A big step is presently being taken to overcome a years-old problem in Bovina -- a lack of office space.

With the remodeling project currently underway by Edward Isaac on his Main Street building, the lack of office space in this town will be remedied to some extent. Whether this will be enough to fill all the need remains to be seen and it just could be that this new office building will show the need for still more space.

Adequate office space has always rented well and continually here and, no doubt, some rental business has been lost because more places weren't available.

Isaac's confidence in the continued progress and future of his (and our) community is to be commended. We're proud of him for investing his money in a project which will be of benefit to the entire community. And not only will additional office space be available when the remodeling is complete, but the building, once vacant and unattractive, will add to the appearance of the entire business area of the town.

We're proud of it.

People from more conservative communities and parts of the country might not believe it, but a bus load of Bovina people, some of them football fans, are going to Arkansas in about 10 days for the Texas Tech-University of Arkansas football game.

This is one of those kind of deals which people often think about and say, "Wouldn't that be fun?" and then forget about. Not so this time. Something has been, and is being, done about it. The trip is all but set, as we understand it. And we don't mean just agreed on; we mean paid for.

To the trip promoters, it wasn't enough to say that you were interested in going. They got your money and then signed your name to the list. This way, backing out is strictly up to the fellow who paid the money. He doesn't have to make the trip, but his seat on the bus does and the cost is all the same.

Such a business-like way of tending to pleasure trips is admirable.

It matters not now what Tech or Arkansas do in their games this Saturday. Win or lose, the Bovina bus trip is on.

It would have been a cinch to find a busload of people who were interested in going to the game if it decides the Southwest Conference champion. But probably it would have been too late to get tickets and arrange the trip, then. So, the trip was scheduled and the people lined up long before the exact importance of the contest in question was determined.

The trip has been described as being of the "ridiculously fun" type. We're not going, but we can't help but be impressed a little by the people who are. We admire their "sporting blood."

One of the reasons we're not going to make the trip is that we refuse to jump on the Red Raider bandwagon just because they're having a good year. People who are Raider fans have insisted that we let bygones be bygones and join in the fun during this great Tech football year.

Their big-heartedness is appreciated.

Aubrey Brock says that if Tech should be lucky enough to win its next two football games and take the championship flag for the first time in history, the Blade's editor can take the following week off.

"If that happens," Brock allows, "those Tech people will write you so many letters to the editor that you won't have space to print anything else that week."

Surely such won't, and wouldn't, be the case. Tech people would be much too big to "rub it in" on a dedicated Fightin' Texas Aggie fan just because their team won the Conference.

Wouldn't they?

Arkansas, Here Bovina Comes

A busload of Texas Tech Red Raider football fans from Bovina have chartered a bus to the Tech-Arkansas game in Fayetteville, Ark. November 20.

Approximately 40 people have signed up for the bus trip, paid their bus fare and purchased their game tickets, promoters of the trip report.

The bus is scheduled to leave about noon Friday, November 19. That night will be spent in Tulsa, according to present plans. The bus will go on to Fayetteville and the game Saturday and return to Tulsa Saturday night.

The return trip from Tulsa to Bovina will be made Sunday.

The enthusiastic Red Raider fans are hoping that the Tech Arkansas game will decide the Southwest Conference championship. However, each of the teams has a conference game to play this Saturday and the November 20 game might have no bearing on the conference championship.

Nonetheless, the trip has been scheduled and will be made. It was felt by those interested in the trip that if they waited until the importance of the game was known, it would be too late to get tickets, charter the bus and arrange the trip.

The bus has been chartered from New Mexico Transportation, through the company's agent here, Paul Jones Texaco.

Rummage Sale Set Saturday

A bicycle will be the door prize at a rummage sale Saturday in the fire station building on Main Street.

The rummage sale will be the first fund-raising activity for the community improvement project, which has as its goal building a clinic for Bovina.

Items to be offered for sale are toys, clothes, dishes, silverware and small pieces of furniture, according to Mrs. Bob Estes, a member of the community improvement committee who is in charge of the rummage sale.

