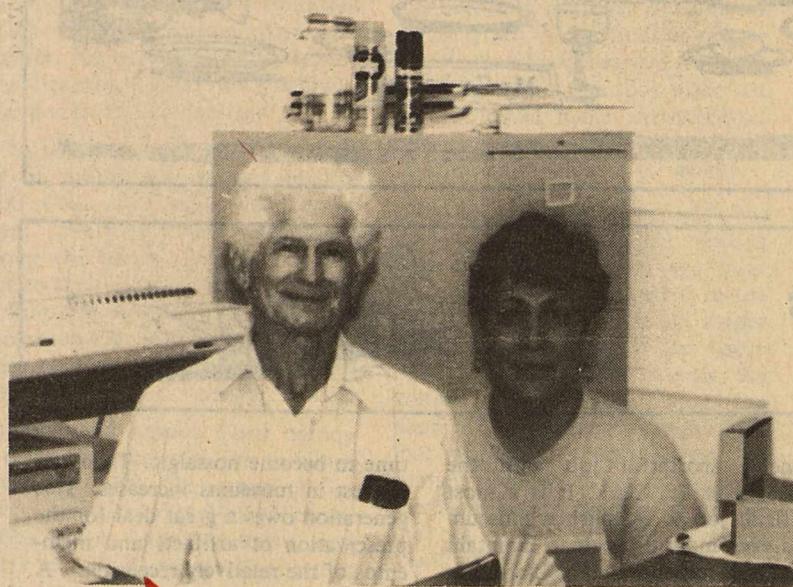

## Silver Haired Legislator

J.D. "Jack" Huey of Brackettville has been elected to the Silver Haired Legislature of Texas. Jack will represent Kinney, Val Verde, and Real counties in the Silver Haired Legislature.

The members of this group are an elected representative, non-partisan body of citizens 60 years and over in age, elected by their peers.

Candidates can be any citizen sixty years of age or over prior to January 1, 1990. They must be registered voters residing in the area in Texas

from which he or she is applying for candidacy and who will uphold the responsibilities of the elected office. The Texas Silver Haired Legislators met in the Texas Capitol in 1989 for

the purpose of considering and voting on proposed legislation that concerns the needs of both present and future older Texans.

The Legislature offered this opportunity to become more knowledgeable about the legislative process through involvement, to develop a forum for older Texans, for discussion of senior citizens issues, debating these issues and establishing legislature to consider, to provide advocacy training enabling delegates to continue their role within the community, to offer informed assistance to policy makers, and to provide an avenue through which older citizens may serve as a resource to public and private sectors, boards and commissions. The senior citizens have the utmost confidence in Mr. Huey and are happy to be represented in the Silver Haired Legislature of Texas.

## Board Approves

### New Class Rooms

In a special meeting held Tuesday, June 19, 1990, the Brackett Independent School District Board of

Trustees approved the purchase of a two classroom portable building for use during the 1990-91 school year. The cost of the building will be around \$30,000 or \$19.00 per square foot.

Superintendent Bob McCall told the Board that this building would be necessary if Kindergarten and third grade exceeded the 1:22 ratio. Board

President Jim Bader appointed Zack Davis, Beth Ann Smith, and Eloy Garica to a building committee. The committee will explore future building needs, construction costs, and funding options and report to the Board in July.

In further action, the Board accepted administrative recommendations and approved the contract of

Mr. Ken Campbell. Mr. Campbell will coach at Brackett High School and teach math.

