Texcor contends that their geological analysis affirms that the subsequently the operation of the Kinney County location is ideal for facility, charge that health hazards, use in their proposed operation, and that their studies provide assurance no danger to community life will

Opponents charge that Texcor lacks the experience and expertise to construct and operate such a facility.

The Texas Department of Health must determine, grant or deny, the license. In March, by recently passed legislation, jurisdiction over the licensing of such facilities will pass to the Texas Water Commission. TDH has stated opposition from the community to such a facility is not a valid cause for denying a license.

The proposed Texcor site, according to their application, would accept industrial waste from mining and oil production byproducts that are naturally radioactive but become more concentrated through industrial processes.

Such waste has not been regulated in the past, but new regulatory rules are expected to increase the market for its disposal, and herein lie the concerns of op-

Both sides have many expert witnesses scheduled to testify. The hearing is open to the public so that concerned citizens may hear firsthand the testimony being offered.




In February 1982, District 22 was closed and Mr. Hernandez transferred to a maintenance section in District 7 at Brackettville.

When asked what he planned to do with his time now, he just smiled and indicated he would do pretty much as he wanted to, but would keep plenty busy.



and booked on 2nd degree felony charges of Possession of Marijuana. A total of 25 pounds of the expensive weed, valued at approximately \$30,000, was seized and will be held as evidence. Maldonado has been released on bond and the case will be presented at the next meeting of the Kinney County Grand Jury.

The second felony case under investigation by the Sheriff's Department was that of Felony Criminal Mischief (3rd degree) that occured on the 18th hole of the Fort Clark Golf Course Christmas night. We received a report of the offense from Fort Clark Security Chief Karle Chism the afternoon of December 26th. Chief Chism had made a preliminary investigation that was followed by an on-sight investigation by Chief Deputy David Luna. The investigation determined that someone had driven a vehicle, believed to be a pickup, across the green several times doing extensive damage to same, estimated by Fort Clark personnel at \$1,000.00. The damage was more than would

usually occur because of the soft surface of the green that had been soaked by the recent rains.

The case was broken by this writer on information supplied by a reliable informant and the 17-year old suspect in the case confessed to the crime when confronted with the evidence. He explained that he did it 'just having fun" and did not know that so much damage would be done. The information was passed on to the Fort Clark Board of Directors and they made the decision not to file charges on the young suspect if full restitution of all expenses related to the incident were paid to Fort Clark, and in addition the youth would be barred from Fort Clark for a period of one year.

This case is a prime example of expensive damage that can be done by someone "just having fun" and not realizing the effects of their actions. There is no doubt in my mind that the youthful suspect was just having a good time, but he was doing so at the expense of others. And, were it not for the understanding and forgiving nature of the Fort Clark Board of Directors this young man could very well be facing felony criminal charges, a conviction of which would follow him around the rest of his life. I sincerely hope he has learned his lesson well, and I sincerely hope that this case will stand as an example to other youngsters that we must pay for our actions when those actions infringe upon the rights and property of others.

In other Sheriff's Department activity, Deputy Jay R. Smith was assigned to travel to Travis County (Austin) and pick up a prisoner being held there on our warrants for Violation of Probation-DWI on January 4, 1992. Manuel Ramirez, 31, of Austin, was returned to Kinney County where he remains in the county jail pending a hearing on his case.

At approximately 12:30 a.m. the morning of Sunday, January 5, 1992, two local Border Patrol Agents stopped a suspicious vehicle that had run off the roadway approximately 3 miles west of Brackettville on Hwy. 90. Upon further investigation, it was determined that the driver and two occupants were juveniles. The driver of the vehicle was a 15-year old from Fort Clark, and the two occupants, aged 16 and 17, were from Brackettville. Upon a determination that all three ned over to the Kinney County Sheriff's Department with Deputy Vito LaGioia and Chief Deputy David Luna responding. The juveniles were transported to the Sheriff's Office and released to their parents and/or guardians on formal custodial release. Charges against the three are pending in juvenile

I'm sure there is not a person alive who would not subscribe to "safe sex." The only real question is, "What is safe sex?"

When Magic Johnson was practically deified because he admitted he had the AIDS virus and had caught it from promiscious sex with women, he immediately was sought out to help promote "safe sex." For a few days he loudly proclaimed the need to use condoms for safe sex.

I'm waiting to see some ambulance chasing lawyer file suit due to failure of a condom. He logically could successfully recover from the U. S. Government because Sullivan (a cabinet officer) has highly recommended it as safe sex.

Some schools could be held liable for giving out or making available free condoms.

