Highway Work

Children—Work in Donley County is included in the 1978 Special Rehabilitation and State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer Lewis H. White of Children said the work includes seal coat on 16.9 miles of State Highway 70 from the Gray County line, south to U. S. 287 at Clarendon at an estimated cost of \$218,700.

Field Day

The Social Security Administration District Office in Amarillo has received reports from the public that they are being contacted by a man who is falsely representing himself as an employee of the Social Security Administration, reports Jim Talbot, District Manager. "He uses the guise of one of our employees and tells the people that if they are receiving Supplemental Security Income, they are now required to pay eight dollars a month just to receive SSI," says Talbot. "Those who are on SSI are in no way obligated to pay a fee for receiving these benefits."
