Bull Town Days Highly Successful

Spears Resigns --

Name Jacobs Superintendent

L. F. Jacobs is new superintendent of Bovina Independent School District.

Jacobs, who has been high school principal here since January of '66, was named to the post at a special meeting of the board of trustees Thursday morning.

Otis Spears, who served as superintendent for the past three years, submitted his resignation last week. The board then offered the position to Jacobs. The change is officially effective September 1.

Named to succeed Jacobs as high school principal was Gary Cox, former grade school principal. He served last year as principal of a grade school in Arizona.

Jacobs and Cox both received two-year contracts.

The new superintendent came to Bovina High School at mid-

term of the '65-'66 school year as high school principal. He was with the Tahoka school system for 18 and one-half years. He was grade school principal and athletic director at the time of his resignation there.

He started in the Tahoka school system as a classroom teacher and an assistant coach. He was high school principal at Tahoka for five years and then grade school principal and athletic director for 10 years. He served as head basketball coach during most of that time.

Jacobs has a bachelor's degree from West Texas and his master's from Texas Tech. In addition, he has 36 hours in graduate administrative work. He was graduated from West Texas State University in 1947.

Spears has accepted a position with the State of New Mexico. He will council high school-

age boys at Fort Stanton, which is near Ruidoso, N.M.

Mrs. Spears, who has been remedial reading instructor in grade school here, has accepted a position as a teacher in a Ruidoso grade school.

Spears was superintendent at Tahoka for 13 years prior to coming to Bovina. He succeeded Warren Moron, who was head of the school system in Bovina from 1956 through July of '64.

Cox was grade school principal here for two years prior to moving to the Arizona post for the '66-'67 school year. He and his family are expected to move here by the first of next week.

A native of Lorenzo, Cox is a graduate of Sul Ross State College at Alpine. He also served as high school baseball coach during his tenure here.

Cox taught and coached at Wall, near San Angelo, prior to moving here.

Crowd Of 3200 Attends Barbeque

The curtain was drawn on another tremendously successful Bull Town Days celebration here Saturday night.

Considered the best in the four-year history of the celebration, the three-day event kicked off Thursday at 1 p.m. with a steer roping and concluded Saturday night with professional wrestling matches and a Western Dance.

Sandwiched in between were three days of various activities, all of which were considered successful by leaders of the celebration.

LaNelle Christian, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wendol Christian, was crowned queen of Bull Town Days 1967 at a variety show Thursday night in school auditorium.

The queen's contest, featuring 12 candidates, was conducted earlier at Bovina Roping arena. The contest is unusual in that 60 per cent of the judging is based on the contestants' horsemanship ability.

Named second runner-up was Eva Jo Clawson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gayle Clawson. First runner-up was Toni Pinner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Pinner.

The five finalists in the queen contest included the top three and Darlene Denney, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Denney, and Judi Usher, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Usher of Plainview.

Crowds at most of the events were increased over those of a year ago. This was especially true of the free barbeque supper which was served Friday afternoon.

The total served at the barbeque was set at 3200 by Thomas Beauchamp, president of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. This was considered some 700 more than attended the barbeque in 1966. The menu consisted of 4000 pounds of barbequed beef, Pinto beans, onion and cantaloupe, all produced in the Bovina area.

In contests conducted prior to the horseback performances of the queen contestants at the roping arena, Mrs. Buck Ellison was named champion of the women cow callers, Mrs. Ed Hutto was named second best woman cow caller and Mrs. Bob McMeans placed third.

In the men's division of the cow calling, Wilbur Charles placed first. Reagan Looney, last year's champion, was second and Owen Patton was third.

Larry Scott was declared champion beard grower. C. E. Trimble, general chairman of the celebration was second, and James Williams of Plainview was judged to have the third best beard.

Sixteen beard growers entered the competition.

A packed house was present in the school auditorium Thursday night for the variety show which featured a "Miss America" contest featuring men of the community dressed as feminine beauty show contestants. "Harlene" Sherich stole the show as she (he) was named Miss America by the five judges. He was also voted the title of "Miss Congeniality" by his fellow contestants.

Also on the variety show were several musical performances by local and area people. The "Miss America" pageant was directed by Betty Hawkins.

The crowd at the variety show overflowed the auditorium which seats in excess of 700. Additional chairs were brought in and still people stood in the hallway and outside to see and hear the performances.

