Linda Hidalgo has a new bike and she rode it from her home on Ann Street to the Kinney County Nutrition Center.

Linda's new bike is actually made from old parts and that is one thing that makes it special. But, there are other special features of this bike. For one thing, Martin Kelso made it for Linda. He scrounged looking for a three wheel frame, a lawnmower handle, a big wide seat, plastic tubing, and various odds and ends. As people heard about his project, things materialized from concerned, loving people. With his creative ability he put this odd assortment together into a unique vehicle.

The real heart of this story is that Linda was thrown from a horse sixteen years ago and has not been able to walk since. At that time she was just nineteen years old, had recently graduated from high school and was attending beauty school. She had been born on her family's ranch and had ridden horses all her life, yet the accident happened.

Mr. Kelso is a frequent visitor at the Nutrition Center and about two years ago he met Linda there. She seemed to be alone. He asked how she had gotten there and how she was to get home. An uncle had brought her but had been unable to stay to get her home. Mr. Kelso saw that she got home that day. He still sees that she gets back and forth and frequently can be seen pushing her wheel chair to make the trip.

He built an exerciser in her back yard similar to the ones you see Shetland horses hitched to -- the

ones that go round and round so kids can ride the ponies. The first day Linda managed to get around 100 times.


Then, Mr. Kelso got the idea for the three wheeler. It was finished and presented to Linda on Tuesday, July 16. Wow, she had wheels so she immediately rode it to the Nutrition Center . . .and knew the exaltation of being mobile on her own. Linda said she had an exercise bike at home but when she rode it, she didn't go anywhere. Riding this new bike actually got her someplace, and

Kinney County Commissioners Meet

A Special Meeting of the Kinney County Commissioner's Court met July 15, 1991 at 9:00 a.m. to discuss several items.

First on the agenda was the selection of a Citizens Advisory Group for redistricting. Several placed their name on the list. A complete group will be selected at the July 22, 1991, 7:00 p.m. meeting.

A review of the redistricting proposal by the firm Ford, Ferraro and Fritz was held. Interested persons were asked to submit their ideas by the July 22 meeting.

Certificates of obligation projects for funding were discussed and approved. Along with the selection of projects for funding the Court agreed to approve a resolution authorizing giving a notice of intention pertaining to the issuance of Certificates of obligation for \$325,000.00.

Discussion was held on the advisibility of buying a computer system for Kinney County. That issue was tabled until a later time.

The lease agreement is due on the office of the Justice of the Peace. It was determined to take the building on a month-to-month basis until new quarters in existing County owned offices could be arranged.

City Council Reviews Long Range Goals A public meeting on City Plan- around 500,000 going into the Mr. Groves suggested cree

A public meeting on City Planning was held in the Kinney County Commissioner's Courtroom Monday, July 15, 1991 at 7:00 p.m.

The meeting was attended by Diane Bravo, Mayor pro tem, Julie Fuentes, City Councilwoman, Felix Gonzales, City Secretary, Alvin Groves, Project Engineer who submitted a Master Plan for the City of Brackettville, members of the press Jean Faulkenberry and Sonja Shell of The Brackett News.

Not enough City Council members were present for a quorum so Mr. Groves made his presentation in an informal manner.

Mr. Groves reported that he submitted two copies of the Master Plan report to the Department of Commerce in Austin on Monday, July 15, 1991. He reviewed the plan and stated that the City Council should adopt some of these recommendations immediately. The sewer program is a priority.

He recommended that the City take a fresh look at the proposed sewage treatment plant. It may be possible to remodel the existing plant at a lesser cost than building a new one. He also recommended getting a financial advisor on board in conjunction with the city planning program.

In conjunction with the waste water treatment plant the city needs to find out why the flow into the plant is so large. At the most there should be only about 350,000 gallons going into the system. At the present time there appears to be

around 500,000 going into the system. Is there a possibility that there is fresh water flowing into the system?