After Carl hit the cat again with the

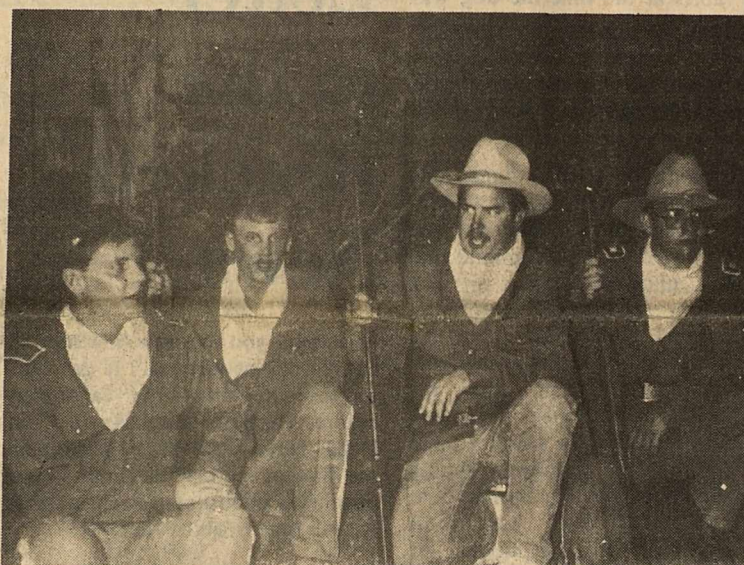

at 1:00 A.M. Sunday morning. The male lion weighed 107 pounds and measured 6 feet and 3 inches in length.

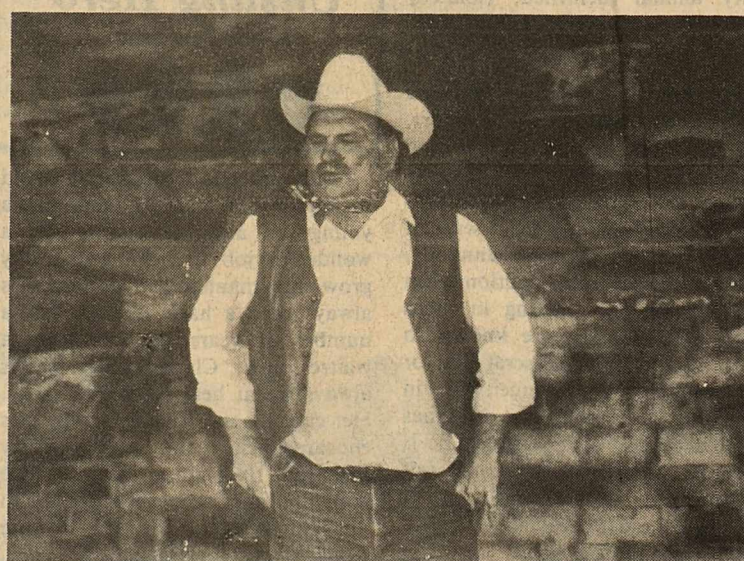

"The Glory Road", was presented this past Saturday evening at the Amphitheater on Fort Clark before a full house. Early reviews have declared the production a smashing success by exceeding the expectations of the viewers and the critics. Remarks such as "Wonderful... Absolutely fantastic... Great Acting... Well Written... Would not mind seeing it again..." could be heard from members of the audience as they departed following the final curtain.

## Money No Longer Available

The City of Brackettville up to about 1977 was using a parcel of County land for the City's landfill which was located north-west of town. At that time and a few years later the City was receiving money from the Federal Government called Revenue Sharing, which the City Council voted to use to defray the cost of running a landfill. This money is not available to the Counties or Cities any longer.

In 1977 the City had to moved their landfill to another location. The City and Mr. Joe K. York, Sr. entered into a contract with terms and conditions one of which being that the City could have the landfill for 10 years free as long as it didn't charge the citizens of Brackettville for the use of the landfill. The landfill was and still is located on the Spofford road.

In 1987 the 10 year contract signed between the City and Mr. Joe K. York, Sr. expired. The City and Mr. Joe York, Jr. entered into a contract for three years with terms and conditions to be followed by the City. On re-entering a contract with Mr. Joe York, Jr. the City agreed to pay Mr. York a fee of \$200.00 per month paying in 6 month payments. Total charges for the lease of the landfill being \$2,400.00 per year.

The City of Brackettville had two employees working at the landfill until the latter part of last year. The cost of running a landfill is great and

the rules and regulations are stiff and will soon be getting tougher.

Several years ago the City put a landfill fee on all utility customers to try and defray the cost of the landfill lease, but at that time did not take in consideration the salaries, landfill permit fee, digging of new ditches and equipment and so on.

The City receives about \$4,800.00 per year from collection for the landfill from the utility customers and a few dollars here and there on extra charges for tires, metal and appliances.

