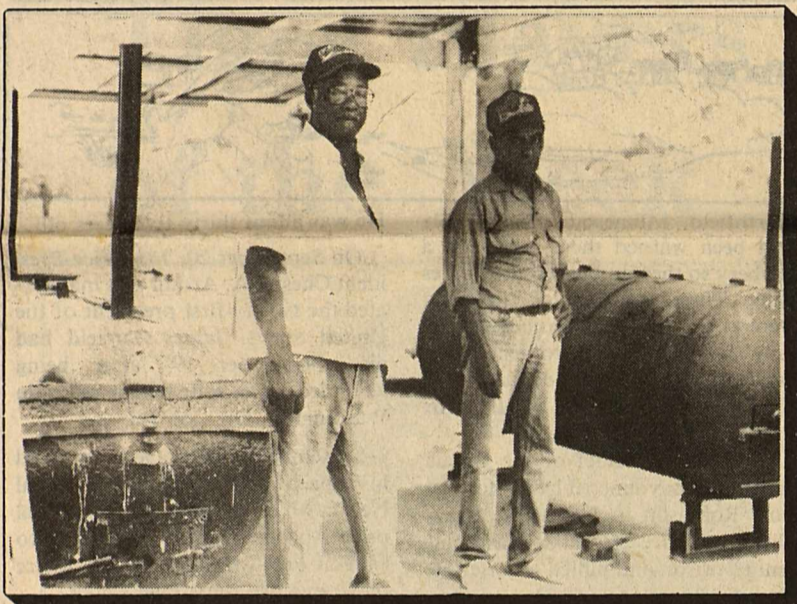

The memorial service to be held at the cemetery Sunday afternoon was moved to the school because of the weather.



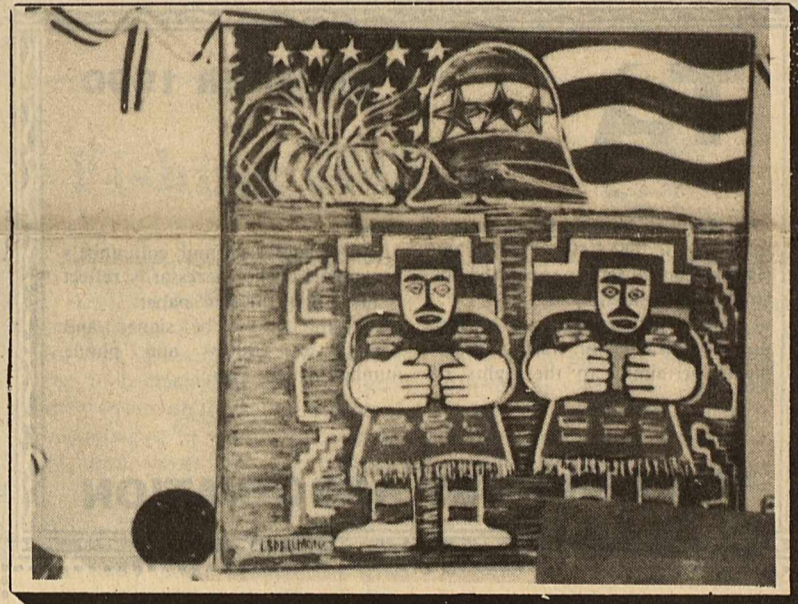

County Tax Rate Remains the Same

A special meeting of the Commissioners Court was called this past Monday morning at 10:00 A.M. in the county court room.

The meeting was called to order by Judge Tommy Seargeant and a quorum was established with the attendance of Bill Bizzell, Rueben Fuentes, Joe Garza, and Rosemary Slubar.

The insurance that is now being provided by Blue Cross/Blue Shield was discussed at length with Diane Zertuche, representative for the company, on hand to answer questions. Ms. Zertuche was called down by Commissioners Slubar and Bizzell for "bad mouthing" a rival company who had earlier presented their insurance plan. Mr. Bizzell insisted that everyone get back on track and after a lengthy discussion it was voted on and passed to adopt the Plan 1 insurance program at an added cost of \$24,000 per year.

Joe Garza, Jr. appeared before the Court and personally thanked them for the ambulance service that is provided and managed by Kinney County. "If it had not been for the prompt attention of the ambulance and the crew I honestly feel as though my father might not be alive today", the younger Garza said. His words of praise were well received by the Commissioners.

The issue on setting the Sheriff and the Constable fees was voted and passed and will be effective as of January 1, 1991.

The motion was made and seconded to transfer money for postage, supplies, and books from the County Attorney's office to the County Clerk's office for a paper shredder.

The motion carried.

Judge Seargeant attempted to contact Mr. Graves for the final plans on the Courthouse Annex but was unable to do so. Mr. Graves' representative reported that the plans were not complete making them unavailable.

The Commissioners rejected the census report due to discrepancies in the areas that were covered and the population of the areas. The matter will be researched further.

A motion was made by Judge Seargeant and seconded by Commissioner Fuentes to hire Ramon Garcia as a court house maintenance man with his duties primarily being janitorial work. The motion carried with Bizzell abstaining. Garcia will be hired on a six month probationary period and he will be starting to work on Tuesday, September 18, 1990.

