Moore wished La Gioia the best of luck, he stated, "I didn't run against him, I ran for the position. I think he did a good job." Moore added, "I want everyone to know that Vito and I will be working very closely together."

Mayor Moore and the City Councilmen will be sworn into office Thursday May 10 at City Hall. The first official meeting of the newly elected city officials will be Monday May 12. One of the discussions will be the appointment of a new City

In the Alderman elections, the seat for Councilman Place 2, held by Agapita Saenz, was challenged by 4 candidates.

# **Blood Donors Needed**

Get ready, blood donors, the South West Regional Blood Bank will be in town on May 15, awaiting your donations. The student council will spear head it's only community involvement on the 15th at the Home mics Cottage from 2 P.M. to

This year's campaign depicts a donorsaurus, "A rare creature that generously donates blood. May it never become extinct." Of all the people eligible to give blood, only about 5% actually do it. The Student Council hopes you will consider this when deciding whether or not you want to become one of these rare, unselfish creatures.

You may donate blood if you are between 17, and 72 years old, you weigh at least 110 pounds, you are in general good health. Thirty days after you donate, you also qualify for a special kind of insurance that will help cover the cost of certain blood use fees if you or any of your family members are hospitalized. The donor discount dividend plan covers you, your parents, brother and sisters under age 18, your spouse, and other tax dependants (such as your children). If you are under the age of 18, Texas law states that you must have the written consent of your parent or guardian before you can donate blood.

Last year, the student council at B.H.S. won a trophy for having the most number of donors. This year, "We want to win it again!" Says Yvonne Luna, President.Forty-eight contributors, this year the goal is 60. To sign up for this good cause, all you have to do is contact any student council member, or call 563-2491 and sign up. ### Governor Clements Vetoes Bill to Increase Sales Tax

AUSTIN--Governor Bill Clements today vetoed House Bill 150, which would make the Texas sales tax the second highest in America behind Connecticut.

In vetoing the bill, the governor said, "The taxpayers of Texas will not stand for any measure that raises their sales tax to an all-time high and makes it the second highest in the nation. The average Texas family already pays more than \$1,200 per year in state sales taxes, directly or indirectly.

"I will not saddle Texas families with an unnecessary increase in their tax bills. We cannot burden taxpayers with new taxes when surplus funds in the state's current \$49. billion budget are readily available to pay for education reform. Raising Texans' taxes would be irresponsible

when other alternatives exist. "The Legislature's tax bill would fall short of the funds needed to pay for Senate Bill 1. In fact, this tax bill would be more than \$6 billion short over the next four years. Furthermore, Senate Bill 1 would bind future Legislatures, which is prohibited by our state Constitution.

"In addressing this issue, the Legislature must not attempt to pass the buck to local property taxpayers. That's why I support legislation that



ence," said Nelson.



Three drug cases were tried in County Court before County Judge Tommy Seargeant on Tuesday, May 8, 1990. The defendants were; Jose Guadalupe Arango-Arango charged with Possession of a Controlled Substance, Arce Sergio Jimenez, charged with Possession of Marijuana, and Javier "Herbie" Martinez, charged with Delivery of Marijuana. Arango-Arango and Jimenez are both Mexican Nationals that were apprehended at the Border Patrol checkpoint East of Brackettville in possession of the illegal drugs. Their cases were turned over to the Tri-County Task Force for futher investigation and subsequent prosecution. Martinez made the mistake of selling a small amount of Marijuana to a Task Force undercover agent in March, 1989. He was indicted by the Kinney County Grand Jury but his case was referred to County Court due to the small amount of the illegal weed involved in the case. All three pled guilty before Judge Seargeant and were assessed fines and court costs. Martinez received an additional 10 day county jail term, he was fined \$700.00 plus court costs of \$127,50. Arango-Arango was fined \$500.00 plus costs, and Jimenez was fined \$250.00 plus costs. All three chose to lay their fines out in jail at the rate of \$50.00 per day.



Sometimes questions are asked because clarification is needed. Uninformed would like to become better informed. Questions contribute to better communication between teacher and scholar, constituents and their elected representatives, and thus knowledge is shared.



