Council Approves Enterprise Zone

City Council met in special session June 26, at 4:30 p.m. Members present were: Aldermen Agapito Saenz, Louis Dimery, Dave Broderick and Mayor Vito La Gioia. **Ordinance Passed**

City Council passed Ordinance #263 in favor of closing a portion of Gove Street at the request of Mr. Sterling Evans, since he owns all the property surrounding the dead end alley.

The motion was made by Broderick and seconded by Saenz. All voted in

Public Hearing

public hearing followed, to discuss the adoption of an Enterprise Zone for Brackettville. A presentation by Planning Development Consultant, Mr. Charles Trost was presented.

After a general discussion, City Council motioned to adopt the proposal. The next step will be to get the approval of the state. Mayor Vito La Gioia was appointed by Council members as the Chief elected official

to administer the program. The Federal program would be regulated by the State and administered by the

Mayor La Gioia said that the first concern of his would be to ask County officials if they would turn the City pool over to the City.

"We have the know how to fix it and the water. I think if the City was allowed to take over we could get it in shape," stated Mayor La Gioia.

Sewer Plant Study Mr. Trost informed Councilmen that adequate sewage operation would be essential for future development of Brackettville. Council members approved a sewer

Maxine Smith, a local resident, informed the City Council that she was interested in opening a Daycare Activities Health Service for disabled and the elderly. Councilmen seemed to approve of the concept, yet more information will be needed.

Mayor Curtails CPL Rate Increase

CPL has asked the cities it serves and the PUC for the approval of a rate increase. Approval was granted by City Mayor Vito La Gioia, but not near the figured rate asked by CPL.

"I worked late at nights, traveled out of town and attended meetings on the CPL rate increase. I feel it is not in our best interest to pay for their mismanagement," stated Mayor La Gioia.

According to cities executive committee press conference, CPL invested \$1.205 billion or 53% in the troubled Texas Nuclear Project (STP), the general consensus is that CPL's stockholders should absorb the cost for mis-spending instead of the CPL customers.

Cities report concluded that power from STP is expected to cost 200% more than power presently generated by CPL's gas-fired plant. The report states, "Although the addition of STP will increase CPL's capacity by only 17%, this added capacity is 2,940% more costly per kw than the existing mix of plants."

According to the report, CPL and other owners erred in choosing Brown and Root (B&R) as architect engineer-constructor. At the time, B&R had never designed a nuclear plant and was having trouble with the one it was constructing in North Carolina. The owners rejected bids by firms with years of experience.

The report finds the decision to hire B&R even more troubling because of an apparent social relationship between management personnel at B&R and Houston Lighting and Power (HL&P), managing owner of

The report states: "The decision by

HL&P and CPL to gamble on an inexperienced A/E-C lies at the heart of most of the Project's subsequent problems."

As an example, when B&R began safety-related construction in 1976, it claimed that 60 percent of the engineering had been completed. In spite of a contractual obligation to have 90 percent of the engineering completed before initiating safetyrelated construction, the owners relied upon the 60 percent representation and permitted B&R to begin construction. Several years later, B&R admitted that only 8-10 percent of the engineering had been completed when safety-related construction started.

The report also points out that inadequate staffing, escalating costs and lagging achievement characterized engineering efforts for years, culminating in the firing of Brown & Root in 1981. According to the report, B&R should have been fired at least three years earlier.

According to Eddie Rodriguez, City Manager of Eagle Pass, "The economy in the CPL service area is so depressed, an 87% increase in electric rates will adversely affect any hope of economic recovery."

Glenn Smith, Assistant City Attorney for McAllen, stated, "The law in Texas is that costs associated with mismanagement of public utility investment should not be passed on to customers and cities' report cleary paints a picture of mismanagement." The City Council of Brackettville

requested adjustments of the \$157,554,732 increase per annum representing the first year of the 9 year phase-in plan or the equivalent of \$464 million annual increase.

Volksmarch is Coming

Volksmarch organizers met Tuesday, June 27, at the Fort Clark Springs Board Room to finalize plans for the crowds of hikers, bikers and swimmers expected on July 8 and 9. The Volksmarch is open to anyone, regardless of age, who would like to earn a medal for completing required distances by walking, biking or swimming. Some 300 participants are expected to take part in the sex events scheduled during the weekend.

The Nat Mendelsohn Activity Center on Scales Road will serve as the base of Volksmarch activity. Fort Clark Springs Recreational Director Sondra Meil said her crew will begin the day at 6 a.m. on Saturday, July 8, by offering coffee and donuts to early Volksmarch participants.

