City Employee Randy Castilla **Passes State Certification Exams**

Randy Castilla has completed the educational requirements and passed the state exams to become the City of Brackettville's only employee to hold Class C Water License, and Class C Waste Water License. The certification required 120 hours for the Water License, and 94

The courses are taught, and the exams are given, by the Texas Engineering Service.

Mr. Castilla was born in Michigan and attended elementary school there. His father was stricken with cancer and moved to the warmer climate of Texas upon the recommendation of his doctor. (The can-

father has moved back to Michigan) Randy attended Brackett High School for two years, and then completed his high school education at Crane High School.

After high school, Mr. Castilla was a pulling unit operator for Bullard Wells Service of Crane for

Mr. Castilla was employed by Fort Clark MUD for a year and a half. His supervisor there, Larry Sofaly, recognized Randy as a hard working, honest and trustworthy individual, a highly capable maintenance man who could be counted on to perform any assigned task with minimum supervision, and believed that education and formal training could only improve his performance thereby improving the overall operation of an organization.

He has now been employed by the City since September 1990. David Martinez, City Utility Superintendent, expresses his appreciation of Randy by saving that he performs assignments in a highly professional manner, is always willing to train fellow workers in any manner that is suitable, is cooperative, and needs ery little supervision.

Commissioners Adopt Budget

At 10 a.m. Friday, August 30, Kinney County Judge Tim Ward called the Commissioners Court into session with Commissioners Freddie Frerich and Plunker Sheedy present. The agenda contained two items: tax rate hearing, budget hearing and approval. The morning was spent in finalizing the budget into adoptable form.

At 4 p.m. Judge Ward called the Court back into session and all commissioners were present.

After some minor changes, and updating by Mr. McClure and Mr. Fuentes, a motion was made by Commissioner Frerich to adopt the budget and approve the tax rate. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Fuentes. Judge Ward, Commissioners Frerich, Fuentes, and Sheedy voted for the motion. Commissioner McClure voted not. The motion carried.

Commissioner McClure objected to the budget because of the increase which necessitated a tax rate increase. He pointed out that the county had had to borrow money to meet expenses, it was broke when they took office and the situation had not improved, and that he favored expense cuts in every department.

adopted budget is \$1,388,604.14. The tax rate will be set September 9. Included are salary increases of 6% for permanent personnel.

The Commissioners requested Judge Ward to write a memo to each department head emphasizing that the budget was to be strictly adhered to.

Redistricting had been added to the agenda. The Commissioners had looked at 17 plans for possible presentation to the Justice Department. Guidelines have been to have straight boundaries and an acceppopulation. table minority Population figures rather than voter registration strength is the critique for establishing commissioner

County Attorney Tully Shahan expressed doubts that any plan being considered would be acceptable and suggested the Commissioners plan to meet again on Tuesday (September 3) after again contacting Attorney Clint Hackney who has been working with the County. Commissioners Fuentes said he was dissatisfied with the services received for the \$5800 already paid the law firm and other commissioners agreed.

Commissioner Fuentes moved to present plan GL1. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Sheedy and it carried. With tongue-in-cheek Mr. Sheedy suggested GL1 plan ws "Good Luck #1," and Judge Ward

said his name choice was "Government Law #1." The plan gave Precinct 1 (Frerich) 778 population with 46% Hispanic; Precinct 2 (Sheedy) 812 population with 56% Hispanic; Precinct 3 (Fuentes) 742 population with 75% Hispanic; and Precinct 4 (McClure) 787 population with 25% Hispanic

Proposed boundary lines may be viewed at the Court House and a map will be printed in this newspaper when the Justice Department approves the plan.

Judge Ward dismissed the Court as there seemed to be no need for additional meetings in the next

No Shows At Public Hearing

As required, the City set a public hearing on the proposed budget for 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 29, at the City Hall meeting room.

In contrast to the over-flow crowd at the August 27 meeting for the public hearing on Mr. Gonzales, The Brackett News editor was the only person in the room at the appointed time. Seven minutes later, Councilman Bernie Cervantes came in and seeing the absence of the Council said he would go downstairs to see what was happening. Eight minutes later, Mrs. Ginger Dodson came in and announced that there would not be a meeting since only two members of the Council showed up. When asked, she said Mayor Pro-tem Bravo, the second memberof the Council present, was downstairs. Mrs. Dodson gathered up the Council name plates, pads and pencils, turned off the air conditioner, walked out with this editor and locked the door.