Mr. Groves made a few suggestions about street planning. When new sewer lines are laid, the City could put in curbs and gutters at the same time to keep from repeating some of the work. This would also help carry away the water of heavy rains.

Developing a work force within the City Hall is an essential part of the plan. Qualified workers could carry out most of the projects without having to resort to outside contractors to do the work.

Brackettville needs more parks.

Mr. Groves suggested creating green belts out of areas that are now streets that are seldom used. He suggested closing Fritter, King and Ross streets at the Las Moras drainage ditch and turning the area into a park. That way the City could get rid of three low-water crossings. The streets are not in good repair at this point

One other item that would help the looks of Brackettville would be to pass an ordinance to condemn and tear down shacks and abandoned buildings.

A copy of the Comprehensive Master Plan that Groves and Associates of San Antonio have submitted can be seen at City Hall. The public is welcome to view it.


If you decide **no**, then one way to stop this anger is to have some fun with it. Turn it into humor. Exaggerate the consequences.

IRISH SODA BREAD

4 to 41/2 cups flour 2 Tbs. sugar 1 Tb. baking soda 1 Tea. salt ½ cup margarine 1 cup raisins 2 beaten eggs 11/2 cups buttermilk

Preheat oven to 375°, grease a 2quart casserole dish. This makes one large bread. In large mixing bowl, combine 4 cups flour, and the next four ingredients. With a pastry blender or fork, cut in margarine until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in raisins. Reserve 1 Tb. of the beaten eggs. Beat in buttermilk and eggs into flour mixture. On lightly floured board, knead dough mixture adding remaining 1/2 cup flour as necessary, if dough is sticky. Shape into ball, place in prepared bowl. Cut a cross in top of bread about ¼ in. deep, 4 in. long. Brush top with the 1 Tb. reserved beaten eggs. Bake for 1 hour.





Available For Texans



I grew up during the Depression in the little town of Lakeview, just outside of Waco. I don't know why they called it Lakeview, because there was no lake to view.

It was just a little town where the people worked hard and didn't ask for a lot. A big time was driving into Waco for an ice cream cone. I've never forgotten what I learned growing up there in Lakeview.

The rule was: wear it, wear it out, turn it over and wear it again.

Those lessons I learned from my mama have stayed with me throughout my life. She showed me how to squeeze a dollar and a quarter out of every dollar. And when it was time to clean, she taught me to scrub to the bone. And it's time we applied my

mama's lessons to state government.

The fabric that makes up state government is wearing thin. The current shape, the proposed expenditures amount to \$4.5 billion more than our income. Texans are faced with making a fundamental choice between cutting and spending.

It is time to take care of our budget problems the same way my mama took care of a worn out shirt. She'd rip off the collar, turn it over and sew it back on.

On July 15 we begin a special session dedicated to the budget. But it will be much more than that. It will be an accountability session as we try to bring order and sanity to a state bureaucracy that is badly in need of an overhaul.

This special session is going to be a historic one. I am confident that statesmanship will prevail over partisanship, and the people of Texas are going to be proud of the job their representatives do for them. Democrats and Republicans alike know that we will never have a better opportunity to reshape state government than the one we have before us today.

Part one of the session will be cuts

and consolidations. Part two is the budget.

In part three, we'll talk about new revenues - but only after we are absolutely certain they are necessary.

And I guarantee you that part one is going to be a headline-maker.

Texas Comptroller John Sharp has given us the tools we need to cut state government.

Early in the session I authorized the Comptroller to conduct a complete audit of every state agency and function. While critics claimed Sharp's report couldn't possibly come up with more than "\$200 or \$300 million in savings." I insisted that he take a microscope to every function the state performs.

And he has given us an absolutely stunning piece of work. Sharp's 1,500 page report outlines ways to reduce our overall state expenditures by \$5.2 billion.

