, Memphis, Quitaque, Turkey and Wellington.

News From Our County Agent

The elm leaf beetle is doing a lot of damage to elm trees throughout Donley County, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch. The elm leaf beetle is one of the most destructive pests of the elm tree. This yellowish-green 1/4 inch long beetle or the small yellow to black larvae can be found skeletonizing the leaves or crawling about on the bark of the trunk of infested elm trees

This beetle can be controlled by thoroughly spraying the trees with one of the following insecticides; sevin, DDT, toxaphene or chlordane. Another application may be necessary for the second generation of the beetle, using this application several days after the first one. The addition of 1/2 teaspoonful of linseed oil per gallon of spray will help the spray stick

to the leaves of the tree. Gooch stressed that caution should be used in the use of these and any other insecticide.

A CAREER in ENTOMOLOGY



pest control for more abundant food and fiber



for an ever-growing population

Despite widespread use of control measures, insects cause about \$12 billion damage annually to U. S. livestock and crops. Moreover, the damage is done by only one percent of the 700,000 different insects known to man.

To help lessen this destruction are 4-H youngsters who are fascinated by bugs, worms and butterflies. They are busy with entomology projects set up by the Cooperative Extension Service and carried on with the assistance of local 4-H Club leaders, conservationists and other specialists in this area.

Future career opportunities are virtually limitless. Girls with butterfly nets and boys with glass jars in which to snare their catch may one day be scientists, teachers, researchers, manufacturers, accountants or salesmen. Scores of different jobs are related to the entomological field.

Past performance of 4-H'ers has disclosed remarkable progress in a few short years devoted to the project. Studying insect life cycles, making displays, giving demonstrations on safe use of insecticides, and assisting local agencies in pest control are but a few examples of what the young bug hunters can do.

For their efforts, awards are offered by Hercules Incorporated, sponsor of the national 4-H Entomology program for 15 years. This year about 5,000 outstanding club members will receive the county medal of honor.

The entomology project judged best in the state will send a 4-H'er to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago as guest of the sponsor. From the 50 state champions, six will be selected for national honors and a \$500 scholarship.

DPS Positions Open

In an effort to ease the manpower shortage in the Texas Dept. of Public Safety, the Department's uniformed services have gone on a five day work week, as of September 1, 1966. Salaries have been raised to \$468.00 and \$484.00, depending on the branch of service.