Kicking off Friday's activities was a chuckwagon breakfast. Approximately 250 people ate breakfast from 2 to 9 a.m. Vernon Estes was in charge of preparing the meal.

Registration of old timers was conducted Friday from 10 a.m. until noon under the direction of Bovina Woman's Study Club members at the Masonic Lodge Hall. A basket lunch was served at noon for the old timers.

A large number of people were on hand for the meal and visiting session.

Horsemanship activities at the roping arena Friday included a junior calf roping and pony express races.

Another highlight of Friday was the parade which began at 3 p.m.

The parade featured floats, commercial exhibits and hundreds of horses.

The queen's float was judged the best in the parade. Second place went to Sherrill Lumber Co.'s "Bull Town School House" and third place went to Bovina Woman's Study Club. Mustang Drive-In received honorable mention in the float competition. Cochran County Sheriff's Posse won the first place plaque in the riding club competition, senior division. Bovina Roping Club was second with third going to Swisher County Riding Club. In the junior riding club competition, the Plainview Comancheros were first and Parmer County 4-Hers took second.

Friday night's activities, other than the free barbeque, which is considered the celebration's highlight, included an auction of works of area artists. The paintings were donated and auctioned, with the proceeds going to Bovina's Clinic Fund.

Houston Bartlett of Bovina and Larry Potts of Friona cried the sale, which netted in excess of \$600 for the clinic fund. Also, Friday night was a fiddlers' contest. Bartow Riley of Olton took first place. Second place went to Dale Hendrix of Spearman and Bovina's Al Kerby took third place. The top three received cash prizes of \$50, \$25 and \$10.

A square from Bovina's square dance club, the Star Righters, took first place in square dance competition which followed the fiddlers' contest.

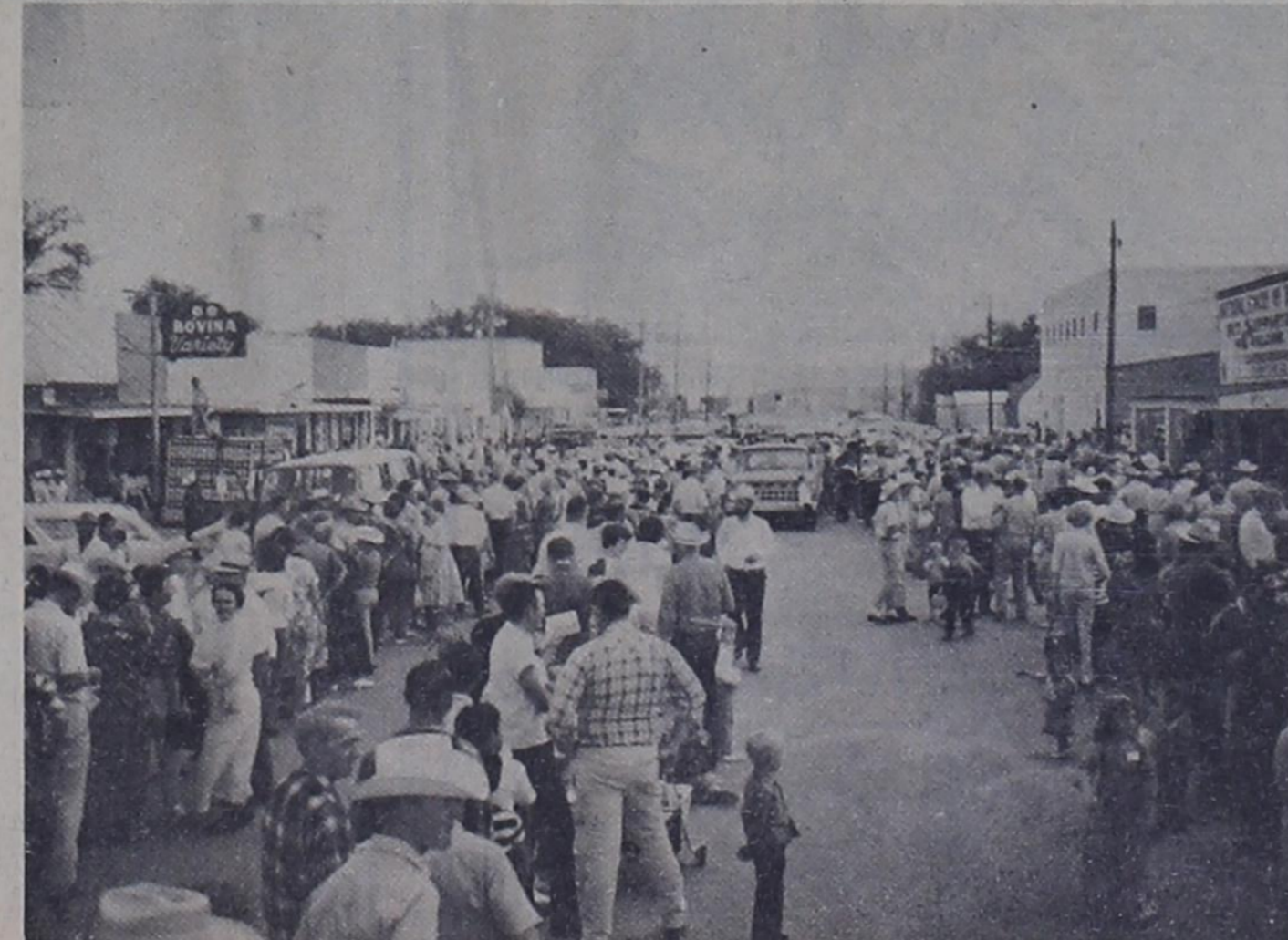
Square dancing on Main Street concluded the day's downtown activities.