The cost to the City to have an employee, pay liability, workers' comp., social security, vehicle insurance, equipment purchase and maintenance including diesel and oil, landfill lease, digging new pits, (which by law the City must have several pits for different waste), extra personnel to pick up litter along the Spofford road and around the

landfill that is from people hauling trash that is not tied down or covered as required. All these things mentioned above loses the City around \$20,000 or more per year and the City has no way of recovering this sum. This money could be used for repairing more streets badly needed in the City.

The City Council is now in the process of studying this problem and hope to soon come up with a feasible answer for everyone.

# Sheriff's Corner

The owners of the VCR machine that was recovered during our recent investigation of two burglaries of vehicles came into the Sheriff's Office on Sunday, June 24th, to identify the property taken from their residence during a burglary that is believed to have occurred the night of June 9th. The owners, Mr. & Mrs. A.L. Bacon of Unit 12, Lot 6, Ft. Clark Springs had been out of town on vacation and upon their return discovered their home had been burglarized. Upon reporting the crime they learned that we had already recovered some of their stolen property and had been unable to file on the suspect because we were unable to determine the location of the crime. As a result of their identification of the recovered stolen property and other evidence in the case, 1st degree felony charges have been formally lodged against Hugh Wayne "Hootie" Martin, 30, of Spofford. Martin now faces three felony charges as a result of his week-long crime spree that culminated with his arrest by this writer and Chief Deputy Sheriff David Luna on Thursday, June 14th. Martin has now been formally charged with two

3rd degree felony charges of Burglary of a Vehicle and one 1st degree felony charge of Burglary of a Habitation. He remains in the County Jail at the time of this writing in lieu of bonds totalling \$20,000.;; set by Justice of the Peace Alvin Hall.

Another local investigation into alleged voting irregularities during the City election on May 5, 1990 is being conducted by Texas Ranger Johnny Allen of Del Rio at the direction of District Attorney Tom Lee.

The allegations are that at least 9 people voted in the City election illegally and that the on-duty election Judges/Clerks failed to properly carry out their duties and responsibilities by allowing the 9 to vote without properly and correctly determining their place of residence and/or issuing a challenge to their eligibility. Under Texas election laws only legally registered voters whose physical and officially registered address is within the city limits may legally vote in a city election. At least 9 persons are believed to have voted illegally in the May 5th election. Anyone who knowingly votes in an election illegally is guilty of a 3rd

degree felony and an election judge/clerk who allows improper voting procedures to occur without issuing a formal challenge is guilty of a Class B misdemeanor. The results of the investigation will be submitted to the Kinney County Grand Jury by the District Attorney.

Rabies has always been a dreaded disease that affects wild animals, domestic livestock, household pets, and sometimes, humans. Rabies affects the nervous system and mammals that contract the disease die a slow, painful, horrible death. Anyone who has ever witnessed an animal or most tragic of all, a human, die from rabies infection will never forget it.