Companies who manufacture them could be held liable. Stores who sell them could be held liable. Already there is more proven failure and damage from the use of condoms than IUDs and yet damages in the millions have been awarded by irresponsible juries in cases filed against manufacturers of IUDs.

Any person or agency that promotes the use of condoms as the answer to AIDS by providing safe sex is either ignorant or patently a line.

Days Past

January 21, 1785 - The Ottawa and Wyandot Indians ceded their land in the present day state of Ohio to the new government in the Treaty of Fort McIntosh.

January 9, 1789 - The governor of the Northwest Territory reaffirmed the Treaty of Fort McIntosh, with the Ohio Indians, in the Treaty of Fort Hamar. This treaty established the principle of payment to the Indians for land received.

January 11, 1805 - The Indian Territory was divided, it's northern section became the new Michigan Territory. General William Hull, a hero in the American Revolution, was named governor, with its capital in Detroit. The District of Louisiana became the Louisiana Territory.

January 22, 1807 - President Jefferson formally notified Congress of Aaron Burr's alleged conspiracy to carve out a private empire in the Southwest. Burr was arrested in Alabama.

January 9, 1809 - President Jefferson authorized a deputation of the lower Cherokee Indians to visit lands west of the Mississippi to see if relocation would be feasible. By 1840, Indian removal was almost completed.

January 28, 1811 - The South West Fur Company was formed with John Jacob Astor as controller of two-thirds of its interest.

January 12, 1812 - Having survived the New Madrid Earthquake the steamboat "New Orleans" reached the city of the same name and became the first steamboat to make the passage from Pittsburg to New Orleans.

January 8, 1815 - With both sides unaware that the war had ended with the Peace of Ghent, the British attacked a 4500-man force of mainly

Tennessee and Kentucky sharpshooters at New Orleans. The British were thoroughly defeated, and news of the victory made the American commanding general, Andrew Jackson, a National hero.

January 17, 1821 - The Spanish governor of Texas granted a charter to Moses Austin to settle 300 families in Texas. Soon American settlers outnumbered the Mexicans there.

January 1829 - The House of Representatives defeated a bill that called for creation of a territorial government in Oregon.


Often a larger bedspread doesn't cost much more, and for that little bit of extra money, you can add a real decorator touch to your bedroom.

3/4 cup milk 1 cup molasses 2 eggs, well beaten

Sift flour with sugar and spices. Stir in raisins and rind. Dissolve soda in milk, add to flour mixture: milk, molasses, and then eggs. Mix just enough to moisten dry ingredients. Bake in 2 greased 9x5 loaf pans for 11/2 hours at 325°. Turn out on racks to cool.



The Mockingbird is the official state bird of Texas, Florida, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Arkansas. Although he is seen in other locations, the Mocker is best known in the Southwest.

Like most of the citizens of the southwest, this bird is cordial and friendly, cheerful and unafraid. When he has nothing else to do he is

never bored, he just sings. The Mockingbird is no coward as many cats can testify. He considers where he lives as his territory. One Mocker lives in my yard and my yard is his personal property.

He mocks the other birds, it's true, but when danger appears he has a special bugle note that says, "call to arms." When an intruder appears, this bird and his friends dart in, peck, flutter, and shriek until the culprit is ready to sneak away. They will risk death to defend their nest. As soon as the danger is past, the bird will resume a cheerful song from some nearby perch.

His song on moonlit nights is welcome and cheerful.

The Mockingbird can leap up from his perch, turn a half-dozen flips in the air without missing a note. He's a great show-off and sings to get your attention. Although he has a perfectly good song of his own, he mocks and mimics everything he hears, even a squeaky wheel barrow.

No one knows why Mother Nature gave the Mocker the ability to mimic songs and sounds. There is an old legend of how he stole his

Long ago the old owl who was supposed to be very wise, ruled the forest, before any bird had the gift of song. One day the owl sent out word that he would teach every bird a 0000000000

song, if they would come to his studio in a hollow tree. All the birds were very excited. First came the Robin, the Sparrow, and some others. The old owl stuck his head out of his door and said, "Where is that grey bird, why doesn't he come to learn his song?" And, perched above the Owl, the Mockingbird began to sing. He had listened to all the other birds learning their songs

and could sing them all.

The Mocker is a musical policeman that will protect your vard and eats thousands of insects, grass hoppers, cutworms, rosebugs, plant lice and weed seed. So, if some day you see a pert gray pair of birds building a shabby nest in your yard, consider yourself lucky, because they do eat pesky insects and weed seeds.


