Stafford In Race For Office

Bob D. Stafford, 50, of Bovina, has authorized this newspaper to announce his candidacy for the position of Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector, subject to the action of the Democratic primary.

Stafford has 25 years experience in the banking business, four of which were spent with the Texas Department of Banking.

Most recently, he served for four years as assistant vice president and branch manager of the First Bank of Muleshoe's Bovina Branch. Previously he served as president of the Golden Valley Ag-Credit Assn. at Darrouzett, 1979-82; was president of the Follett National Bank, 1976-79; was assistant examiner with the Texas Department of Banking's Examining Force, 1968-72 and assistant cashier for the First State Bank of Silverton, 1965-68.

From 1982-87, Stafford was self-employed. He owned and operated a motel in Canadian; a trailer park in Amarillo, and later developed 9.65 acres of land on Lake Granbury into 23 homesites.

Stafford was born in Clarendon, and graduated from high school at Silverton. He received his BBA at McMurry College in Abilene in 1964 with a marketing major.

Stafford and his wife Sandy are parents of two sons, Jason, 25, and John, 22. They attend the Methodist Church. He is a past president of the Lions Club, and is a member of the Masonic Lodge at Crowley. (Adv.)

Bovina Tops Whiteface For 10 Wins

The Bovina High School Mustangs scored a 58-56 win over Whiteface on Tuesday, for their tenth win of the season. The Mustangs currently have a 10-3 season record.

Darren Hromas' three baskets paced Bovina to an 18-11 first quarter lead. However, Whiteface rallied to take a 25-24 lead at halftime.

Rusty Venable sparked the team in the third quarter, with four baskets, including one from three-point range, and the team forged a 43-37 lead.

But Whiteface again rallied, and the Mustangs had to hold them off for the two-point win.

Venable and Juan Reyna led Bovina's scoring with 16 points each and Hromas added 11. Reyna hit seven of 12 shots from the field, 58 per cent, and two of two from the line. He also led the team with eight rebounds. Venable and Cain Neal had seven apiece.

U.S. Hwy 60 Second Stage Ready To Roll

Contract has been awarded for the second stage of the widening of U.S. Highway 60, from State Highway 214 (North) in Friona to the east city limits of Bovina.

The contract, in the amount of \$10,795,844.15, was awarded to Amarillo Road Co. A preconstruction conference was held at the City Hall in Friona on Thursday, January 9 to announce plans for the project.

The project will call for the widening of Highway 60 from two to four lanes from Friona to Bovina. It also states that the two new lanes (westbound, or north lanes) will be constructed first.

Then, when traffic is routed onto the two new lanes, the old lanes will be torn up and re-built.

The specifications also calls for the widening of bridges across Frio Draw on the western outskirts of Friona, and Catfish Draw, just east of Bovina.

The contract calls for 520 working days on the project, or 29 months, based on 18 working days per month.

Charles Schmidt, spokesman for Amarillo Road Co., said it was his company's hopes and intentions to finish the project by December 1 1993. That would roughly mean a year for construction of the two new lanes, and another year for reconstructing the present two lanes of the road.

"We don't have any other project going at the present time, and we intend to get onto this one as quickly as possible. We could be doing some work clearing the right of way as early as next week," Schmidt said.