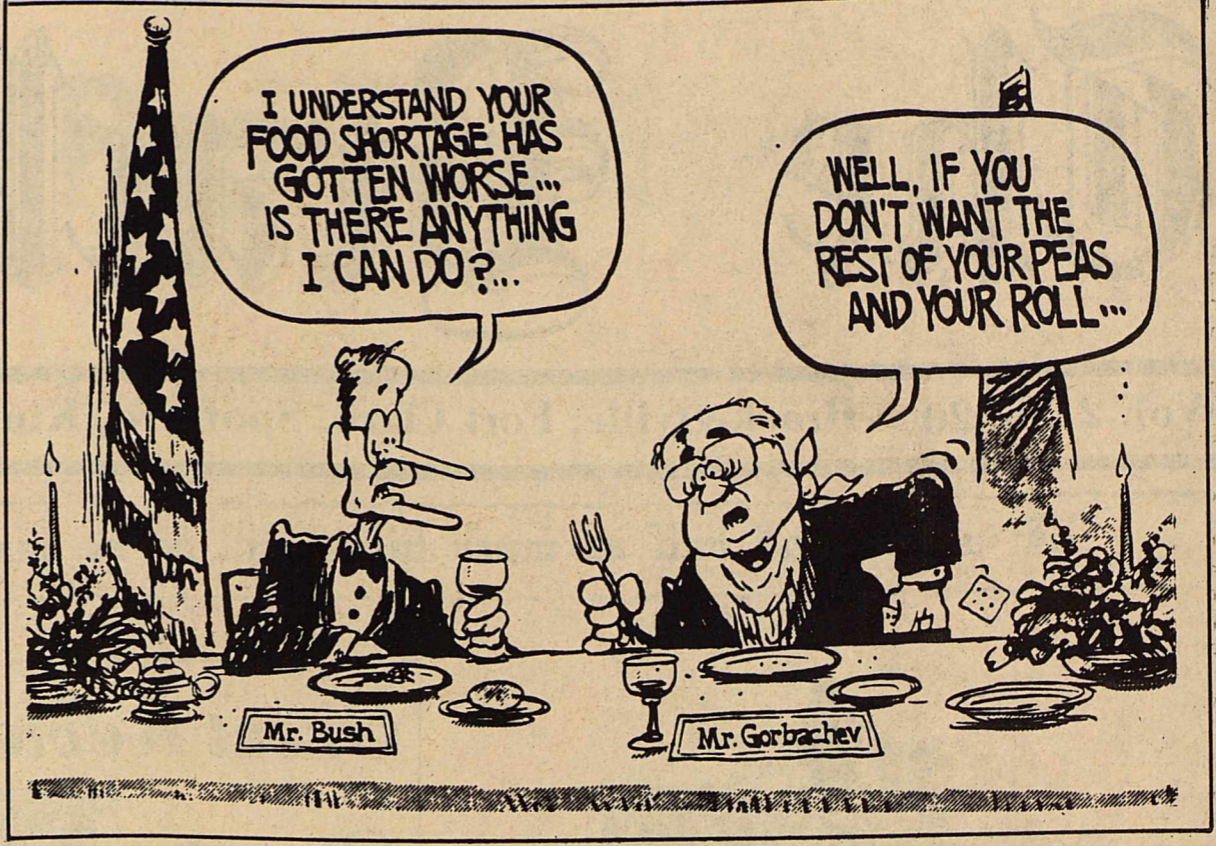
Hot, dry weather such as we are currently experiencing is a factor that seems to stimulate rabies outbreaks that usually start in the wild animal population and spill over into domestic animals and pets exposed to bites or scratches from the infected animal, often the injuries being undetected by the owners until it's too late. Never, ever should the owners of pets that have been vaccinated against rabies assume that the vaccination will protect their pet from contracting rabies if bitten by an infected animal. The pet that does obtain a bite or injury from an unknown source should be isolated for at least 14 days (21 to 45 days is even better).

On May 27, 1990 a Ft. Clark resident reported that his dog had been bitten by a skunk and though the dog had been vaccinated against rabies, further investigation was needed. The skunk was luckily identified, located, and killed with the head sent to Austin for examination. The dog was placed in isolation for observation for 45 days. The skunk has been determined to have had rabies at the time the dog was bitten and all Kinney County residents, and most especially those with livestock and family pets should take precautions against the dreaded disease.

All family pets (cats, dogs, and other mammals) should be vaccinated against rabies annually and anyone observing a wild animal that appears unusually tame or sick should immediately get away from that animal and report it to the Sheriff's Department. Anyone who has cats or dogs or other pet mammals that run loose and appear to have been bitten or scratched and the source is unknown should immediately isolate that animal for at least 14 to 21 days. And, most importantly, anyone bitten or scratched by a dog or cat or a wild animal should immediately report the incident and attempt to have the guilty animal identified, isolated, and/or killed and it's head sent off for examination.

I certainly do not want to cause panic or over-reaction by this report, just plain old common sense and basic rules of caution and precaution will provide adequate protection against the dreaded disease of rabies. Vaccinate your pets annually, use common sense and caution when handling pets or walking in areas where wild animals are known to roam, report all bites, scratches, or sick animals. The danger lies in assuming that just because a pet has been vaccinated against rabies he is therefore immune, this is just not 100% guaranteed.

Be careful out there!

