Charles L. Reynolds Announces For District Judge

The Informer has been authorized to announce the candidacy of District Judge Charles L. Reynolds for re-election to a second term as Judge of the 100th Judicial District, which is composed of Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall Counties, subject to the Democratic primary on May 4, 1968.

Judge Reynolds stated, "It has been both an honor and privilege to have served as district judge this past term, especially in view of the complete cooperation of the attorneys and officials, and the splendid response of the citizens in exercising their privilege of jury service when called upon to assist in the public administration of justice. This has enabled us to maintain a current docket at a time when many courts are faced with congested dockets of cases to be tried."

Having served two terms as county attorney of Childress county, Judge Reynolds is a graduate of Southern Methodist University School of Law and National College of State Trial Judges, a member of the Texas, Childress County and 100th Judicial District Bar Associations, having served as president of the latter two, a member of the American Judicature Society, and presently is serving as a member of the Executive Committee of the Judicial Section of the State Bar of Texas. He is a member and past president of the Childress Rotary Club, and a member of the Childress American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars organizations. He and his family are members of the First Baptist Church in Childress where he serves as a deacon and Sunday School teacher.

"Consideration of my candidacy for re-election will be sincerely appreciated," Judge Reynolds said.

Housing Loans

More than 67 rural people in Armstrong, Donley and Gray Counties have new or vastly improved homes as a result of \$157,210 00 in insured loan funds advanced through the Farmers Home Administration in the past two years. Claude Moore, local County Supervisor of the supervised credit agency reported today approximately \$83,000 00 was advanced in 1967.

The rural housing program was greatly expanded in 1965 when, as part of President Lyndon B. Johnson's effort to strengthen rural America, the financing of the loans was switched from federal to private sources. Practically all of the rural housing funds now come from private sources on an insured basis.

Of the amount loaned during the past two years, senior citizens, 62 years or older received \$24,110 00.

The construction that took place as a part of this credit program provided 2672 man-days of employment for local carpenters, plumbers, electricians and masons.

