

New way offered to invest in education

Americans take it for granted that the best place to invest money is in the education of their chil-

Now, Congress has before it legislation that will give a big boost to more than 14 million American families who want to make that kind of investment.

The Parent and Student Savings Account Plus Act will allow families to deposit up to \$2,500 a year per child in savings accounts known as "A+ Accounts."

The tax-free interest earned by these accounts could be used for any education-related expense: from books, uniforms and transportation to private school tuition. Or, contributions could be saved over time to cover college expenses. The choice of how to spend the money is left up to the

About 14.3 million Americans would be expected to sign up for A+ Accounts by the year 2002, and 75 percent of these families will have children in public

That's 10.8 million parents with public school students and 3.5 million parents of private school students who stand to benefit - without reducing public school funding by so much as a

So if a child in public or private school needs a tutor, parents can tap their education savings account.

If a child in public school needs a uniform, or would like a computer on which to learn, families can use their education accounts to make the purchase.

This legislation also holds out a hand to the more than 5 million American students under the age

How would a family benefit

If a family opened an A + Account with a one-time deposit of \$2,000 when a child was born, at 7 percent interest, the account would earn an average of \$805 in interest after only five years - by the time that child is ready for kindergarten. They would save ters high school.

A + Accounts offer families a strong incentive to invest in education. By enacting this legislation, we could create additional opportunities to excel in their K-12 education.

A+ Accounts are one of the best things to happen to education in a long time. They're good for public schools. They're good for private schools. They're good for parochial schools. And they're good for home-schoolers. More access to good education is good for America's future.

nobody knows for sure, that's the problem.

The folks meeting in Kyoto believe that pollution caused by burning oil, gas and coal is the main culprit causing global warming. They are ready to force countries to limit gases produced by burning oil, gas and coal.

these man-made emissions are to blame for the Earth's climate change.

Scientists do know that the Earth undergoes normal cycles of warming and cooling. Whether the current warming trend is due to nature or some-

United States to reduce pollution. That's right. While we would get hit with the toughest restrictions, Third \$4,522 by the time the child en-World nations including China, Mexico and India would be exempt.

American companies could be forced to choose between making unnecessary and costly expenses to unrestricted countries.

Until we know the facts about global warming, we should not be risking our economy just to make the U.N. happy.

You may be wondering what a treaty in Japan means to you in Texas. Well, it could mean a 50cent hike in the price of a gallon of gas. Everyone from a farmer or rancher to a member of our armed services is hurt by higher energy costs.

With our wide-open spaces, we Texans depend on our cars to get us where we need to go. Farmers and ranchers could see their livelihoods dwindle away because of higher gas, electricity, fertilizer and chemical expenses. Hikes in energy costs limit our military's training and support operations. This could translate into poorly trained personnel and increased risks to our national security.







Francis Henry French was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana on September 27, 1857. Deeply impressed from his youth by the stirring deeds and stories told by veterans of the Civil War, he realized his ambition for a military career by entering the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York, where he graduated 12th from the Class of 1879. He was assigned as 2nd Lt. of "E" Company 19th Infantry and came West. Following service at Fort Garland, Colorado Territory and Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, the regiment moved to Fort Brown at Brownsville, Texas, where Lt. French was detailed as the Regimental Adjutant. In December of 1882, the 19th Infantry was posted to Fort

At Fort Clark, on January 1, 1883, Lt. French began diaries, which he faithfully maintained for the next 30 years.

Friday, Dec. 11, 1885

A letter from home and bundle of papers made up my mail. A cold drizzle has kept up all day. Marched on guard this morning. After relieving the old guard come up to quarters for reading matter. Spent the day in reading papers from home and Draper. Inspected sentinels in the morning and went to Q.M. office to order a load of wood. Lunched at noon and had dinner after retreat. Otherwise did not leave the guard house. Officer of the day inspected about 12-30 A.M. after which I turned in. Lt. Farber, the new sub. of the 8th recently promoted from 1st Sergt. of Farnsworth's Troop, came in today from Langtry where he has been encamped for the past two months.
