Taylor Painting Given To Jack Hightower

A painting in oils by 12 year old Timothy Taylor, sixth grade student in Quail School, was presented to Congressman Jack Hightower during the recent Cotton Festival here.

Mr. Hightower saw the painting when it was exhibited in the junior art division of the Collingsworth County Fair and expressed an interest in buying it. Several Hedley people bought the painting for Mr. Hightower, and he plans to hang it in his office in Washington.

The painting is a typical Pseudocypripedium landscape, said Mrs. Buecher Bounds, with whom Timothy has studied art for two years. Timothy also had a showing of his other works in Moffitt Hardware during the Festival.

Timothy won grand and reserve champion for his entries in the Collingsworth County Fair in 1974, and won reserve champion this year. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Taylor of Hedley. He has a twin sister, Kimberly, who has also enrolled as an art student of Mrs. Bounds.

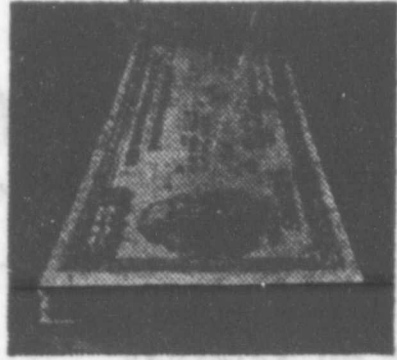

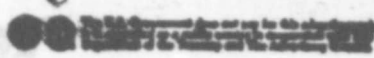