The sale will begin at 9 a.m. and continue throughout the day. People having items they wish to donate to the cause are requested to leave them at the building or contact Mrs. Estes and they will be picked up. A

key to the building is available at the city hall (next door) during regular office hours.

Money made by the rummage sale will be combined with funds from other sources for building a community clinic.

This is the first in a series of fund-raising events for the project, according to Mrs. Estes.

Customers of the sale will receive one chance on the bicycle for each \$1 in purchases. The winner will have a choice of either a boys' or girls' bicycle from Western Auto here, Mrs. Estes explains.

"We still need more items for the sale," she points out, "and we'll appreciate the cooperation of everyone in helping make this event successful."

New Football Field Discussed By Board

Possibilities for a new football stadium for Bovina Schools highlighted a lengthy meeting of the school board Monday night.

Advancement of the high school to Class A status next year has created an even greater need than before for additional seating space for football games, school board members agreed.

No decision was made concerning building a new stadium. Ways and means of paying the cost of the facility were considered and discussed.

The field will be built on two city blocks of school-owned land a block west of the school property. A rough estimate of the cost is \$35,000, according to Superintendent Otis Spears. The funds could be raised with a bond election, by increasing the present tax rate, by using funds now available in the school's interest and sinking fund or by selling options on seats in the new stadium, Spears points out.

The board discussed all the possibilities and a decision is expected to be reached at a later date. The board was in agreement that a new stadium needs to be built, Spears says.

The estimated cost includes bleachers, a fieldhouse, sodding the field and fencing the area.

Discussion of the proposed new athletic field took up a majority of the time of the meeting which lasted until near midnight.

In other business, the board

accepted, "with sincere regret" the resignation of Mrs. W.E. Williams, teacher of a first grade section. Mrs. Williams, who is now in the hospital at Friona, resigned because of ill health.

Mrs. Williams is in her 33rd year of teaching and her 26th year here. She also taught in Tarrant County for two years and in Parker County five years.

Two Charged With Assault

A shooting in downtown Bovina Sunday night resulted in one youth being seriously injured and two others charged with assault with intent to murder.

The shooting occurred about 9 p.m. Sunday in front of Mustang Theatre on Main Street. According to reports, Gonzales was standing on the sidewalk on the north side of the street, near the theatre. The Garcia cousins allegedly drove up in a car near where was standing. One shot was fired.

According to Denney, the bullet entered one shoulder and lodged in the opposite shoulder, piercing a lung on the way. Gonzales was rushed to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona by his friends.

The shot was believed to have been fired by Eugene Garcia, Denney says. Cecil Garcia was in the car with him at the time. They were arrested at the labor housing area at Bovina GInCo., where they were staying, within minutes after the shooting by Denney and Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter.

The Garcia boys were taken to Farwell where they were arraigned before Justice of the Peace J. R. Thornton. He set their bond at \$2000 each.

Cecil has been working here as a farmhand, Denney says. Eugene arrived here "about a week ago," to seek work.

Gonzales' condition was considered serious following the shooting. His condition is now reported to be improved, however.

Marshall Denney says that according to information he has the boys had "a few words (argument)" a few days prior to the shooting. "Outside of that, I don't know of any trouble between them," he reports. It is not known whether words were

