Postal Service

It is extremely important that we reach the people who have been brainwashed by newspaper and magazine editorials relative to the urgency of a Postal Corporation

Amendments

There will be nine proposed amendments to the Texas constitution to be voted on August 5. A brief summary of their intent is as follows:

No 1, Making no substantive change, but cleaning up obsolete, superfluous or unnecessary sections of the constitution by repealing several sections.

No 2, Granting the powers to the Texas Water Development Board necessary to develop sufficient water resources for present and future development of the state.

No 3, Authorizing the legislature to set the salary of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house at not more than half the salary of the governor and the members of the legislature at not more than that of a district judge.

No 4, Exempting non-profit water supply corporations from ad valorem taxation.

No 5, Increasing the amount which may be spent in one year for public assistance payments to \$80 million, to comply with federal requirements for matching funds.

No 6, Removing interest rate limitations on certain bonds.

No 7, Adding certain governmental employees, officers and agents to the list of persons whose surviving spouses and children are eligible for assistance.

No 8, Authorizing the legislature to provide for additional loans to students under the Texas Opportunity Plan.

No 9, Providing for annual sessions of the legislature.