Friday, August 30, Mrs. Bravo said she and Mrs. Dodson had called the Texas Municipal League to learn . what steps would now be necessary. She learned that by law the proposed budget must be prepared and presented to the City

Secretary who would review it and a public meeting must be scheduled not less than 15 days prior nor 30 days past the receipt of the budget by the City Secretary. This was done, and now another public hearing must again be set within that time frame, the budget could be adopted and the tax rate set at the same meeting.

City To Advertise

At 7 p.m. Tuesday, September 3, Mayor Pro-Tem Diane Bravo called the City Council into special session with one agenda item. Councilmen Gonzalez and Cervantes were



Sheriff's Corner

A Houston area resident who has a hunting lease on the Auger Ranch adjacent to Ft. Clark Springs reported the theft of a homemade deer feeder recently. Mr. John C. Romero, Sr. stated in his report to the Sheriff's Department on August 30, 1990 that the feeder was made from a 35 gallon barrel, on legs, green in color, with a numeral 2 painted on it in white. The feeder has a homemade sheetmetal lid, and a timer with a solar charger. It is believed that the perpetrator(s) of the theft entered the property on foot, most likely from the Ft. Clark side of the fence and took the feeder. Anyone seeing a feeder matching the description given above is asked to call the Sheriff's Department at 563-2788. All information received

will be kept confidential. The Del Rio Police Department apprehended three (3) juveniles in that city in relation to the theft of an automobile and a checkbook and various credit cards from Brackettville. The thefts were first reported to the Kinney County Sheriff's Department on September 1, 1991. The vehicle, a 1990 Toyota 4-dr was

taken from the owner's residence sometime after 11:00 p.m. August 31st. The theft of the check book and credit cards were a related crime as the juveniles arrested in the auto theft case were picked up while trying to use the stolen credit cards. The cases will be processed through the Juvenile Court in Val Verde County by Juvenile Officers with the Del Rio Police Department.

Sheriff's deputies Vito La Gioia and Jay R. Smith were involved in a short but somewhat bruising chase of two suspected illegal aliens and auto thieves in the early morning hours of Tuesday, September 3, 1991. As the deputies were patrolling on Highway 90 west of Brackettville they noticed a west bound vehicle approaching the gas pumps near Villa's Grocery. The fact that the store was closed and the vehicle had no lights on aroused their suspicions and they proceeded to investigate. When they approached the vehicle it pulled over next to the fence bordering the Ft. Clark "400" and two subjects jumped out, jumped the fence, and, as one deputy put it, "took off running!" The deputies gave chase in the darkness for a short distance before becoming disenchanted with the dark night and heavy growths of thorny cactus. The suspects are described as follows: Both are Hispanic males (believed to be illegal aliens from Mexico), approx. 5'8", slender builds, about 20 years of age. One of the suspects was wearing a white shirt, the other a red shirt. And, according to Deputy Jay R. Smith, one of them is carrying a heavy load of cactus thorns and spines on and about (and in) his person as he fell into a large cactus plant while fleeing from the deputies. The vehicle driven by the two suspects was a 1978 Olds Royal, blue in color. The vehicle was displaying ficticious license plates that came back registered to a 1978 Chrysler out of San Antonio, Texas. The case is still under investigation and anyone spotting a man in a red or white T-shirt covered in cactus thorns is asked to contact the Sheriff's Department. He might not be the car thief, but he would most surely need assistance with the thorns!

During the City Council meeting August 27, former City Secretary Felix Gonzales stated that whether he was terminated from his position or not, he would be in contact with District Attorney Tom Lee with a request for Grand Jury Investigation as to abuses that were committed at City Hall prior to his arrival as City Manager for the purpose of clearing himself and new members of the City Council of any wrong doing that done by the previous management personnel and listed:

Abuse of City vehicles Personal telephone calls from city telephone

Abuse of city property named in a police report.

Excessive overtime by most of the employees.