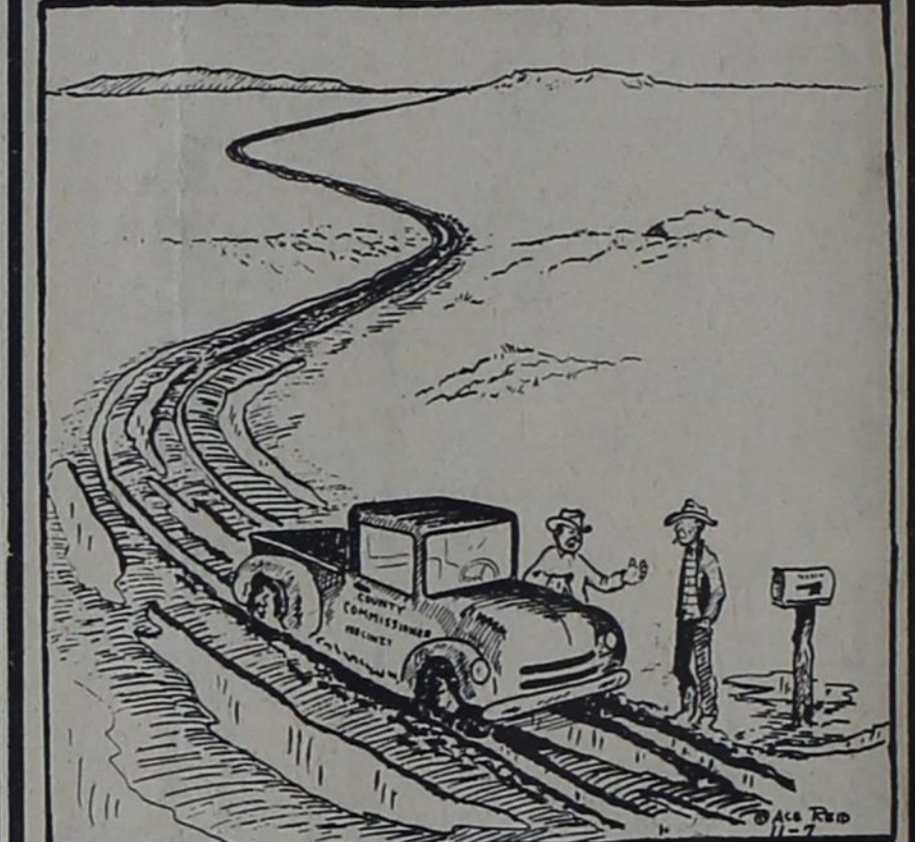

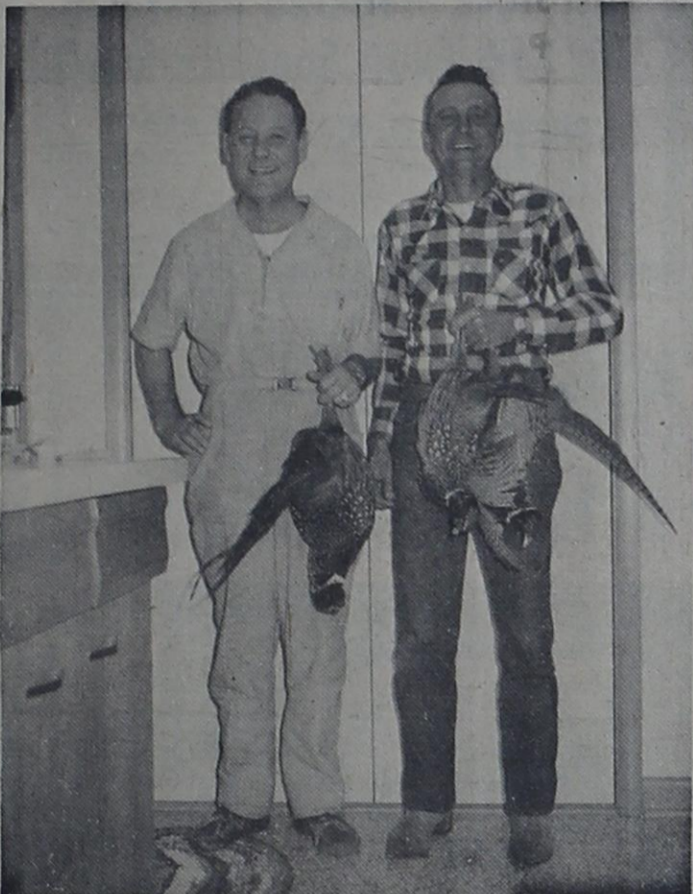

Recently I have read several letters to editors from boys who are in Viet Nam. It is quite interesting to see their duties and conditions over there.

