IT'S GETTING CLOSE to the place on the calendar reserved for spring.

You can always tell for sure, because the kids taking track are out trying to practice up for their next meet in this hedge-podge known as West Texas weather.

Oh, they sometimes manage to get one, maybe two decent days a week for workouts (Monday of this week was as near perfect as you're gonna get in this country). But come track meet day--watch out!

Having lived my entire life in this section of the country, and also having been a track fan, it has been interesting to see how an otherwise good week, weather-wise can be shot to heck by anything from a blizzard to a sandstorm on Saturday.

Last Saturday ended up probably better than average. But when the field event contestants began to do "their thing," the temperature was only 26 degrees. They say you haven't lived until you've tried to pole vault with these new fiberglass poles in below-freezing weather. I think they have even lost a few poles (hopefully no vaulters) which snapped, since they wouldn't flex like they do under "normal" conditions.

How do you get your muscles warmed up for your event when it's 25 degrees and threatening snow?

It's always a tough season for spring sports in West Texas, and we admire the youngsters and their coaches who endure our weather for whatever event they are striving for--whether it be track, tennis, golf or what-have-you.

For years we have advocated that the schools in our area adopt a special policy for scheduling track meets. When you get your field lined up for your meet, you tell them it's "the week of March 12," rather than Saturday, March 17.

Then, you watch the weather each morning to see how it's going to shape up. From about Tuesday on, you pick the day that looks like it's going to be better than average (at least no snow on the horizon).

Get on the 'phone and call your field of entries. They are to be at the track by noon. With a little luck, you could be finished before dark.

Maybe it's a little far out. But wouldn't it be something to have your meet on a perfect Friday, then be inside by the stove on Saturday when that "last blizzard" of the season sweeps in!

SPEAKING OF WEATHER, something sure needs to happen fast, or the prospects for making a dryland wheat and barley crop will look very gloomy.

Our moisture this winter has been very scant--with only one snow which amounted to anything in the moisture department.

It is about as dry as we have seen it in many years. In the past month or two, there haven't even been a good threat of moisture. We've had a "smell" of rain this last week, so maybe our time is coming.

As everyone knows, this country can change considerably for the better after a good, general rain, and it could still allow the farmers to make a little wheat and barley.

Just about the time everyone has given up on it ever raining again--that's about when it will come a good soaker. Most of the folks we know are ready for it any time now.

BHS Track Meet Slated Two Days

Court Approves Pact With MH/MR Center

Parmer County Commissioners approved a contract with the Central Plains MH/MR Center of Plainview on testing for alcohol or drug dependency as required for probation in DWI cases according to the new Senate Bill number one.

Laura Jacobs, County Extension Agent for Home Economics, reported that a new 4-H Club had been formed at Rhea, having 20 members.

Several certificates of deposit which were maturing February 29, 1984 were re-invested for short terms, to be available on short notice without a penalty and still earn income for the county.

CDs re-invested included \$150,000 from the General Fund; \$200,000 from Farm to Market Funds, another \$100,000 in General Funds expected to be received from new taxes before the next court meeting; \$30,000 in Right-of-Way funds plus \$100,000 in new tag receipts to be invested for Farm-to-Market revenue.

Discussion was held regarding a request to move an underground tile line alongside FM 3333. It was determined that the line in question was outside the county's right-of-way, and could not be moved by the county.

Motion was approved for soil work for a number of farmers using county equipment when available, such work to be reimbursed the county. Farmers

The meeting concluded with prayer and refreshments were served by Anna Valero.

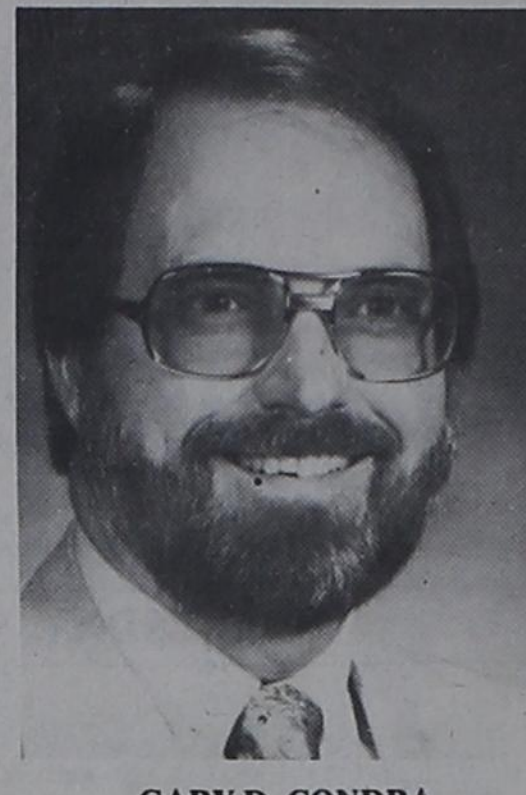
Economist Enters Race For Congress

Gary D. Condra, 39, a Lubbock agricultural economist, has announced that he has filed for the Democratic nomination to the 19th Congressional District seat being vacated by Kent Hance.

