

The Various Classes of Persons In Great Britain Who Cannot Be Arrested - Royalty, as a Matter of Course, le First on the List.

The other day at the Westminster (England) county court a warrant for the arrest and committal of a solicitor had to be extended for four months more, as, though the solicitor was walking about the streets in the sight of the police, they dared not lay a finger on him. Even the judge seemed surprised that the man could not be arrested. But it is probable he never will be arrested, for, as he carries a charm on his person in the form of a brief, his body cannot be seized. This is because no one engaged on business at a law court can be arrested for any breach of the civil law. If you happen to owe a debt, to have a judgment delivered against you and to be committed to prison for not paying, of course you can be arrested under ordinary circumstances, but if you are subpanaed as a witness you cannot be arrested while going to the place, while staying there to give evidence or while returning home, and you may feel substant the courts will stick up for y
