## Nothing Good Ever Happens!

This is Red Ribbon Week. It is a state campaign in our schools and community to try and keep kids off drugs, alcohol, or other mind-altering chemicals.

It is supposed to be an education program warning our youth of the consequences of drug use. I hope it works. The dangers of drug use are apparent every day yet some kids and young people believe themselves to be "bullet proof" when it comes to trouble.

I know about bullet proof. I have been "8-foot tall and bullet proof" a few times in my past. A wise woman (who happened to be a judge) once told me that "nothing good ever happens because of drugs and alcohol." I tried to prove her theory wrong but failed.

Friona interim police chief Tony Baptiste wrote in this paper a couple of weeks ago about the drug problem in Friona. Many citizens are ignorant of the local drug scene by choice. It is easy to ignore something until it shows up in your own life. Baptiste said half of our local crime is related to drug activity.

He continued: "Do we have drug dealers in Friona? Absolutely. Do we have drug addicts in Friona? Absolutely!" Chief Leon Saddler would probably certify the same thing about Bovina.

To impressionable, energetic kids, drugs are "fun and exciting." In the beginning. Drugs are trouble sooner or later. Users need money to buy. To get money, stealing starts. Family trouble follows. Resentment and anger and crime spill over into the community. Violence and prison, hospitals or asylums are the ultimate destinations of drug addicts.

Support the Red Ribbon campaign not only this week but every week. Help keep a kid off drugs by example and guidance and encouragement. Where do you start?

With this: nothing good ever happens because of drugs or alcohol.

# From Chieftain Field To The Battle Field

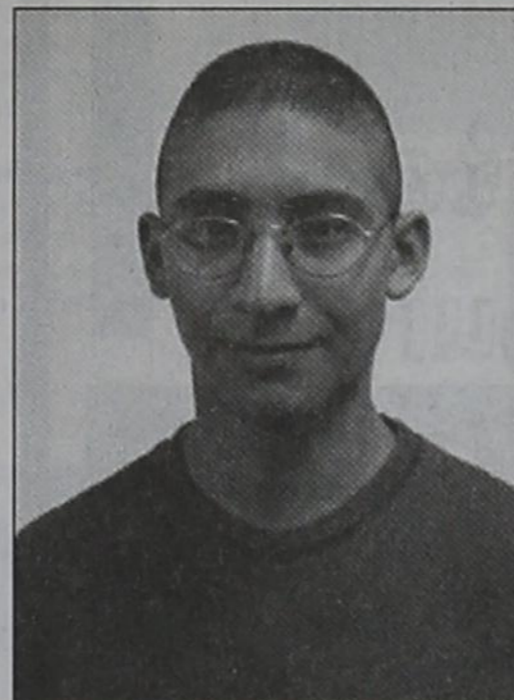
Dario Hernandez is back home now. It has only been about a year and a half since he crossed the stage at the Friona Junior high auditorium with the Class of 2002.

At FHS he dodged a few tacklers and inside pitches as a member of the Chieftain football and baseball teams. But then he grew up. For 8 1/2 months he dodged Iraqi bullets.

On May 28, 2002, four days after graduation, he left for Marine boot camp at Camp Pendleton in San Diego, California, weighing 150 pounds. When boot camp ended he weighed 170, was assigned to the 7th Marines, 1st Battalion, Weapons Company, 81mm mortar squad.

He married Dianna Tirado of Friona in August of 2002 and they were stationed at Twentynine Palms, California. Dario's unit shipped out to Kuwait on January 31, 2003, where they stayed for 1 1/2 months waiting for the war to start. When it did they headed for Baghdad. Along the way, they seized and saved Iraq's largest oil refinery.

The Marines moved up 2-3 times a day, his mortar squad providing security for forward advancing troops. Each time they stopped, they had to dismount, dig in, and calibrate the heavy mortar. On one occasion, the

Air Force dropped a 10,000 pound bomb on a nearby hill. He said the top of the hill just disappeared.

When they got to Baghdad, the 1st Marines were already there at Baghdad University. I asked him what it was like being shot at. "You don't

think about it much. When the shooting begins you worry more about the guys on either side of you." No Marine in his unit died during their stay in Iraq. One time a fellow Marine lost an eye when he stuck a bayonet into an Iraqi truck tire to disable it and the tire blew up.

From Baghdad, they went to the holy city of Najaf, where they patrolled the streets. Because of the close action, Hernandez's mortar squad was not needed, so they became foot soldiers, packing rifles, patrolling streets.

How did they know who the enemy was, I asked. He said, "The official rules of engagement changed. At first, we could only fire with permission from commanders and if we were in real danger. Later, any Iraqi with a weapon who posed a potential threat could be fired on."

