The junk ground has been left unlocked for the convenience of everyone, but it will have to be locked hereafter, and dumping of junk will be permitted only on Monday afternoons from 1:00 to 4:00. No dumping will be per-

mitted at night or on Sunday, and no dead animals can be placed in the junk ground at any time. This is a point on which the Health Dept is very emphatic. Loads of junk will be inspected and no dead trees or other items which are too bulky can be dumped.

When the gate is locked, no junk can be dumped outside the gate, and anyone doing so will be prosecuted. Anyone leaving a dead animal at any time will also be prosecuted.

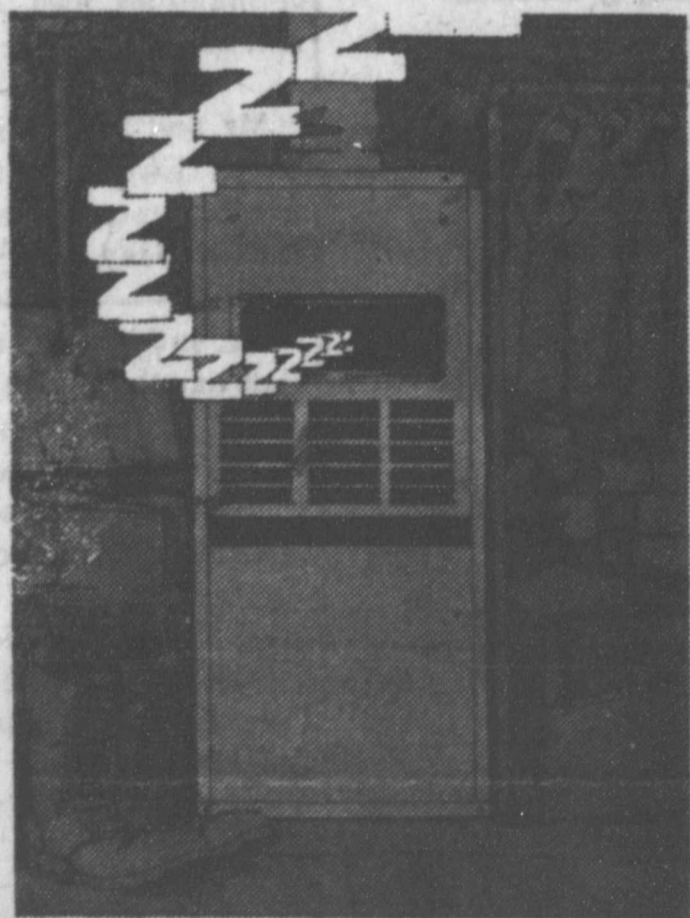

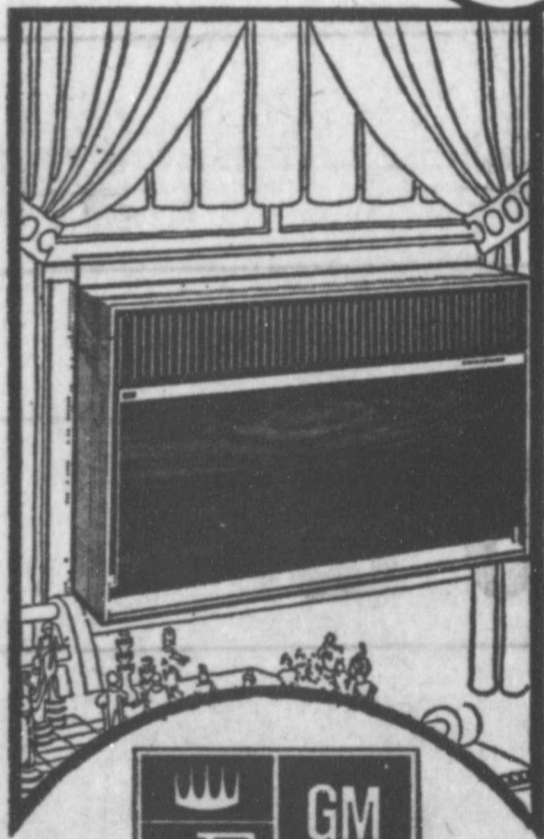