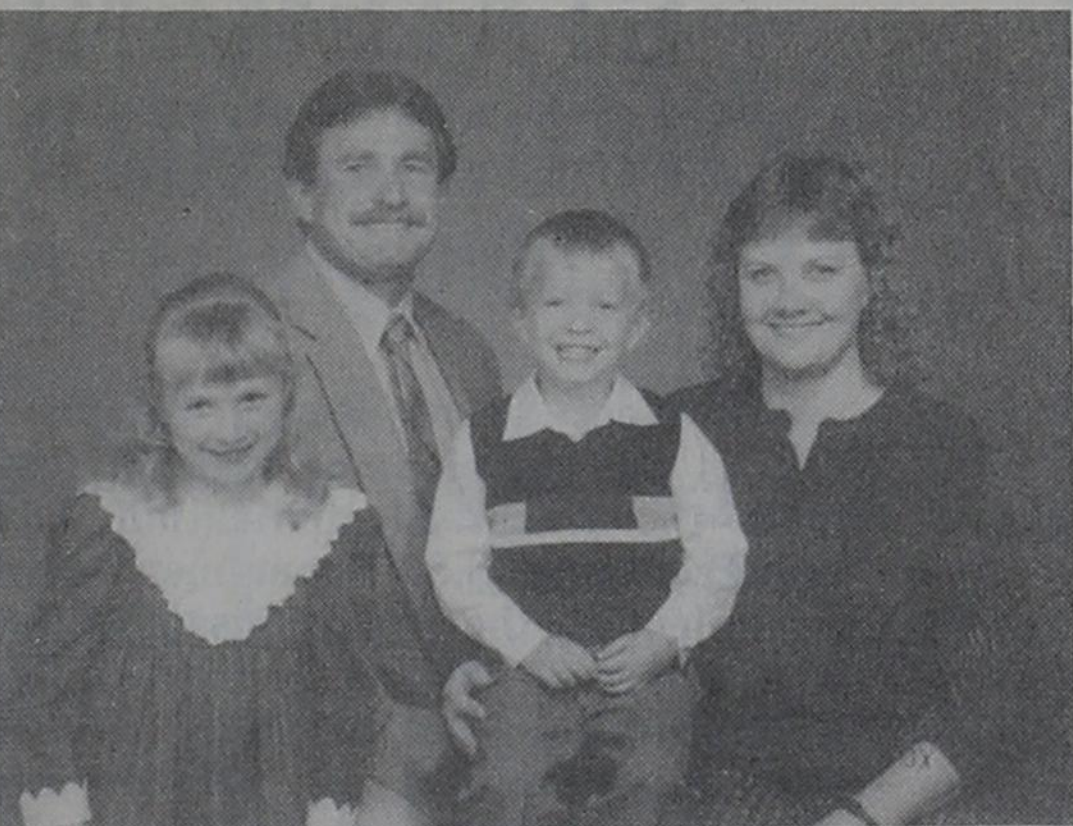
Schmidt said it was planned to start laying asphalt by June 1. Under the contract specifications, no asphalt may be laid from October 1 through April 30 of a calendar year.

The construction official also indicated that a hot-mix plant would be set up in the Catfish Draw area near Bovina to provide materials for the Bovina-Friona roadway.

Rhea Bradley, resident engineer with the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation, conducted Thursday's meeting.

"The purpose of this meeting is to secure close cooperation between the contractor, law enforcement agencies and the Texas Department of Transportation personnel in promoting traffic safety on the construction project," Bradley said.

The longtime engineer said that a major problem in the current phase of the project will be widening the roadway in the western portion of Friona, where there are businesses located along the curving highway.

W.T. is anticipating reviving its football program this year after a one-year absence.

