



pasture might be burned, he plowed furrows across it every forty or fifty yards, each plowed strip being from 3 to 5 or 6 feet wide. His idea was that, like an ordinary, roadbed, these bare strips might be of decided yalue as fire guards, Fortunately the range was not burned. By early fall the needles from the needle grass had blown over the pasture, and millions of them had planted themselves in the soft broken ground. Other grass seeds had also caught in this soft earth. The following spring and summer these furrows were thickly seeded down to a variety of grasses, tween the furrows were largely reseeded, so that by the following summer he was able to note with satisfaction that his entire range had been much-improved.
