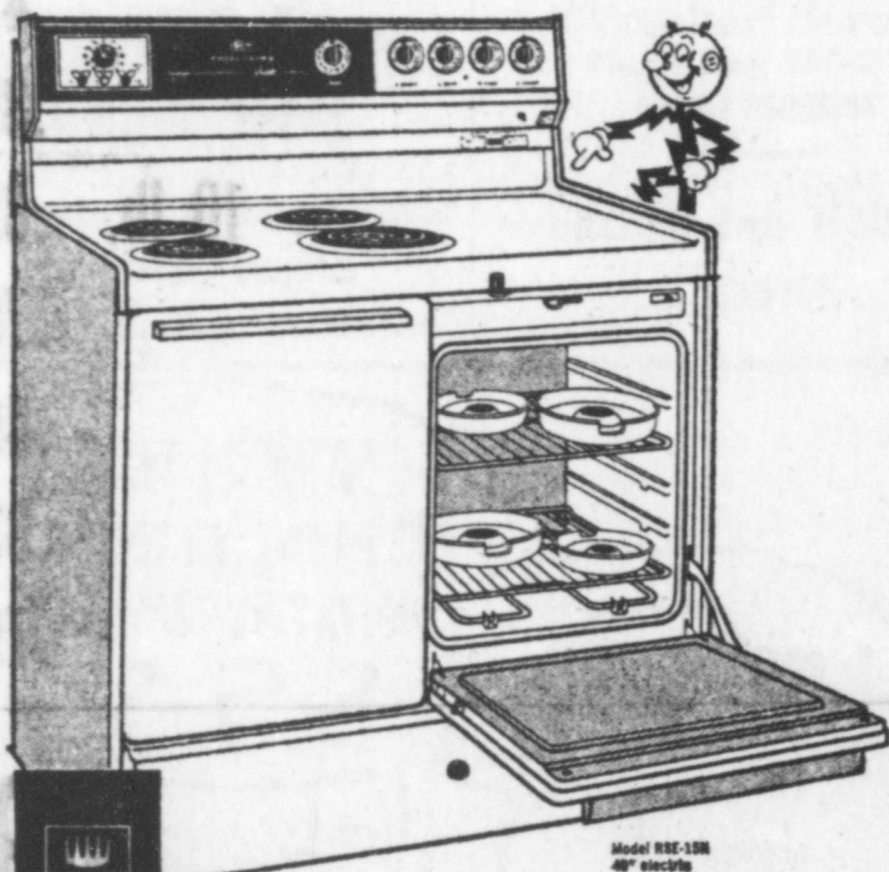

Wheat Loans

For those of you who have a loan on your 1967 or 1968 wheat you have until April 30 to either redeem the loan, request an extension, or forfeit the grain thus cancelling the loan. Special post card notices have been mailed to all producers with outstanding wheat loans. On the return portion of this card you will be asked to check what you want to do.

Acreage Reports

Remember that May 1 is the final date for reporting your wheat acreage. In making these reports, please consider the following items:

- 1 It is very important that these reports be correct.
2. Any acreages determined in the county office using measurements you furnish are not official. To have an official acreage determination it will be necessary for a representative of the County Committee to visit the farm, make any necessary ground measurements, then return to the county office and determine the acreage.
- 3 If you have any doubt as to whether or not you can make a correct acreage report, may we urge you to request and pay the cost of official measuring service.

Donley County Feedlot In Expanding Program

Charles H. Payne has announced that Donley County Feedlot is expanding feeding pen facilities to take on more cattle that have been booked for the feedlot. About 350 head of cattle are on the feedlot at present with new cattle arriving weekly. Last week cattle arrived from Tennessee to be fed out here. About 300 more are expected to arrive from Tennessee in the next two weeks to be fed out in the Donley County Feedlot.

A statement was made by Mr. Payne that the feedlot is nearly 1,000 head behind on new construction for cattle that are booked to be fed out here. New pens are being added as fast as possible to take care of added cattle. The way things are looking we will have a hard time building pens fast enough.

People feeding cattle at the feedlot at present are Spenser Sitter of McLean, Floyd Farms, Duane Reynolds and Kenneth Sams of Hedley, Flip Breedlove and Emmett Simmons of Clarendon and Harry Youngblood of Lefors.

Other people bringing cattle in the near future are C O Sutton and Bob Callan of Amarillo and Blain Odum of Baird.

Charles Payne, sole owner and manager of Donley County Feedlot, started construction in August of 1968 and opened the feedlot in February of 1969 for business. The feedlot needs full time hands to do various construction work. Please contact Charles H. Payne, 856-3822 or 856-2331.

Accident Report
