Initiative for Texas Chairman Virtually all elective and ap pointive offices－－whether execu tive，legislative，or judicial， whether at the national，state，or
local level－－are held by Demo－ crats or Republicans． rats or Republicans． hundreds of millions of dollars of special interest money and hun－ dreds of millions of dollars of pub lic funds．They have the non－stop attention of the media．
These two parties have held a monopoly on all elective office power for over a hundred years．
They feel ascendant They feel ascendant．
But shrinking voter turnout and
ncreased third party activity tell a different story．
Of the 1,014 Texans that the Texas Poll surveyed last month， 304 were not likely to vote．O the 691 who identified themselves as likely voters， 323 did not af－
filiate themselves with either the Republican or the Democratic party．Thus in Texas， 627 of the
1,014 adults surveyed（ 61 percent） were ignoring both major parties were ignoring both major parties．
This should not be surprising． These two parties have been in creasingly aggressive in using
their power to disenfranchise pos－ their power to dise
sible competition．
They have rigged ballot access laws，campaign finance laws，and even election districts to favor in cumbents．
They permit the various gov－
ernment entities in Texas to have their own separate Election Day their own separate Election Day
and resulting six or seven elections a year is a main reason for low
voter turnout．They refuse to mail sample ballots to registered vot ers－one reason the electorate re mains ill－informed．

litical parties in Texas litical parties in Texas（Democrat，
Republican，Libertarian，Reform） Republican，Libertarian，Reform）
held their conventions．The con－ trast between the two old parties and the new parties was striking． The Democrats，having held years，have long felt comfortable

AUSTIN - Texas wildife have

"We view this as a cycle for
nature," said John Herron, wildlife diversity program director with Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW). "Things are tough right now, but most of our native wildlife have adapted to these types of conditions.
Despite the fact that range con-
ditions across much of Texas are ditions across much of Texas are deteriorating rapidly due to scorching temperatures and a lack of rainfall, biologists aren't pushing any panic buttons. The caveat being that if no relief comes dur-
ing the next month or so, that outlook could change.