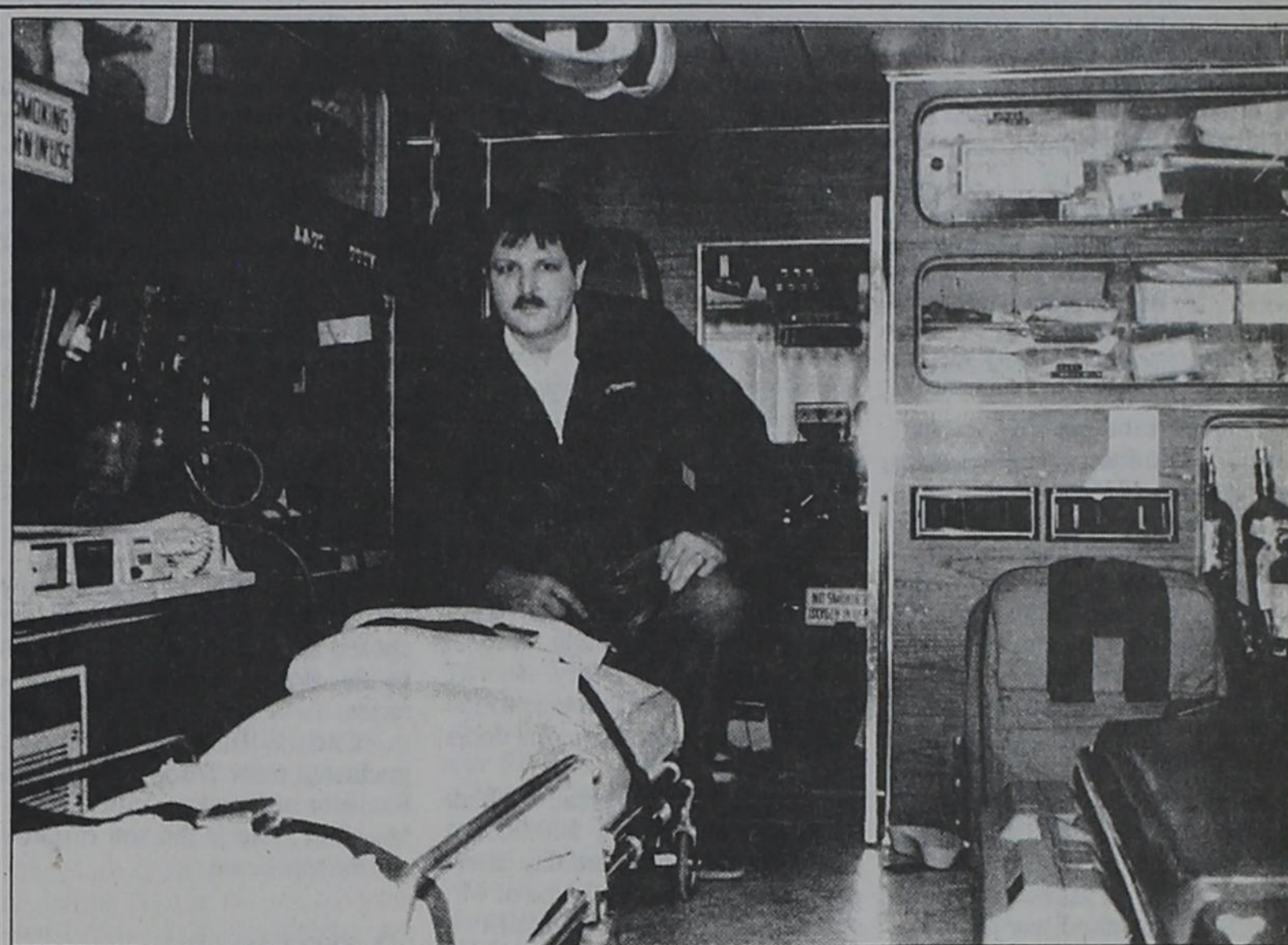

Bovina EMS receives boost from community volunteers

BOVINA - Residents of this sparsely populated farm community point with pride at their Emergency Medical Service - an entity that recently landed a new home in the former American Legion Building.

Bovina native Larry Mitchell, who heads a trained crew of 12 volunteers, said the 24-hour service is able to stay afloat because of community caring support.

"You've got to care. It's like a ministry to me. It gets in your blood," Mitchell said.

His wife, Donna, is an emergency medical technician. She said the endeavor is rewarding - especially "when you see people on the street that you've saved."

The idea to undertake emergency medical service in Bovina occurred in 1978 when Ralls minister Dick Richards arrived in town and talked with citizens about beginning such an operation, Mitchell said.

Richards took out advertisements in the local newspaper, and 12 community members soon volunteered their time and services.

Mitchell and his wife were among the 12 initial volunteers. They trained for respective paramedic and emergency medical technician certifications in Lubbock.

Today, Mitchell and Don Spring, a certified paramedic, teach classes in medical training. They also take 40 hours of continuing education classes annually to retain their certification.