An 81mm mortar has a range of two miles and a kill radius of 40 meters. In one engagement, his squad was directed to fire 42 high explosive (HE) rounds into a field where enemy had been identified. He said a team inspected the field later and reported that the Iraqis had herded some civilians into the field for cover. The HE rounds did their damage.

"Most of the Iraq civilians were friendly," he said. "We didn't always

understand their culture, but we learned to co-exist with them."

Meals and showers took on new importance too. The Meals Ready To Eat (MREs) were pretty awful but not bad if heated. The longest he went without a shower was two months. Baby wipes had to suffice between showers.

Dario plans to stay in the Marine Corps for a 20-year hitch and retire. His next tour will be a 7 month deployment to Okinawa, Japan, in July. Unless, of course, another war starts in a different part of the world. He hopes to take martial arts training and become an instructor and also go through the Marines' jungle survival school.

He now holds the rank of Lance Corporal, has earned a "meritorious combat" medal, a combat action ribbon, national defense ribbon, and was nominated for (but did not get) the Navy Achievement Medal. In addition to these honors, he also proudly wears a Marine sharpshooter badge. He hopes to be promoted to corporal soon, then in a few months will be on track for the rank of sergeant.

Dario is the son of Carmella Hernandez of Friona. He is a credit to his family, his former classmates, to our community, and to America. We are proud.

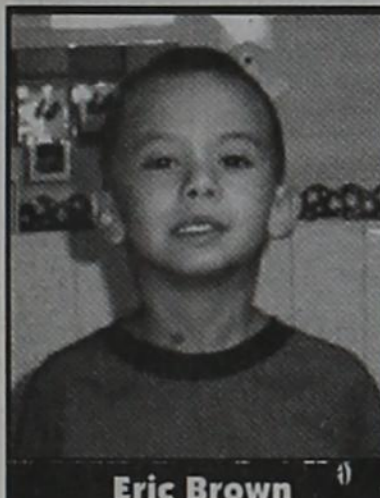
Jordan Monroe and Erin Austin placed in the top ten. Monroe ran 7th with a 15:40 time and Austin was 8th at 15:53.

PEOPLE WITH ALL NEEDS APPRECIATE CONTACT LENSES

Growing numbers of people are getting contacts because of their safety and ease of use. In addition, a greater variety of individuals are able to use these vision aids. For example, Bifocal contacts are allowing more baby-boomers and seniors to wear lenses.

In the past, some patients were not able to wear contacts for long periods of time, because they were uncomfortable or did not allow enough oxygen into the eye. Now these concerns are significantly reduced because of changes in the lens materials and processing. Only a small number of individuals cannot use contacts because of specific problems such as inflamed or infected eyes.

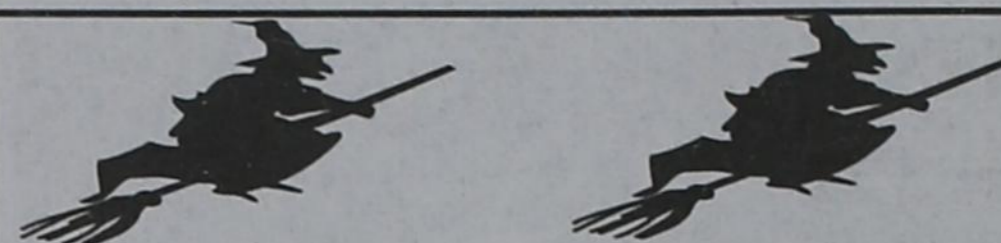
New Contact Wearers often complain of having dry eyes. Lenses are available that help reduce this problem. In addition, lubrication drops can be used to re-moisten the eyes. Most adverse reactions that occur with contacts can be quickly stopped if contact wear is ceased for short times. If lens users carefully follow instructions given by the eye-care practitioner, the risk of vision problems becomes extremely small.