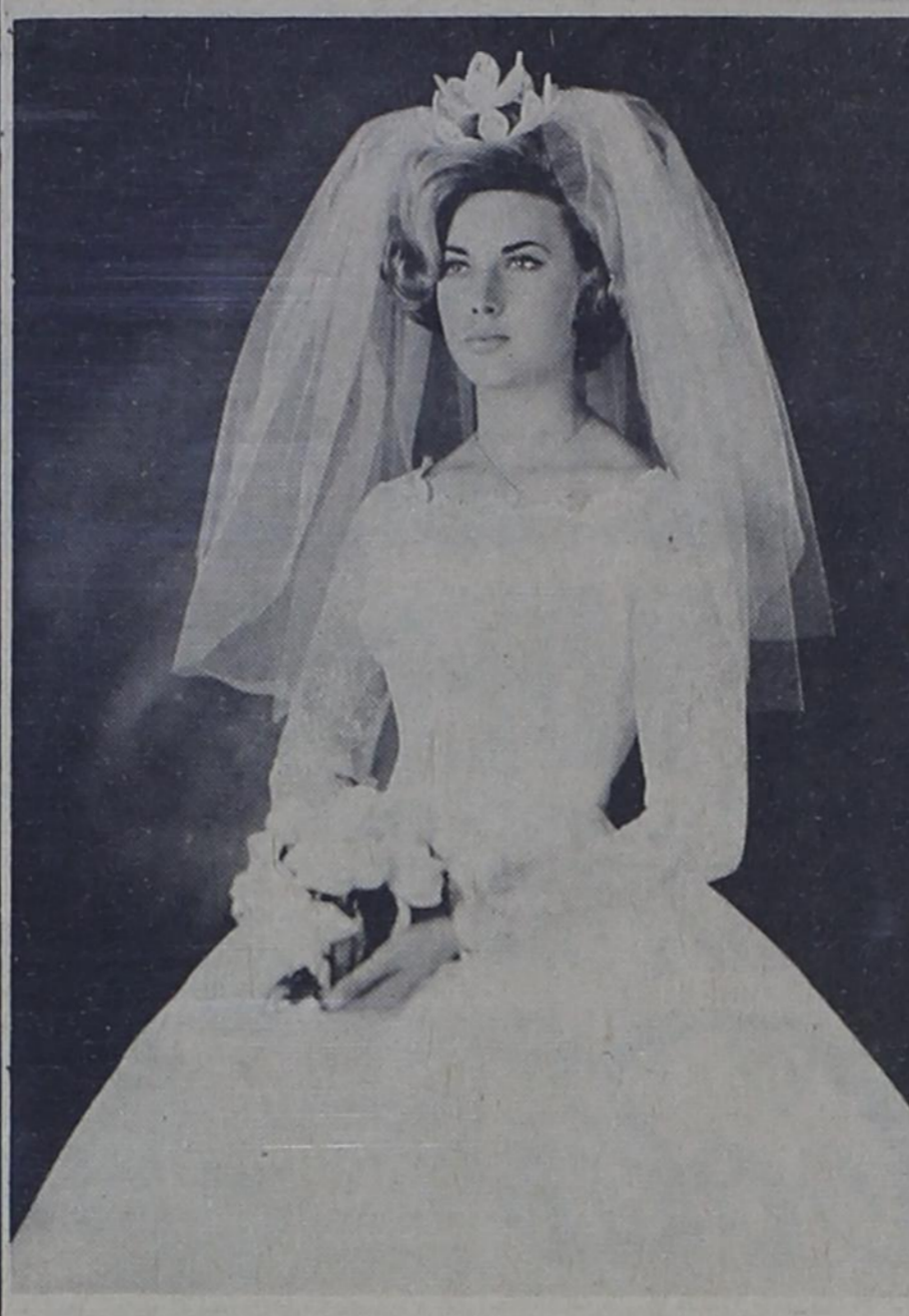

On The Farm In Parmer County

Cotton classing offices are now furnishing micronaire readings on all cotton classing samples, without additional charge. They will appear on all cards along with grade and staple.

This is in keeping with USDA's announcement on October 25 that "mike" measurements of fineness will be included as an additional factor for 1965 Upland cotton going under price support loan after October 31.

