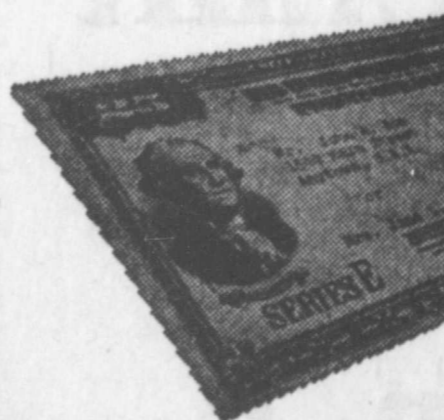

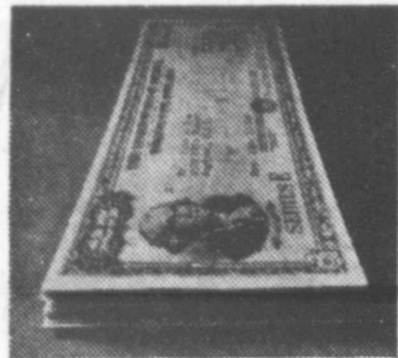

Wesley Knorpp is Donley County Easter Seal chairman The Texas Easter Seal Society provides many services for crippled children and adults who cannot pay all or part of the costs involved and who are not eligible for help from any other resource.

These services provide assistance in paying for some types of therapy, special diagnostic evaluation, orthopedic equipment transportation costs etc., up to a limit of \$150 per client per year for therapy and \$150 for transportation for treatment or evaluation.

Services which cannot be provided by the Easter Seal Agency include tuition, room and board to special schools or sheltered work programs, surgery drugs, medication or hospitalization, non-orthopedic or non-hearing items, school material, clothing or food.
