Golf course manager released at Fort Clark

Bob Slate has been released as the golf course manager at Fort Clark Springs, officials confirmed late Wednesday.

The management decision was reportedly made earlier this week. No further information was available at press-time.

Commissioners court transfers HIDTA forfeiture account

The Kinney County Commissioners Court unanimously agreed Monday to transfer a \$62,000 High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) forfeiture account to the city of Eagle Pass.

All of the assets of the Allied Area Narcotics Task Force had previously been transfered, except for the cash.

The commissioners released the money based on a request from the state.

The commissioners also established an appellate judicial system at the special meeting.

The approved order, which was required by the state, creates a \$5 fee on all district and county court civil filings for the use of the appellate court.

Chief Justice Phil Hardberger said the Fourth Court of Appeals needed the additional money "because of gross salary inadequacies for our staff and briefing attorneys compared with the private market and other courts of appeals."

In other action, the court set salaries for lifeguards at \$7 per hour, including \$5 from the county and \$2 from donations. Assistant lifeguards will be paid \$5 per hour, with total wages coming from the county.



Calvin Coolidge once said, "The business of the American people is business." Therefore, our government should be working with business not against it. Nowhere does this ring truer than in current debate over reforming. the Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA).

As a former small business owner, and having spoken with literally thousands of employers and employees throughout Texas, I am convinced employers and workers alike would benefit if OSHA functioned in a way that helped establish workable safety standards and enforced those stan-

Rather than look to OSHA as a partner in safety, many employers I know fear the agency and its random inspections that turn their work sites upside down.

We need to put behind us the days of Byzantine regulations and "gotcha" enforcement practices. We must recast OSHA into a modern, effective partner in the rapidly evolving American workplace.

The fundamental, statutory flaw in OSHA is that current law does not require the agency to consider the feasibility and unintended consequences of its regulatory actions. Nor does current law provide the agency with any incentive to do so.

Rather than look to OSHA as a partner in safety, many employers I know fear the agency and







GARDEN MYTHS: OLD HABITS DIE HARD

and asked, "Is the train on time and knock the railroad!"

If you swap advice with other gardeners, you've probably heard some common gardening myths.

Like stepping on the top of your onion plants will force them to bulb. Or that the reason squash fruit turns green or gets green spots is because it has cross-pollinated with cucumbers. And many people believe that tree roots will grow down toward water. Plants are also lost each winter by the good intentions of their owners sprinkling them with water just before the temperature drops to the freezing point.

Let's clarify a few of these myths. Let your onion plants tell you when to harvest-and be patient. As bulbs mature, the foliage sends its reserves down into the bulb. If the foliage is damaged or stepped on, the plant

stops manufacturing food and reduces the reserves that can be sent down to the bulb, stopping the increase in bulb size.

In the case of cucurbits, squash will not cross-pollinate with cucumbers, watermelons or cantaloupes. They can, however, cross with pumpkins. It is possible for different varieties of cucumbers to cross, or different varieties of watermelons, but squash and cucumbers do not cross-pollinate. The mosaic virus causes mottled fruit and is spread by insects or is carried on the seed itself. Control insects and buy clean seed to prevent multi-colored squash.

Roots grow only where there is adequate moisture, oxygen, fertility, temperature and soil structure. Most of the absorbing roots are located in the top 12

inches of soil, with the rest of the roots usually staying in the top 5 feet. Since roots only grow where water is available, give your plants a deep watering and do not assume there is a magical oasis luring plant roots to it.

Sprinkling a layer of water on tender vegetation does not form a protective layer when it freezes like many gardeners think. The best way to protect vegetation from freezing is with mulch or blankets when cold weather threatens

Question: Could you explain why the toys I buy for my children say on the package what age child the toys are for?

Answer: Because small toy parts can be a real hazard to infants and toddlers (due to the risk of choking), many toy manufacturers designed a system of labeling toys so that parents would know which toys are appropriate-and which toys are not-for their young children.