One of the more courteous participants looked at me and said, 'Sir, we have been on this course for five and one half hours playing 18 holes of golf. I am so totally exhausted from standing, waiting, and hitting from behind the trees I will probably need help to get into my car." He went on to say, "I just live about two miles from here but with city traffic the way it is I will probably spend another hour getting home." And....so goes the life of a

big city golfer. The moral to that little story is very simple. After you settle down to a life of retirement never say you have found the best place in the country until you have explored the living conditions and golfing pleasures that



Lawn Weed Control

On Tuesday, April 24, 1990, key meetings across the state and identifleaders in Kinney County met in county study groups to identify important issues of concern to the people of this county over the next 4

The strength of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's efforts to provide educational programs that are interesting and worthwhile to the communtiy comes from involvement of clientele in developing long-range programs that address the critical issues that may face residents within the next 4 years.

The study groups divided into task forces to identify the most critical issues facing the county in broad fields of agriculture and natural resources, community development, youth and home economics. The groups identified issues and discussed how they will impact Kinney County's economy, environment, and social welfare.

The work of the study group is one of the first major steps in an intensive effort for determining Extension Service programs of 1991-94. Each county in Texas will develop a long-range Extension program by October and all will be considered in the development of the Extension Service's statewide program plan. In 1986, more than 12,000 Texans

participated in these county study

ied almost 5,000 issues.

Based on these issues, a 1987-90 Long Range Extension Program (LREP) was prepared by each county. County issues were grouped into 12 broad statewide issues to form a state plan of action for directing programming for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service through 1990.

Issue-based programming has been highly successful for the Extension Service in directing educational pro-

Lawn Weed Control

One of the best means for controlling weeds in a home lawn is to maintain a dense, vigorous growing stand of turfgrass through proper fertilization, irrigation and mowing. Thin, weak turf encourages the invasion of weeds. Sometimes, even the best kept lawns will have some weeds. The homeowner can control problem weeds with herbicides labeled for home turfgrasses.

Effective use of herbicides (weed killers) to control weeds in a lawn depends on: proper identification of the weed, selecting the right herbicide, treating weeds when they are immature and actively growing, applying herbicides at proper rates, and observing all labels for proper precautions. It is very important that only specific herbicides labeled for use on home lawns be used to control weeds in lawns. Indiscriminate use of industrial strength weed killers often results in tree and shrub damage or

Glyphosate herbicides are nonselective contact spray vegetation killers. Roundup, Doomsday, and Kleenup contain varying amounts of the active ingredient glyphosate. These herbicides are slow acting, as much as two to three weeks, on stubborn perennials. Never hoe or

mow the top of sprayed vegetation as this will lessen the effectiveness of the product.

Post emergent selective materials are applied shortly after weeds are visible and when used according to the label will not damage turf. Post emergent broadleaf can be controlled with 2, 4-D, MCPP, dicamba, or a combination of these herbicides. Weeds should be immature and actively growing for best results. Do not use 2, 4-D, MCPP, or dicamba on St. Augustine in hot weather (above 85 F). Dicamba should not be sprayed next to shrubs or under drip lines of trees.

Preemergent herbicides such as Balan, Dacthal, or Betasan can be used to control grassy annual weeds. but only if the chemical is applied prior to germination of the weed seed. September and February are the most common times of application. Do not use on any area that you may be planning on reseeding as these will inhabit grass seed germina-

If you are unsure about a product and its use and cannot find answers on the label, check with your nursery operator or my office before you use the herbicide.

### USPS Wants More For Less

The U.S. Postal Service, now in the process of demanding still more rate increases to match its recent service decreases, is the largest mismanaged enterprise in America. We were thinking of putting an "arguable before those two descriptives, but what the hell. We guarantee that the postalities qualify on size, with a head count of around 800,000 and a payroll over \$32 billion.

We also posit that USPS is uniquely and stunningly ill-managed. Year after year under an amazing assortment of CEOs-there have been five in the past six years--it runs an operating deficit even while steadily curtailing service and raising its rates faster than inflation. (The current requests feature a 20 percent increase in the first-class letter rate, to 30 cents.) It accomplishes this trick mainly by overpaying employees, who are practically impossible to

THE 800,000 HAVE wage and fringe packages averaging over \$38,000 a year these days. That is an incredible figure. A study at the University of Pennsylvania concluded that postal workers made around 20 percent over the market rate for comparable semiskilled

work. And yet, oddly enough, the postal proletariat acts demoralized and dissatisfied. It keeps throwing out the mail instead of delivering it. An internal audit two years ago found properly addressed mail tossed out at 76 percent of the offices surveyed.