Condra, who has over ten years experience as an economist and educator, brings a life-long involvement in agriculture to the race. Condra believes that his training and experience are particularly well-suited to representing this district because agriculture is such an important sector of our economy. He emphasized that "we must restore profit and stability to the U.S. agricultural economy; or West Texas agriculture, as we know it, will not survive." Condra also pointed out that "this is the real question which will face Congress when it addresses the 1985 Farm Bill."

Condra is also confident that his economic training and experience will enable him to more effectively represent the district in dealing with economic problems like oil and gas pricing and the budget deficit.

Condra recognizes the need to maintain a first-rate educational system for the youth of America. "Our young people are our most

valuable resource," he said, "and we cannot maintain our greatness without a national commitment to their educational development." Condra also stressed that his experience and that of his wife, Betty, a former public school teacher, will insure that this district is well represented in the area of education.

Condra suggested that we should elect our Congressman just like we would hire any other employee. "First," he said, "look at the job description and requirements. Then look at the training and experience of the applicants."

Condra graduated from Ballinger High School and received a bachelor's degree in animal science from Texas Tech in 1969. After a tour of duty with the U.S. Army in Vietnam, he returned to Texas Tech where he received a master's degree in agricultural economics in 1973. In 1978 he was awarded a doctorate in agricultural economics from Texas A&M.

Condra resigned his position as Extension Economist with the Texas A&M University System in September to evaluate this Congressional race. During his tenure with Texas A&M, he served with both the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Water Resources Institute. He also has experience as a private consultant, real estate appraiser, irrigated farm operator, and feed-lot office manager.

Condra is married to the former Betty Ann Moore of Plainview and they have two children, Clay, 14, and Merinda, 13. The Condras are members of the Westmont Christian Church in Lubbock.