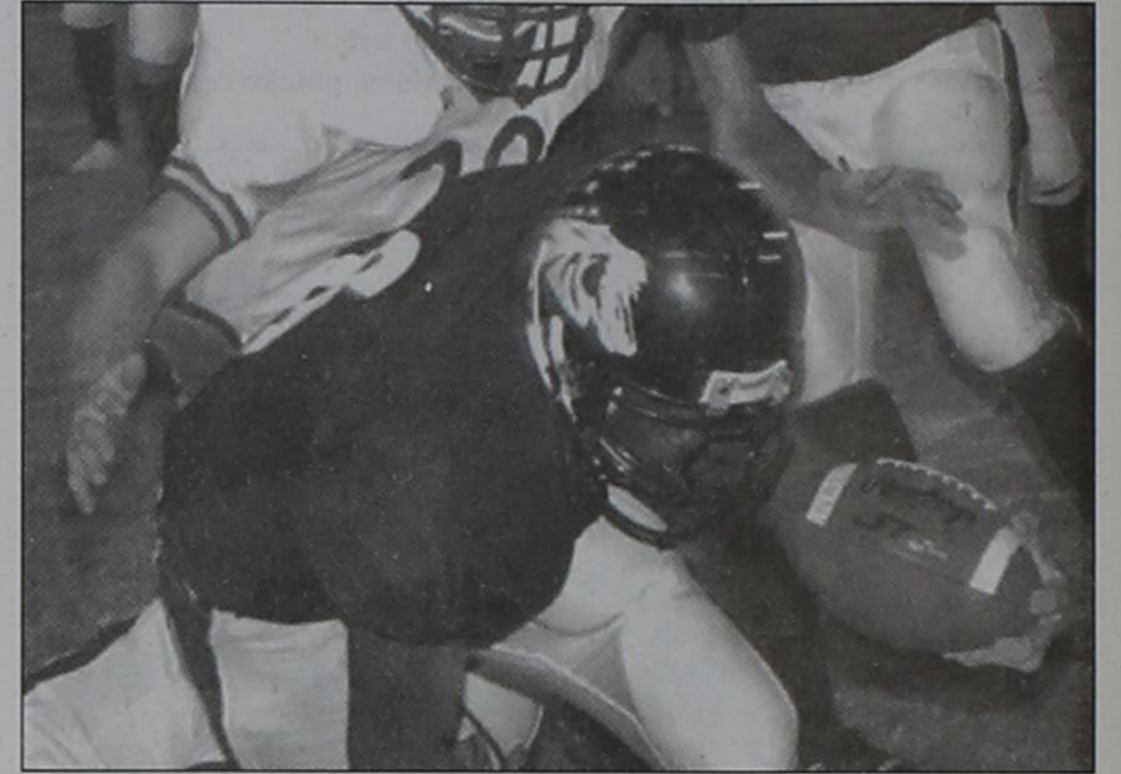

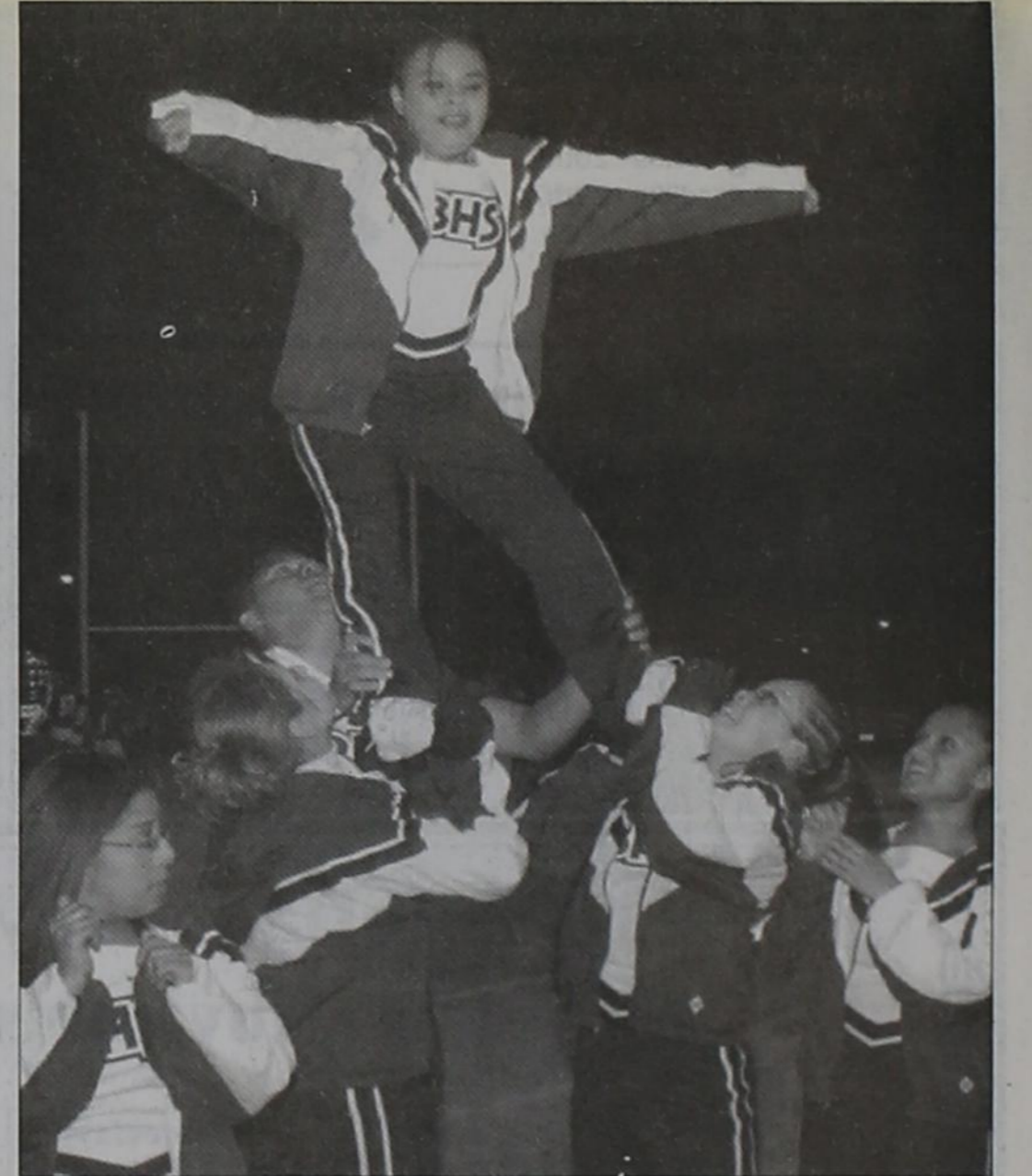

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# Chieftains Break Loss Streak At H. Center

The Chieftains broke the school's longest losing streak since 1992 last Friday, when they put together an impressive 70-yard drive in the game's waning minutes, to edge the Owls at Hale Center.

Friona had lost five straight games, most since the 1992 team, James Morton's first, went 0-10.

The Owls were also desperate for a win, having now lost eight straight games, and led by sprinter Terrance Johnson's four touchdowns, gave all they had to attempt to break into the win column.

The Chieftains had the ball only three times in the fast-moving second half, and fortunately for them, were able to put together two long scoring drives out of their three possessions, the last coming with 1:05 left in the game, for a come-from-behind win.

Friona took the ball in its second possession of the game, after holding the Owls' fourth-and-one try from their own 49-yard line, and took advantage of the "short field" to post the game's first score.

Chieftain running back Sergio Saenz carried the ball four times in the drive, giving Friona first downs with efforts of six and ten yards, and his third carry went into the end zone from six yards out. Quarterback Brock Field had runs of 11 and five yards during the drive.

Antonio Monreal's PAT kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead with 2:30 remaining in the opening quarter.

Hale Center failed to move after the kickoff, and defensive end Marc Haile recovered an Owl fumble, giving Friona the ball at their opponent's 45.

Field hit wide receiver Steffan Busch on a 32-yard pass-and-run play that carried to Hale Center's nine.

But three plays found the Chiefs on the Owls' three, and Coach Bob Ferguson opted for a field goal attempt.

Monreal, who hasn't missed much this season, nailed the 23-yard kick, and Friona had upped its lead to 10-0 with 9:19 left in the first half. The field goal proved vital later in the game.