Mike readings, used widely in commercial channels, are measured on a scale from 2.4 to 8.0, in steps of one-tenth. It works like this: Compressed air at 6 pounds pressure is forced through the sample of cotton. A special air-flow instrument registers the mike reading of that particular sample. Fine cottons permit less air to pass through. Thus, the finer the fibers, the lower the readings. Fineness, depending on conditions, can be related to maturity. Fineness and maturity affect the spinability and value of cotton.

Included in the USDA announcement was a schedule of premiums and discounts that will be applied when cotton is put under loan. If the mike reading ranges 3.6 through 4.8, a premium value of 14 points per pound will be allowed. No premium or discount will be allowed if the reading is 3.3 through 3.5, or 4.9 through 5.1. But discounts from 15 to 300 points will apply if readings are outside these measurements.

COTTON STRIPPER EFFICIENCY
Three factors will determine the efficiency of your cotton stripping operation. These are:

1. Field conditions at harvest time;
2. Machine characteristics and adjustments; and
3. Skill of the operator.

Very important is field conditions at harvest. In damp weather, performance of a cotton stripper will be less efficient than under dry conditions. Extensive testing has shown best cotton stripper performance is obtained when humidity is below 60%.

So, for better grades and cleaner fields delay harvesting until the relative humidity is 60% or less at boll height in the field to be harvested.

Condition of the cotton stalk is also important in addition to relative humidity. Strippers are designed to handle comparatively large volumes of dry trash efficiently. But a small amount of green leaves and other green trash can cause a significant reduction in the grade of stripped cotton. For this reason, cotton harvested with a stripper prior to frost should be treated with a chemical desiccant to kill the leaves.

After the desiccant application, delay harvesting for a

week or ten days. This will allow leaves and leaf stems to become brittle. Harvest should not be delayed until the main stalk and branches are dead, as this will cause more bark to be accumulated with the cotton, which can cause a reduction in grade.

Harvesting after frost should be delayed until frost-killed leaves and stems are brittle or crisp. Here again, harvesting should be done while the main stalk still has enough sap in it to be limber. Brittle stalks and branches mean more bark in the cotton, but leathery leaves and limber leaf stems mean extra moisture in the harvested cotton which can cause sweating during storage prior to ginning.