As you would have expected, the hollering has already begun. Opponents of the report wasted no time before taking to the newspapers and the nightly news to protest the cuts and consolidations. And they are howling loudly.

But the people of Texas are fed

They are fed up with business as usual and a bureaucracy where no one is in charge and the simplest decisions are months in the making. They want change in state government. They want accountability and accessibility in return for their tax dollars.

And it is important to point out that many of the proposals put forth in the Comptroller's report bear out what I have always believed: In many areas we can actually improve service while reducing costs.

We are going to do this by eliminating unnecessary duplications that turn the simplest request into a maze of bureaucratic red-

The people of Texas want a dramatic change in the way we do business in state government.

The people of Texas do not want a state income tax.

I intend to honor their wishes on both those counts. That's why I am so excited about the prospects for real change in this special session.

Because we are at a crossroads that the citizens of Lakeview would have had no trouble understanding when I was growing up there.

So we'll take what we have, turn it inside out, and make it better.





Amistad: Water clear, 82 degrees, 6 feet low; black bass are good to 4 pounds on purple yellow-tailed worms; striper are fairly good around the dam in 70-90 feet of water on 2 ounce Bananahead jigs; crappie are slow; white bass are good in the Devils River on slabs and minnows; catfish are good in shallow water on cheese baits in Caballo and Zorro

Braunig: Water clear, 85 degrees, normal level; black bass are good to 61/2 pounds on spinners, worms and topwaters; striper are improving in the 6 - 8 pound range on chicken livers; catfish are excellent in the 31/2 to 5 pound range on liver, shrimp, cheesebaits and nightcrawlers; redfish are improving to 171/2 pounds from the bank, Parks and wildlife biologists this week stocked 67,000 fingerling redfish. Other stockings are planned for late this week.

Coleto Creek: Water murky, 76 degrees at the dam, 92 degrees at Dike No. 2, 6 inches above normal level; black bass are good but small with limits on June Bug worms and Rattle Traps; striper are slow; crappie are excellent with minnows and jigs, limits caught but most fish are small; catfish are good to 8 pounds on chicken liver, shrimp and cheese

July 11, 1869 - Eight companies of the U.S. Fifth Cavalry attacked the summer encampment of Tall Bull and his Chevenne Dog Soldiers at Summit Springs, in northern Colorado Territory. The Dog Soldiers were a separate selfappointed warrior order that refused to concur with earlier treaties. Tall Bull and 52 Indians were killed. The fight was recorded as the Battle of

Summit Springs and was the last in that section of the Great Plains. It freed Kansas and the surrounding country from the threat of Indian attack. Buffalo Bill did not take a direct part in the Battle, but scouted out the village's location.

July 1873 - Jesse and Frank James, with their gang derailed and held up their first train on the Rock Island Line between Adair and Council Bluffs, Iowa. The gang stopped the

Benjamin R. Milam had dark

piercing eyes, black hair, light complexion, six feet one and one-half inches tall, and weighed two hundred pounds. He was an adventurer, land promoter, leader, soldier, and was outstanding in courage.

Milam was born in Kentucky, the fifth of six children born to Mose and Elizabeth Patti Boyd Milam. His birth was probably October 20, 1788. He lived in the Kentucky wilderness until he was twenty-four. Then, he bacame a soldier. From August to December 1812, he was a private in the 8th regiment, Kentucky Militia of the U.S. Army. He then went home until 1815.

In 1815, Milam and his partner, John Samuels, took a load of flour down the Mississippi to market at New Orleans. Prices were so low they chartered a schooner and set sail for Venezuela, South America. Yellow fever hit and killed the captain and most of the crew. When they finally docked, they had lost their cargo in a terrible storm.

Coming home Milam took a consignment of goods overland to the Colorado River of Texas. While on this trip, he met David Burnet,


another great Texan.

Milam threw in with the Revolution of Mexico against Spain, as a result, he was thrown in prison in Saltillo but was released and welcomed in Mexico City. Milam was betrayed and thrown in prison at Monterrey but was released in November, 1822.

