The article is headed: "For all those born before 1945: We are Survivors! Consider the changes we have witnessed.

We were before television, before penicillin, before polio shots, frozen foods (let alone frozen embryos), Xerox, contact lenses, frisbees and the PILL.

We were before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ball-point pens; before pantyhose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes, and before man walked on the moon.

We got married FIRST and then lived together. How quaint can you be?

In our time, closets were for clothes—not "coming out of." Bunnies were small rabbits and rabbits were not Volkswagens. Designer Jeans were scheming girls named Jean or Jeanne, and having a meaningful relationship meant getting along well with our cousins.

We thought fast food was what you ate during Lent, and Outer Space was the back of the Regal Theatre. Gay was cheerful or fun.

We were before house-husbands, gay rights, computer dating, dual careers and commuter marriages. We were before day-care centers, group therapy, and nursing homes. We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yogurt and guys wearing earrings.

For us, time-sharing meant togetherness—not computers or condominiums, a chip meant a piece of wood; hardware meant hardware; and software wasn't even a word!

In 1940, "Made in Japan" meant junk, and the term "Making Out" referred to how you did on an exam. Pizzas, McDonald's and instant coffee were unheard of.

We hit the scene when there were 5 and 10-cent stores where you bought things for five and ten cents. Sanders or Wilsons sold ice cream cones for a nickel or a dime. For one nickel, you could ride a street car, make a phone call, buy Pepsi or enough stamps to mail one letter and two postcards. You could buy a new Chevy Coupe for \$600, but who could afford one? A pity, too, because gas was only 11 cents a gallon.

In our day, cigarette smoking was fashionable, GRASS was mowed, COKE was a cold drink, and POT was something you cooked in.

ROCK MUSIC was Grandma's lullabye, and AIDS were helpers in the principal's office. Queer meant unusual or strange.

We were certainly not before the difference between the sexes was discovered, but we were surely before the sex change. We made do with what we had. AND, we were the last generation that was so dumb as to think you needed to have a husband to have a baby!

No wonder we are so confused, and there is such a generation gap today!

Lazbuddie Outlasts Mustangs For Win

Bovina High School's Mustangs lost their rabbit's foot where Lazbuddie is concerned last Friday when the two schools met at Lazbuddie with the district title on the line.

For the first time that many folks could remember, Lazbuddie was able to score a football victory over the Mustangs. Their 52-32 win gave the Longhorns the inside track to the district title and number one playoff seed.

But until the fourth quarter rolled around, the game was a back-and-forth battle.

In fact, with less than two minutes left in the third quarter, Bovina held a 26-21 lead, and Coach Terry Bean said, "I was feeling pretty good about that time."

But the Longhorns scored three touchdowns in a little over four minutes of clock time, and what had been a 26-21 lead became a 44-26 deficit.

"I don't know where we broke down. Our defense went down a

bit. They began to run a sweep play against us, and they may have had a little more speed than we did," Bean said.

"Due to the rivalries between the two schools, our kids go at it (this game) really hard. The game meant a lot to both teams. We respect them a lot, and I know they respect us. There is a lot of mutual respect not only between the schools, but between the kids," Bean said.

The homestanding Longhorns were stunned early in the game when Bovina cornerback Kory Mitchell stepped in front of a Michael Williams pass, picked it off and returned it 45 yards for a touchdown.

The kick failed, but Bovina had a 6-0 lead.

Lazbuddie came back with a 38-yard pass from Williams to Kevin McGehee to tie the game at 6-all, and later in the opening quarter, Eddie Zamora ran a yard, then tossed to Casey Russell for the

PAT as Lazbuddie took a 13-6 lead.

The Mustangs responded in the second quarter when Manuel Porras ran 26 yards. The PAT kick failed, and Lazbuddie still held a 13-12 lead.

Doug Barnes scored on an eight-yard pass from Williams, and Williams kicked for two points as Lazbuddie took a 21-12 lead.

Then, before halftime, Hector Guevara broke loose on a 30-yard run and Juan Reyna kicked the PATs, and the Mustangs went to intermission just a point back at 21-20.

Bovina opened the scoring in the third quarter as Robert Guevara raced 39 yards to paydirt, but the kick failed (Bovina was able to convert only once out of five tries in the game), but the Mustangs were on top, 26-21.