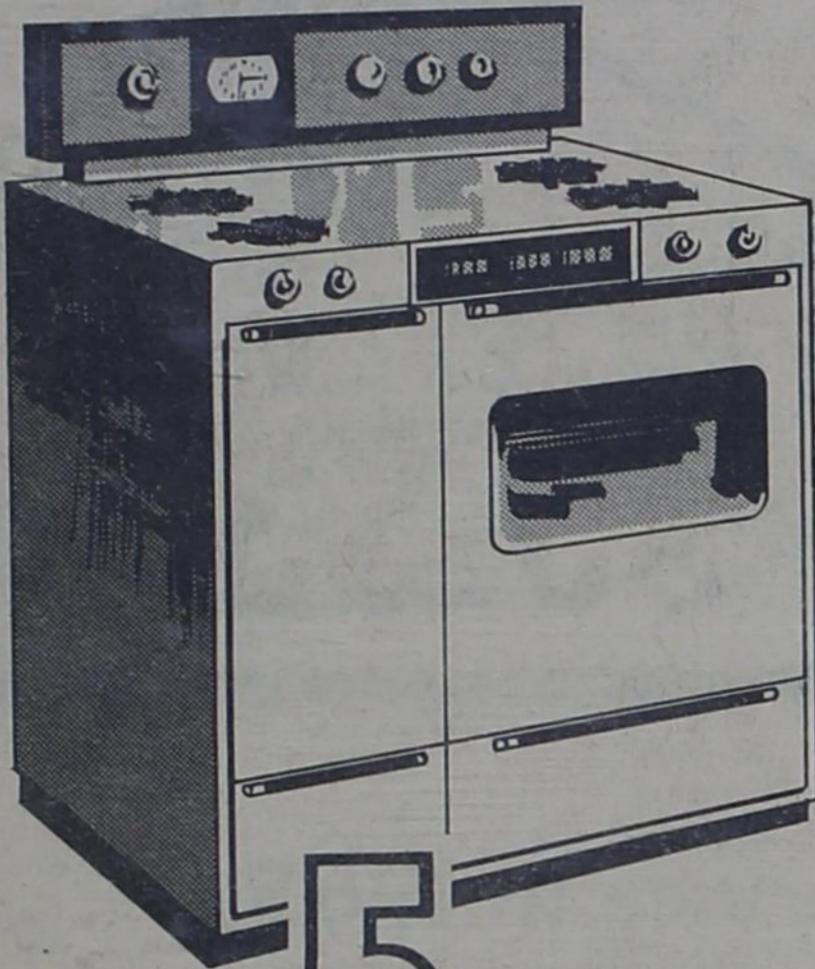

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For 1966 --

Mills Explains Wheat Program

EDITOR'S NOTE -- Following is a news release from the county ASCS for this week. Prepared by Prentice L. Mills, office manager, it is a thumbnail sketch of the 1966 wheat program.)

The 1966 Wheat Program is very similar to the 1965 program.

To a participating farm there is a mandatory diversion of 15% of the allotment for the farm. This was 11.1% in 1965.

An additional diversion equal to 50% of the allotment may be made. Or, on a small farm, the total diversion can be as much as 25 acres. For Example: Farm with 100 acre allotment signs for minimum participation: 100 acres of wheat is planted and 15 acres diverted. This farm could participate by diverting an additional 50 acres (divert a total of 65 acres) and planting 50 acres. In this case a diversion payment would be made on the additional 50 acres diverted.

Another example: Farm with 30 acre allotment signs for minimum participation: 30 acres of wheat is planted and 4.5 acres is diverted. This farm could participate to the maximum by diverting an additional 20.5 acres (total diversion of 25 acres) and plant 5 acres. Payment would be earned on 20.5 acres.

PLANTED ACREAGE PAYMENTS

A participating farm will receive 75¢ domestic certificate on 45% of its allotment times normal yield and will also receive 56¢ payment from CCC funds on 45% of allotment times normal yield. For example: Farm has 100 acre allotment and plants 45 acres or more and has normal yield of 36 bushels per acre. The payment

would be 36 X 45 X \$1.31 = \$2122.20.

It is not anticipated that export certificates earned by a farm will amount to much, if anything, on the 1966 crop wheat.

COOPERATOR REQUIREMENTS:

1. Sign intention to participate.
 2. Meet conserving base requirement.
 3. Set aside mandatory diversion equal to 15% of farm allotment.
 4. Meet additional diversion intentions, if any.
 5. Comply with other allotment crops (cotton, peanuts) on the particular farm.
 6. Comply with wheat allotment or permitted acreage if applicable under substitution on other farms in which he has an interest.
 7. Plant within permitted acreage on participating farm. Substitute crops can be planted on additional diverted acreage. Not sure on mandatory acres (could not in 1965). Can substitute wheat for feed grain.
- Any question concerning a particular farm should be brought to the ASCS office.

The company has a similar plant in operation at Hereford.