Thievery - such as, gasoline, blow gun, impact wrench, 2 motors belonging to a sewer rod machine and the fogging machine (mosquito spray), tapes of Council minutes from Ginger Dodson's desk that contain verbal abuses between Adrian Reyes, Vito LaGioia and Jennifer Pasanski, all trophies that were on display in the front office (approximately 6), paint, paint brushes and paint rollers, a large aluminum ladder of approximately 16 feet, and the personnel file on Ralph Gonzalez.

It is a thankless job to serve on the City Council. The only legitimate reason to want to serve in this capacity is to serve the community. A person who wants to 'run" the city is reprobate to the of-

It is quite apparent that the present city council is indeed interested in serving the community. It is a difficult task to find and employ a city secretary. The problem is compounded when an unqualified person is employed. During the recent problem it was soon evident the wrong person had been chosen.

Felix Gonzales refused to admit to himself and others that he was indeed an employee of the City Council. He felt the City Council was to serve under him and he was to be the boss. He secured a manual published by the Texas Municipal League and tried to claim the technicalities he selected to prove he was right and any who crossed him 'Violated my civil rights.'

This manual has no official authority. It is simply guidelines and

suggestions for city operation. Official actions by the City Council determine what is legal. The

main characteristic of the City

Secretary is to work with the Council, work with the City Employees and to work with and for the best interest of the people of the City of Brackettville. Mr. Gonzales was totally at variance with this concept.

The last few City Secretaries we have had have taken the position of adversary of the people. It is hoped the City Council will next employ as Secretary, a man who feels a compatability with the Council and most of all with the people.

In the "Public Hearing" held by the Council at the demand of Mr. Gonzales revealed many actions that pointed to the need for change, In fact as the City Council were asked to express themselves each one said things had gone so far something must be done. The further the hearing went the more it was apparent it was time to do something.

Testimony of the city employees, actions within the office, actions dealing with private property and many things not brought to light dictated a change. When Mr. Gonzales was em-

ployed, it was for a period of six

months on probation. If everything went well there was a possibility of

permanent employment. Since less than half the six months had passed it was apparent the City Council had

made a mistake. It was not easy for the Council to admit a mistake was made but they had integrity enough to do it. The City Council from the. beginning followed the letter of the law. They were in turn guided by the Attorney for the City Mr.

Felix Gonzales, from the time he opened his business, has been my friend and I have been his. This has no bearing whatsoever on the City Hall situation. You never do a man a favor when you employ him to do that which he is not qualified to do.

The present City Council is truly interested in helping and serving the people of Brackettville. It's almost a miracle all the good adjustments and the thousands of dollars saved by the Council. Don't be misled, these were done by the Mayor Pro Tem and the Council. There are still changes in personnel that need to be made and problems to be solved but at least, they are working at the job. The City Council, one and all, are to be commended for the concern, interest, and fine job they have done

Days Past

September 1513 - Vasco Nunez de Balboa, his Indian guide, and 65 Spainards arrived at the last mountain ridge on the Isthmus of Darien (Panama) before the ocean. Balboa called a halt and went up to the peak alone - to become the first European to see the Pacific Ocean from the shore. Four days later standing on the Gulf of San Miguel, he claimed for the Spanish King "all the sea and the countries bordering it.'

September 1633 - Massachusetts Bay Colony settler John Oldham led a group inland to the Connecticut Valley; they spent the winter at Withersfield, Connecticut. Meanwhile, William Holmes of Plymouth Colony had been commissioned to erect a trading post on the river, above the Dutch post at Hartford.

September 22, 1711 - Tuscarora Indians massacred a settlement of North Carolinians in the first clash of the Tuscarora War, which continued until 1713. South Carolina came to the aid of North Carolina. Finally, the entire Tuscarora Tribe was removed to New York State (where some members still lived) near Niagara Falls

September 10, 1752 - The Delaware and Iroquois Indians, at the Winchester Conference, revoked the year-old Treaty of Logstown and threw their lot with the French, supporting their claim to the Ohio Territory.

September 18, 1758 - Abercomby, like his predecessor Loudown, was replaced as supreme commander after his defeat by Montcalm at Fort Ticonderoga and Amherst took

September 8, 1760 - English forces under Generals Amherst and Haviland met at Montreal in sufficient strength to compel the governor of Quebec to surrender the entire province of Quebec (New France) to the English

September 9, 1763 - the Mississippi Company, led by George Washington received a grant of 2.5 million acres from the English Crown for settlement by Virginia soldiers who had served in the French and Indian War. The land lay between the Ohio and Wisconsin Rivers.