Hale Center picked up a first down to midfield, but was forced to punt, thanks to a nice defensive play by tackle Emmanuel Vega. But three

plays later, Field was intercepted, and the Owl defender ran the ball all the way to the Friona 20.

Johnson then ran the ball three straight times, gaining nine, nine and seven to get his team on the board. However, Johnson was stopped on a running try for points, and Friona still led, 10-6 with 4:31 left in the half.

Friona responded with another scoring drive. Kick returner David Davila almost had a touchdown on the kickoff return, running over 40 yards before being tackled. A 15-yard penalty advanced the ball the Hale Center 23.

Field gained eight, then kept for 13 yards to the Owls' one. Jacob Hoon sneaked across for the score, and Monreal's kick made Friona's lead 17-6. The score came with just 2:22 left in the half, and that turned out to be the halftime score.

Hale Center's first possession in the third quarter was a disaster, made so when FHS safety, Monreal, intercepted a long pass, giving Friona the ball.

The Chieftains then made a quick scoring drive. Field hit Freddy Reyes for a first down, and then hooked up with Reyes again. This time, Reyes had broken into the clear. He caught the ball in the open, and then completed a 54-yard scoring play. Monreal missed his first PAT kick, but Friona led, 23-6.

The drive got Hale Center's attention. The Owls went 83 yards in seven plays for a TD. Big play was a 40-yard pass, and another pass for the PATs made it a 23-14 game with 3:46 left in the third.

Friona came back with a drive, sparked by Ramos and Reyes, that stalled at the Owls' 15. Monreal's field goal try was just wide from 37 yards out.

Johnson responded with an 80-yard sprint to paydirt, and added the points-after, and it became a one-point game at 23-22, Friona, early in the fourth quarter.

Hoon made a short return of the kick, but fumbled as he was tackled, and Hale Center recovered at the Friona 20.

