That one publication is The Record.

Of course speeches that are printed in regular order in the debate, ap pearing on the day after they are de livered, are to be found only in their regular place in The Record. But in the cases of speeches withheld for revisioa there is an opportunity to have them displayed on the first page of the official report of the proceedings. This is merely done by an arrangement between the senate and house by which this privilege is about equally divided. Senators and representatives who withhold their remarks for revision frequently inquire when they can have the first page of The Record, which is generally reserved for at least a week

The general rule is, "First come, first served." In this way those who want first page of The Record on the morning of a day when a vote is to be taken, in order that they may be brought prominently to the attention of their fellow legislators just before they are to take action on the matters of which they treat. It is in the nature of judicious advertisement -Washington Star.

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
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
