Kitchen fire forces Full Circle to close

Manager says cafe's future uncertain

A kitchen fire last week has forced the Full Circle Cafe to close its doors indefinitely

Last week's blaze occurred early Wednesday morning and ruined all of the cooking equipment in the restaurant, located three miles west of Brackettville on U.S. Highway 90.

"Most of the fire was by the door between the kitchen and the bathroom," said Steve Boutwell, manager of the Full Circle Cafe.

"Everything in the kitchen was pretty much destroyed. All of the equipment, all of the utensils and all of the pots and the pans, everything was burned up. I don't think anything will ever be usable again," he added.

Officials initially said the fire was caused by electrical problems. A fire inspector from Del Rio was scheduled to investigate the accident on Tuesday.

U.S. Border Patrol agents reported the fire to the Sheriff's Department at 1:05 a.m. The Brackettville Volunteer Fire Department was dispatched to the scene at 1:07 and arrived at 1:10.

"We got out there and the fire was out at about 1:30," Boutwell



Francis Henry French was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana on September 27, 1857. Deeply impressed from his youth by the stirring deeds and stories told by veterans of the Civil War, he realized his ambition for a military career by entering the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York, where he graduated 12th from the Class of 1879. He was assigned as 2nd Lt. of "E" Company 19th Infantry and came West. Following service at Fort Garland, Colorado Territory and Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, the regiment moved to Fort Brown at Brownsville, Texas, where Lt. French was detailed as the Regimental Adjutant. In December of 1882, the 19th Infantry was posted to Fort

At Fort Clark, on January 1, 1883, Lt. French began diaries, which he faithfully maintained for the next 30 years.

No mail for me today. Made out pay accounts this morning and wrote a letter of transmittal to be sent with them, and also wrote usual letter home before lunch time. After lunch completed "England under Gladstone" a book that has given me a great deal of satisfaction and not see any improvement. Have pleasure. It is well written and gives a concise resume of English temper or thoughts and am afraid affairs from 1880 to 1885. Then I am becoming a fault finder and wrote letter to Lula and John and mailed it on way to dinner. Today is Lula's birthday; may she have a great many happy and prosperous returns of the day.

Tuesday, Jan. 4, 1887

The cold weather is making Gen. Smith's unusual drill order inoperative. He has ordered three drills a week during this month but we have had none yet. Mail brought my pay for last month. Carried part down to deposit at the store. Funk, a private of "A" Co. came to my rooms with his books that he is studying to fit himself for a commission. He has asked me to help him. Have promised to do so and must do my best. Black came back last night with Mrs. Stanley who was here last February. Called in at Hammond's a while this morning and had a pleasant chat with Mrs. Stanley. Capt. Leefe and Guard also came back today. Saw latter at his house after lunch and was very glad to see him looking so well & happy. Wrote a letter to Harry Rhoads enclosing a check for \$50 to pay for the Christmas gifts. Hope this will be enough to pay this bill entirely. Black has moved in with me temporarily, This evening Harris performed a small operation on him for piles. Hammond came up & played piquet a while. It was a relief to sleep through reveille this morning. Mail brought nothing but a paper as advertisement. Started in to play tennis with Hammond when a man from the company came up with notice that they had a fox up a tree and wanted me to come down by the old grave yard to see the hounds capture him. The game was suspended and I went to the hunt while Hammond had his haircut. The chase was not very long as the fox went up three trees in succession after being driven down by the men, but the hounds finally got him on the ground and made short work of him. Got the brush and gave it to Mrs. Lester who was the only lady present at the death. Played tennis with Hammond against Guard and Harris and we were beaten. After lunch went up with Mrs. Guard to Mrs. Cunningham's and practiced through the Nanki Poo part of the Mikado and did not find it as hard as I expected. Believe that with practice I can sing it all right. After this played tennis with Miss Coleman against Guard and wife. Escorted Miss Coleman to Guard's in the evening and played whist until midnight. Mrs. Guard and I beat Miss Coleman and Guard by one game. Had cake and lemonade for refreshments.



Deer season closes Sunday north of Highway 90

A few reminders this week: The general deer season closes north of U.S. Highway 90 in Kinney County on Sunday.

There will be a muzzleloader season, north of U.S. 90 only, Jan. 9-17, for antler-less and spike buck deer only. You need to purchase a muzzleloader stamp if hunting this particular season.

South of U.S. 90, the general season ends on Jan. 17. A special late general season will run Jan. 18-31, for antler-less and spike buck deer only. That will wrap up another season of deer hunting.

Dove season is currently open in Kinney County - but not for long! If you hunt north of U.S. 90, the season runs through Wednesday, Jan. 6. If you hunt south of 90, then it runs through Tuesday, Jan. 5.

Be careful about the closing date south of 90. Depending on where or which county you hunt, the closing days are different.

It closes on Jan. 5 in southern Kinney County because we had the special white-wing hunt for the first two weekends of September (four days) in that area.

Bag limits, rules, and regulations are the same county-wide and are the same as they were in the regular dove season in September (15 birds).

Hunting Accident

We had a hunting accident involving a firearm in southern Kinney County a few weeks ago.

A hunter was handling a pistol when it discharged, hitting him in the upper leg. He survived. We can be 10 or 100 years old, have many hours of training and safety courses, have years of experience, and an accident can still happen.

■ Treat every gun as if it were loaded. Treat it with respect, loaded or not. There is no room for carelessness or horseplay. Don't get in a hurry or get careless when handling weapons and