A teenage dance at the Legion Hall was also Friday night.

A total of 93 entries competed for trophies and cash prizes in the Quarter Horse Show at the arena Saturday. The show, sponsored by Bovina Roping Club, was the seventh annual.

Ex-students of Bovina Schools held a banquet Saturday night in school cafeteria. A total of 98 attended. (See separate story elsewhere.)

The Jews made the mistake of thinking that the system of religion that God gave to them when He led them out of bondage would last until the end of time. They could not see that their age was one of preparation for the better Gospel age. We will be in the same class unless we realize the truth taught in such passages as Heb. 7:12, "For the priesthood being changed, there is made of necessity a change also of the law."

God promised that the world would be pleased through the seed of Abraham, Gen. 22:18. 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Long, Inexpensive Trip --

Alan Carson Visits 25 States, Canada On Cycle

All one really needs to tour 25 states and Canada is a Honda 160, a quilt and a lot of fortitude. These components were filled by Alan Carson, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Carson, who recently completed such a trip, Alan will be a senior at Bovina High School this fall.

The approximate cost of the trip was \$150 and a lot of wear and tear on the nervous system. Alan was gone one month and six days. He left home July 10 and returned August 16. Some of the states he visited are Oklahoma, Arkansas, Tennessee, East Virginia, West Virginia, Washington, D.C., Kentucky, New Jersey, New York, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin, North Dakota, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico and Canada.

He was in Newark, New Jersey during the race riots. This experience will not soon be forgotten. He noted that as he entered the city, policemen were stopping everyone and checking vehicles. He was busy looking up the address of a YMCA when he was accosted by a van of policemen, complete with submachine guns and clubs. After answering the who, where, why, what questions, he was told to leave the city. But after a full days drive on a Honda, he decided to risk it and drove on to downtown Newark where he found the YMCA. This was his stop for the night.

He said that as he was bringing his things in from his bike he was once again stopped by the police. After answering the same questions he was allowed to stay at the YMCA. Alan said he didn't get much sleep because of the screaming sirens, and was quite ready to leave Newark early the next morning.

Another incident occurred near Bowling Green, Ky. After a full day's journey, he spotted

a barn in which he thought he would spend the night. It was across the road from a farm house, but Carson said he didn't think anyone noticed him going into the barn.

Not so.

He was soon confronted with an angry farmer who thought he was his son returning from an overnight spree in town. After assuring him he was up to no harm, the man encouraged him to stay in the barn and even asked him to eat breakfast with him the next morning.

Carson spent several nights in barns, YMCA's and once in a Catholic gymnasium. This incident occurred in North Dakota. He asked the priest for shelter in the gym. The priest thinking he was a hardship case said, "of course," and then took him to dinner. Alan notes that he did look rather ragged after traveling for many hours in several rainstorms.

Alan stayed with his mother's sister in Illinois for a couple of days. She was worried about his health and lack of food. He noted that he did seem thinner but wasn't sure he had lost weight. However, when he left she packed him four sandwiches which lasted only three hours. After these sandwiches he went on a 36 hour fast in order to conserve money.