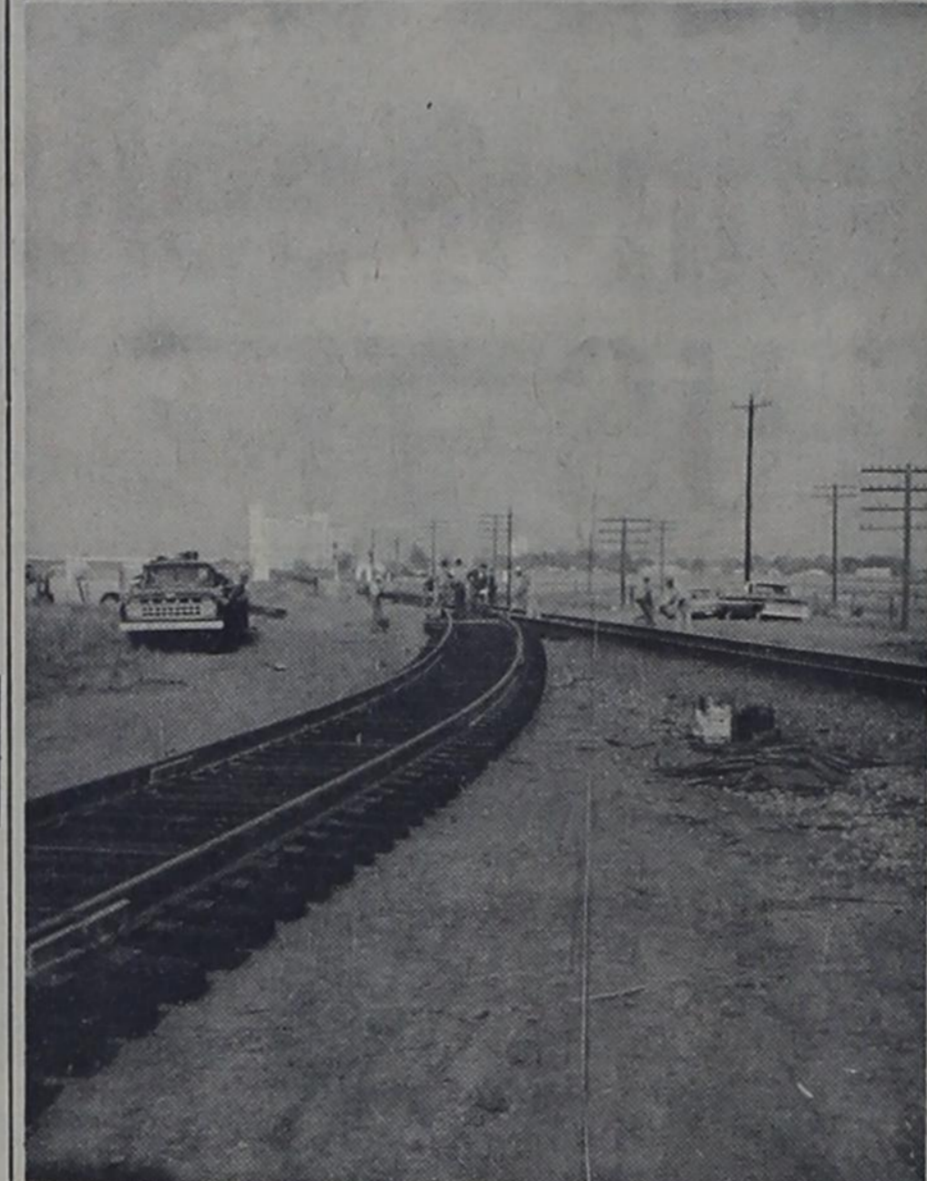
Mrs. Williams Hospitalized

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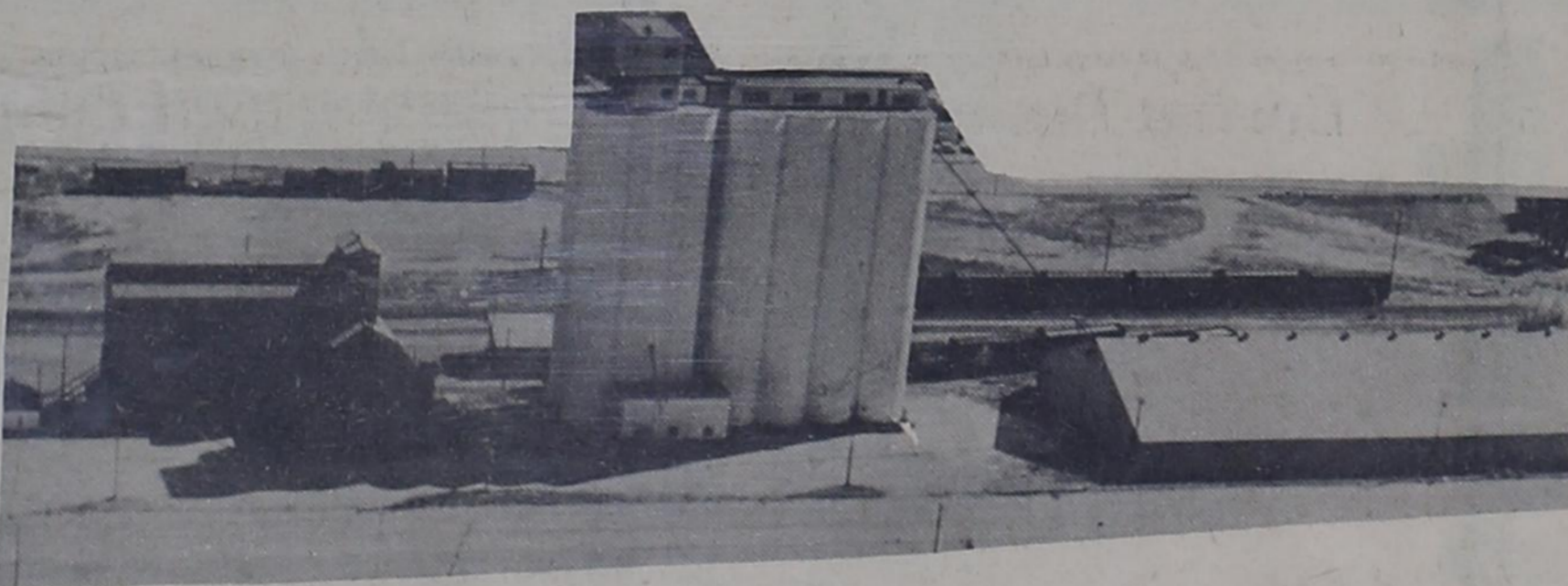

Record Now 5-4 --

Ponies Kick Horns; Win By 32-6 Count

The Lazbuddie Longhorns scored the first time they got the ball in a District 1-B game here Friday night, but from then on the Bovina Mustangs were in complete control and the host team emerged with a 32-6 win.

The victory was the fourth in five district starts for the Mustangs. They are now 5-4 for the season. The loss made Lazbuddie's district record 1-3, the win being over cellar-dwelling Hart.

Halfback Scotty Rundell led the way offensively for the Ponies as he scored three-six pointers on runs of one, seven and 46 yards. Fullback Carl Harris contributed one TD on a four yard run and a 21-yard pass play from Quarterback

Jerry Roach to End Lane Gopher accounted for one, Bovina's first. Following the first Bovina score, Roach passed to End Lynn Murphy for the extra points.

Lazbuddie's opening scoring drive covered 70 yards in 12 plays and was aided by a five-yard penalty against the Mustangs. Terry Parham made the score from one yard out. An attempted kick for the extra point was no good.