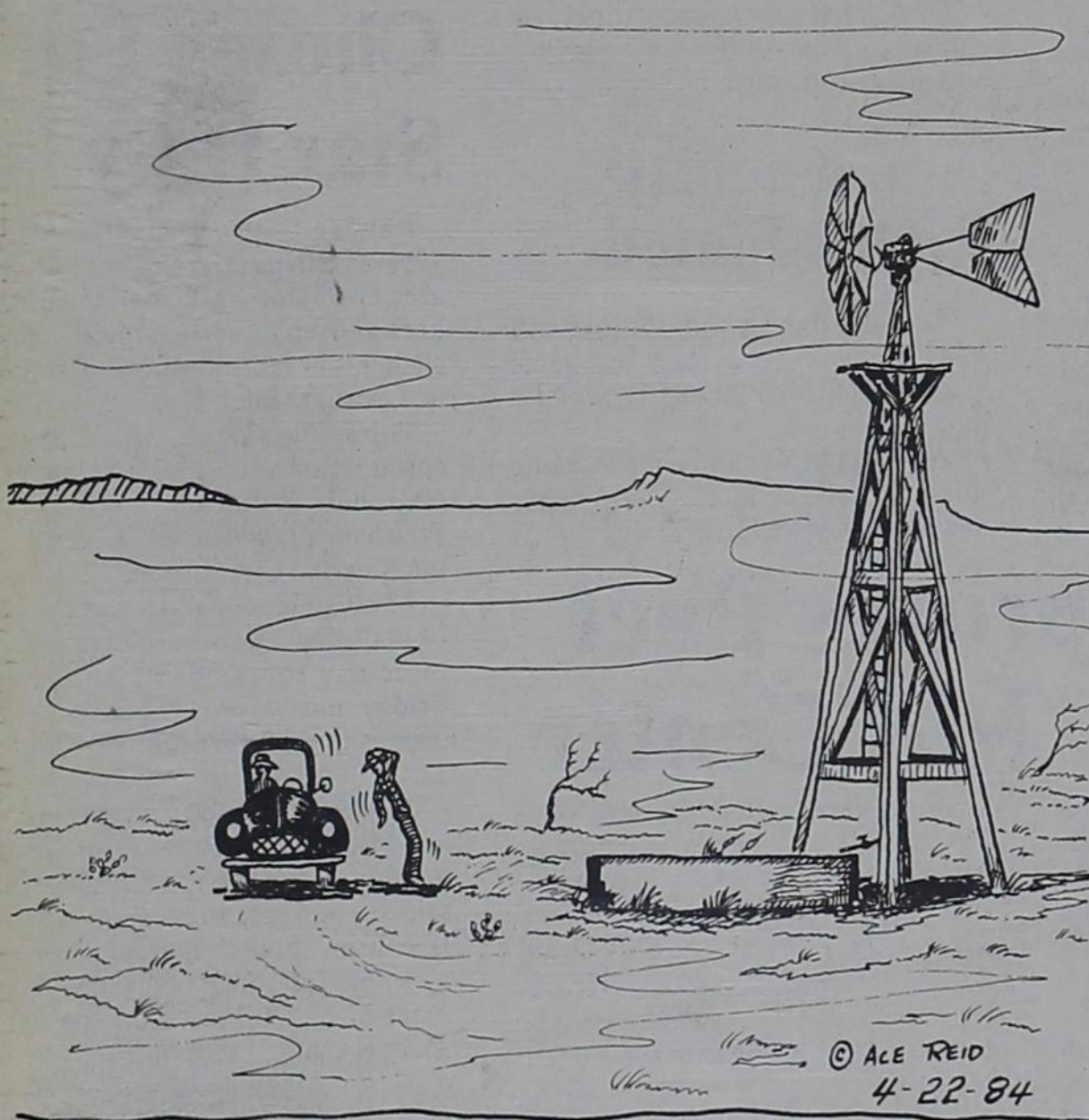
There are many changes taking place today in our world, changes that tend to predict the characteristics of the world in the 21st century. It seems that the future will be marked by increased tension between impulses toward human interdependence and impulses toward autonomy manifested by the inequitable distribution of the world's economic resources. The demand will be greater for the exercise of moral judgment in the development and use of technology, and for cultural and value systems that are capable of co-existence in a pluralistic society. Ultimately, the tension between human interdependence and autonomy will be expressed in the continued struggle for world domination between democratic and totalitarian political beliefs.

What kind of general education program will prepare students for this type of future? I believe that we must arm them with lifelong learning skills. We must produce people who know how to deal with information. They must be able to make decisions, deal with change, and make use of creative imagination. They must recognize the interdependence of all people on the earth, the value of the variety of world cultures, and the need for a knowledge of history and geography. Lastly, and to me most important, we must produce people with a sense of self-worth who appreciate the intrinsic value of human life and recognize the uniqueness of each person's potential.

This is the challenge that faces not only educators, but also students and parents. It will require a dedicated effort on each of our part. Will we be able to meet the challenges of the future?

Poisoning Fact List

1. There are some 150,000 poisonings that occur each year in Texas.
2. 75-85 per cent of all poisoning episodes occur in children under five years old.
3. The Texas State Poison Center handled 29,109 poisoning emergencies during 1983, and answered some 19,000 general information inquiries.
4. Nearly 10 per cent of the ingestions by children-involved their eating household and garden plants.
5. March 18-24 is National Poison Prevention Week.
6. Medicines are involved in poisoning episodes some 40 per cent of the time.
7. Even if you do not live with small children--you should store cleaning products and medications safely--because small children visit everyone.
8. Syrup of ipecac, a substance for inducing vomiting, should be in every home where small children live or visit. It should never be given before calling the Poison Center or your family physician.
9. Never take medicine in the presence of small children, because they like to imitate adults.

