Jack Moreman To Teach At TCU

Holder of degrees in both animal science and agricultural education from Texas Tech University, Jack A. Moreman will join the Texas Christian University faculty as assistant director of the Ranch Management Program effective July 1, said Dr. James Newcomer, vice chancellor for academic affairs.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Moreman of Hedley, Jack served in the Army Veterinary Corps and was employed by the Texas Animal Health Commission before joining the Clarendon Junior College faculty in 1962. For eight years he was general manager of Doneghy Ranches at Wellington and Henrietta, Okla., responsible for both registered and commercial cow-calf operations and stocker operations on native and cultivated pastures.

Since 1969, he has been feed yard manager for Alpha-Omega Industries at Hereford and also responsible for an extensive backgrounding operation on grass.

"Mr. Moreman's broad experience particularly qualifies him for our work at TCU," said Director Merrill, "and we are very pleased to have him join us."

Active in youth work as well as cattle industry activities, Moreman is a member of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, Texas Cattle Feeders Association, Texas Farm Bureau and a trustee of the Texas 4-H Council.

Class of Instruction in Beaded Accessories

A two day class of instruction in making beaded accessories will be conducted in the Homemaking Dept. of Hedley school from 1:30 p. m. to 5:00 p. m. on June 10 and 11. Anyone interested in learning to make the current fashions in bead accessories is invited to attend. Other than individual materials needed, there will be no charge for the classes.

Instructions will be available for making the crocheted rope necklaces and many "strung" designs, rings, the pearl tie and bead collars. Materials needed will depend on the design and article selected. To help determine supplies needed, follow information listed below.

Thread may be tatting thread, crochet cotton in size 30 or 50, dual duty thread. Clasps for ends of necklaces. Needles, very slender for the strung designs. Crochet hook, in size to fit thread used, size 11 is right for size 30 crochet thread. Smaller thread requires a smaller hook.

Beads: Pearl tie, 4 pkgs, of size 5 mm, pearls.

1 60 in string, 535 pearls, of size 2 1/2 mm will crochet approximately 18 in of rope.

1 60 in string, 450, size 3 1/2 mm. will do about 11 1/2 in of rope.

1 60 in string, 410, size 4 mm. will do about 13 in of rope.

These materials are available in Memphis and Wellington. Clasps should be selected to fit design of article constructed. Any strong thread in correct size for beads used will be satisfactory.

Mrs. Shields will be available for information on the mornings of June 7, 8, and 9 from 9 to 12 in the Homemaking Dept. These accessories are fun to do and not nearly as complicated to make as they appear to be; a good "pick-up" hobby.

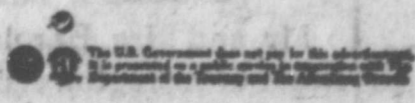

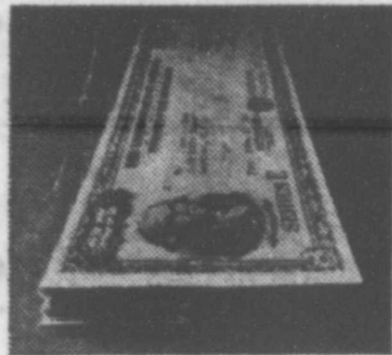