Another destination was Bagosa Springs, Colo. where he visited with Galen Hromas and his family, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Hromas.

Alan said that he enjoyed the Expo in Canada but that the tremendous length of the lines to the exhibits soon grows dull. Of New York City he commented that two hours was plenty of time to spend there. Washington, D.C. was worthwhile and very educational. He said he saw Arlington Cemetery, the White House, Lincoln

Memorial, Washington Monument and other points of interest.

Alan's average mileage when traveling from one destination to another was about 500 miles a day. This varied in different sections of the country. He went 650 miles for his record day. He carried a spare bottle of gasoline and only ran completely out of gas one time and didn't have a flat on the trip.

Following his stay with the Hromas family in Colorado he met a group of Baptist youth from Bovina at Gloretha, N.M., which is a Baptist encampment. From there he returned home.

Of the weather he said it was generally good if you like riding in the rain and sleeping in a wet blanket. He only spent one night in a motel and this was in order to dry out his clothing and blanket.

Due to the fact that his bike did not have a windshield he waged a small battle with a severe bug advance just outside of Montreal, Canada. These, plus mosquitoes, at Lake Superior in Michigan were enough to keep the youth on the road early in the morning and late at night.

Alan said he honestly couldn't recommend the trip to any of his friends. He noted that he enjoyed the adventure but liked the country and people better this side of the Mississippi.

Wandering Carsons are not unusual as Alan's older brother, Richard, toured Mexico last summer.

Alan is one of five children, four boys and a girl.

He stated that the trip was certainly educational in that he learned more geography and more about people than he could have in school classrooms.

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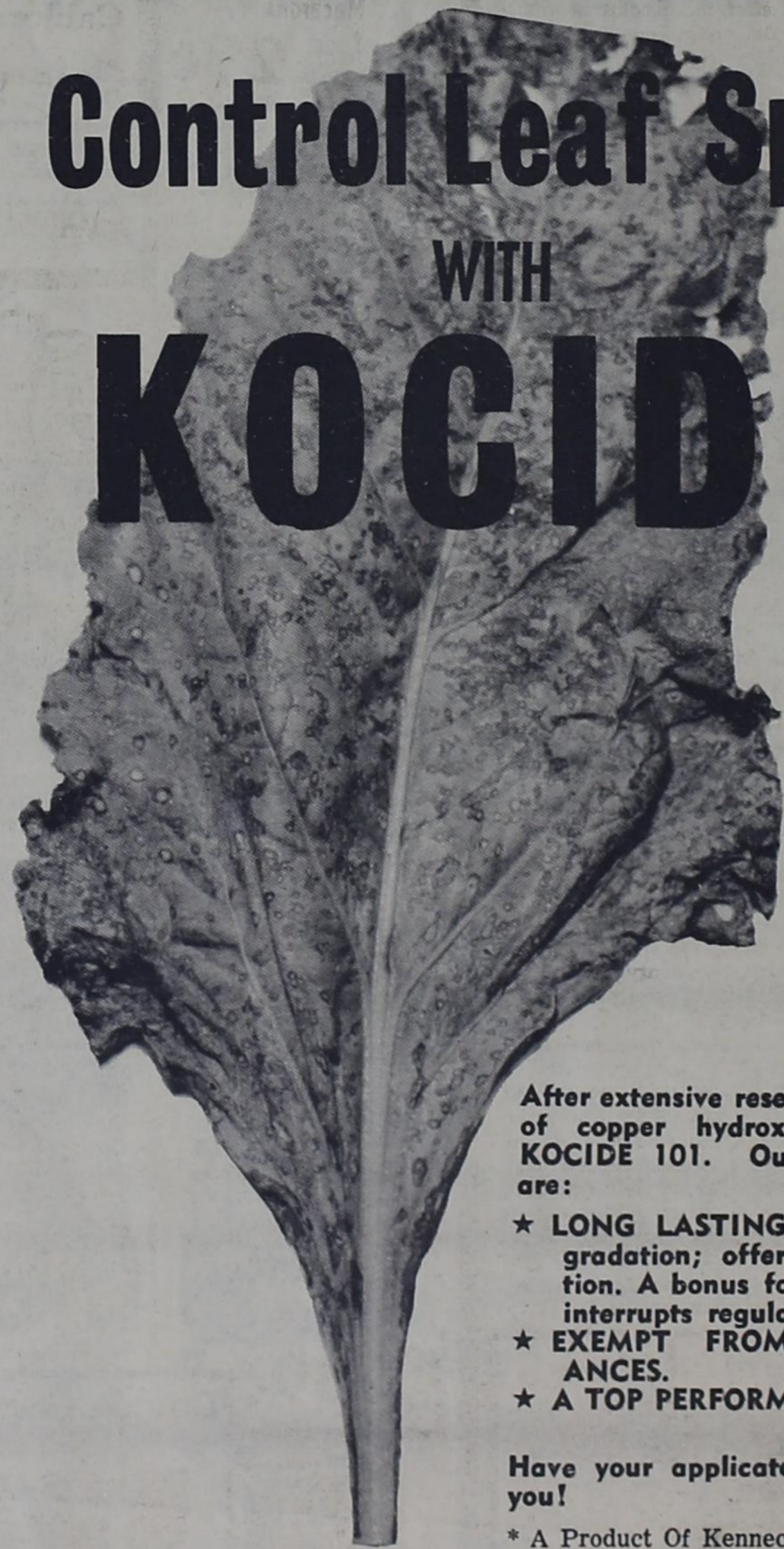
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MISS AMERICA -- Harley Sherich earned the title of "Miss America" during the "beauty pageant" Thursday night.

