ONCE AGAIN, voters were reminded this past Saturday of the value of a vote, when the area's favorite son, Kent Hance, lost the Senate nomination bid by a total of 509 votes out of almost a million votes cast in the Democratic party runoff.

It has been pointed out that if Hance had received just two more votes per county, statewide, he would have won the election.

Of course, Hance's area backers can see where the Dimmitt native could have won if he had received about ten more votes per county in a 50-county region.

That computes out to about a pair of votes (one married couple), in each community.

But the real key to the election is one we haven't heard expounded upon from any other source. Kent Hance lost the election because there was no local runoff in Amarillo.

In Potter County, the turnout for Saturday's election was an anemic 7.35 per cent of the registered vote, or only 2,705 voters. Lubbock County, by comparison, had 23,929 voters in the senate race.

Lubbock County likewise did not have any heated local runoffs on the ballot—just a local candidate.

If Potter County could have mustered ten or 15 per cent of their voters at the polls, it could have made the difference in the election.

A longtime county political observer told us Monday "Our area just blew it. They had the opportunity to get 'their man' into the senate, and they just didn't come out to vote."

Saturday's race reminded me of another race about a decade ago, when the state's voters were casting ballots on the prospects of adopting a water plan which would have provided for importation of water for this area.

That vote was turned down, and we recall that in that one, if the voters of this area, which had the most to gain, had turned out with a little more fervor, the issue would have passed. Its failure was a hard blow to the West Texas area.

The failure of conservative-minded people to bother to go to the polls last Saturday may also prove costly, if the liberal Lloyd Doggett wins the election in the fall.

Promotion Winners Are Told

Winners were announced for the Bike-A-Thon and Walk-A-Thon which was held at the City Park May 12.

Jerry Pierson rode his bicycle 23 miles and won first place. His prize was a ten-speed bicycle. He is the 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. D.W. Pierson of the Oklahoma Lane Community.

Lance Teague rode his bicycle eleven miles and won a radio. He is the 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Teague of Pleasant Hill.

Amy Venable entered the Walk-a-thon and won the prize which was a Sony "Walkman." She is the four-year-old daughter of Radford and Kay Venable and she walked a mile in the competition.

The Lions Club donated the two radios and the Bovina merchants donated the ten-speed bicycle.

Those who had contributions of \$25 or more received T-shirts donated by Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and the Lions Club. These youngsters were: Amy Venable, Jerry Pierson, Lance Teague and Rusty Venable.

City, County Voters Give Kent Hance Big Margin

The only thing Kent Hance could regret about his showing in Parmer County in the Democratic runoff is that another 500 voters didn't turn out at the polls.

If that many more folks had voted locally, chances are that Hance would have won the statewide nomination from Lloyd Doggett.

Parmer County gave Hance the largest majority of any county in the 19th Congressional District, and probably of any other county in the state, which cast more than 1,000 votes.

Hance received a gaudy 97.7 per cent of the vote in the county. His margin was 157 to five for Doggett in

Bovina (96.9); 333-9 in Friona (97.6), and 204-6 in Farwell (97.1).

In three of the county precincts, Doggett failed to receive a single vote. Hance won the Lazbuddie precinct, 94-0; took the Oklahoma Lane voting box, 91-0, and won at Rhea, 43-0. He also won the absentee box by a shutout, 33-0.

In the race for the Congressional runoff, Parmer County gave winner Don Richards a good 70 per cent lead over his challenger, Thomas M. Richards, with 704 total votes to 308.

Don Richards' biggest boost in the county came in Friona's precinct 2-2, where he received 58 votes to only

eight for the "other Richards," a majority of 87.9 per cent. He won the Black precinct, 24-4, or 85.7 per cent, and won the three Friona precincts combined, 256-83, or 75.5 per cent.

The nominee's margin in Bovina was 111-44, or 71.7 per cent of the vote, and at Farwell it was only 110-83, or 54.2 per cent.

Don Richards Wins

Don Richards won the nomination by a slim 718-vote margin, receiving 29,144 votes to 28,426 for Thomas Richards.

Don won twelve counties to Tom's three, but Tom won big in Ector County (Odessa, 4,376-1,751), and also carried Lubbock County, 12,728 to 10,744. Don's win was made possible by his excellent showing in the rural areas.

Parmer County voters also gave their nod to incumbent winner Bill Davis in the Court of Criminal Appeals race, with 505 votes to 246 for Roy Greenwood.

They also matched the sentiment of statewide returns in the court, place 3 race, giving Bill White a total of 519 votes to 239 for Tom Thorpe.

Court Has Routine Session

Parmer County Commissioners held their regular meeting on May 25, with Commissioner Ernest Anthony presiding due to the illness of Judge Porter Roberts.

Anthony was authorized to sign a bond for Charles A. Beam, who is custodian of textbooks at the Lazbuddie schools.