What Constitutes "Conflict Of Interest?"

The Texas Municipal League and Axia Insurance (the City of Brackettville's Insurance Carrier) have affirmed that settlement has been made with Jose Bravo on a personal injury suit filed June 15, 1990 and adjusted June 27, 1990. Mr. Bravo was a city maintenance employee and the suit was filed for back and leg injury. The suit was pending at the time his wife, Diane Garza Brayo, entered the race for City Council and was elected. At the time of final settlement of the case in August, 1991, Mrs. Bravo was serving as Mayor Pro-Tem.

At a public hearing held August 22, 1991, former City Secretary Felix Gonzales suggested a conflict of interest since public disclosure of the pending case was apparently not made by Mrs. Bravo during the campaign.

"The Texas Municipal League Handbook for Mayors and Council Members In General Law Cities" on page 41, paragraph 2, outlines avoiding possible conflicts of interest: "At least three situations can impair the ability of councilmembers to properly perform their duties. All three involve conflicts of interest in which a member of the city council is placed in the position of owing loyalty to the interests of the city on one hand, and to some other interest on the other." On page 42 of the handbook is the statement that the Texas Legislature enacted a statute which requires the public disclosure of conflicts between the public interest and councilmembers private interests (Section 171.000). The purpose of this statue is to prevent councilmembers and other local officials from using their positions for hidden personal gain. The law does sung Hero.'

not require members of the council to file a list of their specific sources of income or property holdings. Rather, it simply requires the filing of a form by any councilmember whose private financial interests - or those of his relatives - would be affected by an action of the council. Relatives covered by the law include all persons related to the council member "in the first or second degree by either affinity or consanguinity."

Is this situation a conflict of interest for Mrs. Bravo?

According to a TML spokesperson, "It is if Mrs. Bravo exerted any influence to hold a position open, or to re-hire her husband after the suit was settled. However, a person may run for office (such as the Council) if the spouse is already employed.

QUICK BAKING POWDER **BISCUITS**

Sift together 1 cup all purpose flour with a pinch of salt and 11/2 Tea. baking powder. Cut in 2 Tbs. butter or margarine until the mixture resembles fine bread crumbs. This can be done in a food

Add 1/3 cup milk and stir, or process, just until dough comes together. Knead lightly and roll out ½ inch thick. Cut out rounds with a 2-inch cutter. For topping, melt 1 Tbs. butter, dry breadcrumbs, and a dash of paprika. Place biscuits on baking dish, brush top with the topping mixture, microwave on high for 2 - 5 minutes until well risen. Turn biscuits every minute to cook evenly. Serve with butter, or honey, or thinly sliced country ham.

For best results with microwave cooking, use a round pan, or dish, instead of a square or oblong. This way, there are no corners, and your food will bake evenly and you'll be happily surprised.

Try this one:

APPLE PECAN STRUDEL CAKE

11/2 cup all-purpose flour, sifted ¾ cup brown sugar 1 Tea. baking powder 1 Tea. nutmeg 1 Tea. cinnamon ½ Tea. soda 1/4 cup milk with 1 Tbs. lemon juice or vinegar (This makes sour milk)

½ cup oleo

1 egg, beaten

For the topping take 1 apple, thinly

½ cup chopped pecans

sliced and peeled. 1/3 cup brown sugar 1/4 cup all-purpose flour

2 Tbs. margarine Combine all the cake ingredients and mix for about 30 seconds, or until fairly smooth. Do not overbeat. Pour in an 8-in round dish. Scatter over the apples, do not put too many in the center. Melt the margarine for the topping for 30 seconds on high. Mix in the remaining topping ingredients and sprinkle over the apples and batter. Microwave 6 minutes on medium, increase to high and cook 6 minutes more. Let stand on a flat surface for 10 minutes before serving.

In earlier days a "madstone" was believed to have the power to "suck" poisons from wounds made by mad dogs and venomous snakes. They were supposed to be especially effective in preventing hydrophobia or rabies. This belief was formerly universal in America

Abraham Lincoln believed in madstones and when his son, Robert, was bitten by a dog, he took the boy to Terre Haute, Indiana, to have a madstone applied to the wound.

