The Flood at Brackett.

Brackett, Tex. June 16.-Kinney county has just experienced the heaviest downpour that has probably ever fallen in any location. From 11:30 Tuesday night until 5 o'clock next morning there was a constant and increasing rainfall that was simply phenomenal. The rain gauge at Ft. Clark registered eighteen inches, Brackett was entirely submerged. The water in the main street was running in a torrent twelve feet deep and with such velocity as to show a perceptible elevation in the center of the current. IN A SULPHUR MINE.

Terrible Hardships of the Boys Employed

"There are but few who admire the collection of beautiful sulphur crystals in the National museum, remarked the gentleman who cel Entered at the Postoflice at Sonora mines in Sicily to a Washington Star reporter, "who have any idea in relation to the same except their Senora, Taxas. - June 24, 1899. beauty. I don't think," he said 'there is another spot on earth where such abominable treatment, such fiendish cruelty, is inflicted on the laborer as in the sulphur mines of Sicily. They are paid barely enough to provide themselves with a scant supply of the coarsest. cheapest food, and a good portion of the time they are in a state of chronic starvation. When I was last there, many of the mines were closed, and a Sicilian paper stated that 30,000 people were starving at the mines. The work is of the bardest and most exhausting character. Very few of the mines have hoising apparatus, and the sulphur ore (su phur and limestone combined) is brought up from the depths below on the backs of men and boys. Long, sloping, narrow tunnels lead from the surface down to the sulbelow. Miners dig the stuff out. and it is carried up in stout sacks or flat baskets.
