WHITTLIN'

Don't look now, but evidently the Republican candidate for Congress is running a pretty good race to take over the seat that Walter Rogers is vacating.

Almost every time we open our mail, we're reminded of the hard race the aforementioned candidate is running.

In addition to his well-organized campaign, he has other advantages. One is that he came fairly close to winning over Rogers two years ago. Another is that, because of the race two years ago, he's probably better known across the district than is his Democratic opponent, Dee Miller of Amarillo. The Republican candidate hardly stopped campaigning, it seemed, after he lost to Rogers two years ago. He was right back in the swing of trying to get elected after only a minimum of time off.

We thought his efforts would probably continue to be futile until Rogers announced that he would not be a candidate to succeed himself.

Now we're worried. Our district may be about to have a Republican Congressman in spite of the Democratic votes on the south side. North Plainsmen have little or no scruples against casting a ballot for a Republican. This situation is a disadvantage for any Democratic candidate, of course, and it can be doubly bad if he is not as well known as his Republican opponent.

Back to the fact that we could end up with a Republican Congressman in our district; if this happens, and well it might, and John Tower is re-elected as the junior senator from Texas, our voice in Washington would be dominated by GOP politicians. We don't think our area would like that. It's highly possible that we'll have the opportunity to try it and find out if we will.

By these remarks, we don't mean to concede the elections to either of the Republican candidates. There's a good, fighting chance of course, that they'll both be defeated by their Democratic opponents as they should be. We're only attempting to point out what may be about to happen to the citizens in the 18th Congressional District of Texas if they take their politics lightly this year.

The fact that Miller is from Amarillo has its advantages and disadvantages in the race, we understand. Needless to say, it's beneficial for a candidate to be able to carry Amarillo in the election. There's a slug of votes there that any candidate would be glad to have counted in his favor.

On the other hand, sometimes people in the rural areas, or at least those out of Amarillo, resent the fact that the "big city" furnishes the political leader for the district. So, being from Amarillo might cost a candidate some votes in other areas in the district. As we said, we think this might be especially true on the North Plains. People on the South Plains, it seems to us, would rather have an Amarillo candidate than one from farther north. So, a candidate's home town is an automatic advantage and disadvantage at the same time. It is important in a race, though, political observers will tell you.

You wouldn't think that farmers who spend a lot of their time irrigating would be wishing that the rain would quit. But some of them are in this area after moisture totals during an eight-day period of last week and this of about that many inches.

Said farmers have a tendency to feel a little guilty when they wish "that it would clear off for a while." They realize full well that they may be wishing for some of this moisture at a later date or another year, but at the same time they figure they have about all the rain that's good now.

One farmer even admitted to us this week that he complains when it's dry and now he's complaining because it's wet. "I hate for it to be that way, but that's the way it is," he confessed.

650-Plus Students Expected --

Bovina Schools Start '66-'67 Year Tuesday

Tuesday is the opening day of the 1966-'67 year for Bovina Schools.

More than 650 students are expected to enroll if the total continues to increase as it has here each year for the past several. Last year's opening day enrollment was 632. The total in '64 was 611.

Bovina Schools are starting this year eight days later than are many area schools. Monday of this week was the first school day in some other communities in the Panhandle and Eastern New Mexico.

The opening of school here is slated for Tuesday so that Monday, September 5, Labor Day, may be observed as a holiday.

Tuesday will be a full day of school with classes scheduled to begin at 8:25 and be dismissed at 3:45. Buses will run on their regular schedules and lunch will be served in the cafeteria.

Registration of high school students is being conducted today (Wednesday) and tomorrow. Sophomores, Freshmen and eighth grade students are being registered tomorrow (Thursday) while registering of seniors, juniors and seventh graders is today. Registration is in the high school study hall.

There will be no pre-registration for grade school students in grades two through six. First graders were requested to register this morning or tomorrow (Thursday) at 9 a.m., according to Tom Templeton, grade school principal.

A high school science teacher has been signed to fill one of two vacancies which existed on the faculty. The new science teacher is Ben Templeton, brother of Tom Templeton, grade school principal. This will be the first teaching experience for Ben. He lacks three

hours of having his bachelors degree from Tareyton State College at Stephenville and plans to finish by correspondence. He has a major in biology and a minor in chemistry.

The remaining faculty vacancy is for a teacher for a first grade section.