A magic stone, probably a madstone was mentioned in The Talisman by Sir Walter Scott.

In 1872, Schele deVere wrote, "Madstone is the name of a round stone the size of an egg, of dark color, preserved by some families in the South, to which is given the power to cure persons bitten by mad dogs or venomous snakes. It is placed on the wound, from which it draws the poison, and when it is applied again and again is supposed to extract the poison.'

Sometimes the stone is soaked in sweet milk before it is applied. If it sticks, it will draw out the poison, if it doesn't, it was thought there was

A genuine madstone was supposed to turn the milk black. The United States Department of Agriculture refers to madstones as mythical stones and has no scientific foundation. unless

The bezor stone, a biliary calculus from the gall bladder of an animal, is a common form of madstone. It is about the same substance of a human gallstone.

Another form is composed of halloysite, which absorbs moisture and will stick to a moist surface until nearly saturated. It will actually absorb some blood and some of the poison from a newly made wound

The American Indians used snakestones as an important remedy. Their real value was inspired by the confidence of the user. Their danger was in using them alone without other methods of protection also.



Beginning August 29, 1991, customers who are in a household with an income at or below the poverty level (as determined by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget) will be eligible for a \$7 reduction in Brackettville's monthly residential service

The Lifeline program is part of a negotiated settlement approved last year by the Texas Public Utility Commission. The settlement includes customer benefits of \$1.2 billion over the next four years.

To be eligible for Lifeline Service, customers must be the head of their household, have income at or below the poverty level or qualify for an assistance program, such as Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), Food Stamps, WIC or Supplemental Security Income.

The discounted rate applies to all classes of residential local exchange service. No optional extended area service may be provided to a customer who qualifies under the discount. Lifeline customers may subscribe to other telephone services such as Touch-tone and Custom Calling features, but the discount will not apply to those services. The discount is good for one year after the customer qualifies and then recertification is

The \$7 reduction is calculated by subtracting \$3.50 from the local service charge and waiver of the current \$3.50 subscriber line charge.



County Agent News

This September's mourning dove season promises to be one of the best in recent times for Texas hunters

Dr. Dale Rollins, San Angelowildlife specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said good spring and summer rains and little violent weather have increased dove numbers in two of Texas' three dove zones.

These zones are defined by the North Zone, the area north of Interstate 20; the Central Zone, the area between IH 20 and U.S. Highway 90; and the South Zone, the rest of the state south of U.S. 90.

Rollins says that state wildlife department surveys of adult mourning doves in May showed the northern zone populations to be up 24 percent over the same time last year, while the southern zone fell

The real news is the central zone, which is up a whopping 45 percent from last year. This is well above the long-term average. Rollins says that traditionally most mourning doves are taken either by hunting over a water source or over fields of milo, fallow wheat or wild sunflower.

Although the prospects look good for a very successful season, all the good rains in the central and north zones have provided the birds plenty of feed and water sources. This means they may not be as concentrated over your old favorite water hole or field as they were in leaner years. Be prepared to do a little scouting before you start your hunt.

Mourning dove season to avid hunters is one of the most exciting times of the year because it signals the start of fall hunting. Rollins compares mourning dove hunting to a salad bar served before the other fall entrees. Rollins estimates that about 70 percent of the birds taken are harvested in the first two weeks after opening day. In the northern and central zones which open September 1, most of these are taken over the Labor Day weekend, in years when weather permits.

According to Rollins, most hunters prefer shotguns in 12- or 20gauge loaded with number seven and a half or eight shot. These hunters only bag an average of two birds per box of 25 shells. That's 23 misses per box Rollins says that the majority of misses are attributed to shooting behind the bird. Hunters stand to benefit from spending a few hours on the skeet range before they head into the field.

small birds, so generally only the breast is prepared. Because it is a dark meat and fairly dry, special care must be taken to preserve its distinctive flavor.

Rollins suggests filleting the meat from the breast and wrapping both fillets around a jalepeno pepper. Then wrap the whole thing with a strip of bacon and skewer with a toothpick. Grill the meat over a charcoal fire for a taste that is hard

FIREWOOD: It's time to start thinking about firewood for winter nights ahead. As you consider the purchase of firewood or if you gather your own, here are some things to keep in mind.

