


The teaching philosophy changes emphasis so often teachers hardly know which way to go.



Crowe's first recitation was a poem about an old, tattered American flag flying over the courthouse in a small West Texas





In December of 1882, the 19th Infantry was posted to Fort

At Fort Clark, on January 1, 1883, Lt. French began diaries, which he faithfully maintained for the next 30 years.
