The new edition contains much bi-centennial information, and in the bi-centennial edition of the Almanac. It tells much on bi-centennial activities in Texas.

Other special features include a history of the Texas Railroad Commission, the latest U. S. census on manufacturing, wholesale and retail trade, service industries and transportation in Texas, and an account of the 10 Travel Trails in Texas.

Included also are data on election results, listings of county, municipal and state officials, appointive boards and commissions, and complete information on Texas as a whole.
