## Winter In Texas Hypothermia Deaths

 sometimes are "warm, the TexasDepartment of Health (TDH) warns that deaths resulting from cold weather occur almost yearly in the
state.
In 1993, at least nine Texans died of weather-related hypothermia,
severe loss of body heat. At least six of them were older than 55 .
"While severe or extended cold is dangerous to anyone, some people
are more likely to suffer from hypothermia than are others,", ex
plained Dr. Diane M. Simpson paine Dr. Diane M. Simpson,
TDH Associate Commissioner for Disease Control and Prevention. She said people who are sick, or thbse taking certain prescription drugs o
drinking alcohol, may lack resistan ce to low temperatures. Small
children are vulnerable because their bodies radiate heat faster than the bodies of adults. The homeless
who are unable to find temporary shelter also are at risk.
However, Dr. Simpson said that the elderly are the group most
susceptible to hypothermia. A study of death certificates from 1981-1991
showed that 73 of the 111 Texans showed that 73 of the 111 Texans
who died from cold weather conwho died from cold weather con-
ditions during those years were 55 ditions
or older.
Several combined factors make
cold weather more cold weather more hazardous as
people age. The elderly may not ef people age. The elderly may not ef
ficiently feel and react to cold since

## Congress Should Eliminate Unfunded Mandates

The phrase "unfunded mandate" sounds like something only a bureau
crat could love. And it is. But say those words to a mayor, county judge rstate governor and you'll get a pained look, followed by a recital
Unfunded mandates, decrees from the federal government to establish new programs which end up raising local taxes, are universally loathed. Some
municipalities in Texas spend more than 20 percent of their entire budget meeting such requirements. Texas towns and cities are being forced to spend more than $\$ 25$ billion complying with federal environmental mandates, 1993; El Paso spent $\$ 26$ million and Amarillo spent $\$ 27$ million. Just as irksome is the reasoning behind many of these mandates. Often, they are imposed to address what is an assumed - rather than actual problem. Why should Abilene be forced to spend $\$ 1$ million on a clay line for its landfill when the land been banned for 20 years and which has never been found any closer than 2,000 miles from Plano's municipal water supply?
As a result of unfunded mandates, state and local governments face painful alternatives. Unlike the federal government, they don't enjoy the luxury of deficit spending - they must balance heir budgets. So they ca ways, health care, law enforcement, or they can increase state and local taxes. Governors and mayors alike have raised a litany of complaint that the costs of complying with the federal government's environmental and socia initiatives are distorting their spending priorities and straining their budgets. No wonder local elected officials are fed up with Congress for imposing unfunded mandas,
