## Legal Notice

In accordance with Chapter 1, Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, all owners of any livestock shall within six months after August 30, 1971, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county in which the livestock are located. The mark or brand shall be recorded whether the mark or brand has been previously recorded or not.

After the expiration of six months from August 30, 1971, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer be in force or effect, and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after August 30, 1971, shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

All marks and brands registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years.

The location of the mark or brand must be designated. Your County Clerk has posted a diagram on the bulletin board in the courthouse showing various parts of animal that may show mark or brand.

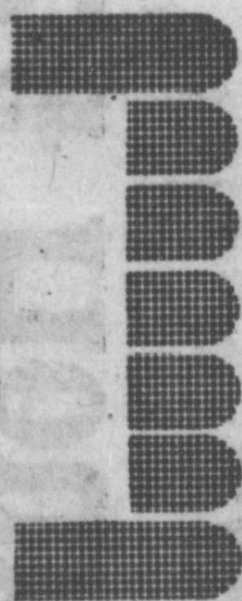

**Notice Of Special Election**

To the duly qualified resident voters of the City of Hedley, Texas and to all other interested persons:

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in and throughout the City of Hedley, Texas on the 18th day of September, 1971 on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said City, in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the City Council of said City, as follows, to-wit:

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF HEDLEY, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1 %) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITH-

IN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACES; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Whereas, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose

of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village, Now Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEDLEY, TEXAS:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Hedley, Texas, on the 18th day of September, 1971, at which election there shall be submitted to the residents qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1 %) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1 %) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

Polling Place: City Hall, Hedley, Texas.

Presiding Officers:

Presiding Judge, Ross Springer.

Alternate Presiding Judge, L. D. Messer.

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident voters of the City of Hedley, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

**INSTRUCTIONS:** Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1 %) local sales and use tax within the city.

PASSED AND APPROVED, this 12th day of August, 1971.

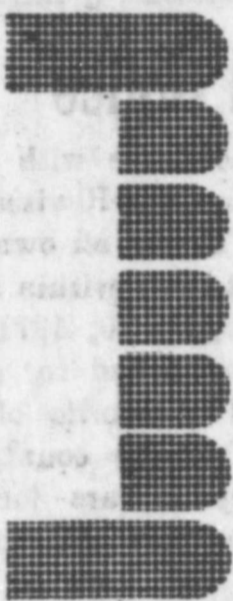

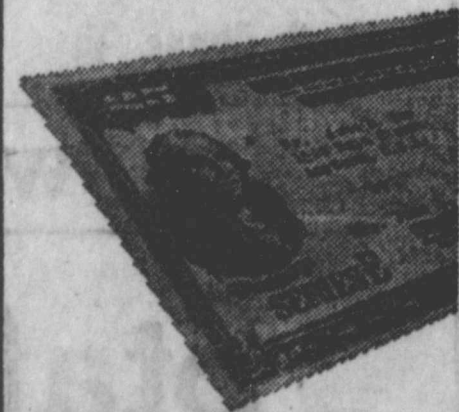

## City Sales Tax

The City of Hedley having received a petition, bearing the names of a sufficient number of qualified voters, requesting that an election be held to adopt the local sales and use tax in the City of Hedley, an election for such purpose has been called for Sept. 18, 1971, at the City Hall in Hedley. Ross Springer has been named Presiding Judge and L. D. Messer Alternate Presiding Judge, and two clerks will be appointed by Mr Springer.

If the issue carries, the tax will be at the rate of 1%, and will be collected together with the state sales tax, making a total of 5% sales tax, which is the same as in most of our neighboring towns.

Many Hedley citizens have spoken in favor of this tax. Everyone knows, of course that the city has lost a substantial amount in tax valuations. Also, due to state regulations, the cost of operation of the city junk ground has had considerable increase.

Hedley's Greenbelt water payments increased \$76 per month for the fiscal year which began July 1st, making our monthly water payment now \$1030.

The city is trying to absorb the increased water cost and the increased cost on the junk ground without raising the water rates. The sales tax could be a great help in this effort.

Incidentally, please investigate the water rates of some other towns, and we believe you will appreciate your local rates more.

## Hedley School States Its Free Lunch Policy

Superintendent Garlon Freeman has announced that the Hedley schools will again this year provide free, or lunches at a reduced price to children whose families cannot afford to pay the full price. Regular priced school lunches are Elementary 35¢, High School 40¢, school employees 40¢ and visitors \$1.00. He said that forms had been made available showing family size and income eligibility requirements.

In deciding if children are eligible for either a free or reduced price lunch, we will also take into consideration any unusual circumstances such as prolonged illness, unexpected expenses due to disaster, seasonal unemployment and similar emergency situations.

All applications will be reviewed by Freeman within three days and parents notified promptly as to the decision. Freeman said that if children were found to be eligible to receive reduced price lunches, parents would be notified as to the amount they will be expected to pay.

Any parent who feels that they cannot pay the amount listed, or whose application is rejected may appeal the decision, Freeman said. All applications will be handled privately and information will be kept strictly confidential, he said. Children who receive free or reduced lunches will be treated in the same manner as those who pay the full price for the lunches. Every possible effort will be made to make sure that no one other than the person reviewing the applications, knows which children pay and which ones do not pay for their lunches.

A complete copy of the policy is kept on file in the Superintendent's office at the school.