The Commissioners went into executive session to discuss personnel, salaries, pending litigation, and possible official misconduct by an elected official.

The meeting recessed for noon and re-convened at 1:30 P.M.

The budget for 1990-91 was discussed at length. Attorney Shahan cautioned the Commissioners to take a long look at a budget that did not include the \$23,000 for the insurance program that would be paid out to Blue Cross/Blue Shield. He told them the budget would have to be revised to include the money that is to be allowed for insurance.

The budget was amended to include the increase in insurance and accepted.

The tax rate for 1990-91 will remain the same with no changes.

City Council Holds Special Meeting

The city council met in a special called meeting this past Monday night at 6:30 p.m. in the City Hall. The primary purpose of the meeting was to finish work that had begun during the regular monthly business meeting but was postponed due to illness by one of the council members.

The lease for the landfill renewed for one year.

Mayor Larry Moore called the meeting to order and established a quorum with all council members present those being Julie Fuentes, Bernie Cervantes, David Broderick, Richard Terrazas, Louis Dimery, and Mayor Larry Moore.

All visitors were welcomed. The budget for 1990-91 was passed.

The tax rate for 1990-91 was passed. The lease for the landfill was renewed for one more year with Joe York.

The city building code was discussed with minor changes going into effect. In the future a contractor must acquire a permit to paint with the fee set at \$5.00 for any job under \$2,000. If the job is more than \$2,000 the increase in permit fees will be adjusted accordingly. Meeting adjourned.

Project Flooded by Political Controversy

BRACKETTVILLE, TX

Work on the low water crossings on Tularosa Road remains at a standstill after Tully Shahan, Kinney County Attorney, dispatched Sheriff Norman Hooten to the job site with a request for a meeting with Commissioner Bill Bizzell to discuss irregularities pertaining to the project. Bizzell had volunteered his time to Commissioner Rosemary Slubar as supervisor over the entire project and was in the process of preparing the crossings for pouring of concrete.

The projects had been voted on and passed by the Commissioners Court with construction to get underway immediately.

After the "halt order" was placed on the job a special meeting of the Commissioners Court was called for Monday morning, September 17, at 10:00 a.m. in the County Court room.

The meeting got underway on schedule with the county judge, county attorney, and all four commissioners going into executive ses-

sion at 11:15 a.m. The agenda called for a discussion on personnel, salaries, pending litigation, and possible official misconduct by an elected official.

The officials came out of executive session at 12:15 p.m. and recessed for lunch.

Commissioner Bizzell and Slubar were asked for statements regarding the irregularities but both refused. Their comments were, "Everything is O.K."

Judge Tommy Seargeant was contacted and an appointment was made for an interview but he ignored it by directing the reporter into the next room and not showing up.

Ms. Slubar was re-contacted and she was more liberal with pertinent information leading to the fiasco that was unfolding.

She admitted the cost of the water crossings came from Bill Bizzell's figures. No other figures were attained by the Commissioners Court. The work was to have proceeded with those figures and Mr. Bizzell supervising the job. The material cost was put out on bid with Earl Baker receiving the cement work and Alamo receiving the bid on the iron work. The question of installation came up after interested citizens called Judge Seargeant and reported a deficiency in construction according to their opinion.

The project has now been put on hold pending the hiring of a state approved engineer to re-figure the

job and oversee the entire construction. The new engineer should be ready for work within the next two weeks and work on the water

crossings should resume within three to four weeks. Commission Slubar when asked about the project replied, "I know the importance of finishing this work before the bad weather sets in. It is very important to the people who live out there and it is important to me to see that the county meets their needs."

A portion of the alleged irregularities have been discounted but others remain questionable. The question of using a commissioner's private workers on county projects... the question of buying cement for county jobs from a concrete company that is owned by the county judge...using county employees to assist in the operation of a private business...the question of county commissioners bidding on county jobs and doing the work. These are questions that need to be answered.

The county judge has been responsible for calling a rival newspaper and giving the names of newly hired agents hired by the Sheriff's department that will be doing dangerous and secret undercover work but when he is asked about irregularities in Kinney County surrounding him and his court he simply answers, "I don't know nothing."