You can tell from a mile away that USPS needs a revolution. Like the prerevolutionary state enterprise in Eastern Europe, its mismanagement is ordained by its monopoly powers. Nobody else is allowed to deliver first-class mail (i.e., junk) mail or to put any kind of paper in or on, or hung from a mailbox. The present organization does not know how to compete. When it finds itself in competitive markets, as in parcel post, it is a guaranteed loser: United Parcel and a few other private shippers now have 90 percent of the package-delivery market.

THE FORM TO BE taken by the revolution was a major issue at a Cato Institute conference on the postal program a while back. The conference, whose proceedings are about to be published, is a treasure trove of negative nuggets about USPS (some of which you have just been reading), which is what you might expect from a libertarian outfit like Cato. We were somewhat surprised, however, to note that not all the participants were for frogmarching USPS straight into the

private sector. Some of them, including Cato policy analysts James Bovard, argued that it made more sense to leave the Postal Service in place as a quasi-government agency, which, he assumed, would fail when forced to compete in first- and third- class mail. Among those who did favor privatization was James C. Miller III, former head of OMB. But people who take either position have an obligation to explain how you get from here to there--"there" being the land of competitive markets. The parallels with Eastern Europe are really quite interesting.

WOULD THE AMERICAN public stand for it? Miller's proposal is eerily reminiscent of some ideas now onstage in Poland, where the big problem these days is figuring out how to privatize the state enterprises that long ran the economy into the ground. Some members of the Mazowiecki government think the simplest solution would be to just turn over the ownership to the bureaucrats who have been operating them all along. But most Poles seem to find this concept deeply offensive, and it probably will not fly. The mailers of America might be similarly offended by Miller's plan. It may

all depend on how desperate they are. THE SOLUTIONS proposed at the Cato conference reflect deep awareness of the Postal Service's political clout. Cato folks show signs of discouragement about the influence of the USPS and the postal unions in Congress. As one speaker observed, those 800,000 workers are in every congressional district in the country and tend to be single issue voters. When the union contract expired in 1984, Postmaster General William Bolger briefly experimented with a plan to bring in new employees at lower pay levels. He had no trouble finding people willing to work for less; his problem was Congress, which instantly and almost unanimously passed a law requiring adher-

ence to the old contract. The problem that kept surfacing at the Cato conference; How do you buy off USPS? How do you put together a deal that eliminates the monopoly power but leaves Postal Service workers willing to move into competitionland (where many would ultimately lose their jobs)? Miller's proposal involves a huge bribe. Basic idea: You create a new private postal corporation, but instead of selling the stock to the letter-writing public, you give it away, for free, to the postal workers and managers. Miller says this would give each employee a windfall of at least \$30,000 and should induce him to support the

In 1985, a joint study by the United Nations, World Bank and World Resources Institute reported that in the past 200 years we have destroyed more than half of all the trees on Earth. In the past 30 years, the rate has accelerated to the point that we are now losing 27 million acres of trees each year - an area equal to the state of Florida.

-- The continuation of 31 multiagency, multi-jurisdicitonal task forces that are already operational. During calendar years 1988 and 1989, the task forces arrested 13,584 individuals for drug-law violations and removed illegal drugs worth over \$700 million in street value from Texas communities. Cash, vehicles and other property valued in excess of \$18 million have been confiscated from drug offenders, and 1,088 weapons have been seized, including Uzis and Russian and Chinese made

-- Major new initiatives in the Houston and Dallas metropolitan areas that use innovative approaches

In Houston, a new program will provide undercover police officers and other resources to combat drug sales and related crimes at "hot spot" locations, and a drug-detection canine squad will focus on drug and currency couriers who use the Houston area as a transshipment point. The Houston metropolitan area and all of Harris County will be covered by the largest task force in the state, which will combine the resources of 25 participating agencies. A task force headed by the Dallas Police Department will target the highly organized criminal enterprises that ship and distribute large quantities of drugs into North Texas. In addition, multi-agency task forces are being established by Denton County, Rockwall and Richardson. In all, 19 new task forces across the

state will be funded this year. -- Drug impact courts in Dallas, El Paso and San Antonio to handle the increased number of controlled substance and asset forfeiture cases generated by the task force activity. Specialized prosecution projects are also being funded in Houston, Austin and Midland/Odessa in addition to the prosecutor teams assigned to most of the task forces.

-- A coordinator in the Adjutant General's Department to enhance the Texas National Guard's ongoing assistance to federal, state and local agencies involved in counter-narcotics operations.

-- A pilot drug-testing project in Midland to identify probationers with substanc-abuse problems who can be referred to treatment during their term of probation.