Start times for the 10-kilometer walks, 200 meter swims and 25 kilometer bike ride will be from 7 a.m. to noon on both Saturday and Sunday. All participants must be finished by-3 p.m. A special "Night Walk" will begin anytime participants choose between 4 and 6 p.m., with the finish time by 8 p.m. on Saturday. The "Night Walk" and biking event will be on Saturday

Fire Chief Adrian Reyes said the Brackettville Fire Department and Auxiliary will offer delicious hamburgers, sausages, cold drinks and other items from 10:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Saturday, and from 10:30 to 5 p.m. on Sunday.

The Fire Department's food booth will be directly across Scales Road from the Activity Center. Maintenance Supervisor Alvin McClure said his crew is preparing the area, and will place tables and chairs under shade trees for Volksmarchers to relax while eating.

The Fort Clark Springs "Super Six" Volksmarch weekend is sponsored by the Selma Pathfinders, a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting family sports. Selma Pathfinder club members will man control points during the walks, count laps during the swim and offer refreshing drinks and candy to participants. Anyone interested in participating can register and begin from 7 a.m. until noon for the walks, bike ride or swims, or from 4 to 6 p.m. for the "Night Walk".

Initial event medal and bar is \$5. Additional events are \$2.50. Participants earn a beautiful medal embossed with the Fort Clark Springs logo for the first event, and bars which attach to the medal for any additional events.

The resolution passed by City Council states that the net first year increase shall be \$59,505,017, a substantial decrease in the amount asked by CPL.

CPL pamphlets state: It will be the first time since 1983 that customers will see an increase in their CPL bills. It also states, "CPL's total investment in the South Texas Project is \$2.28 billion (\$1.4 billion in cash, plus interest of \$881 million). These construction costs were paid by CPL investors and by the sale of bonds and notes. Now that STP is being used by our customers, shareholders

and investors expect to see a return on their investment.

If they do not receive a fair rate of return, investors will go elsewhere, which would make CPL financing difficult and more expensive. And under past rate-making treatment, those higher financing costs have ultimately been passed on to our electric customers.

CPL services 67 cities with electricity. Some of the cities voted with the increase, some did not. An actual count on this is not available


School Board Meets

The School Board met last Monday evening, with the exception of Diane Bravo. They began their monthly meeting with the discussions of Health Insurance and audit proposals, which were postponed until the executive session held in July. Following that, "Update 34" was reviewed and accepted. This delt with local contracting employment and the use of alcohol and tobacco by school employees in the presence of students.

When the subject of bleacher repair was brought up, the Board finally decided to make minimal repair to the grandstand. It will suffice for the 1989 football season, which will consist of only 4 varsity home games. They plan to put approximately \$18,000 plan in the budget for the upcoming year. During the summer of 1990, they plan to build aluminum bleachers for the 1990-91 season.

The Board accepted the First State Bank of Brackettville as their principal bank depository. TI-IN contracts for the upcoming year were approved. Service center contracts of Region 20 were also accepted.

Sheriff's Department and City Police lawmen were kept busy during the early morning hours of Saturday, June 24, investigating reports of gunshots fired in various locations in and around Brackettville, Ft. Clark and Spofford.

The first report came from a Brackettville resident at 1:14 a.m., and the last report from a Spofford resident at 3:30 a.m. No injuries were reported, though there was property damage in Spofford as well as a tragic shooting of two dogs.

The 3:30 a.m. call from Spofford was to report that a mercury light in the front yard of Reserve Deputy Ben Vasquez had been shot out with several shots fired. Deputy Vasquez was out of town at the time.

Evidence discovered at the scene during investigation by this writer, Chief deputy Luna and Chief of Police Johnny Fritter indicates that the shooter stood directly underneath the light to shoot it out. Several expended high powered rifle cases were found at the scene as well as a

The Spofford resident whose dogs were shot was also out of town at the time of the shooting and did not discover the grisly scene until returning home late Saturday evening. Upon his return he discovered that someone had entered his property, chased his two dogs onto a screened in front porch and shot them both several times as they cringed in a corner, evidently trying to escape their attacker.

The act was a senseless, vicious attack by someone who has no respect or compassion for owners rights or the feelings of family members who owned the dogs. Evidence was discovered at the scene that links the dog shootings to the property damage at the Vasquez residence and also points a finger to a prime suspect. The case will remain under investigation until all possible leads have been exhausted.

We are also investigating a burglary that occurred at the Kinney County Clinic (United Medical Center #2) and an attempted break in at the courthouse that occurred sometime Friday night, June 23, or early morning, Saturday, June 24. Burglars entered the clinic and then went to an office within the clinic where petty cash is usually kept.

The criminal or crimminals must have been extremely disappointed to



discover that only \$9.71 was in the petty cash drawer. A window on the north side of the building was broken but investigators Chief Deputy David Luna and Chief of Police Johnny Fritter have reason to believe that the broken window may not have been the point of entry. This has not been ruled out however, and the case is under investigation. Burglars apparently tried to enter the Kinney County Courthouse through a southside window leading into the county courtroom.

