But editors have not only to put up with the vagaries of individual officers and be forbidden to express their opinion on this or that ques tion, but they are also liable to receive a command to make statements directly contrary to their own con-

victions and knowledge of facts. In addition to these summonses to appear, the censorship department maintains an active correspondence with the papers by means of circulars, which contain instructions concerning matters to be suppressed.

In critical times such circulars follow so quickly, often contradicting one another, that the wretched editor is generally at his wits' end to know what to do.

The censor watches more closely over political than social morals, and it is often surprising to see the bold drawings allowed to pass. Political cartoons very seldom obtain permission to be printed. - London Gazette

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
