It is a sad comment on mankind that we wait until a man has died before we say all the things that deserved to be said during his lifetime. But perhaps it is better to say it then than never.

Dr. D. H. Cox gave his life for Hedley people. It's impossible to say even what our one family owes to him. He delivered our babies, came in the middle of the night to quiet our convulsions, to treat our sore throats, and to reassure our mother. Never can we remember his not coming when called, no matter what the hour.

Not only was he a completely selfless doctor, but he was a father to many of us. We children valued greatly his hellos to us in town, his praise of our achievements, the times he took us to ball games out of town, the many evenings we spent at the Coxes—folk dancing, playing records, singing at the piano, and eating stacks of sandwiches and delicious home made soup. We remember also the Coxes helping us make the figures for the Methodist Church's nativity scene, and their providing us with the funds to accomplish many of our projects.

I loved Dr. Cox. I owed him my life on a number of occasions. May he rest in peace.

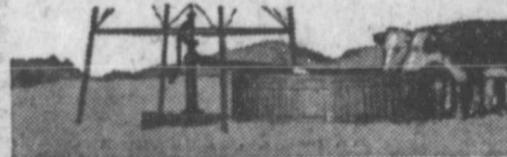