It took seven plays, but Johnson again went in from a yard out. The PAT was missed, but the Owls had taken the lead for the first time at 28-23, with just 6:31 left in the game.

Friona then mounted a 70-yard scoring drive as the clock kept moving.

Field hit Reyes on a 13-yard gain to the Friona 45, and four plays later, on a desperate fourth down needing five, again found Reyes over the middle for five yards, keeping the drive going, with 4:30 remaining.

Three plays later, the Chieftains were flagged for holding, moving the ball back to midfield. But Field rolled out, turned the corner, and was finally tackled at the Hale Center four—a vital 44 yard gain.

With first and goal, the Chiefs lost yardage back to the ten, and Field threw incomplete. But the 150-pound Friona QB found Hale in the end zone for a ten-yard scoring strike, snaring the lead back at 28-23. A try for two points failed, and the Chieftains had to hole Olton's last few desperate plays for the hard-fought win.

## Chieftain JV Now 3-0 In District 5-2A Play

The Chieftain Junior Varsity remained undefeated in District 5-2A play with a 20-12 win over the Hale Center JV last Thursday at Chieftain Field. The team is now 6-2 overall with two games left.

Steven Sanchez paced the young Chieftains, gaining 78 yards rushing, including scoring runs of 52 and 14 yards.

Fernando Moreno gained 53 yards rushing; Octavio Moreno had 38, Andrew Chico ran for 42 yards and Ruben Chico added 28 yards.

Ruben Chico also had 28 yards receiving, for 56 yards overall, and scored a receiving TD.

Hayden Patton had the other pass catch, for eight yards.

"We played a solid game on the defensive side of the ball. They hit a few passes on us, but overall everything went well," said Coach Rex Cumpton.

Cumpton pointed out that Bobby Silva, linebacker, got an interception. "Also, our en-

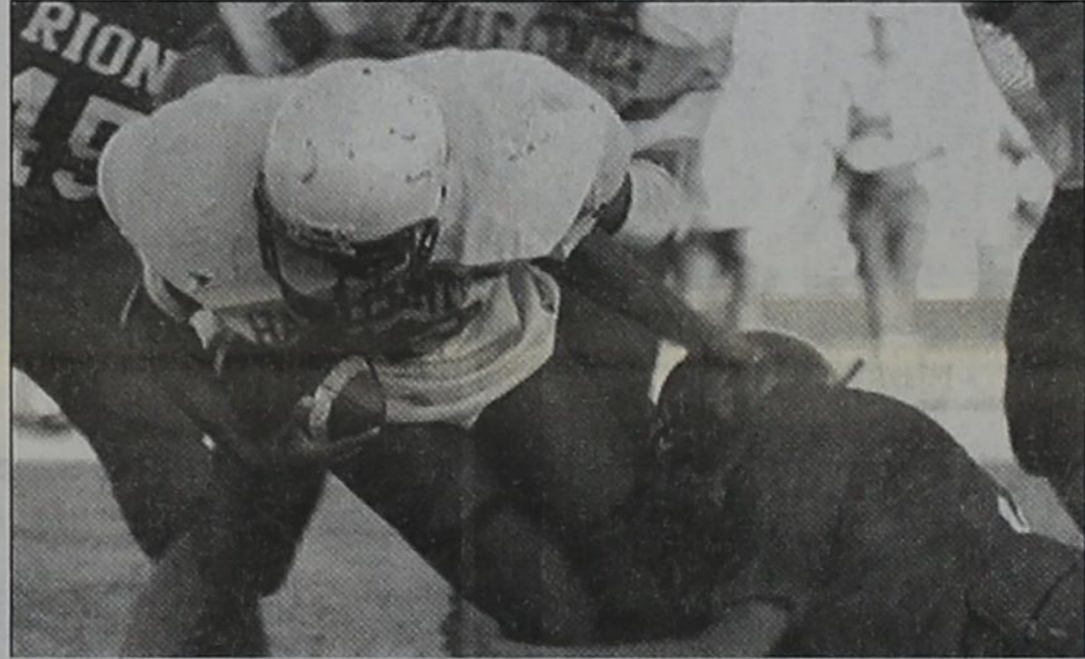

The American Angus Association, headquartered in St. Joseph, Missouri, was founded in 1883. It is the largest beef registry association in the world in terms of both annual registrations and active members.

### USDA Announces First 2003-crop Counter-cyclical Advance Payment

LUBBOCK, October 24, 2003

United States Department of Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman announced late last week the first advance counter-cyclical payment rates for the 2003-crop Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP).

For Upland cotton producers the first partial advance payment toward the 2003-crop Counter-cyclical payment was announced at 2.01 cents per pound. The figure equals 35 percent of the projected final payment rate of 5.73 cents per pound.