Although green wood will burn, seasoned wood has more heat value and will not deposit excessive creosote in chimneys and stove

Any moisture in wood reduces the recoverable heat. The heat must first dry the wood so it will burn. So wood cut in late fall or winter doesn't have time to dry adequately. So, if you cut your own, it's recommended to cut it in spring or early


Splitwood will dry faster than wood not split. Stack wood loosely in piles on a couple of rows of bricks. This keeps wood off the ground and prevents decay while at the same time allowing faster drying.

Stacking firewood in a sunny location and covering it with clear plastic also helps moisture to evaporate, thus speeding up drying and seasoning.

Since vapor will condense on the plastic, adequate ventilation is necessary. Keep plastic off the ends of the firewood to allow air to flow and to keep condensation from wetting the wood. If trees are cut for firewood in the summer, you may want to leave tops and limbs on for a week or more. Leaves draw moisture from wood and help it to dry more quickly.

Wondering which woods make the best firewood? Oak and hickory make the best, both producing a very high amount of available heat per cord, but oak is easier to split and you will probably have a hard time finding much hickory in this area. Pine can also be used for firewood. Past reports that pine causes creosote to build up in chimneys and stovepipes have not been substantiated by research. Relief for Allergy Problems

George W. Brasher, M.D.

· I have a young child with allergy problems. He sometimes has severe allergy attacks. Should I consider allergy shots to relieve his problems? What do they involve?

Allergy problems are quite common and it is estimated that some 40 million Americans suffer from one or another of the common allergic diseases. The most frequent of these conditions are allergic asthma, allergic rhinitis (also known as "hay fever") and certain allergic skin problems.

Many people have relatively mild allergy symptoms and respond quite well to symptomatic medications in the form of antihistamines, bronchodilators or topical steroid preparations. In such individuals these simple measures are often sufficient. On the other hand, some people will have more serious problems or will not respond well to simple measures. In addition, some

individuals will have significant side effects from their medication, and drug treatment may create as many problems as it solves. A more detailed evaluation is needed in these people. An allergy evaluation

begins with a detailed history in order to get as much information as possible about the patient and the problem. Most allergists (physicians trained in the evaluation and management of the various allergic diseases) use the combination of a careful history and selected skin testing to pinpoint the specific allergens involved. Blood testing is not as sensitive as skin testing and has only a limited role in the evaluation of most patients.

The common allergens are household inhalants (such as dust mites, feathers and animal hairs), pollens (such as trees, grasses and weeds) and the environmental molds. Once the specific allergen has been identified, there are basically two approaches. The first approach



involves avoidance, which is appropriate for certain allergens such as animal hairs and feathers since they can be excluded from the home environment. The second approach involves allergy injections, also known as immunotherapy, for those allergens which cannot be avoided if a person lives in the Central Texas area (cedar pollen, for example).

Immunotherapy was first introduced in England 80 years ago and involves periodic injections of an extract composed of those inhalant allergens that cannot be avoided. The body produces protective antibodies which can block the allergic reaction and reduce the need for symptomatic medication. Immunotherapy is a long-term treatment and should not begin without a careful evaluation of all the factors involved. In addition, the patient should be seen by his allergist periodically to assess his progress. Only in this way can maximum benefit be obtained from allergy shots.

New Bills Become Effective

AUSTIN--The recent regular and special sessions of the Texas Legislature resulted in several bills affecting the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department scheduled to go into effect September 1.

House Bill (HB) 1207 creates the Texas Conservation Passport. The \$25 Conservation Passport provides a way to directly contribute to the conservation of Texas' public lands. Passport holders will have access to hundreds of thousands of acres of previously inaccessible areas through special tours and activities. The passport also will allow free entrance to state parks and discounts on camping and other department products.

SB 1062 creates a turkey stamp. Anyone hunting turkeys in Texas will be required to purchase a \$5 stamp in addition to a valid Texas hunting license. Sale of the stamps is expected to raise about \$600,000 yearly for the eastern turkey restoration program.

Another turkey bill, SB 744, creates a non-resident spring turkey license for \$75. Previously, nonresidents had to pay \$200 for a big game license. The \$75 license is designed to enhance the economy by drawing more out of state turkey hunters.