That's when Lazbuddie opened up the throttle. Kirk Jesko ran 25 yards for a TD, and Williams' kick gave the 'Horns a 29-26 lead.

Jesko repeated from 11 yards out for a touchdown, and the kick stretched the Lazbuddie lead to 37-26. Then, as the final quarter opened, Williams crossed the goal-line on a 24-yard run. A one-point PAT made the scoreboard read Lazbuddie 44, Bovina 26.

Robert Guevara broke the cold spell for Bovina by taking a seven-yard scoring pass from Juan Reyna, to make the score 44-32, as the kick was no good.

10 Cattle Killed

An accident occurred early Thursday morning, November 2 at 3:30 a.m. that involved four vehicles and ten cattle.

The cattle belonged to Roy Hartzog and were huddled on Highway 60 near Sherley Grain Company.

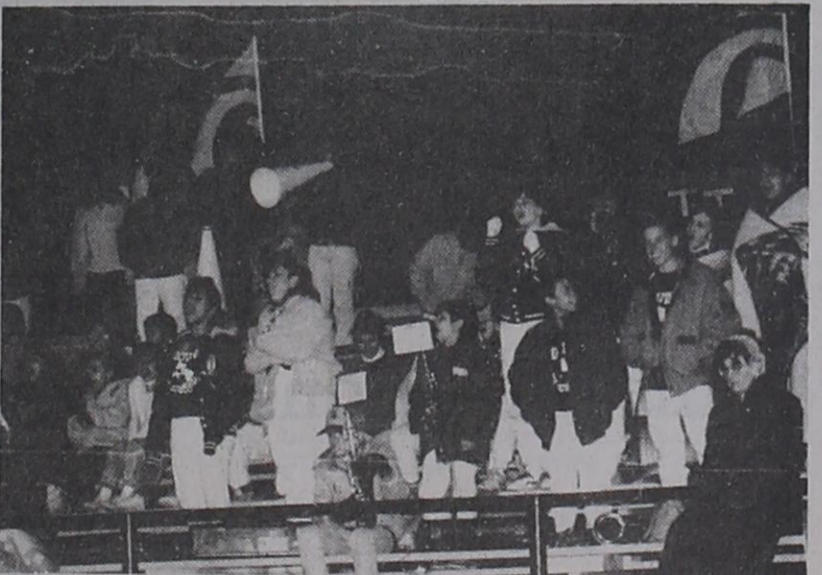
A westbound cattle truck, driven by Michael Kent Gast of Farwell, first struck the cattle, then another westbound truck driven by James Odis Norman, who drives for the Crozier Trucking Company, came along and hit the cattle again.

An automobile came along and drove up over the cattle but didn't stop. Officer Don Hatley, Deputy Sheriff, got a call that the accident

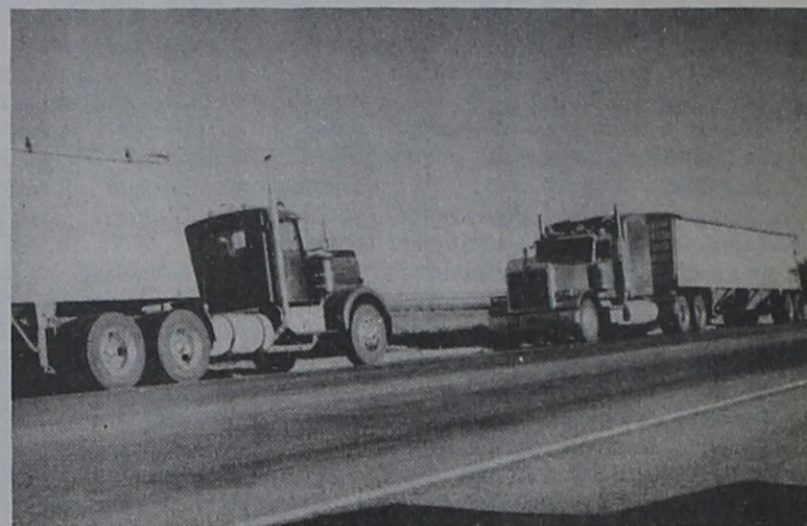
was at the roadside park about four miles west. As he drove around the corner down Third Street and onto the highway, he struck the cattle with his vehicle.