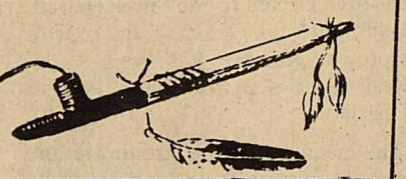

## Smoke From Nakai

Some Spanish games were introduced to the Southwest Indians among the Rio Grande Pueblos. One of the games was the Corso de Gallo or the Chicken Pull. The Spanish brought such games from Spain. It is a contest of riding skill traditionally performed on San Juan Day (June 24) even though it can be performed any other time on separate events such as a native ceremony. The Papago Indian version of the chicken pull takes place on a sandy race track several hundred feet long. Half down the track a live rooster is buried up to its neck in the loose sand. Individual riders galloping at full speed lean out of their saddles and attempt to pull the rooster out of the ground. It usually takes many tries before a rider succeeds in grabbing the fowl free.

The tribes that adopted the Chicken Pull gave it a religious connotation. To the Rio Grande Pueblos, it has an agricultural significance with the planting and subsequent removal of the rooster is regarded as symbolic of sowing and reaping. The blood and feathers of the fowl represent the sunrise and clouds. The foam and lathered horse represent rain and is also considered to be a blessing for the earth which promotes fertility.

The June 24 or San Juan Day is recognized among the pueblos as a day to cut a woman's hair and to bathe in the river real early in the morning; and it is considered a day for rain.

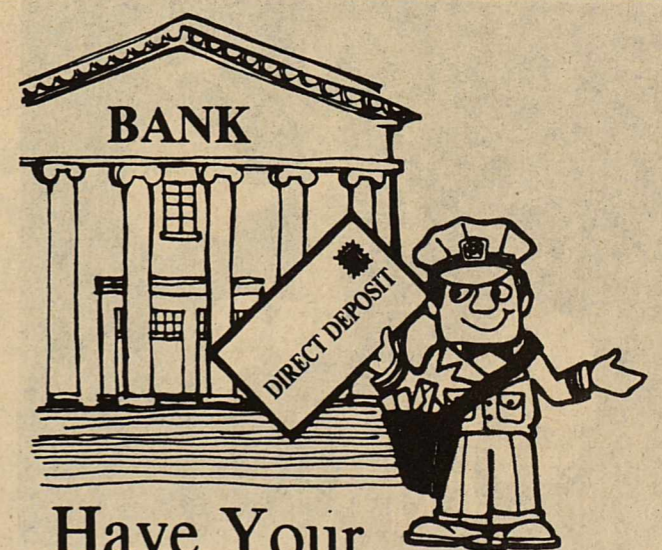

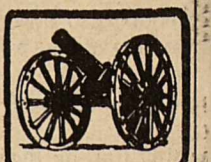

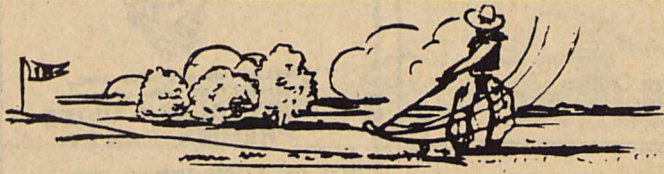
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# Golf News

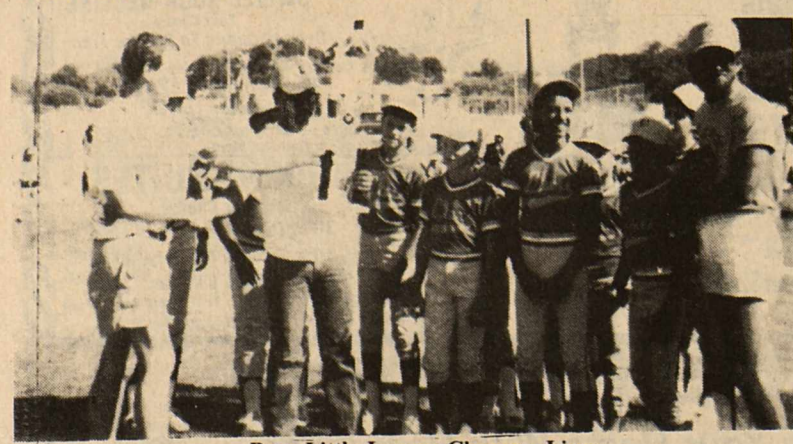

3 quarts sliced cucumbers
2 large onions-sliced
2 green peppers-sliced
1 tea celery seed
1/2 cup salt
2 cups white vinegar
3 cups sugar

Mix all ingredients together and let stand in glass container, covered. These pickles are ready to eat in one day. Then refrigerate in smaller jars and enjoy them all summer.

