LESS THAN TWO weeks remain before voters will go to the polls to elect their president for the next four years. According to much of what we read, it appears that even this close to the election, a number of voters have not made up their minds as to who they will vote for.

Just prior to and immediately following the Democratic National Convention, Jimmy Carter was the "shooting star" in the political arena, and it appeared that President Ford would have little chance of catching this newcomer.

That was before Carter had made a stand on many subjects, and before he had undergone the pressures of a national campaign. The former Georgia Governor has made some statements, had some endorsements, and granted the infamous interview with Playboy Magazine, and these actions have probably cost him votes in some quarters.

However, an opinion that we read this week seemed to believe that Carter was the victor in the second of the three debates, and that he had begun to beat back the advances made by President Ford in recent weeks.

So, it appears that the race may well go right down to the wire, and that the early indication that Carter might win in a breeze will have been washed away to the extent that the race might turn out to be a real toss-up.

ORIGINALLY, Bovina voters had only had the presidential race, and the U.S. Senate and Congressional race to contend with for 1976.

But due to the death of Wilbur Charles, who was in the middle of his term as Justice of the Peace, a special election had to be called, since Charles' unexpired term had more than two years to run.

This will make for two contested races within the county, as the Friona precinct has a Democratic and Republican candidate vying in the commissioner's race.

In the U.S. Congressional race, longtime representative George Mahon has an opponent for the first time since 1946 in former Odessa Mayor Jim Reese. And in the Senate race, Lloyd Bentsen is opposed by Alan Steelman.

Various of the other statewide offices are contested this November.

So-Texas is slowly becoming a two-party state. It is taking a while, but the age old custom of winning your office in the Democratic primary and then winning the general election as a formality is beginning to change.

And this is good for politics. People change—even your elected officials. Sometimes we have voted to nominate a person in the primary, and by the time the general election rolled around, we were completely against the person. With a two-party system, you can have two shots at an individual in a case such as this.

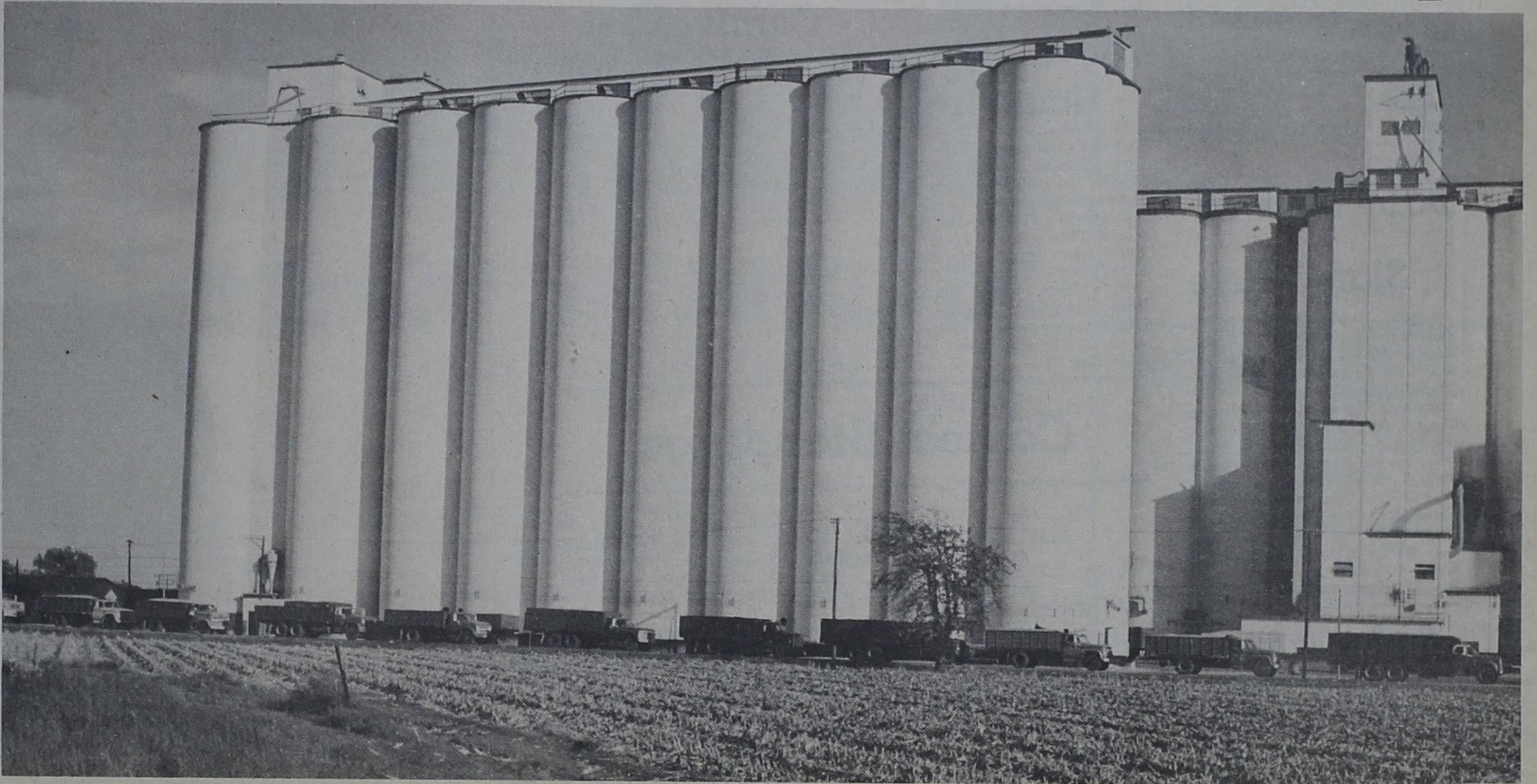
And then, if you were rooting for the Yankees in the World Series, then by the time Sunday was over, you really felt like you had had a "lost weekend."