Milam had gold and silver mine interests in Northern Mexico. In 1829. Ben Milam joined with his old friend, David G. Burnet, to form the Western Colonization and Mining Company. One of his backers was Porter Clay, brother to Henry Clay, but this venture also fell through.

With Mexico's troops under General Cos, word reached the Texans that the Mexicans were disorganized and overestimated. Ben Milam stepped in front of the Texas Headquarters and said, "Who will follow old Ben Milam into San Antonio?" The seige lasted four days. Milam fell on the third day and died. Victory came on the fourth day December 10, 1835.

By dying, Milam achieved victory. In life, he was only near great, but in death be became a brave



Reasonable fertilizer programs are a part of basic landscape maintenance. Our soils are low in plant essential nitrogen. Yearly applications of nitrogen containing fertilizers are necessary for healthy trees, shrubs and turf grasses.

There are as many fertilizer formulations on the market as there are diet colas. Exotic fertilizer combinations are usually as nutritional to the plant as a diet cola is, also, specific fertilizers are marketed for specific plants (pecan fertilizers, tomato fertilizers, etc.). It is a proven fact that plants are unable to read fertilizer labels. Our soils tend to have sufficient phosphorus and potassium in almost all cases. In all cases, our soils are low in iron because of high pH values. Nitrogen is also relatively low.

It is possible, and much more economical, to use the same fertilizer on your lawn, trees (shade, fruit, nut) flowers, and vegetable garden. Which fertilizer? One that is primarily nitrogen (the first number of the analysis with lesser percentages of phosphorus and potassium (the second and third numbers). The old 16-20-0, has been used for years, but it is probably not the best.

Fertilizers that contain sulfur, zinc and iron may contribute somewhat to plant available amounts of these elements in soil, but additional and separate applications of iron (in a chelated form for alkaline soils) will be needed on ornamental and fruit trees. Pecans will need zinc (as a foliar spray) for greatest vigor and nut production.

Ideally, fertilizer rates are based on soil samples. Sample instructions are available in the Kinney County Extension office. Remember, fertilizer applications go hand-in-hand

-- Trees: apply 1.5 pound of 21-0-0 per inch of trunk diameter. A 10 inch pecan tree would need 15 pounds of 21-0-0 scattered around its dripline.

--Shurbs: Apply 1 pound of 21-0-0 per foot of shrub height. A group of three junipers, 4 feet in height would require 12 pounds of 12-0-0.

-- Lawns: Apply 20-30 pounds of 21-0-0 per 1000 square feet of common bermuda. St. Augustine requires about 10 pounds less. These are total yearly amounts of fertilizer. Divide your total requirements into 2-3 applications. Measure your lawn as to not overfertilize.

-- Vegetable gardens: Preplant incorporations of 1 pound of 21-0-0 per 100 square feet of garden area. Additional side dressings of fertilizer may be necessary during the growing season.

I have made several visits to homes in Unit 15 and around Fort Clark. They all have had one thing in common. Problems with iron chlorosis are common this time of year. A general yellowing of the leaves with green veins running through the yellow leaf indicate a lack of plant available iron. Please remember, the iron these plants need is not the same kind of iron from metal shavings, rusty nails, old horse shoes or similar steel items. This form is not available to the plant and does no good to be around a tree. Chelated iron (copperas) is the type you need to be using.


Geologically-speaking, Enchanted Rock is literally the "Birthplace of Texas." It is the place where Texas is estimated to have begun one billion years ago. At one time covered by But it was the Indians, whose ocean, part of a large granitic mass was uplifted and exposed to the elements. Through the eons, overlying ancient metamorphic and younger posing an extensive igneous feature known as the Enchanted Rock bathposed batholith in the United States (Stone Mountain, Georgia is the largest). For all its apparent barrennomadic hunters and gatherers attrac-ness, the rocky terrain supports an abundance and great diversity of animal and plant life because it is an ecological crossroads.