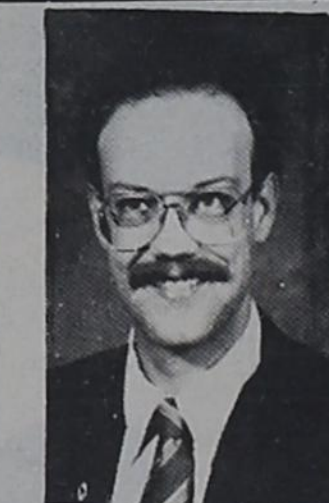

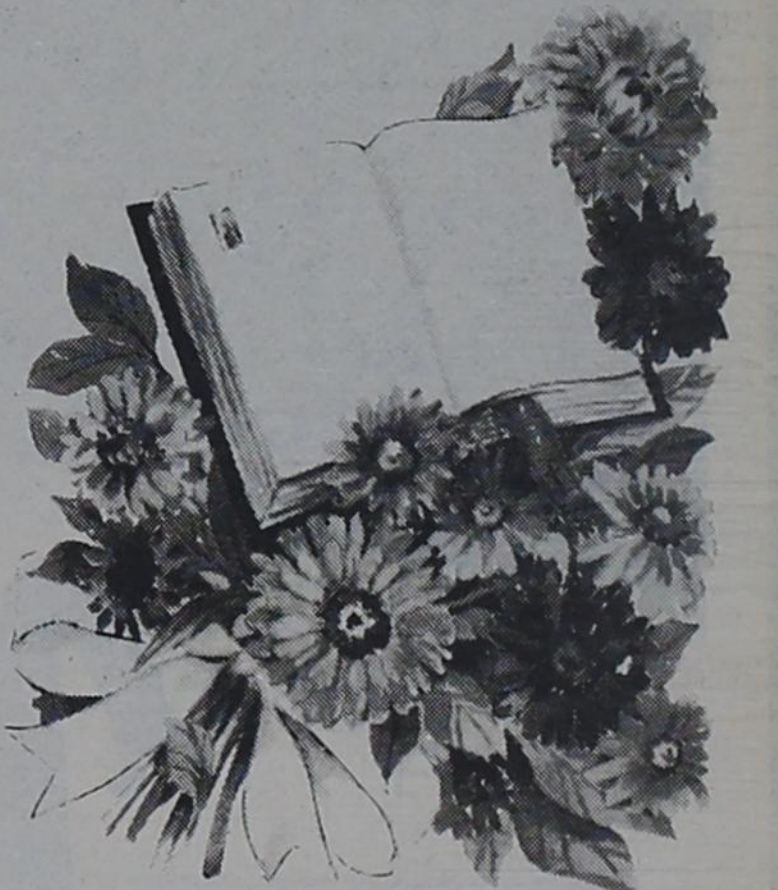

Sales Tax Checks Show Nice Increase

Cities in Parmer County were slated to receive their monthly sales tax checks from the state comptroller for the period ending February 27, 1984, and in every instance the check amounts showed nice gains over comparable periods for the preceding year.

Bovina was to receive a check for \$1,507.20. This is an increase of \$528.48, a gain of 54 per cent, over the check for the comparable period in 1983.

For the calendar year 1984, Bovina has now received a total of \$5,704.13, which is \$477.77 less than at this time a year ago.

Other receipts for Parmer County cities during the current period included: Friona, \$7,156.48 (compared to \$1,759.68 in 1983); year's total, \$24,608.46 (compared to \$21,057.82, up 16.9 per cent).

Also, Farwell, \$1,569.29 for this period (compared to \$545.48 in 1983); year's total, \$5,796.61 (compared to \$4,993.08, up 16.1 per cent).

In all, Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totalling \$53.5 million in local sales tax payments to 985 cities which levy the one per cent tax.

"Texas is pulling out strongly from the trough we were in last year," Bullock said. "Along the border, January sales were well above last year in Laredo, Brownsville and El Paso. Among the 20 biggest sales tax cities, only Midland and Odessa are still running behind last year. Overall, sales tax receipts are up more than 12 per cent," he said.

March checks reflect sales made in January and reported to the comptroller in late February.