For producers who have watched market prices for cotton surge over the past few weeks, the announcement was met with a mixture of appreciation and concern as higher prices could still zero out the CC payment calculation and create a situation where producers would be required to repay all or part of the advance payment.

Early on prognosticators had opined that the 2003 CC payment could be eroded by as much as 4-6 cents as a result of then steadily improving market prices.

What few anticipated, however, was the quick run-up that has occurred thus far.

Back in June the December 2003 New York futures contract was trading in the 52-cent range. Take a snapshot today and the same contract is trading near 80 cents with little indication that a huge drop can be expected.

That difference in the market has many producers wondering whether or not this might be all that the 2003 DCP program will provide in terms of a Counter-cyclical payment on this year's crop.

Knowing that the bulk of the marketings used to calculate the weighted average price received by growers for any given crop year occurs during the November, December, January and February time period forms the crux of producer concerns that a repayment situation could still be created.

Make no mistake, producers are happy that prices have surged upward. As a result, those that have cotton to sell will gladly take their money from the market instead of the government.

The concern that you hear however, stems from the fact that for many on the High Plains there is simply no cotton to sell as a result of a tough 2003 growing season.

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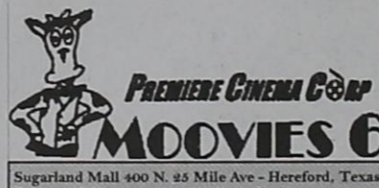

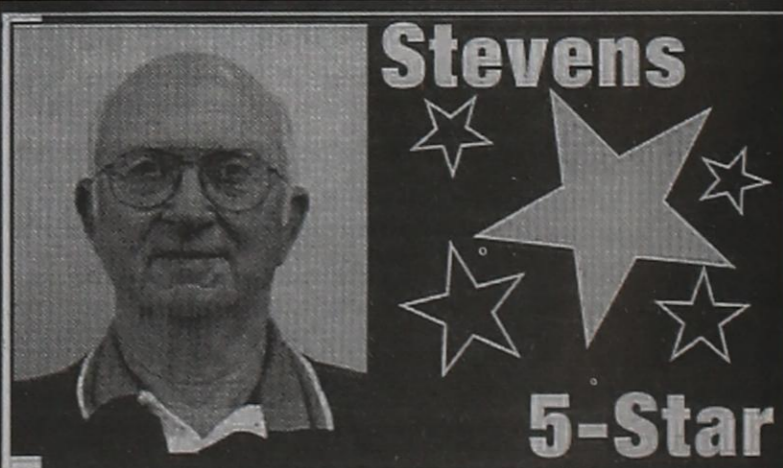

# OUT HERE

This & That: Bashing Baseball & Government

Could some baseball fanatic please call and tell me why a home run is called a "dinger"? Could it have something to do with aluminum bats?

The best part about baseball season being over is not having to hear Amarillo's Channel 7 sportscaster Lee Baker say, "it's high, it's hard, it's handsome, it's history," every time he showed a home run on his show. Get some new material Lee. (He also calls a birdie in golf a "tweeter").

The Florida Marlins, with the lowest paid players in the league, beat the New York Yankees, the highest paid players in the league, in the World Series. At last we have an example of what money can't do. Let's hear it for underdogs. God Bless America.

Thank you God that the pro baseball season is finally over. Now if you could just do something about pro basketball.

According to USA Today, Texas Lt. Governor David Dewhurst says he wants Texas to offer financial incentives to public school teachers and administrators to reward good work. Dewhurst told the Austin Area Research Organization that the goal is to keep the best educators in Texas. He had no immediate plans for funding the proposals.

Another politician floating an idea with no plan on how to pay for it. He wants to reward teachers for good work. The question I have is: how do you know when a teacher does good work? That standard has to be established first and I don't think it's possible. Or fair. It seems to me a teacher's success depends a lot on circumstances. For instance should a teacher be paid extra for taking a class of failing kids and bringing up their grades, or based on how many of their students qualify for college? How about coaches? Should they be paid more for getting to the playoffs, or band directors for winning marching contests, or ag teachers for the number of blue ribbons?

Not only does Dewhurst not know how to fund such a program, he'll

make a lot of enemies in the teacher community when he starts trying to define their "good work".

Did you know that "the Texas Supreme Court is the only public body that in effect gets to vote on something and their vote is never reported to the public?"

The question was asked by a Federal Judge in San Antonio during the opening of a federal lawsuit that "seeks to push official actions of the Texas Supreme Court into the sunlight of public disclosure."

(The Federal Government has brought a lawsuit against the Texas Supreme Court).