8 hamburger buns-split
1/2 head of lettuce, finely shredded
1 cup grated cheese (chedder is best)

Toss rhubarb with brown sugar and 3 TBS flour and put in a one-quat casserole. Combine one cup flour, sugar, baking powder and salt in a

bowl. Mix together margarine and milk and stir into flour mixture with a fork, just enough to moisten all ingredients. Spoon evenly over rhubarb and bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for about 35 minutes. Serves 4 or 5.

Now if you're having company and need a little different dip to go with the chips or snack crackers this weekend, this one fills the bill.

Chip Dip
2 eggs
2 TBS sugar
3 TBS Vinegar

1 8 oz. cream cheese softened
Finely chopped celery, green pepper, and onion to taste. Cook eggs, sugar, vinegar and salt over moderate heat in a heavy saucepan until thick. Pour mixture into bowl, add softened cream cheese, blend until smooth. Add prepared vegetables and set in refrigerator overnight to blend flavors. Stir will before serving.

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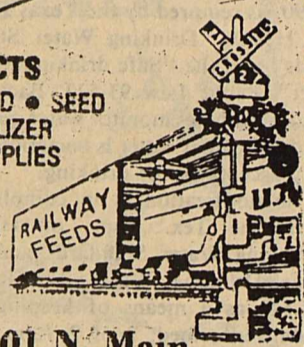

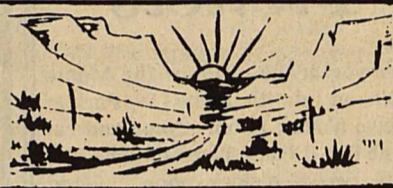

Kit Carson was an illiterate mountain man and trapper and became a legend in his own time as a Western Guide.

Carson was born in Kentucky on December 24, 1809. He grew up in a stockade home in Mississippi where the ever threat of Indian attacks was a way of life.

In 1811 Carson took the famous guide Thomas Fitzpatrick as a partner in a trapping venture to the north. For over over a decade, Carson was a trapper in the Rocky Mountains. There he met Jim Bridger, fought Indians and other elements and married an Arapaho woman who bore him a daughter. In 1824 Kit Carson met John Charles Fremont, "The Pathfinder", who took him as a guide on his first two expeditions.

When the Mexican War began, Carson served in the Army in

California. He guided Kearny's Cavalry from New Mexico to

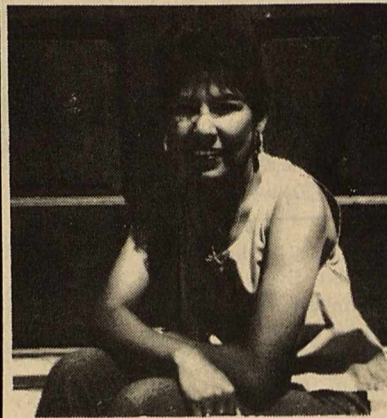
California, and fought in the Battle of San Pasual.

He was sent to Washington with dispatches in the summer of 1847. there he was well received because of his association with Fremont in a manner of dress. He returned to Taos, New Mexico where he was appointed Indian Agent in 1853.

When the Civil War started he was given a commission with orders to suppress the Apaches and Navajos in that area. He was sent to Texas and at Adohe Wells, Carson held off an attack of four thousand hostile Indians with only four hundred men and two cannons, which made him famous in Texas.

Only in the last years of his life, while serving in several military posts, did he finally learn how to read and write.

what would be done about it, I was answered rudely and offensively. The individual suggested that if I thought something should be done about it, I could do it myself.