More Rain Falls Here

Another rain, totaling as much as four inches in parts of the area, fell here Sunday night. The moisture came while the area was still water-soaked from last week's heavy downpour. Many farmers were planning to resume farming activities Monday, but their plans were washed out by the Sunday night rain.

The moisture total was lighter in Bovina than it evidently was anywhere else nearby. Most gauges inside the city limits measured 1.7 inches.

South of town, the reports were from three to four inches. Two inches was the approximate total recorded north and west of town.

Some water problems were created on the highways Sunday night as the rain fell on the already moisture-soaked soil causing heavy runoff of water.

Traffic was halted by state highway department crew on Highway 60 on Parmerton Hill for several minutes Sunday night because of water over the pavement.

The rain made Running Water Draw live up to its name for the second time in as many weeks.

Area farmers, who usually wish for more moisture, agreed this week that they had "had enough" and were ready for clearing weather conditions and sunshine which would allow the maturing of milo and cotton.

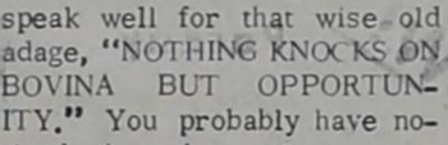

Grissom Wins Tennis Tourney

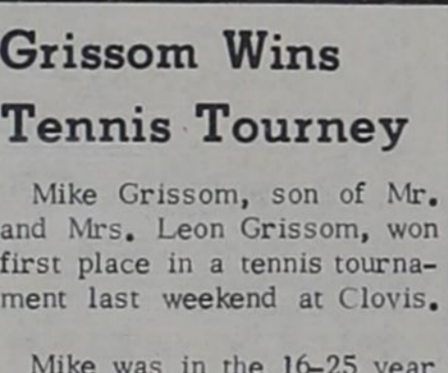
Mike Grissom, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Grissom, won first place in a tennis tournament last weekend at Clovis.