"People aren't as gung-ho as they use to be," Mitchell said about potential volunteers. "They don't

want to give the time. But we've got really good community support."

Community support comes in the form of donations.

The Study Club of Bovina, for example, raised \$1,300 for the Bovina EMS in 1991 through its annual Christmas Card project.

The organization has contributed more than \$10,000 since the operation began, Mitchell added.

Another bedrock for continuing and improving EMS service came from the now dissolved American Legion post in 1990 when they donated their stucco building at 109 N. Third St. to the emergency service.

More than \$30,000 was spent to remodel the building.

Most of the remodeling money was raised through events such as spaghetti dinners, raffles and fireworks sales, Mitchell said.

Government entities have also played a key role in maintaining Bovina EMS.

Parmer county commissioners allocate \$500 a month from county funds to the medical service. City Council members pitch in \$200 monthly and assuming utility and insurance costs.

"Our City Council has been terrific," Mitchell said.

The city bought the service's ambulance in 1979.

Long-term goals for Bovina EMS include purchasing a new ambulance, continued landscaping around the Bovina EMS Training Center and equipping all volunteers with pagers linked to emergency 911 telephone service due to arrive in Parmer County in February, Mitchell said.

30 Yrs. Ago--Jan. 10, 1962

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HPUWCD To Elect District Directors

Early voting for Farmer County Committee members and District Director of Precinct Three of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 began Monday, December 20, 1991 and continues through Tuesday, January 14, 1992. The election will be held on Saturday, January 18, 1992.

Farmer County voters may cast early ballots during regular business hours at City Hall in Bovina. The election clerk is Pat Kunselman.

A.W. "Webb" Gober of Farwell is the incumbent Precinct Three Director seeking re-election to a four-year-term. District Director's Precinct Three consists of Farmer County and the portions of Bailey and Castro Counties within the Water District boundaries.

The five-member Board of Directors meet monthly to consider Water District business. They oversee all Water District activities, including legal, financial, and business matters. Water District Board

members also do long-range planning for the District and direct staff activities through the District's general manager.

The County Committee is made up of one member elected at large and one member elected from each of the County Commissioner's Precincts in Farmer County.

The candidate for County Committee member at large is Carroll R. Cook of Friona. County Committee candidates from the Farmer County Commissioner's Precincts are: Alan Monroe of Friona, Precinct One; Dale E. Gober of Bovina, Precinct Two; Vick Christian of Farwell, Precinct Three; and Robert Gallman of Friona, Precinct Four.

County Committees meet on a regular basis to recommend approval or denial of applications for water well permits to the District's Board of Directors. County Committees also serve as a liaison between the voters and the Water District Board of Directors.



The Farmstead Windbreak

When planning a farmstead windbreak, it is important to choose the proper tree species for the Panhandle.

The tree species should be cold tolerant. Some species are adapted to the Panhandle, while others are better suited to the warmer climates south of the Panhandle.

The species should be drought tolerant. Species native to arid regions perform better in West Texas. In order to perform well, species should also be resistant to insect and disease problems.

Species compatibility is also important. Some species are fast growing, while others are very slow

growing. The mature height of the trees should be considered. The mature height of different species can vary greatly.

The tree species can be a mixture of conifers, deciduous and shrub species. A mixture of different types provide year round protection and greater aesthetic values.

The aesthetic value of the windbreak can be enhanced by selecting species with a combination of colorful blooms, fruit or leaves.

Trees can be selected for wildlife benefits. Many tree species can provide both food and cover for many wildlife species.

If snow control is needed the species selected should provide density during the winter months.

With proper planning and species selection the farmstead windbreak will give good wind control, enhance the beauty of the farm and provide good wildlife habitat.

Windbreak trees are available from the Farmer County Soil and Water Conservation District. Trees are selling fast, so be sure to order soon to insure the availability of your desired species.

Programs and services of the Soil Conservation Service are offered on a nondiscriminatory basis without regard for race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, marital status or handicap.

