The new gymnasium at Hedley is also a fine drawing card.

The Bulldogs, snarling triumphantly after enjoying an impressive winning streak in conference games, are determined to battle the Aggies to a standstill. A victory over Coach "Red" Miller's strong team is their aim, strengthened by the fact that the Bulldogs have fallen to the Oakies in previous contests. Whatever the final score may be, fans will be assured of an exciting, fast moving exhibition of basketball showmanship. Price of admission will be \$1 for adults and \$.50 for students. Vehicle Registration

Austin—The Texas Highway Department reported today that more than 67 million motor vehicles will be registered in Texas in 1967 and urged car owners to buy their license plates early.

The new license plates may be purchased during February and March at county tax assessor-collector's offices or at authorized sub-stations. New license plates must be displayed after midnight April 1.

A Highway Department spokesman said motorists can help shorten waiting lines and speed up registration by buying license plates early and by presenting proper ownership documents.

Car owners are required by law to present certificates of title and last year's license plate receipts when renewing vehicle registrations.

Wrestler Turned Preacher

Tommy Phelps, who will speak at the Panhandle Baptist Association's Sweetheart Banquet, Feb. 13, at 7:00 p. m., in the Community Center at Memphis, is a former pro-wrestler. He wrestled professionally for 17½ years. In the Panhandle he was known as "Nature Boy," and had his hair bleached blonde.

On July 21, 1962, in Amarillo, he accepted Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior of his life. Tommy began to tell others about the new life Christ had given him. Shortly thereafter he was fired from wrestling for being what his employer called, a religious fanatic. Fired for telling others about Jesus Christ.

Tommy surrendered to the ministry in November, 1962. He graduated from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in January, 1966. For two years he pastored Inspiration Point Baptist Church, Fort Worth. In 23 months he baptized 115 persons. Tommy's next pastorate was Temple Baptist Church, Hereford. During the 13 months he was there, 200 persons were added to the church. He resigned the Hereford church to enter full time evangelism in January of this year.

In Sept., 1965, Tommy spoke at Windermere Baptist Encampment in Missouri. Over 500 decisions were recorded for Christ. It may appear that here is a man whose words carry the force of the Kingdom of God behind them.

He will help you on any matters relating to Social Security.

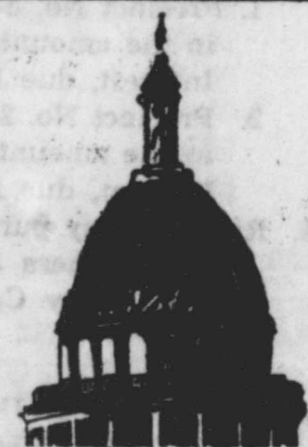

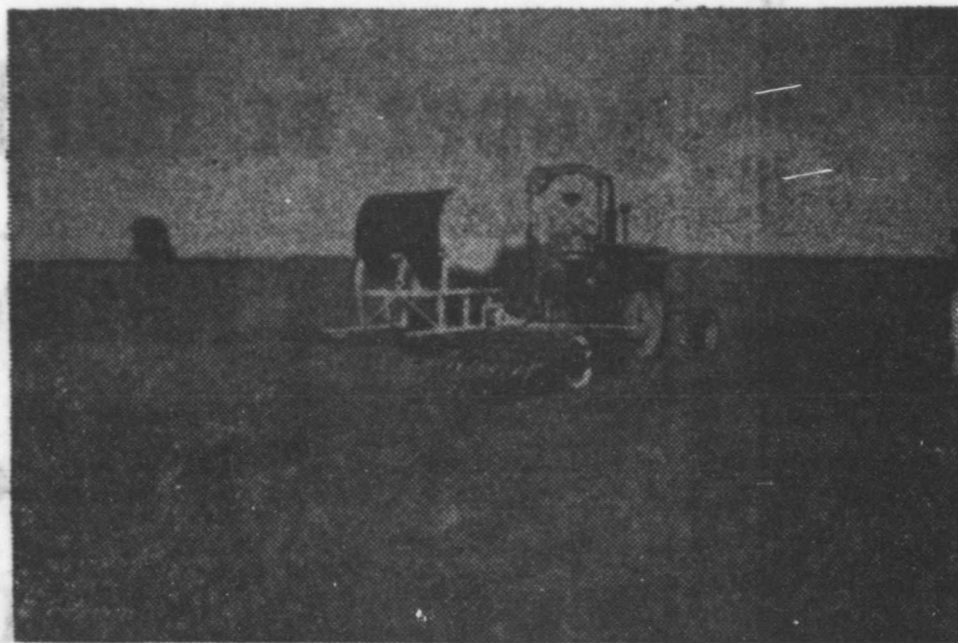

News From Our County Agent

Donley County stockmen are being advised by County Agent Ronald Gooch to be on the lookout for lice on their livestock. These pests can reduce profits and increase feeding costs for the winter unless they are controlled. Research indicates that heavy infestations of lice can increase the winter weight loss in weaner heifers by 300 percent and nearly double the weight loss in mature cattle, if the lice are not controlled.

Livestock producers are reminded that copies of MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External

Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" are available at your County Agent's office.

The publication contains information on insecticides formulations and how to use them for controlling external livestock and poultry parasites. It contains a dilution chart for mixing sprays and dips and outlines control programs for all kinds of livestock.

Lice infestations spread more rapidly when livestock are confined to smaller areas, and if allowed to multiply, can materially affect the general well-being of the herd, points out the county agent.