Springtime here is especially breathtaking. The landscape becomes a living, natural canvas splashed with bluebonnets, Indian paintbrush, yellow coreopsis and the rare purple basin bellflowers that intermingle with waving prairie grasses. Here too, are found rock quillworts that thrive in vernal pools and are indigenous to granite regions of Central Texas, and a rare species of tropical fern that grows only at Enchanted Rock and in tropical Florida.



PROPOSITION #1 (SJR 42)

WORDING ON BALLOT: The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property.

EXPLANATION

The school finance law approved by the 72nd Legislature created 188 new county education districts, composed of single counties or groups of counties. These districts have the limited purpose of levying the required local first-tier tax to raise the equivalent of 72 cents per \$100 of assessed market value and redistributing the proceeds among local school districts within the county education district.

This proposed amendment would authorize the new districts to hold elections to allow voters within the districts to decide whether to grant an exemption on a percentage of the assessed value of residence homesteads; whether to grant an additional exemption on the homesteads of elderly and disabled persons; and whether to impose taxes on certain types of personal property. In the enabling legislation that was passed during the regular session of the legislature, the amount of the homestead exemption was specified as 20 per cent and the exemption for elderly and disabled persons was set at \$10,000. These exemptions would be in addition to the existing \$5,000 homestead exemption, the \$10,000 exemption on homesteads of elderly and disabled persons, and the freeze on property taxes for elderly and disabled persons.

The enabling legislation also directed the county education districts to present the propositions to their voters in an election to be held on August 10, 1991. The wording of the proposals on local ballots will be identical across the state, but the order may vary. Decisions made by voters in a district would apply in that district only, contingent upon the decision of voters statewide on the proposed constitutional amendment which authorizes these elections.

Thus, voters who go to the polls on August 10 will be asked to vote simulatneously on a constitutional amendment and to vote on the local tax options authorized by the proposed amendment. If voters approve the proposed amendment statewide, the locally adopted options would go into effect without delay. This is being done in order to enable the new taxing districts to implement voter decisions in the property tax bills scheduled to go out in October.

1. Trustees of the new county education districts are appointed by local school board rather than being elected by voters, and thus do not have the discretionary authority to decide whether or not to grant these exemptions or impose these taxes on personal property. Therefore, the power

2. This amendment would make it possible for homestead exemptions and personal property taxes to be continued, but at the option of voters rather than by action of the county education district board.

to make these decisions must rest with voters in the county education

AGAINST

1. Passage of this proposed amendment would shift the tax burden from residential property to businesses. It would effect county education district across the state very differently. Those that are dependent primarily upon residential property would be forced to raise residential property taxes more than those that rely on commercial property.

2. Tax exemptions for some property owners would result in higher taxes for others. Only 259 of the more than 1,050 school districts in Texas currently grant homestead exemption. This amendment could result in a large increase in property tax exemptions statewide, narrowing the property base that must provide the local share of public school funding, which contributes approximately half of all school funding. This would mean higher taxes for the remaining taxpayers in order to maintain the required local funding.

PROPOSITION #2 (SJR 5)

WORDING ON BALLOT: The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students.

The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to allow the Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue up to \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to Texas students attending Texas colleges and universities. The maximum interest rate would be set by law. An interest and sinking fund would be established to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds as they mature. The legislature could provide for the investment of bond proceeds and establish the interest and sinking fund. The state cannot issue bonds to finance student loans without this constitutional amendment because the Texas Constitution prohibits the legislature from lending the credit of the state without specific authorization in the constitution, and prohibits use of public funds for grants and loans to individuals. Previous amendments authorized issuance of \$85 million for student loans in 1965, \$200 million in 1969, and \$75 million in 1989.

