CJC To Offer Pilot Training

Clarendon College will offer a complete pilot training program beginning Jan. 18, 1972.

This training program will be complete from the ground school through the private pilot license. All ground school courses and flight training will be done by fully certified and qualified FAA instructors.

This course is approved by the Federal Aeronautic Administration Texas Education Agency, and the Veterans Administration.

The ground school course will be taught at Clarendon College on Monday and Thursday nights from 7 to 10 p m. Classes will meet twice a week for nine weeks, with flight training to be taught through the Brown's Flying School Trade Winds Airport Amarillo. All flight training will be taught in Clarendon or Amarillo.

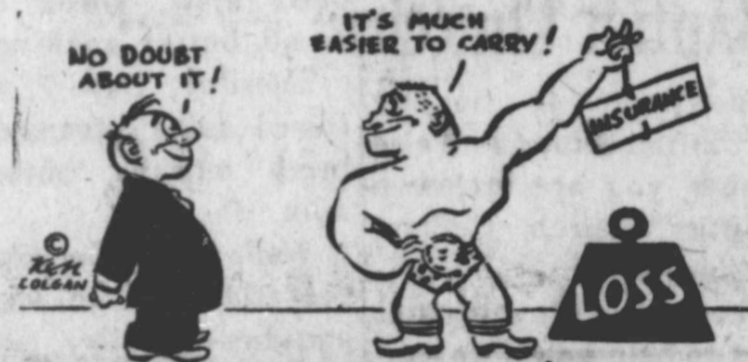