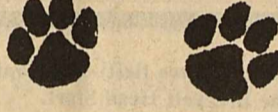

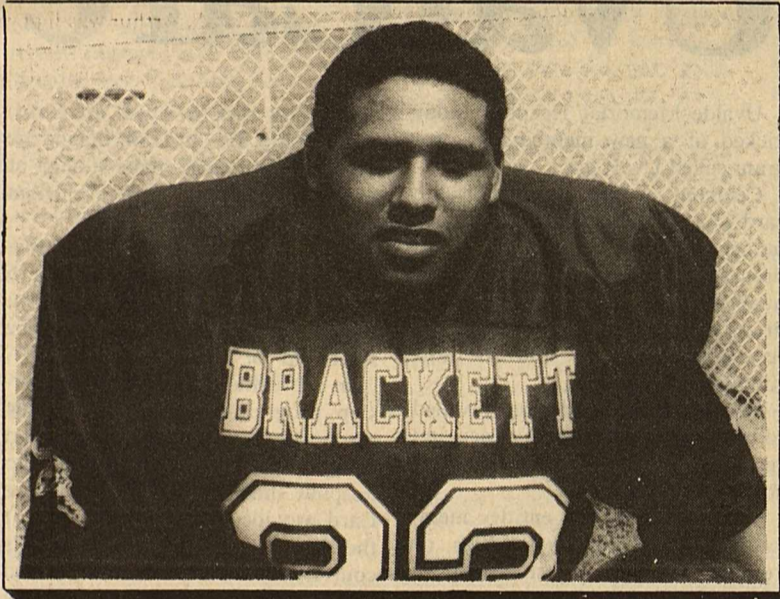

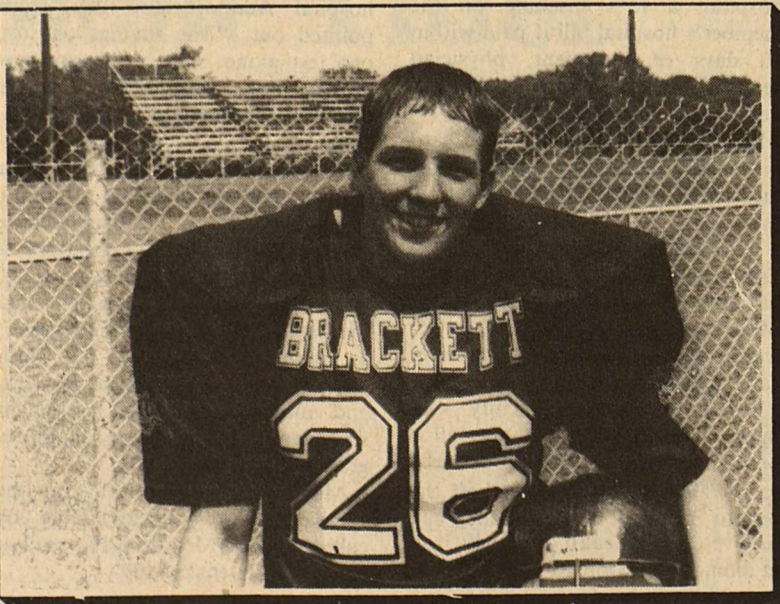

Fishing Report



AMISTAD--Water clear in main part of lake, Rio Grande muddy due to rains upstream, 82 degrees, 7 1/2 feet low; black bass are fairly good early or late on topwaters; striper are beginning to hit, schooling is predicted soon, most fish are scattered; crappie are slow; white bass are slow, some fish under the Pecos River bridge on minnows at night; catfish are fairly good around the river channels on Roger's Cheese Bait; many fish are in the 2-4 pound range; fish are scattered in 6-60 feet of water, best fishing has been in baited holes; shrimp have been good productive baits.

CALAVERAS--Water clear to murky, 85 degrees, 3 inches above normal level; black bass are slow; striper are good to 6 pound average on Rat-L-Traps and chicken livers; crappie are slow; catfish are very good with strings to 3 pound average on live perch and chicken livers; redfish are very good to 10 pound average on tilapia; corvina are good to 7 pound average on tilapia.

CHOKE--Water clear, 84 degrees, 11 1/2 feet low; black bass are fair early to 6 pounds, few limits, on topwaters, spinners and worms; striper are good with limits in the 12-14 pound range trolling cranks around the dam area; crappie are slow; white bass are slow; catfish are good in 1-6 feet of water along the south shore flats and along the river channel on cheese baits and blood bait. A gar fishing tournament over the last weekend produced a 37-pound alligator gar. Six hours after the tournament, Wade Swain from Jourdanton brought in a 200 pound gar which was 7 1/4 feet long with a 42 inch girth. Fish are good to 10 pounds on topwaters and worms; crappie are fairly good with some limits on minnows; white bass are fair; catfish are slow.

BRAUNIG--Water murky, 83 degrees, normal level; black bass are poor; striper are poor; catfish are excellent to 3 pound average on live and shrimp; redfish are excellent to 17 pounds downrigging spoons in 15 feet of water.

Q. We have a kitchen table which has a plastic laminated wood grain top that has lost its shine and looks drab. I would like to know of something I could put on it to make it look nice again.

is Tung Oil, and the second is latex urethane. Tung oil comes in a liquid, and is applied with a soft cloth, and when it dries, you buff the area with another soft cloth. The finish is rock hard, easy to apply, and resembles a varnished finish.

With either of these suggested applications, having a clean surface is important to insure proper adhesion. Q. Can you tell me how to get the smell of urine out of a cellar concrete floor? It would be very appreciated. A.T.

A. First, cut a piece of cardboard slightly larger than the hole to provide a backing. Put a piece of wire through the cardboard, push the cardboard into the hole. Wrap a pencil or small stick around the wire to hold the cardboard against the back of the hole.

Once the first application hardens (usually 15 minutes), snip the wire and push the remainder into the wall, and begin your second application. When the plaster starts to harden, sprinkle some water on it and using your putty knife, smooth out the surface. This is called polishing, and you'll be surprised how smooth the patch will be.
