Bovina, Texas

Aside from one guest speaker at Lions Club here recently, who was mentioned in this space last week, people we talk to, especially out - of - towners, comment on Bovina's fine present growth rate and potential for the future.

Because of community pride, we're not hard to engage in such conversation and we attempt to encourage it in every way possible once the subject is brought up.

In all modesty for our favorite town, though, we will admit that the steady, continuous building and population increase is encouraging. Laying the modesty aside, we'll say that such wonderful things couldn't happen to a better place.

Small towns on the Plains are bucking the trend in the nation, we understand from what we read. They are growing, for the most part, while small towns in other areas are going down-

Nothing, however, succeeds like success and each and every time one improvement or addition is made, it calls for something more.

Another paving program, started early next Spring, would fit right into this growth and improvement picture, too.

Too much newspaper space is wasted, we think, in encouraging people to vote. We mean just vote period. You never can tell - if you convince a fellow to go to the polls who wasn't going anyway - you might just get your vote killed.

However, this week is the time to point out that this year's state amendment election is scheduled for Tuesday, A semibrief description of the 10 amendments to be voted on appear elsewhere in this issue of The Blade.

Traditionally, voter turnout at amendment elections is light and the one next Tuesday is not expected to be an exception.

The amendment which has probably created the most attention is No. 4 on the ballot. If it carries, it will extend the terms of statewide elected officials from two to four years.

On the surface, that sounds like a fair request which probably should be granted. The fly in the ointment, if there is any, is that there is no restriction in the state constitution on the number of terms to which a governor may be elected by the

Those who are against this particular amendment argue that it is an important principle of government that elective officials should go back to the voters every two years for renewal of their authority and approval of their work and that re-election is not a great problem for a competent official since Texas voters have always been willing to grant successive terms.

Major arguments for fouryear terms are that a two-year term is too short for an efficient program to be carried out; that the present set-up requires too much of the official's time in campaigning for re-election; and since running for office is expensive, campaigns every two years put an official in an embarrassing position of depending too much on outside con-

The four-year elective term is coming, as we see it. If this amendment isn't passed by the vote of the people of Texas in this election, it will be brought back before them, possibly with a limit on the number of terms an official may serve. Four-year terms are a thing of the future and we may as well get ready.

Nonetheless, those for and against arguments are sound and it's up to the individual voter to decide how he feels about the situation.

It might be fitting to point out here that a majority of our state legislators probably favor the amendments or else they wouldn't be submitted to the

people for their vote. That is, in our opinion, a pretty good rule of thumb to follow if you are undecided (Continued on page 2)

this by increasing the state ad valorem tax for this purpose from five cents to 10 cents on \$100 valuation.

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Number Two -- would increase Veterans Land Fund from \$200 million to \$400 million. This is the same amendment which was defeated in 1963 with one exception. The exception is that the amount of new bonds which would be authorized is larger than was proposed at that time. The amount of loan to be made to one veteran would be increased from \$7500 to

\$10,000. Number Three -- would permit Legislature to appropriate funds for use by needy aged, needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, needy blind, needy children and caretakers of such children. It would raise the appropriation limit for these purposes from \$52 million to \$60 million.

"We're concerned about Nazareth," Stone says, "This could be the week we lose a district game. They have that good passing attack and some big backs."