-- The drug abuse data collection and analysis project conducted by the Criminal Justice Policy Council to provide a single source of information on drug offenders and evaluate the effectiveness of task-force

-- Expanded crime laboratory services through the Texas Department of Public Safety to provide scientific analysis of evidence from drug cases. The 1990 Texas Narcotics Control Program will add 408 law enforcement officers, 42 attorneys, 5 judges and 117 support personnel, such as court reporters, chemists, crime analysts and clerks, to the war on drugs in the state.

The criteria for awarding the anti-drug grants were based on the analysis of the drug problem and the priorities established in the Statewide Strategy for Drug and Violent Crime Control, which was developed by the Drug Policy Subcommittee of the Governor's Task Force on Drug

I just read something that should interest all you spaghetti lovers, come to think of it, that's about all of us. Spaghetti has gone square, the first radical change in shape since the days of Marco Polo.

The four-sided spaghetti, labeled non-skid, is less soggy than the usual strand, easier to swoosh up, so that it can be eaten with more finesse, and the sauce clings to it better. The method has been in use in Abruzzi, Italy since the 17th century, when a housewife used her husband's guitar as a cutting base for her spaghetti.

The results were so good that her husband, instead of being angry with her, put his music away and turned to manufacturing the frames, Pellegrino, the president of the company producing the square spaghetti brought one of these old-time frames to this country and after careful research, duplicated the square pasta served in Italy.

So if thin is so great, how come we can't find thin square spaghetti? It's still in the New York area only, guess the round spaghetti is cheaper to produce.

If we're going to talk about spaghetti, we should learn different ways to cook it. Pasta of any kind is very good for us.

### Spaghetti with Herbed Cheese

1 cup ricotta cheese 4 cloves garlic crushed ½ cup walnuts ground 1/4 cup minced basil 2 TBS minced fresh parsley 1 TBS grated Parmesan Cheese 1 tea kelp powder

3/4 pound spaghetti

1 cup peas In a medium bowl, blend together the ricotta cheese and garlic, using wooden spoon. Grind the walnuts in a blender with short bursts at high speed. Add walnuts, herbs, cheese, and kelp powder to ricotta and stir to combine. Bring a large kettle of

water to a boil and cook the pasta

until firm-tender.

At the same time, cook the peas in a small amount of water, or steam them just until tender. Drain the pasta and peas, and toss in a serving bowl with enough herbed cheese to throughly coat. Serve hot.

I cup whole wheat flour 2 TBS Brewer's yeast 1 TBS bone meal 1 tea kelp powder 1 tea baking powder 2 tea cinnamon

4 tea coriander

### Spice Cake

4 tea allspice 3 eggs 4 cup honey 1 tea vanilla

1 cup chopped figs 1/2 cup walnuts

Combine the dry ingredients in a medium mixing bowl. In another bowl, beat eggs, and add honey, vanilla and figs. Stir to combine. add liquid ingredients to dry ingredients, add nuts and stir until combined. Lightly oil a 13X9 in. baking pan and spread the mixture across the bottom. Bake in a 350° preheated oven 20 to 25 minutes, until browned.

Now lets make something good for anytime especially for breakfast.

Spice Cake with Streusel Topping 2 cups whole wheat flour

2 TBS bran 2 TBS Brewer's yeast 2 TBS lecithin granules 2 TBS wheat germ

1 tea baking soda 11/2 tea grated nutmeg 1 tea cinnamon 1/2 tea mace 1/2 tea cloves

1 egg 1/4 tea cardamon (optional) ½ tea allspice

1/4 cup safflower oil 1/2 cup buttermilk

1/2 cup blackstrap molasses 3/4 cup raisins

Combine dry ingredients in a large bowl, beat egg in a small bowl, add oil, buttermilk and molasses, beat together, toss raisins with dry ingredients until they are coated.

Add egg mixture to dry ingredients and stir only until all ingredients are blended. Some lumps can remain. Pour into a greased 8x8 in. baking pan, bake at 350° for 30 to 35 minutes.

For topping-1 TBS corn oil 1 TBS honey 1/2 cup rolled oats 1 TBS wheat germ 1 TBS bran 1 TBS lecithin granules

1 tea cinnamon Combine all these ingredients and sprinkle over batter--oops! BEFORE YOU BAKE!

When you travel through the south-west the aristocratic Rambouillet stands out as a breed well represented in thousands of flocks. His breed was established at the command of a king.




