The City Council election is limited to Brackettville residents. All registered voters in Kinney County are eligible to vote in the School Board election.

Legislature must react to changing conditions in children's health care

For many families in Texas, health insurance is a luxury. The peace of mind that health insur- employers do not offer health inance provides is beyond the reach of many ordinary Texans.

know how they would cope with a child who fell seriously ill. An accident on the playground or a fall off of a bicycle could easily escalate into a financial crisis.

Though the number of uninsured kids is increasing nationwide, Texas has been hit particularly hard. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Texas has the highest percentage of uninsured children. We are home to over 1.3 million uninsured kids - nearly one out of every four kids living in this state.

Many factors have contributed to this situation. Our economy includes many service-oriented jobs with low wages and few, if any, benefits. The rising costs of health care has put health insurance out of the reach of many ordinary Texans and small businesses, who once enjoyed full coverage.

Legislators must react to these changing conditions and reverse the declining availability of basic health insurance for children.

Fortunately, the Legislature has already begun constructing a safety net for families.

Through a joint program with the Clinton administration, Texas could insure nearly 1 million of our 1.3 uninsured children, if we take full advantage of this opportunity. It is an opportunity that is too good to turn down.

In 1997, the Clinton administration initiated the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). This offers Texas \$3 in ing fewer school absences. federal matching grants for every \$1 that our state invests in children's health insurance.

CHIP is designed to help parents who make too much to qualify for Medicaid but still cannot afford the insurance premiums for kids to grow to their full potentheir children.

The Legislature has already Many parents today do not committed to helping the poorest children. In my judgement, we must extend this care to the children of working families. However, there is a dispute over where to draw the line.

Gov. Bush's proposal is to draw the line with families that make less than 1.5 times of the federal poverty rate. This plan would include families of four with incomes up to \$24,675. This plan would still exclude too many uninsured children.

The plan proposed by Democrats in the House of Representatives would cover families with incomes up to two times of the federal poverty rate. This plan would include families of four with incomes up to \$32,900, which is the maximum allowable coverage under the federal law.

This plan casts a wider net and covers more families. It also protects children and, just as importantly, saves health care dollars.



Taxpayers will benefit through reduced costs associated with health care. Many uninsured seek care only when illness has spun out of control. Taxpayers often wind up covering this expensive brand of emergency health care.

Lone Star rising

March 2 is a special day for Texans. It is a day that fills our hearts with pride, and it is a day for remembering what we owe to those who went before us.

On that day, 162 years ago, a solemn convention of 54 men met in the small settlement of Washington-on-the Brazos to sign the Texas Declaration of Independence.

The declaration stated: "We, therefore ... do hereby resolve and declare ... that the people of Texas do now constitute a free, sovereign and independent republic."

At the time, Texas was a remote territory of Mexico, hospitable only to the bravest and most determined of settlers. After declaring our independence, the founding delegates quickly wrote a constitution for the newborn republic and organized an interim government.

My great-great grandfather was one of the signers of the Texas Declaration of Independence.

As was the case when the American Declaration of Independence was signed in 1776, our declaration only pointed the way toward a goal, the price of which was enormous effort and sacrifice.

While the convention sat in Washington-on-the-Brazos, 6,000 Mexican troops were marching on the Alamo to challenge the newly created republic. Several days earlier, from the Alamo, Col. William Travis sent his immortal letter to the people of Texas - and to all Americans. He knew the Mexican Army was approaching, and he knew that he had only a very few men at arms to help defend the San Antonio fortress.

Colonel Travis wrote:

"Fellow citizens and compatriots: I am besieged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna – I have sustained a continual bombardment and cannonade for 24 hours and have not lost a man - the enemy has demanded a surrender at discretion, otherwise, the garrison are to be put to the sword, if the fort is taken - I have answered the demands with a cannon shot, and our flag still waves proudly from the wall - I shall never surrender or retreat. Then, I call on you in the name of liberty, of patriotism and of everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid, with all dispatch. The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily and will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible and die like a soldier who never forgets what is due to his own honor and that of his country - Victory or Death. William Barret Travis, Lt. Col., Commander."

What American, Texan or otherwise, can fail to be stirred by Col. Travis' resolve?

In the battle that followed, 184 brave men died in a heroic but vain attempt to fend off Santa Anna's overwhelming army. But the Alamo was crucial. Because those heroes at the Alamo held out for so long, Santa Anna's forces were battered and diminished. Gen. Sam Houston gained the time he needed to muster his forces and devise a strategy to defeat Santa Anna at the battle of San Jacinto, April 21, 1836. The Lone Star was visible on the horizon at last.

We Texans continue to commemorate the heroic times during which we won our independence, existed as a republic and finally joined the Union.

Each year on March 2, I read Col. Travis' letter to my colleagues in the Senate to remind them - and all of us - of the pride Texans share in their history, and in being the only state that came into the Union as a republic.