new year will be available beginning Monday. Higher standards will be required, we learned from a news release from Texas Department of Public Safety.

And guess what? The minimum cost has gone up, too. The fee will be \$1.75 instead of the former \$1.

Deadline for having new stickers on vehicles will continue to be April 15.

Biggest change in the regulations will be that front seat belts must be installed in all vehicles in which seat belt anchorages were a part of the manufacturer's original equipment. The release points out that seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on all American-made passenger cars beginning with 1962 models.

Also to be inspected under the new standard will be steering, wheels and rims. Mechanics will check for loose steering and stickers will not be issued to vehicles on which the steering wheel can be moved more than two inches, measured on the outside rim, without movement of the front wheels.

assessed a tax of \$1.00 plus actual cost of the tag issued by said city, per annum upon each and every dog kept or maintained in the City of Bovina, Farmer County, Texas, such tax to be paid by the owner or keeper of said dog on or before thirty days after date of this ordinance and thereafter on or before the first day of January of 1968 and on or before the first day of January each year thereafter, and the owner of any dog shall exhibit to the tax assessor and collector of said City who shall issue such tags a certificate from a duly licensed and practicing veterinarian to the effect that said dog has, within the last 12-month period prior to due date of such taxes been vaccinated against the disease of Rabies, and in all events prior to the issuance of a dog tag by the City. Every dog kept or maintained in the City of Bovina shall be vaccinated against such disease at least once each year. Upon payment of such tax and submission of a certificate of vaccination for said dog, to the City tax collector, the owner shall be issued a collar being worn by said dog reflecting payment of taxes for the current year, which said tag shall be issued by the City of Bovina to the owner of said animal as hereinafter provided, and when said dog is not in the immediate control and care of the owner of said animal.

SECTION I
It shall hereafter be unlawful for any dog to run or be at large upon any street, alley or public grounds of said City of Bovina, Texas, whenever said dog has not theretofore been vaccinated for Rabies as hereinafter provided and when said dog fails to have an identification tag attached to a collar being worn by said dog reflecting payment of taxes for the current year, which said tag shall be issued by the City of Bovina to the owner of said animal as hereinafter provided, and when said dog is not in the immediate control and care of the owner of said animal.

SECTION II
Every dog found running at large in said city that is known to be afflicted with disease of Rabies shall be destroyed on site by any peace officer or other employee of this city. Every dog found running at large suspected of having such disease shall immediately be taken into custody by the police officers of said city or other city employees, and retained until it is established whether or not said animal is afflicted with such disease.

SECTION III
There is hereby levied and all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys received from admission charges to State Parks shall be deposited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a depository for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor.

SECTION IV
Any City police officer or City employee shall take custody of any dog running at large on any street, alley or public square in this City which does not have such identification number attached to a collar worn by said dog, and which dog is not under the immediate control and care of the owner or keeper of such dog, and shall impound the same in a suitable place and after such dog has been impounded, the owner or keeper of the same may take possession of said dog only by paying the pound fee of \$2.00 for the first day or any part thereof that said dog is held in the City Pound, and \$1.00 per day or for any part of a day thereafter that said dog is impounded, and upon payment of the tax provided by this ordinance and vaccination of said dog for Rabies, at which time said dog shall be released and returned to the lawful owner, if not theretofore destroyed as hereinafter provided.