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Village Idiots, Incorporated

Twenty-one days after the job was completed and water was running through the line, people started complaining about the rusty taste and the fine film of grease that was left on their plates after the daily dish washing (the only ones not to complain about the rusty taste and the fine film of grease, were the ones that were drinking coffee and eating at Karl's, and that's because they never noticed any difference).

Well come to find out, the town leaders had saved about a third on the repair bill by hiring the so called contractor. Of course the savings was split 5 ways.

Plant Pecan Trees Properly

One of the keys to growing pecans, whether in the backyard or in a commercial orchard, is to plant the trees properly so that they get off to a good start.

Tree planting time is fast approaching - January and early February are the best times and here are a few guidelines.

To begin, select a tree 4 to 8 feet tall as soon as nurseries get supplies. Plant as soon as possible using care not to let roots dry out or freeze.

Dig hole only as large as the tree's root system. If the hole is too deep, the tree will settle and this can cause poor growth or death.

The taproot should sit in the bottom of the hole. If the hole cannot be as deep as the length of the roots,

cut back the taproot to fit the hole.

Pack the original soil around roots as tightly as possible. Packing the soil in 2 to 3 inch layers is better than watering to pack the soil. Use adjacent soil to complete filling the hole, not light soil, sand or potting soil. The tree can drown in rainy weather if light fill soil is used on clayland.

Plant the tree at the same depth it vice.

grew in the nursery row. Look at the colors to determine the soil line: the bark is gray and the root is dark brown.

Cut off the top half of the tree at planting to balance the stem and roots and to force growth close to the soil line.

Wrap the lower 18 inches of the trunk with aluminum foil to prevent side shoots, sun scald and rabbit damage. On large plantings, use a mixture of white latex paint and water (one part paint to three parts water).

Build a basin around the tree to hold water and give each tree five gallons of water immediately after planting. Make sure trees do not go longer than 14 days without water.

These are some basic steps for you to consider in planting pecan trees. Hopefully, they will lead the way in getting them into production in a few years.

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



Gene Barker is a retired Master Sergeant, U. S. Army. He works at his second career each Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. He is a registered nurse at Wilford Hall Medical Center - an agency nurse

with Western Medical Services. About twice a month he comes to Kinney County to spend time at his home on the Leona Ranch. He likes to hunt. In fact, he was looking for a good place to hunt when he heard of the Leona Ranch. He came to look, and that was all it took for him to become a land owner. He also has built a home on his property and spends much of his time there just relaxing away from the stress of city living. He enjoys lounging on his porch, looking at the view, watching the wildlife, and he frequently brings friends. They sometimes do target shooting.

He enjoys doing more exotic things, too, like visiting Australia which he has done eight times. The first time he went was in December 1968 for "R&R" when he was stationed in Viet Nam. Between then and September 1970, he returned five times. In 1987, he visited for a month. In 1990, he visited for two months, and is planning another trip which takes about twenty-four to thirty hours to fly "door to door" from San Antonio to Australia.

He brought three photograph from his 1990 trip. The pictures, and the tales, were so interesting, we asked permission to share some of them with our readers.

Mr. Barker has been a Mason for about fifteen years and looks for a lodge to attend when he is traveling. He visited Lodge Greenup #139 of the United Grand Lodge of Queensland, New South Wales. The lodge had about forty active members and was very formal. The men wore Tuxedo dinner suits although visitors were permitted to wear more informal coat and tie attire. The work was basically the same as he was used to in his home lodge, San Antonio #1079, although some degree work was arranged differently. It was at this lodge meeting that he met the master of the lodge, Garvin Chandler.

Mr. Chandler invited Mr. Barker to be a family guest, and to go on a kangaroo shooting (hunt). A block of land consisting of 6 - 7 acres is called visiting with him.

"property." Larger tracts of land are called "station." Mr. Chandler owns a station where he raises sheep and cattle who must compete with an over population of kangaroos for grass. On this hunt, they got into a vehicle (jeep) and drove out to a mob (herd) of kangaroos. Yes, Mr. Barker was a successful hunter.

He said kangaroo meat was eaten by some people but he only had some "kangaroo tail soup." Much of the meat is used for pet food. Dogs are used extensively by cattle and sheep raisers, and also in protection from feral hogs...thus, a big demand for pet food. The hides are very

There were multitudes of rabbits. The expression goes that if one took a blind man to the right spot, turned him around, told him to fire, he would hit a rabbit. The story is that years ago someone imported a pair of European hares and they got

loose, and now the rabbits are everywhere. One of the interesting places that Mr. Barker visited was Texas, Queensland. It seems that the Mc-Dougall brothers went to Australia (no one seems to remember where from) to take up land, and after some lean years went elsewhere for better pickings. Upon their return, someone had taken over their land and after a long "battle", in 1845,

Texas, too. He found that clothing was very expensive, and that super unleaded gasoline was \$4.00 a gallon. Their currency has a different size and color for each denomination...the greater the dollar value, the larger the size. The Australians were amazed that American currency was

being valid, so they just named it

all the same size and color. He was invited to visit in schools and talk to the students. He was asked about Texas, Batman, cowboys, Indians - all these he could discuss but was stumped when asked if he knew The New Kids On The Block.





