Farm Inputs Plentiful

Farm Inputs Plentiful—Although farmers and ranchers are facing many problems today, at least most of the inputs they need remain generally plentiful, points out an economist for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service.

Fertilizers will be ample to meet farm and ranch needs this fall and next spring although prices will be slightly higher. Pesticides should also be sufficient but prices are likely to increase due to larger crop acreages next year.

A good selection of machinery is available but a shortage could develop later. And the fuel situation should remain stable unless there's a long, frigid winter or an oil embargo.