SECTION V
Upon failure of the owner or keeper of any dog taken into custody by the police officer or other City employee, and failure to pay the pound fee and the city tax levied upon said dog, and failure to have said dog vaccinated for Rabies at time of release of the same, said dog may be sold at private sale for the best price obtainable and the proceeds from said sale shall be applied to payment of the pound charges and the taxes herein levied, together with the cost of vaccinating said dog, and the balance, if any, paid into the City Treasurer. In the event the owner of said dog does not claim the same within a period of 48 hours after said dog is taken into custody by said City, and in the event the dog cannot be sold, the same shall be at that time destroyed by the City police or pound keeper.

SECTION VI
The owner of any dog or keeper of any dog in the City of Bovina who shall willfully permit the same to run at large upon any public street, alley or public park in this city, which said dog has not been vaccinated against the disease of Rabies and which said owner has failed to pay the taxes upon said dog for the current year and any year hereafter as provided herein and which said dog is not under the immediate custody and care of such owner and keeper, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction in corporation court of the City of Bovina, shall be fined in any amount not to exceed \$100.00 and each

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days violation shall constitute a separate offense.
PASSED AND APPROVED by unanimous vote, upon motion of Commissioner Owen Patton, second by Commissioner Ed Issac, all of said City Commission being present and voting, upon this the 12th day of June, A.D. 1967.

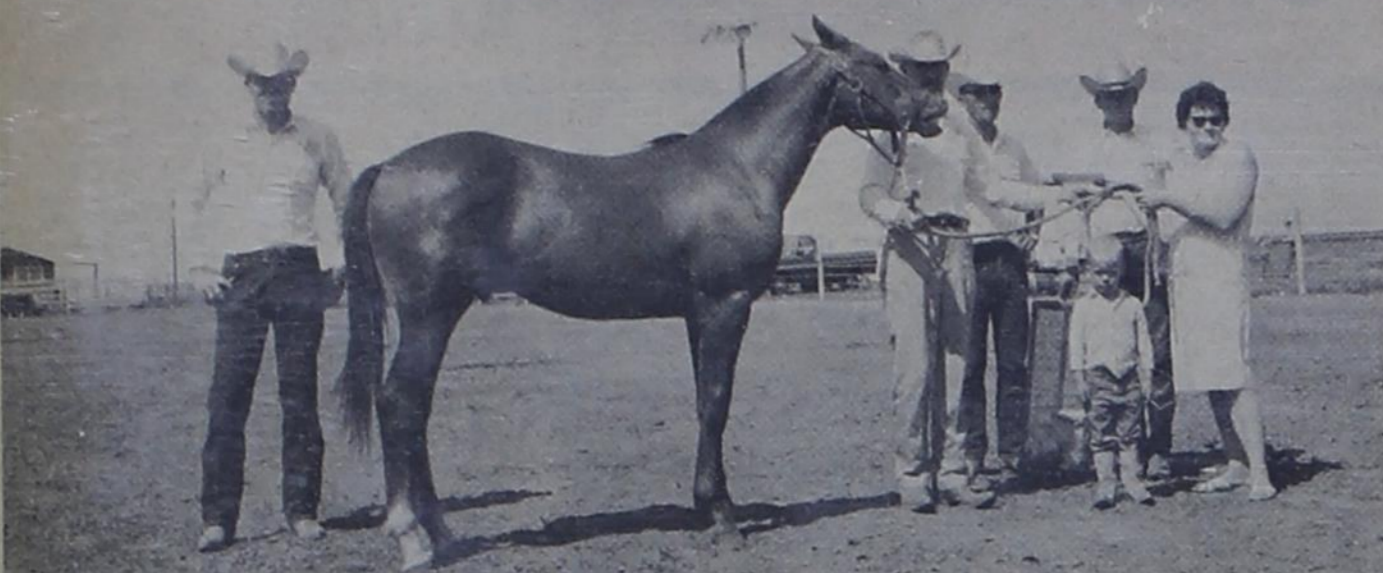

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:
"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services, or public health services."
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING ANY DOG FROM RUNNING AT LARGE WITHIN THE CITY OF BOVINA, TEXAS, WITHOUT BEING UNDER CONTROL OF THE OWNER OF SAID DOG AND WITHOUT THE SAME HAVING BEEN VACCINATED FOR RABIES, AND WITHOUT THE OWNER HAVING PAID A TAX TO THE CITY OF BOVINA AS PROVIDED HEREBY, PROVIDING FOR THE TIME AND IN THE MANNER FOR THE DISPOSITION OF DOGS AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES AGAINST OWNERS OF DOGS WILLFULLY VIOLATING THIS ORDINANCE.
BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Bovina, Farmer County, Texas, as follows:

SECTION I
It shall hereafter be unlawful for any dog to run or be at large upon any street, alley or public grounds of said City of Bovina, Texas, whenever said dog has not theretofore been vaccinated for Rabies as hereinafter provided and when said dog fails to have an identification tag attached to a collar being worn by said dog reflecting payment of taxes for the current year, which said tag shall be issued by the City of Bovina to the owner of said animal as hereinafter provided, and when said dog is not in the immediate control and care of the owner of said animal.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:
"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Development Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.
"All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by law.
"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any governmental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from any person, firm, or corporation, for State Park Sites and for developing said sites as State Parks.
"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.
"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund and the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.
"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the interest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

His mother noticed the fang marks when she washed the blood from the leg. Doctors confirmed that he was bitten by a rattlesnake. There were two

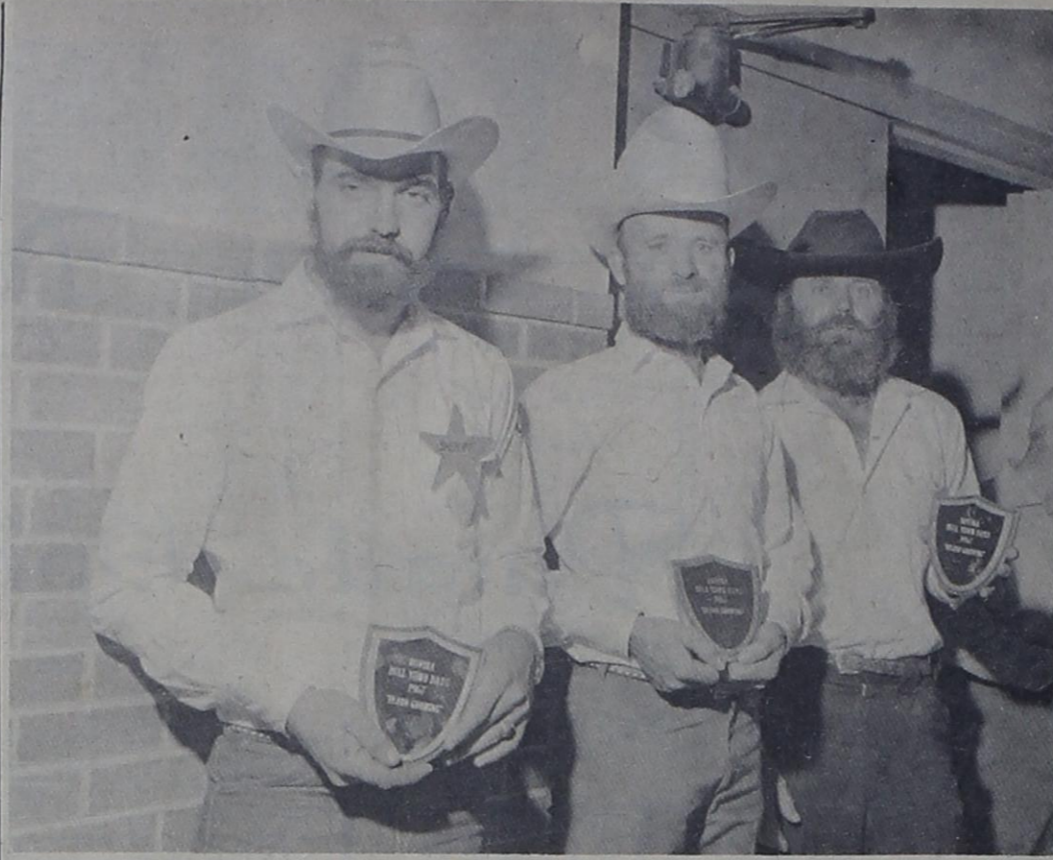
sets of fang marks close together near the knee, Grissom said.