Window slats were removed and the window screen was damaged but the burglars stopped short of further damage. This case also remains under investigation with some peculiarities of the two incidents getting special attention. No damage estimates to the property is available at the time of this writing.

On Wednesday, June 21, Chief Deputy David Luna was dispatched to the canal headgates area of the Rio Grande River on the Moody Ranch in south Kinney County to investigate a report of the discovery of a dead body that had floated down the river and hung up at the headgates. Deputy Luna was accompanied by

Justice of the Peace Alvin Hall acting as coroner in the case. The body is believed to have been that of a Mexican National that possibly drowned while trying to cross the Rio Grande into the U.S. This is a fairly common occurence that sometimes occurs several times a year.

However, this is the first body we have been called on at the headgates in quite some time. Following standard procedure, the body was held for 72 hours and the Mexican Consul notified, in an attempt to check out any drowning or missing person reports from Mexico. If the body remains unidentified and unclaimed, it will be buried in the county cemetery, as others of this

In these cases, the county must bear the expense of pick up and burial, which in most cases is around \$350. This particular body was that of an Hispanic male, approximately 5'6", 145 pounds, with black hair, brown eyes and a mustache. The body was nude, which is often the case, as Mexican Nationals crossing the river habitually roll up their clothes and carry them above their heads to prevent them from getting wet.

A county jail prisoner being held on out of county warrants from Harris County attempted to hang himself in the county jail Monday afternoon, June 26. The prisoner, 28 year old Robert Lopez of Houston, Texas, was being held in the county jail on felony warrants out of Harris County.

Lopez has a lengthy criminal record with convictions and prison terms for forgery, burglary and other crimes against society. He is also a hardcore drug addict and was "high" at the

time of his arrest in a stolen car on June 22, in Kinney County. He has "tracks" on both arms from shooting up with drugs. At the time of his arrest, he was accompanied by another hardcore drug addict and convicted criminal, George Anthony Fuentes, also from Houston.

Both men are parole violators with outstanding warrants on them from both the Board of Pardons & Paroles and Harris County. Both have prior convictions for dangerous drugs. Harris County Sheriff's deputies picked both men up Tuesday, June 27, for transport back to Harris County to stand trial for their most recent crimes against society.

JUST FOR YOUR INFO: We have received preliminary approval of our request for an increase to \$30 per man day from the previous \$28 per man day for the federal prisoner care from the U.S. Marshals Service. If this increase is finally approved in Washington, it will go into effect June 1 (retroactive) and, based on this fiscal years average, will bring an added \$5,160 in prisoner care fees this year and an added \$15,480 during fiscal year '89-'90.

The slump in federal prisoner bed space, required by both the U.S. Marshals Service and the Bureau of Prisons, that was experienced a couple of years ago due to the amnesty program seems to have disappeared and we receive calls regularly from both the BOP and the U.S. Marshals Service seeking bed space for their prisoners.

It is my prediction that in the years to come we will see an increase in privately owned detention centers contracting with various federal agencies for bed space and prisoner care at very profitable rates. There are new privately owned facilities being constructed at various sites throughout the state and the U.S. at an increasing rate even now. In fact, there is a 226 bed unit in operation in Zavala County at this time with plans to construct another unit in Sabinal (Uvalde County) in the near future.

Federal prison officials have realized that they can contract bed space with county jails and private facilities to house low-risk short-term prisoners cheaper than the estimated \$35,000 rate per bed space required for building or adding onto federal prisons.

LATE BREAK: A burglary of a habitation that occurred at Malone Trucking Company headquarters in Spofford recently was reported to the Sheriff's Department Monday, June 26, by Alex Solis, foreman of the wling complex. The exact date of the break-in is not yet known, as Mr. Solis had been out of town and did not discover the crime until after his

There has been evidence of several illegal entries and thefts at the headquarters over the past few months, but this latest burglary is the most serious, due to the large amount of value of the property stolen, amounting to over \$3,000.

Fingerprints, blood and hair samples, along with other evidence developed in and around the scene, led to a warrant of arrest being issued for a prime suspect Tuesday afternoon, June 27. The suspect, who had left town over the past weekend, was arrested as he got off a bus in Brackettville late Tuesday night.

Chief of Police Johnny Fritter was the arresting officer who had the bus stop under surveillance, due to a tip we had received that the suspect, Hugh Wayne Martin, 29, of Spofford, Texas, might be coming back to Kinney County on a bus. Martin was arrested, transported to the county jail, and booked without incident.

Subsequent charges of Possession of Marihuana, Criminal Trespass and Cruelty to Animals have been filed on Martin, based on evidence and his confession to the crimes. Martin remains in the county jail in lieu of bonds totaling \$25,500 at the time of this writing.