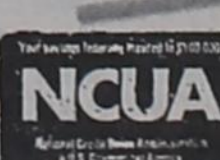
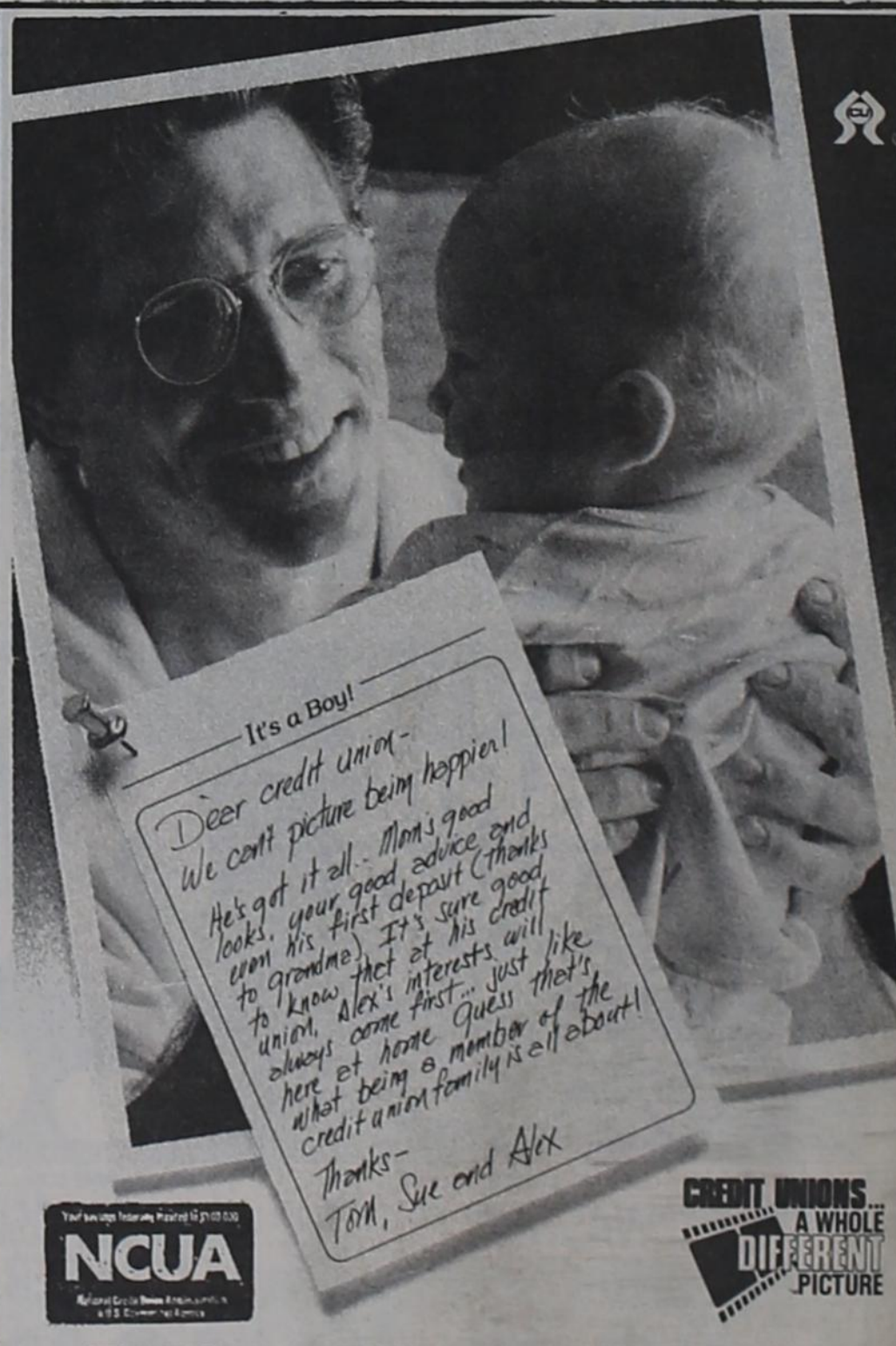
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