1. These loans are urgently needed to meet the fall 1991 demand for loans to financially needy students. If this amendment is not approved, approximately 15,000 Texas students (the number who received loans last year) may be unable to attend Texas colleges and universities this year. These loans go only to financially needy students who otherwise could not afford to attend college.

2. The student loan program usually operates as a revolving, selfsupporting fund. Because changes in federal loan programs have created large increases in the demands for state loans, and because most of the many loans made in recent years are not yet due, the bonds to be issued are necessary to fund the program until payments on recent loans begin to come in. The bonds will be paid back, plus interest, by borrowers, not

1. The state does not need to incur any more debt. The bonded indebtedness of the state now totals \$7.5 billion. General obligation bonds, which account for \$2.3 billion in debt at the end of fiscal 1989, reached \$2.8 billion at the end of 1990.

2. This proposed \$300 million debt will not stand alone. The legislature should undertake a comprehensive evaluation of overall state debt before voters are asked to add to it.



PROS AND CONS OF COUNTY EDUCATION DISTRICT **PROPOSITIONS**

The propositions below will be presented to voters at the same time as the proposed constitutional amendment above. Although the language of the propositions will be identical statewide, the order in which they appear on the ballot may vary.

WORDING ON BALLOT: The exemption of 20 per cent of the market value of the residence homestead from ad valorem taxation in (name of the county education district).

If locally-granted homestead exemptions are completely eliminated, homeowners in the local school districts that have been granting homestead exemptions are likely to face large property tax increases. This proposed exemption could cushion the impact of expected increases.

AGAINST

In districts with substantial commercial property, this proposal would shift the tax burden from residential property to business. Districts that are largely residential would suffer losses of tax revenue and would have to raise tax rates to generate the required amount of local funding.

WORDING ON BALLOT: The exemption of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is disabled and of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is 65 or older from ad valorem taxation in (name of the county education district).

This proposal would alleviate the impact of higher school taxes on those most likely to be adversely affected by them.

AGAINST


Property taxes are alreadry frozen for individuals 65 or older and for disabled persons; this proposal would create an even larger exemption. This proposal is not need-based and would exempt many individuals who can afford to pay the higher taxes, increasing the burden on other tax-

WORDING ON BALLOT: The taxation of all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes, in (name of the county education district) that is not held or used for the production of income.

This would spread the tax burden over a wider base by generating revenue from non-income producing personal property such as boats, cars, and motorcycles.


AGAINST

Appraisals, verification of property, and collection of the tax create costs to taxpayers that may offset the income generated. Many local governing bodies do not collect this tax because it has a high delinquency rate and is difficult to enforce equitably.






What Is Heat Stroke?

: Heat stroke is a I medical emergency caused by excessive heat exposure and characterized by fever, lack of sweating and central nervous system dysfunction, ranging from confusion to coma. The elderly, the poor, the chronically ill, the overweight and alcoholic patients, as well as patients with cardiac disease, are at high risk for developing heat stroke during our hot summer days. There are many things that can be done to prevent heat stroke, including adequate fluid intake, avoiding the heat during the middle of the day, using air conditioners or fans to cool the environment and wearing light-colored and loose fitting clothing. Gradual exposure to the heat during early summer days can acclimatize a person and help prevent heat stroke. Extra rest is also helpful on the excessively hot days. It is im-



There are certain medications that the elderly person may be taking that can predispose him or her to heat stroke. They include anti-depressants, diuretics, certain blood pressure medications and antipsychotics. If the elderly person is on any of these medications, they need to be exceedingly careful regarding their exposure to heat in order to avoid heat stroke.

If a person is suspected of having a heat stroke, this is a medical emergency and they need to be taken immediately to the nearest emergency facility. Attempts to start cooling off the patient are advisable, including applying cool, moist cloths, turning on an air conditioner or a fan and removing heavy clothing.

If the person is alert and not confused, give them cool liquids to drink. If, however, the person has had a seizure or is confused, rapid transport to the nearest emergency facility is important and they should not be given anything to drink.