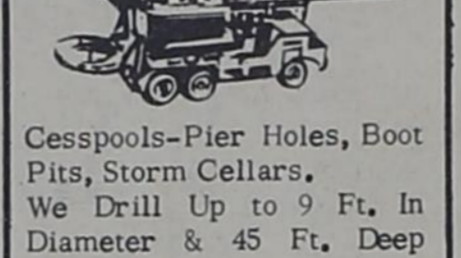

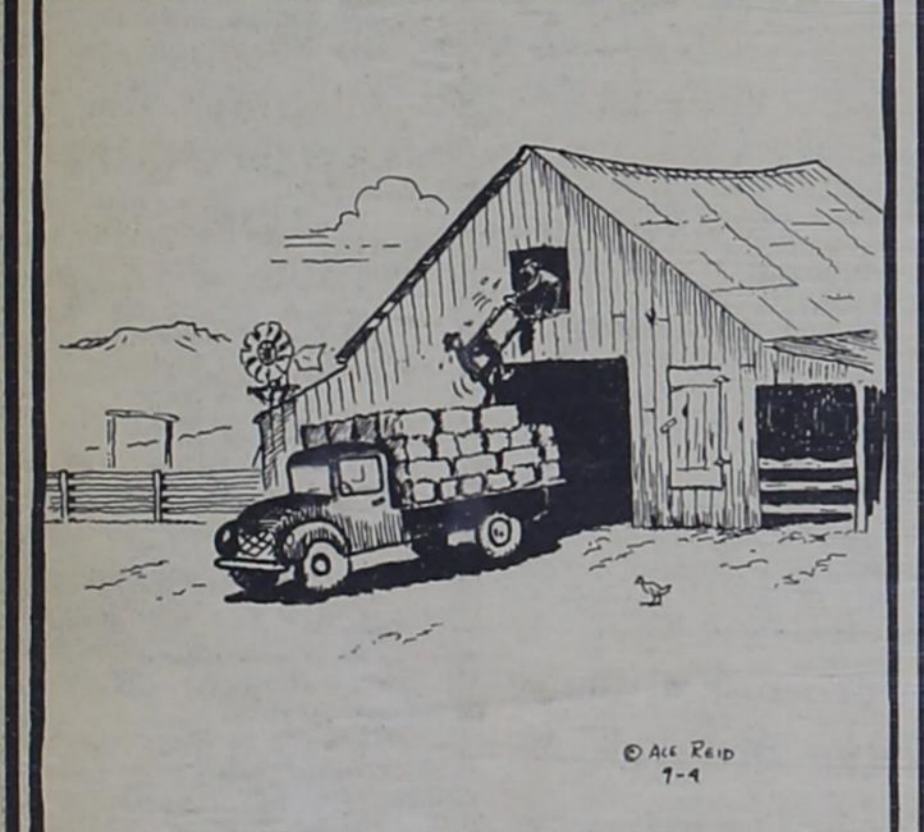

Record Books of 4-H'ers that were turned in for judging in some Economic projects were 49. These have been judged and awards winners selected. Project work for 1966 is over and clubs and leaders are getting ready for the new year. This will be the time for girls and boys to decide on projects for another year. Adult leaders for projects will be needed if 4-H members are to benefit from project work. Adults who can spare a few hours each month can find satisfaction and contribute their time toward a very worthwhile activity. Let the Extension office or the 4-H Club Organization Leader know if you would like to take the training as a leader. It is hoped that training in some projects can be done in October.

Some changes have been made in 4-H Food guides and training on these will be given to leaders as soon as enrollment is completed.

SEPTEMBER BETTER BREAKFAST MONTH

Many homemakers have found themselves a few pounds heavier after all the visiting and picnics during the summer.

Skipping breakfast is not a smart way to lose weight - as

many homemakers and girls do. Following a plan of three well-balanced meals a day to obtain the important nutrients needed in each person's daily diet.

September is designated as "Better Breakfast Month" and is a good time to check on the family's breakfast habits.

Breakfast skippers are likely to become more pronounced with the beginning of school and the competition for "prime" time each morning for students and other busy people.

A recent breakfast study in Iowa demonstrated that when a low-fat, low-cholesterol morning meal is indicated, a cereal and milk breakfast is superior to some because it is low in fat and cholesterol, it contains an adequate amount of complex carbohydrates and a small quantity of simple sugar, and it also furnishes adequate protein, important vitamins, and essential minerals.

A basic cereal and milk breakfast pattern for 400 calories for weight reduction is just as nutritionally efficient as others, according to the study. It includes one-half cup orange juice, 1 ounce of whole wheat flakes or other ready-to-eat cereal, 1 cup of nonfat milk for the cereal and as a beverage, 1 teaspoon sugar, 2 slices of white toast, and 1 teaspoon butter. Preserves or honey substituted for butter further reduces the fat and cholesterol.

A few minutes in the morning for an adequate breakfast for weight watchers and girls and boys can pay off in many ways - it can prevent that tired, nervous, and listless feeling during the mid-morning, and improve grades of the school girl and boy.

Cat Mothers

Having a litter of kittens around the house is an enjoyable experience for the whole family. And if yours is an unspayed female cat who is allowed out of the house chances are kittens will be on the way soon after she reaches maturity and comes into heat.

Gestation, the period from from mating to birth, averages 63 days. During pregnancy, the female becomes plump and usually remains in excellent health and spirits. Avoid lifting her and discourage her from jumping to high places. But don't confine your cat as moderate exercise is good.

For the happy event, the experts at the Purina Pet Care Center in St. Louis suggest that you prepare a box lined with clean rags or shredded paper and put it in a dark, quiet, warm place. Introduce the prospective mother to it and hope she'll choose the box for delivery. If not you can move the whole family back once all the kittens are born.

The average litter consists of three or four kittens and normal birth takes about two to three hours. Mother cat likes to "go it alone," but if labor is prolonged, call a veterinarian quickly.

When newly born, kittens are helpless and blind but mother will take excellent care of them.

LaNelle Christian Writes About Europe

(EDITOR'S NOTE -- LaNelle Christian, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wendol Christian, returned recently from Europe. She went on a two-week tour sponsored by Methodist Youth Fellowship of this area. The following is a log of her journey. SM)

We departed Lubbock Thursday, August 4 at 4 p.m. After a stop in Dallas and New York we flew to Paris, France. On arrival in Paris, we met our guide who showed us to our hotel. We had this evening free for sightseeing. The following day was spent touring Paris. We saw the Arch of Triumph built in 1838 by Napoleon. The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier is there. We also saw the Eiffel Tower, built for the World's Fair in 1889. Other sights of Paris were the Invalides Church, Paris Opera, Notre Dame Cathedral with its rose windows and Concord Square. August 7 we flew to London then on to Glasgow, Scotland where we boarded a bus and travelled to Edinburgh. We had two days free for shopping. We saw a concert which featured Scotch Bagpipes and dancers. Following our stay in Edin-

burgh, we travelled to Leeds University where we spent the night. Next morning we went to York, England where we had lunch. In the afternoon we toured Epworth and saw many historical sights of John Wesley.