Due to the absence of County Attorney Charles Aycock, the item concerning easements for the Bravo Pipeline Company was tabled until the June 11 meeting.

Steve Deffenbaugh of Midland met with the court to discuss the leasing of some of the county's school land in Gaines County. Deffenbaugh was authorized to run a legal notice in the State Line Tribune and the Stanton Gazette, for bids on the land.

A bill from the Parmer County Industrial Development Corp. in the amount of \$121.14, was approved.

Meeting Is Re-Scheduled

Bovina's business leaders attended a meeting at First State Bank recently which was held to discuss ways and means of revitalizing the community.

A second meeting was first called for June 12, but that date has been changed to June 19, at 8 p.m. at the First State Bank Community Room. Everyone is invited and urged to attend.

The meeting was highlighted with a barbecue dinner served at the District Shop at 12 noon.

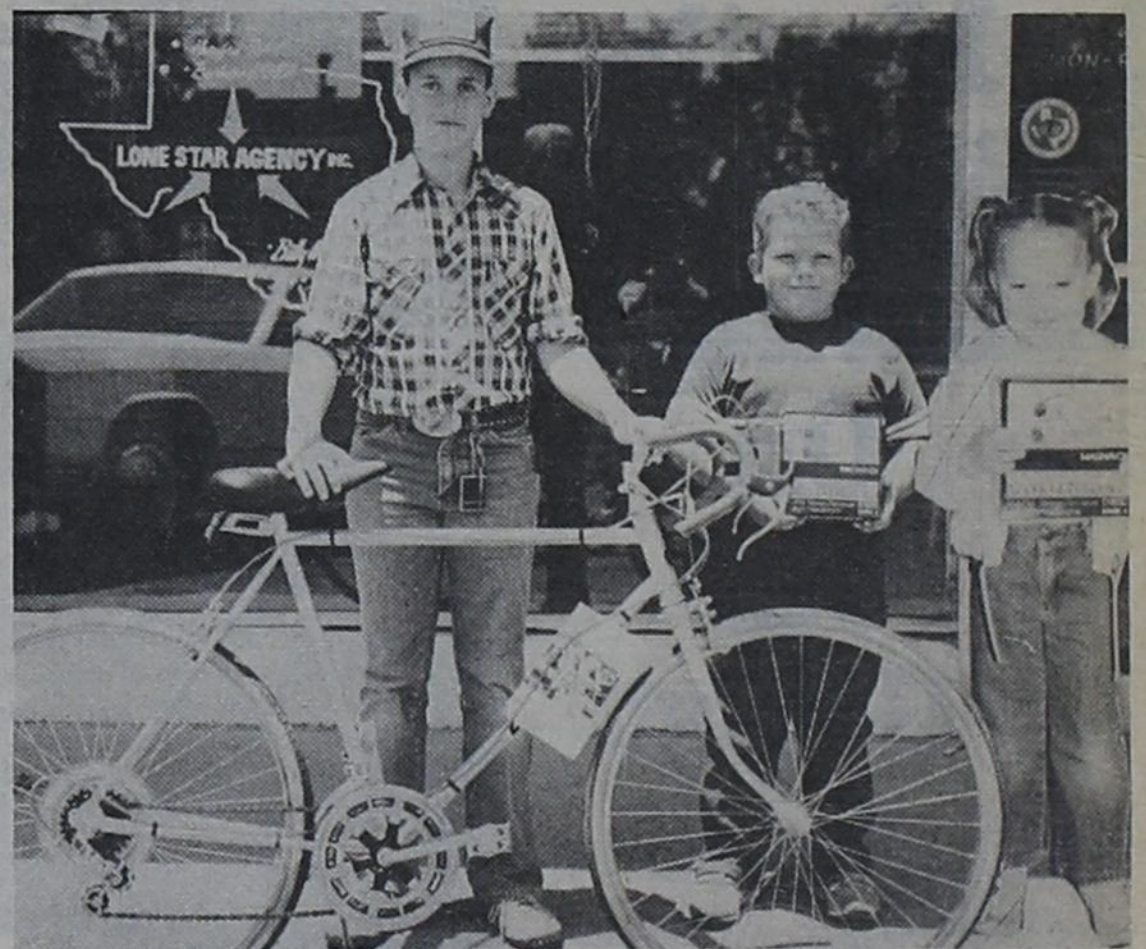
The Awards Day was the first annual awards celebration to be held in District Five of the department.

FmHA Is Accepting Farm Loan Requests

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by 1983 adverse weather conditions are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Farwell, FmHA county supervisor Billy R. Boling said today.

Parmer County is one of 67 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Boling said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 per cent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is five per cent; interest rate is eight per cent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.74 per cent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent

loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Boling said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 4, 1984, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season, Boling said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens, and to farming partnerships, corporations, or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Farwell is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.
