More Radar

More Texas motorists in this area are exceeding the posted legal speed limits and safe speeds for existing conditions than ever before, stated Major Luther Moore, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Major Moore also said that more 100 miles per hour violators are being apprehended than ever before. In an effort to halt this upsurge in speed, additional radar will be used extensively in this area and throughout Texas.

"Experience and surveys have shown that about 85 per cent of Texas operators drive at or below an appropriate safe speed. By removing the 15 per cent who drive over the posted limits and safe speeds for existing conditions, it will be much safer for the abiding 85 per cent and their passengers," Moore said. "The majority will be supporting any legal means of purging these irresponsible drivers from the road."

Drivers License

Austin—Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety, reminded Texans today that any person, regardless of age, must have a birth certificate or other legal document showing birthdate in possession at the time they first make application for a driver license.

"Apparently many applicants are unfamiliar with this new requirement in the law," Garrison advised, "and large numbers of prospective drivers are being turned away until they return home and get such a document. This part of the law applies only to those drivers who make application for their first Texas driver license, and not to those wishing to renew a license."

What Youth Wants... 4-H HAS!

WHY is 4-H unique? Because Mary and Sue, Bill and Jim and all the other 2½ million 4-H'ers do things. In fact, the 4-H way is "learn-by-doing."

And what do they do? They work on projects. They have well over 50 projects and activities to choose from. Among them are garden, electric, horse, livestock, crops, dog, poultry, photography, entomology, automotive and home economics.

With few exceptions, boys and girls participate in all projects with equal skill and success.

For more than a half century, publicly supported 4-H has served the needs of youth through programs set up by the Cooperative Extension Service of the state land-grant universities.

Since the first 4-H Clubs were organized to teach boys how to farm better and girls how to preserve foods better, private industry and community-minded citizens have backed 4-H. Industry provides incentive awards, recognition, educational aids and technical assistance.

Collaboration between private interests in support of this youth program open to all is probably without parallel. Success of the "partnership" is evident in the long tenure of business donors.

Today nearly 400,000 men and women serve as volunteer leaders, using their special skills to

guide the youngsters. Many of them are parents of 4-H'ers.

Through the National 4-H Service Committee of Chicago, nearly 60 business firms and foundations annually contribute large sums as sponsors of national and regional 4-H award programs approved by the Extension Service. In addition they host some 1,600 of the nation's finest teenagers at the National 4-H Club Congress. The 1967 congress, tabbed "the showcase of 4-H," will mark its 46th straight year.

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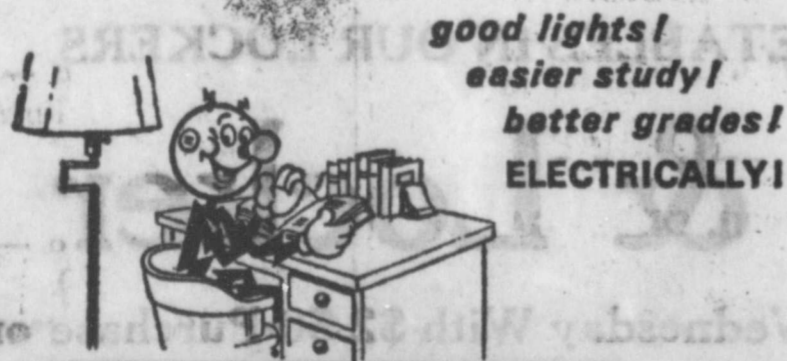

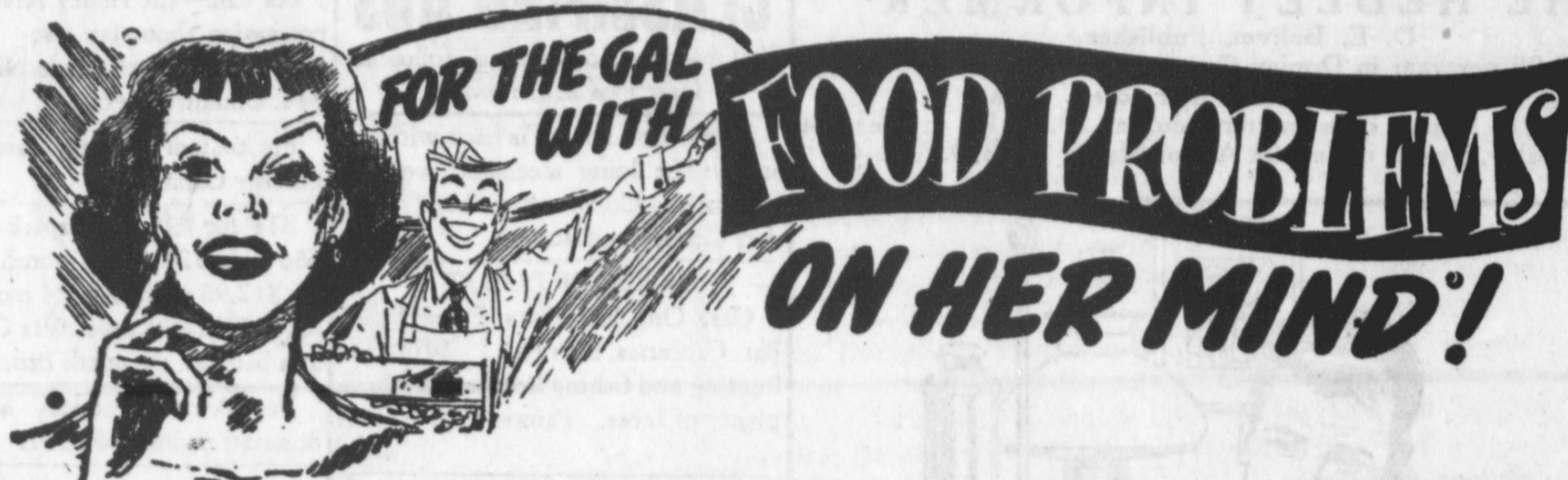