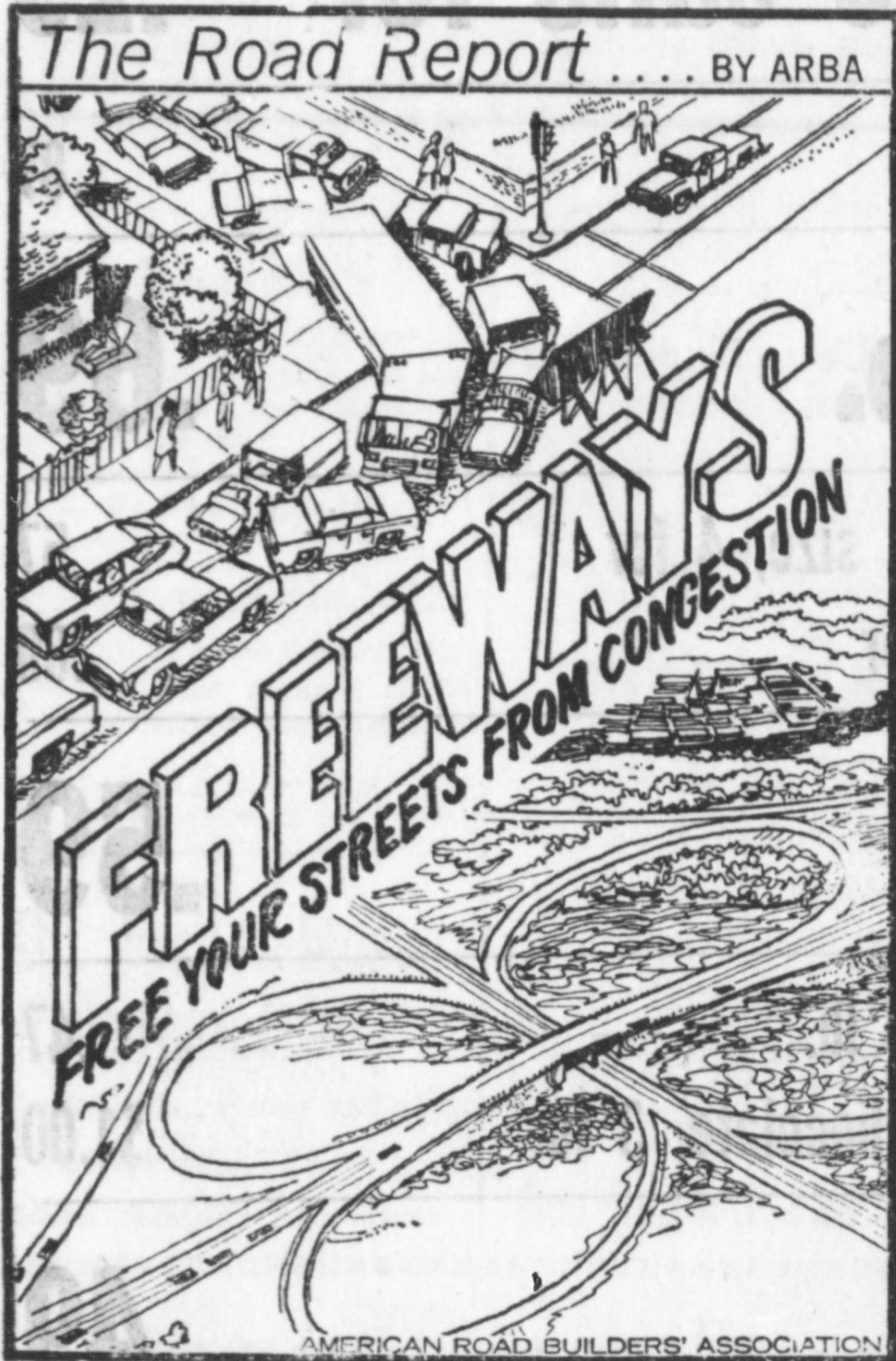

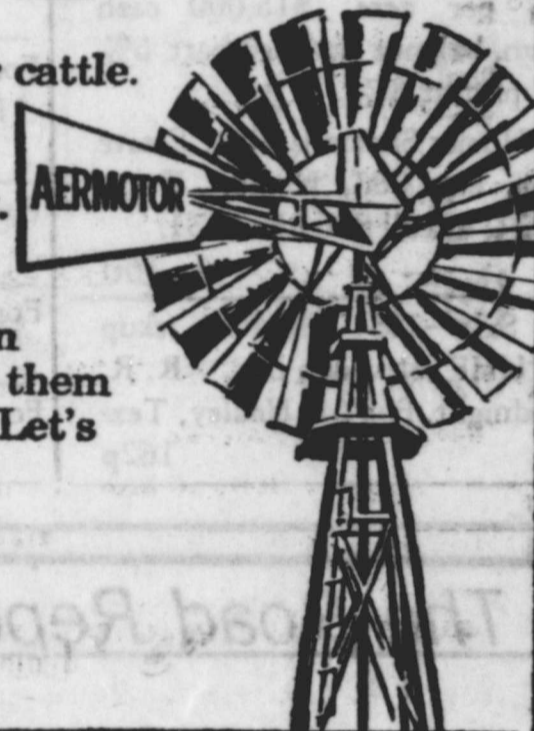

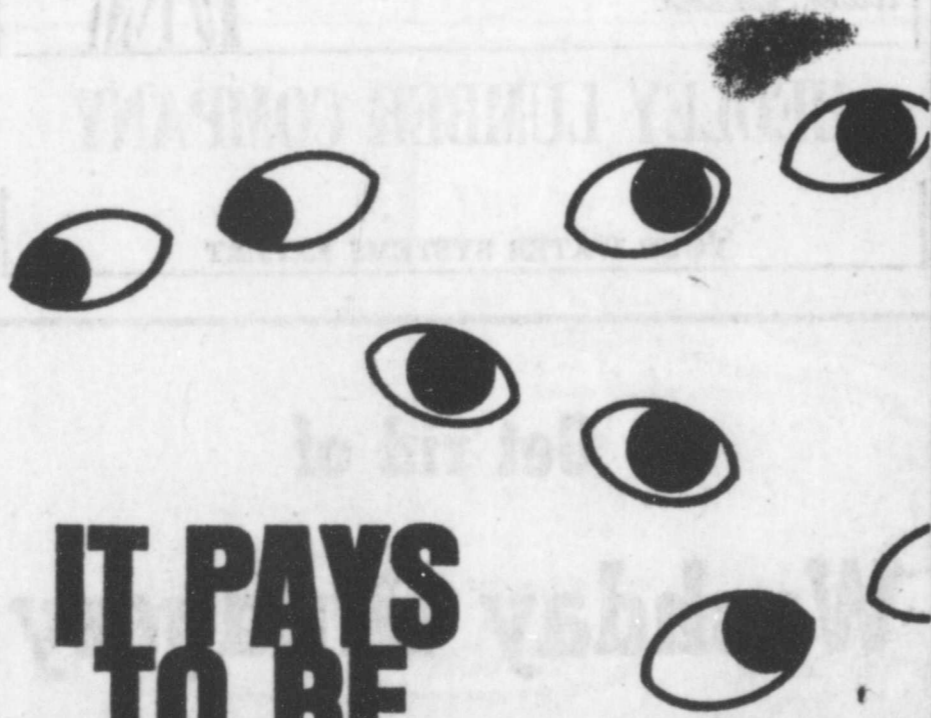

IT PAYS TO BE SHIFTY-EYED

When you are driving, don't stare at a fixed point on the roadway ahead. Keep the eyes shifty to get the full picture of what is ahead—traffic signs, signals, other vehicles, pedestrians, intersections, curves, hills or any other hazard—and to avoid drowsiness.