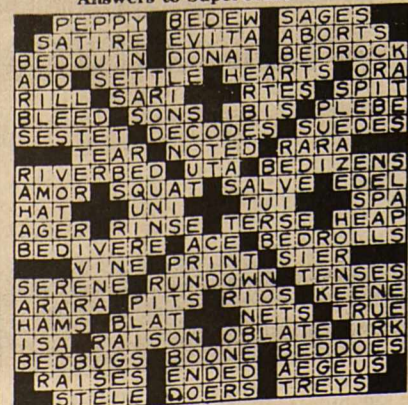
Was I doing something wrong? After all, curiosity killed the cat... maybe I shouldn't have asked how or who opened the packages. However,

as a consumer I figure I have the right to know if giant rats are lurking around opening packages, or gremlins for that matter. I Want To Know!!!!

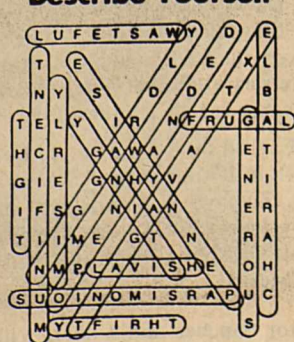

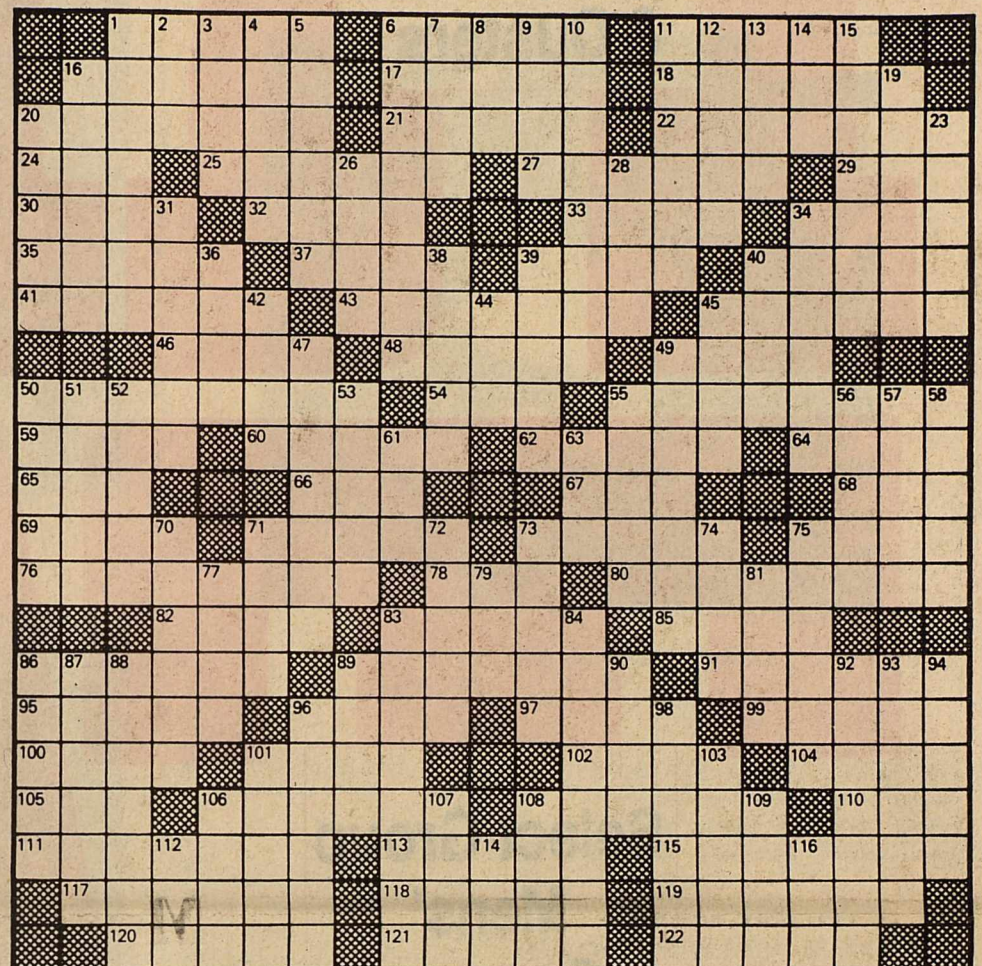