All ten cattle were killed. The cattle truck had front end damage and undercarriage damage to both the cab and trailer. The grain truck had extensive damage to the diesel tank and air lines underneath the truck and trailer. The police car driven by Officer Hatley was sprayed by blood but no damage to the vehicle.

Officer Rick Uribe of Friona covered the accident and said the cattle were valued at \$4,000. There were no injuries to any of the drivers.

The Bovina Mustangs host the Amherst Bulldogs in their last regular-season game, starting at 7:30 p.m.

While Bovina has clinched a tie for runnerup spot in the district and could only be tied by Three Way and possibly Cotton Center (both of whom the Mustangs have beaten), they want to beat the Bulldogs to finish with a 3-1 district mark and have an 8-2 season record.

This would propel the team into the football playoffs for the third straight year; second straight in the six-man division.

"I expect we will play McLean in bi-district. McLean plays Silverton Friday, and the winner of that game is the team we would play," said Bovina Coach Terry Bean.

Deadline Nears For Crop Compliance

Have you developed your conservation compliance plan yet?

To stay eligible for USDA programs, all crop land has to have a conservation plan on all highly erodible fields by the end of the 1989 year.

This time frame may be deceptive. Some people may think that all they have to do is come by during the last part of December and sign-up, but it is more involved than that.

When these plans are developed with the landowner or operator, decisions are made and recorded. Then the paper work starts. Technical decisions are checked to see if erosion control is within limits.

Next, technical descriptions are inserted and all work is duplicated for the landowner's or operator's copy. All this is sent to a checker.

If everything is in order, then it is time to get the necessary signatures. The Parmer County Soil & Water Conservation District meets the first Tuesday of each

From The Chief's Desk



This week's topic will be on lighting. As I mentioned in last week's article, lighting is the most cost effective measure in crime prevention. Lighting technology involves a whole new language. Although it is not necessary to know all the terminology, it should be helpful to be familiar with the following:

Watt: a term used to measure the amount of electrical energy consumed.

Lumen: the lamps (light bulbs) used in various lighting equipment are rated in lumens. The lumen is frequently used as a term to express the output of a light source. Lumen is actually an expression of a light's efficiency as measured by lumen per watt.

If you determine what a kilowatt hour of electricity cost you, then you can determine how effective a light bulb is.

There are four general types of outside security lighting. These are: continuous lighting, emergency lighting, moveable lighting and stand-by lighting.

Continuous lighting, the most familiar type of outdoor security lighting. This technique is normally used when glare of lights directed across an area will not

annoy or interfere with neighboring or adjacent properties.

Stand-by lighting, these systems are engaged either automatically or manually when the continuous system is inoperative or when there is a need for additional light.

Moveable lighting, this system is manually operated and usually is made up of moveable search or flood lights that can be located in selected or special locations which only requires lighting temporarily.

Emergency lighting, may duplicate any or all of the other three types of lighting. Generally, the emergency lighting system is used in times of power failure or other emergencies when other systems are inoperative.

Lighting systems should be carefully planned and should be changed from the less effective lighting sources to more effective ones.

Next week we will discuss general types of lighting sources. If you are thinking about installing lighting as a crime prevention measure, give me a call and I will assist you in any way I can.

Christmas funds are not the only need expressed by representatives of the 25 members of the parents' group.

"There's always a need for more foster homes," Mrs. Connally said.

Anyone interested in becoming a foster parent or in providing support for existing foster homes is invited to attend any of the association's monthly meetings. The group meets at the Community Center on the third Tuesday of each month.

One does not need to be a foster parent in order to be affiliated with the group.

"You can be an associate member and not actually keep kids," said Terry Connally, the association's president.

Individuals are able to provide support for the foster care program without becoming a foster parent.

"We could sure use some weekend babysitters," one woman said.