## Whitten Scores 13 In Contest

The Junior Class of Bovina High School has scheduled their class play. The play is a mystery-comedy in three acts entitled "The Phantom Strikes Again."

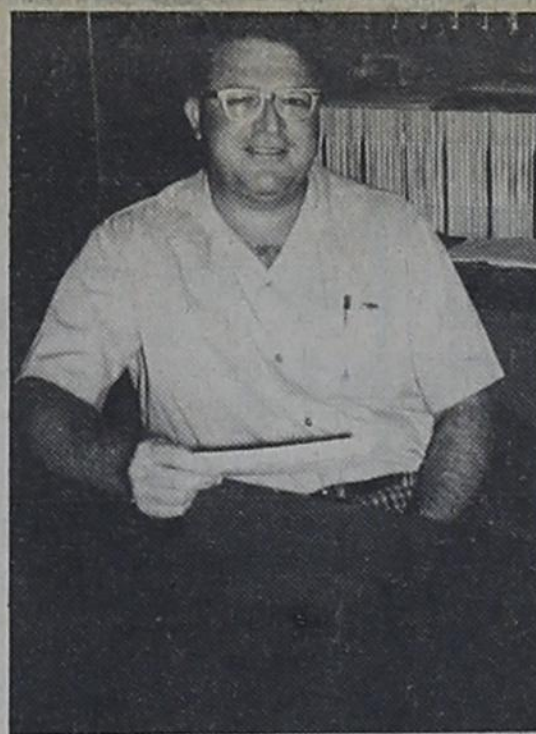

## Committee Named For Jim Reese

A committee for the election of Jim Reese for Congress has been named by Jimmy Briggs, chairman. The members are: Jack Hamil, Peggy Hamil, Frank Hinkson, John Getz, Vernon Estes, Linda Marshall, and Lee Stevenson.

Jim Reese is an outstanding young man, and his political philosophy is most conservative. He says, "When I am elected, I will work to get the government off our backs and out of our pockets! I will vote to cut back the number of Washington bureaucrats who are burying us in a sea of rules, regulations, and red tape."

George Mahon, his opponent, has been in Washington 42 of his 76 years, and a recent study made by the Americans for Constitutional Action shows that Mr. Mahon no longer thinks or votes as a West Texan, Reese says.

His study shows Mahon has voted as follows: 57 per cent of the time against a sound dollar; 65 per cent of the time against a private market and individual freedom of choice and for government price fixing and controls; 50 per cent of the time against private ownership and for government ownership; 49 per cent of the time against a strong national defense.

"We believe the political philosophy and beliefs of Jim Reese (see p. ad. this issue) are more that of the West Texan than those of his opponent," said Briggs.

## Yields Termed "Favorable"

Blessed with good weather, the corn harvest in the Bovina area has progressed at a steady clip, and at press time this week, the harvest was well past its peak, and was on the downhill grade.

Long lines formed at the local elevators during the past week, as the elevators attempted to keep pace with the harvest work.

"It is hard to say exactly what percentage of the crop is harvested, but we are 'way over half through,'" said Earl Whitten at Sherley Grain Tuesday.

A number of farmers have finished up as of press time this week, or would finish up in short order.

Whitten said that the yields, overall, were in line with what the farmers were hoping for. "There have been some good yields, some real outstanding yields, and some just fair," he said.

The price of corn has been fairly stable this week, holding at around \$4.13 per cwt. Most farmers would like a better price, and are not selling their crop for the most part.