A \$2 crab trap tag will be required along the coast. This legislation, HB 1425, will allow TPWD officials to identify the number of crab traps in the bays and monitor blue crab fishing pressure.

HB 1809 gives the department the authority to sell ancillary products. Current authorization for TPWD sales to benefit the Special Nongame and Endangered Species Fund is limited. In the future the addition of promotional materials sales would enhance the department's revenue.

TPWD now can use volunteers in all departmental programs with the passage of HB 1770. Previously volunteers were allowed to work only at historical sites. Now, they'll be able to volunteer at many parks, fish hatcheries and other areas.

HB 1771 will establish wildlife rehabilitation permits. It gives the department authority to establish humanitarian standards for the handling of wildlife resources in captivity. The permit will be free, unlike the scientific permit which will have an as yet undetermined

SB 748 deals allows the TPWD to continue regulating oysters and shrimp. The department's authority on these resources was scheduled to expire Sept. 1.

An ovster shell replacement program may be created by TPWD with the passage of SB 1220. A replacement program can be designed to mitigate damage to reefs caused by fishermen.

A technical amendment to the Parks and Wildlife Code will speed up the process of buying hunting and fishing licenses. HB 1773 and HB 1774 allows someone buying a license to complete all the information required, i.e. signing all the tag blanks, after purchase rather than having the sales clerk do it.

The department will now be able to confiscate all unlawful fishing devices with the passage of HB 2195. Previously, only nets from inside waters could be seized.

Daily entrance fee to all state parks currently is \$2. Beginning Sept. 1, the fee will range from \$3-\$5. Camping fees, from primitive sites to screened shelters, will cost \$4-\$18 depending on the park and time of year.

All stamps except the new turkey stamp (\$5) were increased to \$7. Those stamps include Texas waterfowl, archery, saltwater fishing, freshwater trout and white-winged dove.

Japanese Firm Inks With A&M

Mr. Nakada signed an agreement with the Texas A&M Extension Center in Uvalde, for a three year research project. Kaiware is a Japanese staple used in salads. Kaiware seeds are produced from Daikon radishes.

The A&M study will determine the appropriate growing and cultivation methods for optimum seed and harvest production. A dry harvest is critical to Kaiware seed quality. The seeds are gathered in wind rows and harvested after ten days. Extensive moisture adversely affects the quality of the seed. As such, a major focus of the study will concentrate on the growing season to assure the harvest will occur during optimum dry periods.

Mike Patterson, Executive Director of the Middle Rio Grande Development Council, and Sky Lewey met Mr. Nakada in Japan last fall, during the MRGDC's first Asian mission. "When Mr. Nakada told us that he was looking for a dry climate - critical to the harvest of quality Kaiware seeds, we were confident that we could accomodate him," said Sky Lewey, Director of Economic Development. "When we returned, we contacted Dr. Daniel Lescobar at the A&M research station to discuss the feasibility of seed production. Although the first crop was planted without any specific knowledge, both the yield and quality of the seeds were impressive," she said.

Since the initial results of the Kaiware harvest in June, Mr. Nakada has twice visited the area. He has toured seed cleaning and processing facilities at Foster Rambie and Corn Processors and several

Mr. Nakada is intent on developing the necessary system and operations to insure a supply of quality seeds for his growing markets. Mr. Nakada is not interested in contracting for production but rather in participating with farmers to produce the seed quality he desires. "This is an unprecedented opportunity to develop a unique system of production with direct relationships between farmers and the Japanese consumer," according to Lewey

'Salad Cosmo consumption translates to about 1200 acres of seed production annually," commented Uvalde County Judge Bill Mitchell. "As Mr. Nakada captures a larger market share with his quality product, the potential for increased production of the seed grows accordingly," Mitchell said.

"The Salad Cosmo project is a prime example of an Asian consumer business that is seeking quality and is prepared to invest capital to obtain the product. The concept of attracting the 'end user' of a product to the production source is the foundation of MRGDC's economic development strategy and the A&M research station is key to its success," according to Patterson. "This project is the product of MRGDC's joint effort with the International Marketing Division of the Texas Department of Commerce and our growing partnership with the Texas A&M Research Center,' Patterson added.