Before you lose interest consider this: Texas Supreme Court justices are elected, not appointed. To get elected they raise campaign money. Most of the money raised comes from lawyers and companies that may have cases come before the Supreme Court.

Of the approximately 900 cases the Supreme Court receives each year, they secretly vote to hear only about 10 percent of them. The court has been much more likely to hear appeals filed by the lawyers that gave them the campaign money. So says the Texans For Public Justice organization.

In a 2001 study they stated that over a four-year period, the justices voted to hear 56 percent of the appeals filed by two law firms that gave more than \$250,000 apiece to the justices. That acceptance rate was an amazing 10 times higher than the rate for non-contributors.

No public disclosure is made on how each judge votes on whether to hear a case. Which is not important to you unless you ever have a case that goes all the way to the Supreme Court of Texas. Secrecy in government? Isn't that one of the reasons we invaded Iraq?

We received this tart little news release from the Republican Party of Texas on the election of Charles

Soechting as chairman of the Texas Democratic Party:

"The trial lawyers have finally completed their buyout of the Texas Democrat Party with the installation of their handpicked chairman. Apparently the power hungry trial lawyers were not content with simply funding the Party's activities and have now successfully consolidated control over the Party's leadership apparatus."

What ticked off the Republicans is that Soechting is employed by lawyer John O'Quinn, one of the five trial lawyers that collected \$3 billion from the Texas tobacco settlement. Apparently the Republicans are angry that trial lawyers gave the Democrats over \$6 million in campaign money.

Now I reckon if the trial lawyers started giving the money to the Republicans instead, we wouldn't be getting so many whining press releases.

The government Department of Agriculture thinks you need to know what country your food came from so in addition to labeling what all is in food, now you have the right to know where it came from as if you really care anyway.

Food producers would have to keep records. For example, the government says that for a fish to be labeled as a U.S. fish, it must be born, raised, and slaughtered in the United States. Same for a cow. Or a pig.

Congressman Neugebauer says keeping the necessary records from food production through retail sale will be costly and burdensome. Producers cannot self-certify the origin of their own products. A third party has to do it.

Neugebauer says that product branding, such as Idaho potatoes, Washington apples, etc., should be left up to the producers. Country Of Origin Labeling-COOL—is anything but cool. It should be defeated, tabled, and forgotten.

And whoever thought it up in the first place should be required to attend a pro baseball game every day next season.

## How To Talk To Your Kids About Drugs

The best thing about this subject is that you don't have to do it well. You simply have to try.

If you try, your kids will get the message.

That you care about them.

That you understand something about the conflicts they face.

That you're there when they need you.

The alternative is to ignore the subject. Which means your kids are going to be listening to others who have strong opinions about the subject. Including those who use drugs. And those who sell them.

### ACCEPT REBELLION.

At the heart of it, drugs, alcohol, wild hairstyles, trendy clothes, ear-splitting music, outrageous language are different ways of expressing teenage rebellion.

That's not all bad. Part of growing up is to create a separate identity, apart from parents — a process which ultimately leads to feelings of self worth. A step along that path is rebellion of one kind or another — which is to say rejecting parental values, and staking out new ones.

You did it. They're doing it. And that's the way it is.

The problem comes when kids choose a path of rebellion that hurts them, destroys their self worth, and can ultimately kill them.

That's the reality of drugs.

### DON'T GET DISCOURAGED.

When you talk to your kids about drugs, it may seem as though nothing is getting through.

Don't you believe it.

The very fact you say it gives special weight to whatever you say.

But whether or not your kids let on they've heard you, whether or not they play back your words weeks or months later, keep trying.

### START ANYWHERE.

"Have you heard about any kids using drugs?"

"What kind of drugs?"

"How do you feel about that?"



It's never too early to start.

"Why do you think kids get involved with drugs?"

"How do other kids deal with peer pressure to use drugs? Which approaches make sense to you?"

"Have you talked about any of this in school?"

However you get into the subject, it's important to state exactly how strongly you feel about it.

Not in threatening tones. But in matter-of-fact, unmistakably clear language:

"Drugs are a way of hurting yourself."

"Drugs take all the promise of being young and destroy it."

"I love you too much to see you throw your life down the drain."

### SOME DO'S AND DON'TS.

The do's are as simple as speaking from the heart.

The biggest don't is don't do all the talking. If you listen to your kids — really listen and read between the lines — you'll learn a lot about what they think. About drugs. About themselves. About the world. And about you. They'll also feel heard and that, too, is a step along the path towards self esteem.

There are other do's and don'ts: Don't threaten. Don't badger them. Don't put your kid on the spot by asking directly if he or she has ever tried drugs. They'll probably lie, which undermines your whole conversation.