A spokesman for Bovina Wheat Growers agreed with the estimate

that the crop was considerably on the downhill side of the harvest run. Many empty fields are evident, and some have only a little corn left.

The harvest of the area's milo crop has not gotten underway to a large extent, but it will be a short harvest. One source said he doubted that five per cent of the area's grain crop was planted to milo this year.

Except for minor delays, the harvest has gone without incident. Last Friday morning the harvest was interrupted when the area received around a half-inch of rain.

## Yearbooks Go On Sale

Bovina School Annuals for 1977 will go on sale Thursday at the school. Thursday morning the annual staff will present some skits and forms will be handed out for students to reserve their annuals.

The following Thursday, October 28, annuals that were reserved must be paid for. The annual staff will cover the Elementary and Ridgelea Schools on these two days to reserve and collect for the annuals.

The annuals this year will cost \$7.50. Being offered this year also will be the option to have a name engraved on the front. The name engraving will cost \$2 extra.

The only days that the 1977 annuals can be bought will be on Thursday, October 21 and 28. If you want an annual but have no children in school Mrs. Pat Jacobs or some of the annual staff can be notified. Thursday, October 28, is definitely the last day the 1977 Bovina School annual will be sold.

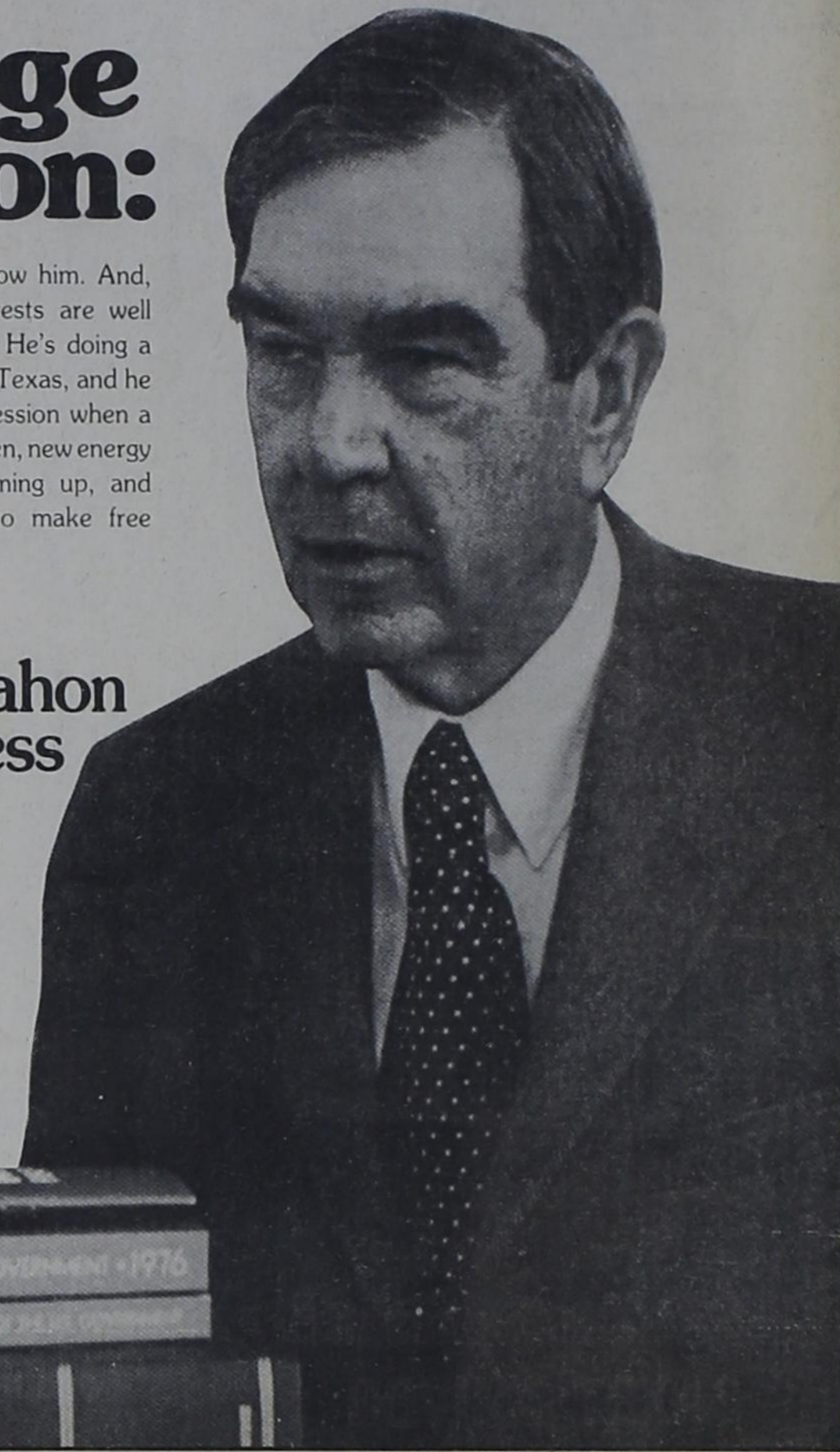

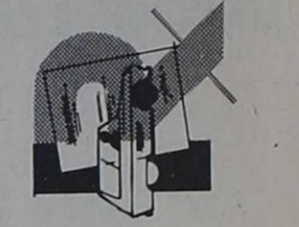
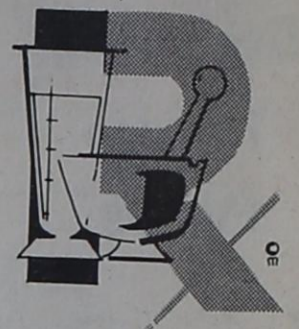

**FARWELL WINS**

**Mustangs Stumble In Dist.**

The Bovina Mustangs were stopped by the Farwell Steers last Friday night as they lost to their cross-county rivals 30-7 in both teams' district openers. Farwell exploded for 18 points in the fourth period to boost their record to 6-0 while Bovina's dropped to 3-3.

**Ponies To Host S-E On Friday**

The Bovina Mustangs will take on the Springlake-Earth Wolverines next Friday night as they try for their first district win. The Wolverines are 1-0 in district and 2-4 for the year. The Mustangs take a 0-1 district slate and a 3-3 season record into the contest. Last week, the "Wolves" slipped by a big, tough Vega team 7-0. A one-yard scoring burst in the second period by Springlake-Earth's Mack Barton, their second quarterback, made the difference in the game. George Flores kicked the extra point.

A Vega fumble on the Longhorn's eight-yard line set up the Wolverines' touchdown as Keith Clayton pounced on the ball. Barton scored four plays later with 5:47 left in the first half.

Wolverine end Joe Fulfer intercepted two passes for the night. He got his second with 1:15 left in the fourth period to halt a Vega drive on the Longhorn 48.