The Mustangs weren't able to burst the goose egg on the scoreboard until the second period, when they got three touchdowns. The Roach-to-Gober pass play for the score climaxed an 86 yard drive that required 12 plays. Rundell did half the ball carrying and also

caught a four-yard pass from Roach.

Bovina's second and third touchdowns came quickly after the ice was broken. After taking the 8-6 lead, the Mustangs forced Lazbuddie to punt and Halfback Dean Stanberry returned it to the Bovina 46. The score, which was made by Harris, came 11 plays later in spite of a five-yard penalty setback. Roach's pass for the extras was no good to leave the score 14-6.

The Longhorns were again held on downs following the kickoff and Bovina put a short punt in play on the Lazbuddie 36. The Bovina drive was halted on the 20 by a fumble, but Roach intercepted a stray Horn aerial two plays later, returning it to the four yard line. From there, Rundell made three and then one for the tally.

Eddi Corn and Roman Ramirez paced the Mustangs defensively. The Ponies held the Lazbuddie offensive attack in check after the first score which made the game's outcome look bleak for the partisan hometown crowd.

Rundell enjoyed his best game of the season as he racked up a total of 230 yards on the ground in 29 runs. Harris made 80 yards in 15 attempts. The Longhorns were set for Halfback Dean Stanberry, evidently, as he managed for only 21 yards in 11 tries.
