1966 Cotton Program

The vote last week on Marketing Quotas carried with 320 voting for quotas and 105 against. This means that there will be a cotton program for 1967. Signup will begin Feb 6, 1967.

The cotton program is voluntary. The farmer who wants to take part in the program must divert at least 12.5 percent of his cotton allotment. Any amount up to 35 percent of the allotment may be diverted from cotton. The loan rate for 1967 has been announced and is set at a National average of 20.25 cents per pound for middling one inch cotton. The price support payment rate will be 11.53 cents per pound times the yield set for the farm. This is the payment made through this office on the planted acres up to 65% of the allotment, and is in addition to the price support loan. The rate compares to 9.42 cents per pound in 1966.

The diversion rate will be 10.78 cents per pound. The 1966 rate was 10.59 cents per pound.

Results Of The Referendum

The results of the vote in Donley County were as follows:

Marketing Quotas, 320 For, 105 Against

Research and Promotion Order 135 For, 284 Against

Both issues carried by a two-third majority nationally. So even though Donley County turned the research and promotion down, it will be in effect for 1967.

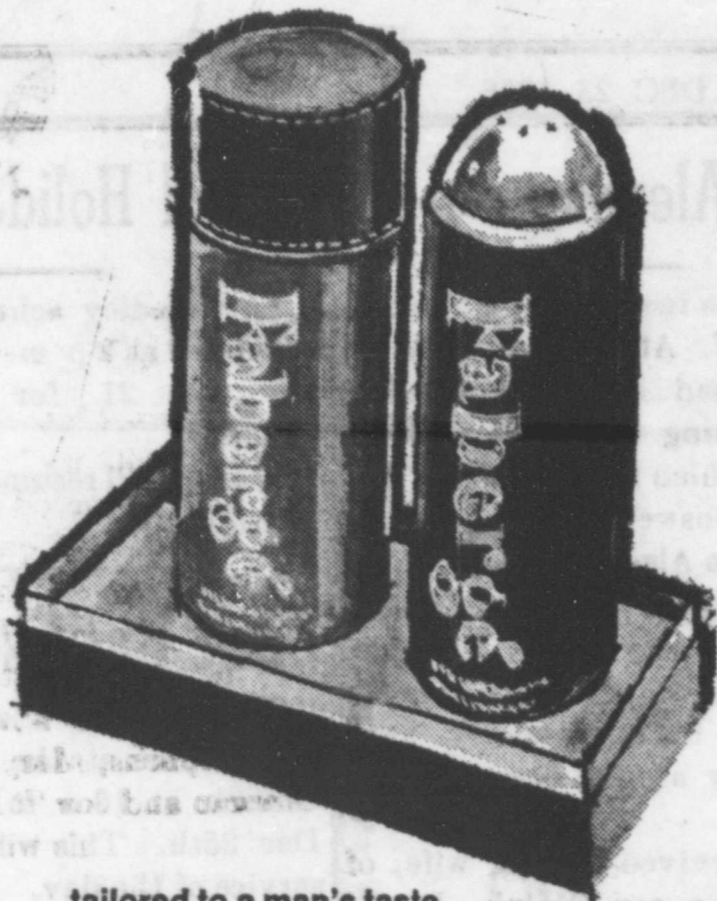

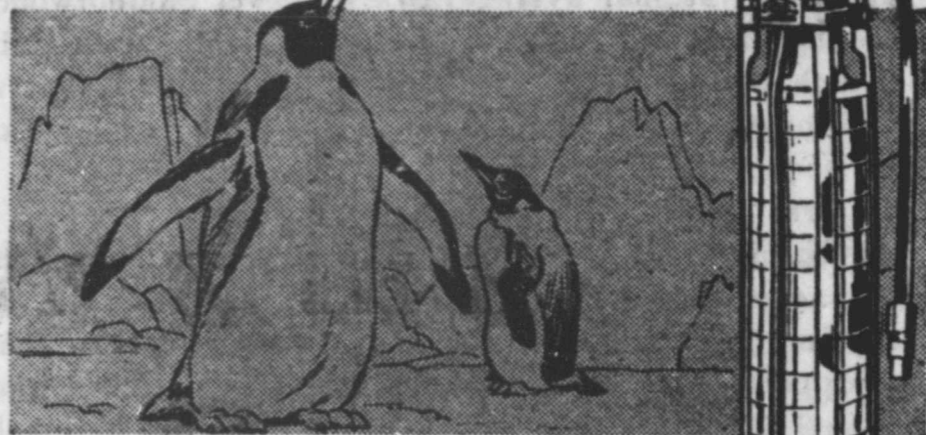

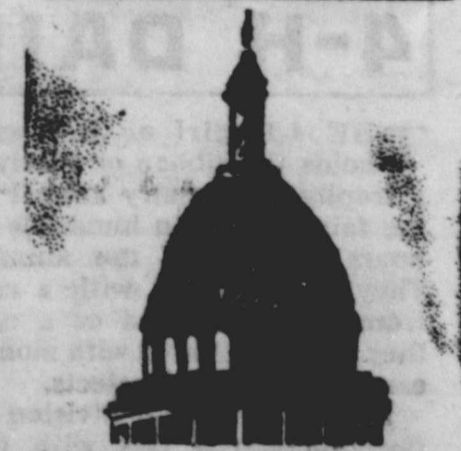

Every project also is ground for cattle members making the judging team travel to county and state fairs and to the large regional and national shows as well.

Their achievements do not go unrecognized. This year nearly two thirds of all the counties in the U.S. are expected to name some 6,000 medal winners, says the National 4-H Service Committee. The medals, plus state and national awards will be provided for the 10th straight year by the Oliver Corporation, sponsor of the national 4-H Dairy program.

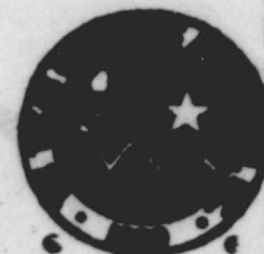

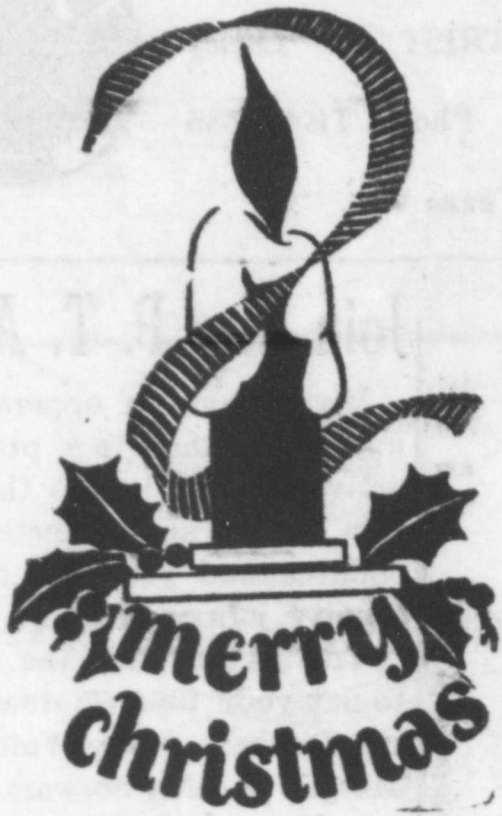
