Illegal alien smuggler escapes on foot after vehicular accident

DEL RIO - Border Patrol agents responded to a report of a group of possible undocumented aliens present at a residence in Cienegas Terrace on Saturday.

Agents observed several subjects attempting to board a van. Upon noticing the marked Border Patrol vehicle, the driver of the van accelerated and left the residence. Agents proceeded to follow the van, never travelling more than 25 miles per hour in the residential area.

After traveling a short distance, agents came upon a cloud of dust and saw the van in a vacant lot. It appeared that the driver had lost control of his vehicle and struck a vehicle, which was parked alongside the road.

Border Patrol agents did not pursue the suspect vehicle nor activate emergency lights, due to the fact that Cienegas Terrace is a residential neighborhood.

The driver of the vehicle climbed out of the van and absconded on foot.

The Val Verde Sheriff's Department was notified of the accident and an EMS unit was also requested. One undocumented alien in the van received lacerations to his head and required medical attention at the Val Verde Medical Center.





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

Power of the people

What if the federal government came up with a plan requiring banks across the country to spy on customers? What if those banks were then supposed to take the information gathered and report it to the federal government?

Every time you withdrew large sum of money, or if you sold your car and made a large deposit to your savings account, the federal government would know. Do you think it sounds like something that would never happen in America? Well, think again. bas

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), the agency that oversees America's banks, recently came up with a plan they call the "Know Your Customer" program. The intent of the plan is to crack down on crimes like money laundering. But this federal plan goes too far.

Under this program, banks across the country would be forced to track the banking habits of their customers. If a customer makes a withdrawal, or a deposit, inconsistent with their normal pattern, the system sends up a red flag to notify officials at the bank.

It doesn't stop there. The bank would then report to the federal government that there has been "suspicious activity" in your accounts.

That means every time one of life's little emergencies crops up, like you need to replace the hot water heater or buy a new refrigerator, the federal bureaucrats could get a heads up about your private affairs, even though you've done nothing illegal. TOW

This frightening plan packs a double punch. Not only does it invade our individual privacy, it also imposes an unfunded federal mandate upon banks across the to enter through t

Your community bank would have to bear the cost of formulating a plan that tracks a customer's banking habits. And the plan is so broadly written that even if a bank had a tracking system in place, the federal government could force changes.

As you can imagine, the "Know Your Customer" plan has not been well received in Texas, teachers can look forward to a pro- or anywhere in the country for that ductive and positive legislative matter. In fact, public outcry has been so intense that the federal banking agencies are rethinking the idea.

The FDIC reports that it has received around 15,000 comments from irritated Americans calling the "Know Your Customer" plan an invasion of privacy.

Because the criticism has been so harsh, the federal government is quietly backing away from its own plan. And just to make sure this invasive program never sees the light of day, Congress is already drafting legislation.

The Fourth Amendment of the Constitution guarantees us protection from "unreasonable searches and seizures." We cannot allow our constitutional rights to be infringed upon.




Henry Lutz, agent of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, spoke to the Brackettville Rotary Club last Thursday.