PUTTING A BRAKE ON GAM-BLING: Gambling is probably as old as humanity itself. For most people, it never becomes a real problem. For others, it can be an addiction that is as destructive as any other compulsion that is fed by state lotteries, the expansion of casino gambling, and even the wild behavior of stock market investors in recent

1992 marks the 20th anniversary of the first inpatient gambling recovery established in the United States. Located at the Cleveland Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center, the Veterans Addiction Recovery Center has pioneered research and treatment for this behavioral disorder which may sometimes run in families. Some ethnic and religious groups also have shown a higher incidence of the disorder.

The treatment program has shown encouraging results. Follow-up studies as much as 12 months after graduation show that 70 percent continue to abstain from gambling. For more information on this program, contact your local VA center.

Free Eye

For the second year in a row, optometrists nationwide are donating their services to give free eye exams to low-income uninsured working people and their families.

People who may qualify for free eye care are being alerted. Coinciding with the 65th anniversary of Save Your Vision Week, March 1 - 7, approved patients will be seen in optometrists' private offices.

Low income people can sign up for the program, called VISION USA, by calling 1-800-766-4466 during January only, according to Optometric American Association. Those who qualify will be matched with an optometrist in their area.

To qualify for the free eye care, persons must have a job or live in a household where there is one working member; have no health insurance; have income below an established level based on family size and have had no eye examination within 12 months.

Stroke seems foreign to you? It shouldn't. It's an American problem. In fact, it's the No. 3 killer in the United States, behind heart

of 500,000 stroke victims die each year, the American Heart Association says. So learn about a disease that hits

attack and cancer. About 150,000

home. Hard. Stroke is often a sudden and severe attack. It's caused when a blood vessel bringing oxygen and nutrients to your brain either bursts or is clogged by a blood clot or another particle. This prevents blood from flowing to a part of the brain, killing brain cells.

There are four main types of stroke. Clots that plug an artery cause the two most common kinds. Ruptured blood vessels cause the other two.

The variety of strokes could alter your behavior and thought patterns, memory, senses, ability to move parts of your body, speech and


your ability to understand speech. You could have one or more of the major uncontrollable risk factors. For example, the older you get, the greater your risk of stroke. Blacks and men have a higher incidence than others. You're more likely to have a stroke if you or a close blood relative already had one. Two other major risk factors are diabetes mellitus and asymptomatic carotid bruit (an abnormal sound doctors hear when placing a stethoscope over

the carotid artery in your neck). But you can control and treat four other major risk factors. So focus on these:

· High Blood Pressure -Have your blood pressure measured regularly. If it is too high, follow your doctor's advice, which might include eating a healthful diet, staying at your proper weight, exercising regularly and, if necessary, taking medication.

Heart Disease — A history of heart disease is a major risk factor for stroke. The three major controllable risk factors for heart disease are cigarette

smoking, high blood cholesterol and high blood pressure.

• Transient Ischemic Attacks (TIAs) — "Mini-strokes" are strong predictors of stroke. These can be treated with drugs such as aspirin that can help prevent clots from

· High Red Blood Cell Count — A high red blood cell count thickens the blood and increases the risk of stroke. Your doctor can help treat this problem.

You indirectly increase your risk of stroke if you drink a lot of alcohol, if you're obese or if you're not involved in regular physical activity. But notice that these secondary risk factors are related to lifestyle habits that you can change.

It's important to recognize a developing stroke, and to get medical help immediately. During a stroke, vou may have sudden weakness or numbness in the face. arm or leg on one side. You could lose your speech or have trouble talking or understanding speech. Another sign is dimness or loss of vision, especially in one eye. Sudden severe headaches with no apparent cause may occur. And be aware of unexplained dizziness, unsteadiness or sudden falls.

If you have any of these signals, see a doctor immediately. How fast you respond could decide how much brain damage occurs - or whether you live.

So know and reduce your risks. You'll help stroke become less of an American problem.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

FOR APPOINTMENT

I. 35-40 years of age -One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age -A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and

III. 50 years of age and over -An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental xrays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.