Bovina head coach Joe Christian speaks highly of the Springlake-Earth Wolverines. "They have good size, and their quarterback is fifth in the state in the 100 yard dash, so they've got plenty of speed," says Christian.

The Wolverine team lost several starters from their team by graduation last year, but even with their inexperience, they have proven themselves a team

to be reckoned with. Their new head coach, Roland Murray, is probably one of the "better young coaches in Texas," according to Top-O-Texas Football Magazine. He is a former grid standout from Abernathy and has helped build New Deal to a grid power the past two years. The Wolverines aren't lacking in speed as they return three members of their 43.6 sprint relay team starting in their backfield. Two returning starters and all-state candidates are quarterback Barton and fullback Rodney Geissler.

All-district Brent Been will be starting at center. He is also one of the top defensive ends in the area. Others in the offensive line include guard Tim May (170) and tackles Bryan Taylor (185) and Greg Holland (175).

Top-O-Texas Magazine picked the Wolverines as the surprise team of the year. Last week they surprised Vega. This week's game with Bovina should be very interesting.

Coach Christian is hopeful. "We're looking for improvement," he said. "We've improved every week so far. We've also established a trend. We haven't lost a home game or won a road game." Hopefully the trend will continue for one more week.

The Mustangs will meet the Springlake-Earth Wolverines at home in Bovina next Friday at 7:30 p.m.

"We didn't play very well in the first quarter," said Mustang head coach Joe Christian. "We had trouble moving the ball. Our best drive came on our third possession when we got the ball on our eight yard line and drove all the way--92 yards for the touchdown. Anytime you do that it's good."

"We looked real good at times," he continued. "The offense had a good game and the defense did better. We're young and young kids tend to get down on themselves quicker, but they're still improving every week."

Farwell's first touchdown came after a Bovina fumble with Mike Goettsch taking the ball in on a two yard plunge.

Bovina couldn't move the ball on their second possession and were forced to punt to the Steers. The Steers took over on their own 40 and moved the ball all the way down field with quarterback Russ Jones slipping in from the eight on a keeper.

Farwell's second touchdown of the fourth stanza came after a fumble recovery by the Steers. Taking over on Bovina's 30, they drove 29 yards with Jones keeping it for the final yard to make the score 24-7 with 4:43 left.

The final TD came with 53 seconds left on a nine-yard pass from Jones to Bibbs. Time ran out as the Steers captured a 1-0 district record, leaving the Mustangs with a 0-1 district record.

Mike Goettsch had 107 yards on 18 carries for the undefeated Steers and one touchdown.
