THE LEGISLATIVE LOFT

By the end of the first week in March, nearly 700 bills had been introduced in the Texas House of Representatives.

After a careful review of these bills it was discovered that a substantial proportion are aimed at special problems in local legislative districts. These bills are important. It's the only way local districts can receive proper attention

There are three bills, however, that are important to all Texans.

The first bill, which was written by Rep. Harold Davis of Travis County and co-sponsored by myself, makes it unlawful for any person 21 years of age and over to provide any person under 21 years of age with any narcotic drugs.

A bill written by Rep. Joe Shannon of Fort Worth prohibits disruptive activities on the campus of any public school or tax-supported institution of higher education.

Within the last week the House approved a bill calling for a constitutional amendment to authorize \$3.5 billion in bonds to carry out the Texas Water Plan. This has to be viewed as a major piece of legislation not only for the High Plains area, but also for any Texas area that has a water shortage.