Wes Lance, known as "Wild Wes" and called a "Real" Cowboy by his friends does what comes naturally to him. "I work with horses. That's all I've done for all my life and I'm 37 vears old now," stated Wes.

Wes hired up with the Alamo Village outfit in January to work with the team horses during the filming of movies and commercials at Alamo Village.

"Anyone can drive a team, but when you're working with 4 to 6 horses, you can't just sit up there and roll along," stated Wes.

Wes was raised on a small farm in Ohio and began riding as a small boy. There's not much he hasn't done with horses. He has worked many rodeos, participated in the event, raced horses as a jockey and trained them for racing, jumping and riding. He's also done a little bit of stunt riding.

Wes says his favorite breed of horse is the American Saddle breed. "Basically, I like to work an older driving horse. I don't like to break young ones. I've gotten tired of the fences," he adds jokingly.





by Debbie Fletcher DEAD POETS SOCIETY — This movie takes us back to 1959, a time when we all held our collective breaths, almost as if we knew what was to come - social turbulence, civil rights, equality for women, hippies, drugs, the Beatles. In this pre-hippie time, we are taken to Welton Academy, an exclusive boys' prep school in Vermont. This school is in fact so reactionary, the viewer might think the headmaster fancies

himself an English lord. The boys who go to this school are all white, monied or certain to marry money, from the "right" families. Thrust into the middle of this stagnant, insular world is John Keating (Robin Williams), a school alumnus, who is back now as an

English teacher. What Keating sets out to do is get his students involved. His unconventional teaching methods and his love for poetry have the boys mesmerized and the heirarchy apoplectic. His rallying cry is "Carpe diem," translated from the Latin, "Seize the day!". And seize it Keating does, with a complexity and an energy that is compelling and stimulating. There could have been no better choice for Keating than whom I perceive as one of the greatest comedic geniuses of our time, Robin Williams. His performance is as exuberant and enthu-

siastic as the character. This movie had it all for me poignancy, raw emotion, happiness and sadness. It's all presented in a very intelligent, palatable, entertaining manner. If I can find any fault at all, it is that Robin Williams isn't in more scenes. You may also find that young children will probably be bored and restless since they most likely won't understand the whole movie.

It's disturbing to see the hysterical condemnation of the executions in China. There is a need to understand the difference in the Chinese concept of crime and the attitude in the United States.

The first executions were men, not students, who set fire and burned a train. The next seven executed were persons who burned army tanks and trucks. To call these hoodlums "peaceful demonstrators" is an

In China I saw many trains and

railroad stations burned, usually by hands of Communist guerillas. Every time I say it, I felt anger at the perpetrators. China has always dealt harshly with criminals. When I was in China there was no drug problem. China had closed her opium dens and the use of opium. This was done simply by dealing with the users. The first time an addict was picked up, he

caught, he was executed.

Justice in China is meted out on the basis of guilt, not legal technicalities and slick defense lawyers.

Therefore, crime in China is almost non-existent when compared to the United States. Murder is almost unknown while every news cast from San Antonio brings news of a multiplicity of killings and that is only one city in the United States. It would be a national catastrophe if any day in Shanghai, with her 28,000,000 people had as many murders as there are any day in San

"The Old Pass" was built in 1916 by the Forest Service. At that time, it was considered the most wonderful engineering feat of its time. It was a dirt road with a steep grade and switchbacks. At the top, the elevation was 9,852 feet.

In the beginning, it was just a trail used by the Apaches when they hunted game and camped on the streams in the summer.

The town of Red River was plotted in 1895 and the old trail was widened into a wagon road. When the wagons and stage coaches got to the top of the big "hill" they would stop and cut down a tree and tie it to the back of the wagon to slow it down on the descent down the hill

Finally, the logs piled up at the foot

of the Pass and the people of Red River used it for firewood in the winter.

In winter, parts of the road became so icy the wagons were let down over these parts with ropes. In those days it was \$5 a day to have a team make a haul up the mountain and \$2.40 to \$2.80 a day to hire a man to drive the

When the pass was improved for automobiles, it was re-routed to the sunny side of the mountain. The cost for the 31/2 miles of road to be built was \$16,974.44, which wouldn't come near to the cost today. The grade was no more than 7.1 percent, which was done by building seven sharp switchbacks.

I went over this pass in 1924, and it was a hairraising experience on a narrow dirt road. Then in 1966 built the newest pass called "Bobcat

Pass", which is a very tame one. The old pass built in 1914, 1915, 1916 is impossible and only considered safe for four wheel drive



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
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
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Grandma's Kitchen

1/4 cup chopped onion 11/2 tsp chili powder 1 big box, or bag of corn chips In a medium saucepan, combine all

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

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
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