The morning of August 11, we journeyed to Birmingham to spend the night. We spent the following day touring. We went to Coventry and saw the world's most modern cathedral built in 1962. In the cathedral there was a unity room which can be used by any denomination. The baptistry was made of rock brought from the Holy Land. It also had a beautiful tapestry of Jesus hanging at the front of the church. We saw the ruins of Sir Walter Scott's castle at Kenilworth and the Warwick castle and gardens. We arrived in Stratford-on-Avon in the late evening and spent the night. The morning of August 13 was free and in the afternoon we toured the Holy Trinity Church where William Shakespeare was baptized and buried. We also saw Ann Hathaway's Cottage and Shakespeare's birthplace. The following day we went to Oxford and saw Christ Church College, Jesus College and Lincoln Col-

lege. We saw Winston Churchill's tomb and birthplace. We toured the Blenheim Palace and attended Sunday evening church services at Stratford-on-Avon Methodist Church.

The following day we went to Bristol, stopped at Bath and saw Kingswood School where the World Methodist Youth Conference was in session. We toured the oldest Methodist Chapel in London on the 17th, we toured Windsor Castle and passed through Runnymede field where the Magna Carta was signed and where the Kennedy Memorial now stands. As we arrived in London we saw the building where Eisenhower and Churchill worked out D-Day. We saw Princess Margaret's palace and the Monument of Queen Victoria. The next morning we toured London and saw St. Paul's Cathedral, the home of the Prime Minister with the house guards, the National Art Gallery and Buckingham Palace. Other sights were the Lord Mayor's residence, London Bridge, Tower Bridge, Tower of London, Tower of Big Ben, House of Parliament and Westminster Abbey. The afternoon and evening were free to attend the opening sessions of the World Methodist Conference. The next afternoon we toured Methodist shrines of London.

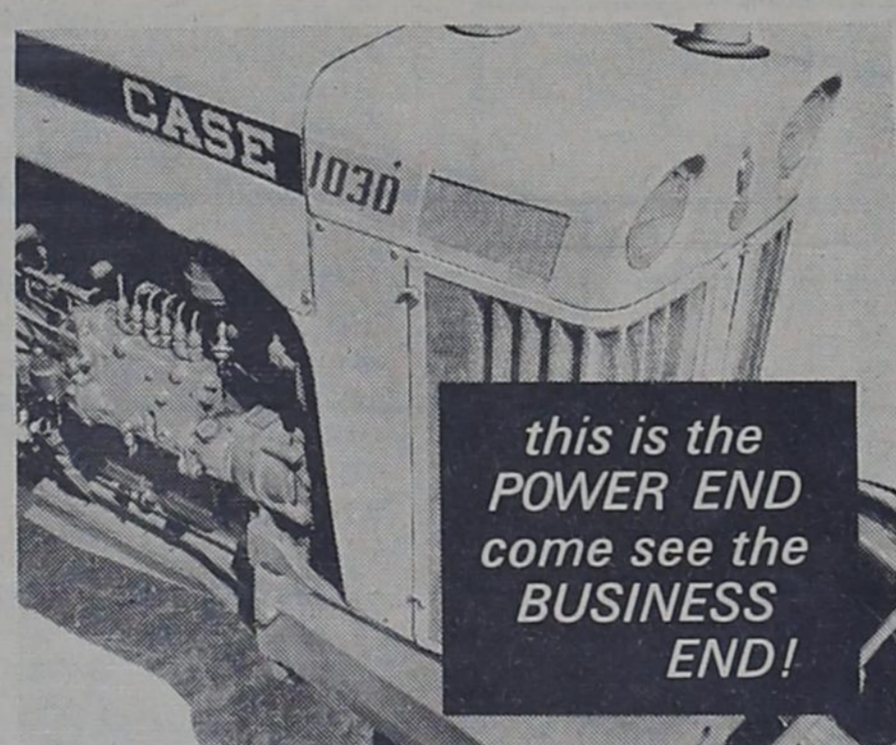
