kachina dolls. For years collectors kachina dolls. For years collectors
treasured these small treasured these small represen
tations of Hopi supernatural beings tations of Hopi supernatural beings
without being able to learn much about them. Since many people do
not know about them, I have done not know about them, I have done
some research for more information of the kachinas.
In the north part of New Mexico

believe in kachinas just as children believe in Santa Claus. Certain kachinas are believed to be the spirits of departed Hopis. The

they differ from mesa to mesa they differ from mesa to mesa,
pueblo to pueblo, and clan to clan. The lack of a clear system of
classification is not surprising because Hopis don't think it is
necessary to use precise information as we do. They don't think of things

source are desirabiliy of feaf color
and shape, drought tolerance, and shape, drought tolerance, ab-
sence of galls, trunk form, vigor and sence of galls, tru

oaks are wind-pollinated means you know one parent but nis the other. The undetermined pollen source in the formation of the acorn
may dilute may dilite the desirable charac-
teristic you seek.
Collect Collect acorns in the fall from Oc -
tober to December. It is not uncommon for the white oak group acorns to germinae while on the
trees. Ripe acorns can be picked of trees. Ripe acorns can be picked of
the tree before they fall; often it is wise to do so in order to escape
weevils which attack those acorns that fall to the ground Psysiologically, mature acorns are brown in color while those which
are yellowish are not ripe. As a rule are yellowish are not ripe. As a rule
of thumb, a mature acorn will snap cleanly from its cup without leaving cess with your acorns, use the "sinkers", yout. Place the acorns in
water and discard those that float water and discard those that float in
the water along with any that show
pin-sized weever pin-sized weevil with holes.
Fall Fall seeding of oaks is preferable
to spring seeding. The white oaks to spring seeding. The white oaks
(such as bur oaks) have little to no
dormancy and dormancy and will germinate as