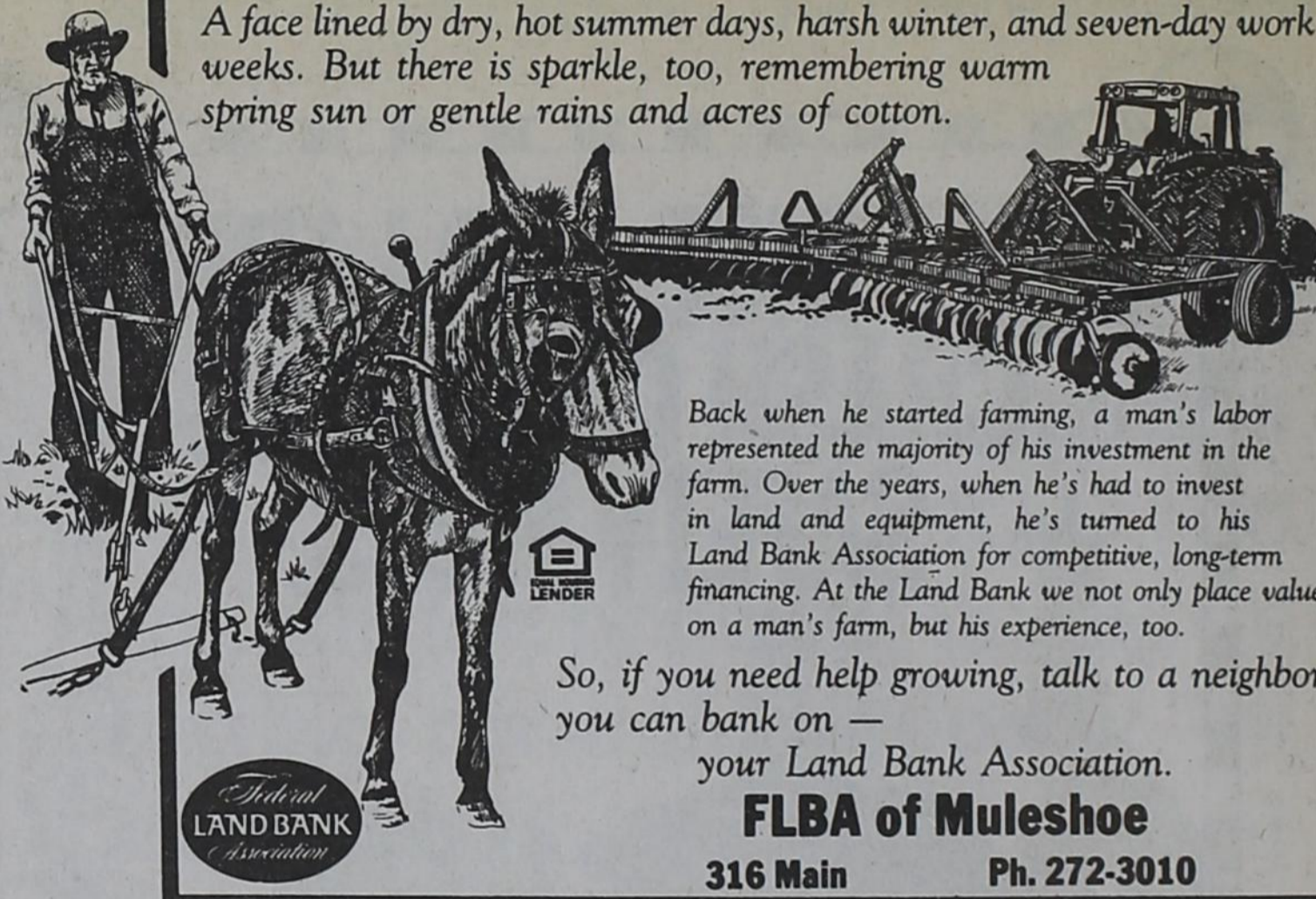

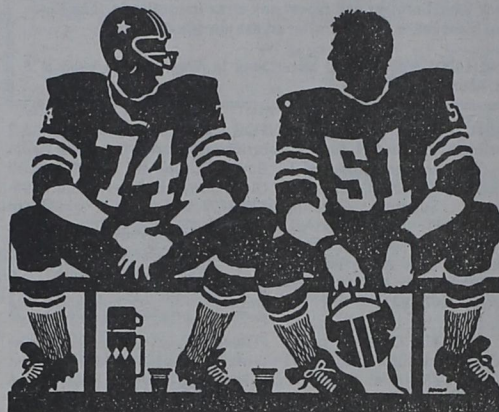