If you suspect your child is on drugs — there are all sorts of symptoms — that's a different matter. Then you've got to confront the subject directly.

In the meantime, just talk to them.

It's okay if you don't know much about drugs.

Your kids do.

But they need to know how you feel about the subject.

And whether you care.

### THE CHIEF'S CORNER

Halloween is a cherished tradition but the excitement of the night can cause children to forget to be careful. There is no real "trick" to making Halloween a real treat for the entire family. The major dangers are not from witches or spirits but rather from falls and pedestrian/car crashes. Both children and adults need to think about safety on this annual day of make-believe.

The National Safety Council urges motorists to be especially alert on Halloween:

- Watch for children darting from between parked cars.
- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians and curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.
- At twilight and later in the evening, watch for children in dark clothing.

Before children start out on their "trick or treat" rounds, parents should:

- Make sure that an adult or an older responsible youth will be supervising the outing for children under age 12.
- Plan and discuss the route trick-or-treaters intend to follow; know the names of older children's companions.
- Instruct your children to travel only in familiar areas and along an established route.
- Teach your children to stop only at houses or apartment buildings that are well lit and never to enter a stranger's home.
- Establish a return time.
- Tell your youngsters not to eat any treat until they return home.
- Review all appropriate trick-or-treat safety precautions, including pedestrian/traffic safety rules.
- Pin a slip of paper with the child's name, address and phone number inside a pocket in case the youngster gets separated from the group.

Children should understand and follow these rules:

- Do not enter homes or apartments without adult supervision.
- Walk, do not run, from house to house; do not cross yards and lawns where unseen objects or the uneven terrain can present tripping hazards.
- Walk on sidewalks, not in the street.
- Walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic if there are no sidewalks.

To ensure a safe trick-or-treat outing, parents are urged to:

- Insist that treats be brought home for inspection before anything is eaten.
- Wash fruit and slice into small pieces.
- When in doubt, throw it out.

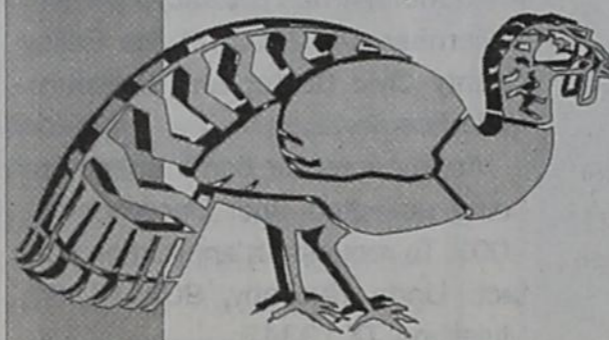

Zach Barrett, son of Robble and Stephanie Barrett of Friona, is a junior equine industry and business major and a member of the WTAMU horse-judging team.

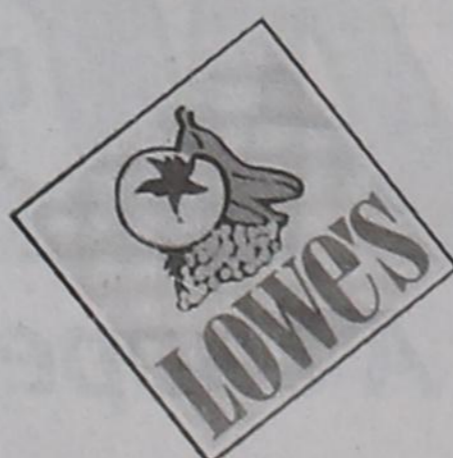

(RUTH 2:14) THE ESSENES WERE STRICTER AND DID WITH ONLY TWO MEALS, THE FIRST BEING ABOUT ELEVEN O'CLOCK, AFTER THE MORNING PRAYERS FOR THE DAY, AND THE OTHER IN THE EVENING. LATER, ABOUT THE TIME OF JESUS, STRICTER JEWS BROKE THE FAST OF THE NIGHT BY A MEAL AFTER THE NINE A.M. PRAYERS, AND ON THE SABBATH FOOD WAS NOT SERVED BEFORE TWELVE NOON AFTER THE SYNAGOGUE SERVICE. BUT THE CHIEF MEAL OF THE DAY ALWAYS TOOK PLACE IN THE EVENING HOURS. LIKE THE MODERN ARABS, THE ISRAELITES WASHED THEIR HANDS BEFORE EATING SINCE GENERALLY THERE WAS A COMMON DISH INTO WHICH EVERYONE'S HAND DIPPED. A PIECE OF BREAD SERVED AS A SPOON AND WAS DIPPED INTO THE BOWL OF MEAT OR THICK SOUP OR POTTAGE AND WAS LADLED OUT WITH THE HOLLOW OF THE HAND INTO A DISH.