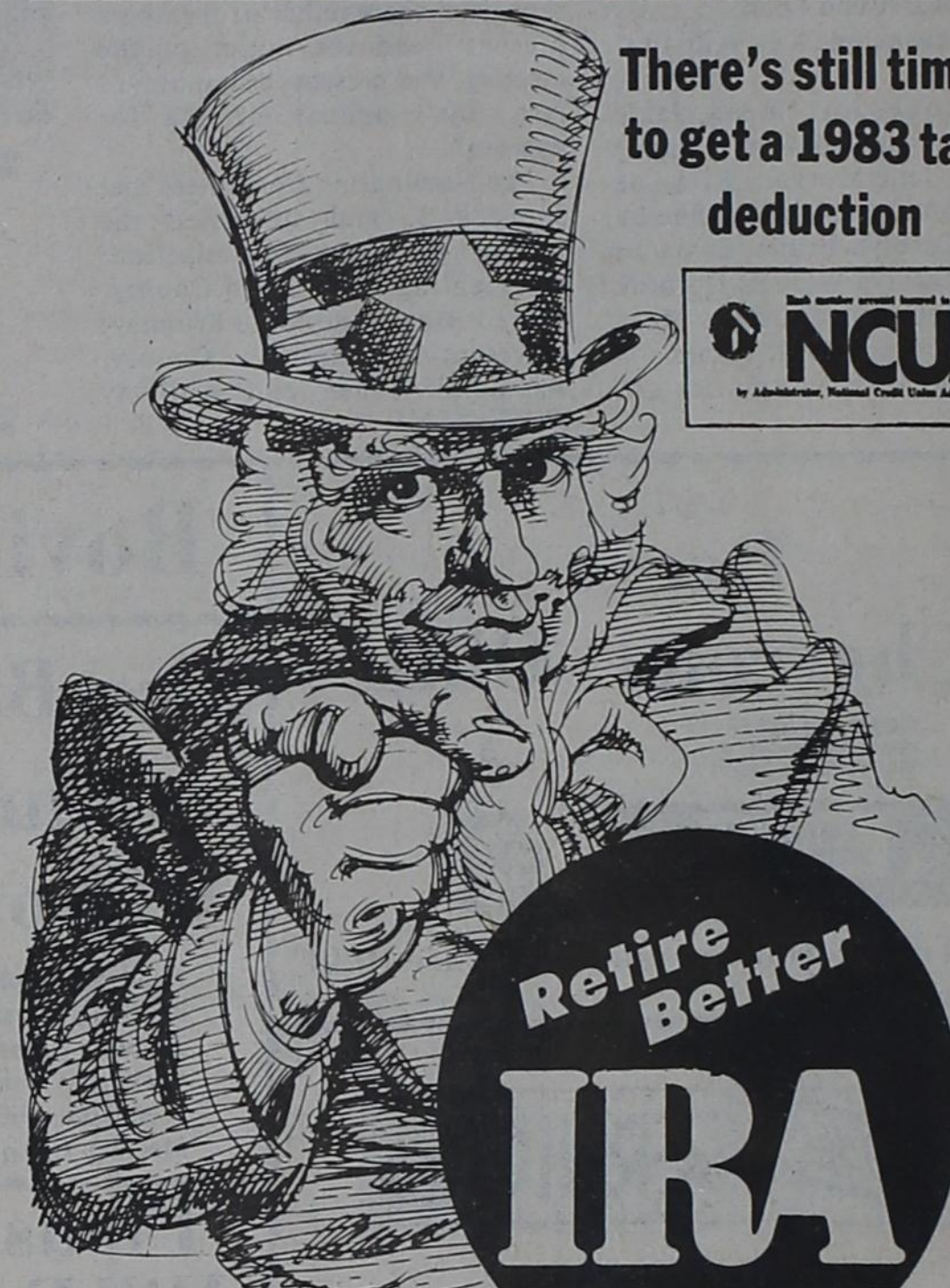
Lowell and Billie Primrose drove to

Residents Opposed To Longer School Days

Panhandle residents who responded to a poll by Senator Bill Sarpalius to determine sentiment for lengthening the public school day have overwhelmingly rejected the idea.

Newspapers from throughout the 29 counties of the 31st Senatorial District assisted in conducting the poll.

"I have never had an issue before the Legislature which generated the amount of response as did my request for input on the extension of the school day," Sarpalius said.

"More than 99.5 per cent of those responding were opposed to adding hours to the daily schedule," Sarpalius added. He said compilation included more than 1,000 responses

and that additional replies were still being received.

Sarpalius said it was apparent from the tone of the instructions he was receiving from constituents that they would rather see better quality education than quantity through an extended school day.

More than 150 students added comments, many saying that they have jobs after school to help with finances at home and felt that longer hours in school would interfere with necessary jobs and with chores around the house and farm.

Many students added that longer hours would cause an increase in drop-outs in their school.

Parents and teachers alike expressed the view that children can absorb knowledge only to a point and think that 2:30 or 3 p.m. is the limit for keeping attention, especially among younger children.

Many felt that the additional time at school would be close to making their children wards of the state and thereby cause deterioration in the family structure.

Many who expressed views stressed the importance of getting back to basics and felt that greater concentration in the first few grades would increase comprehension levels at higher grades.

A sizeable number of responses expressed concern at not allowing a child to enjoy childhood experiences. These people said that activities such as piano, dance classes, baseball, scouting, time for play with friends and family would be severely restricted by long hours at school. They feared that children would receive too narrow a view of life.

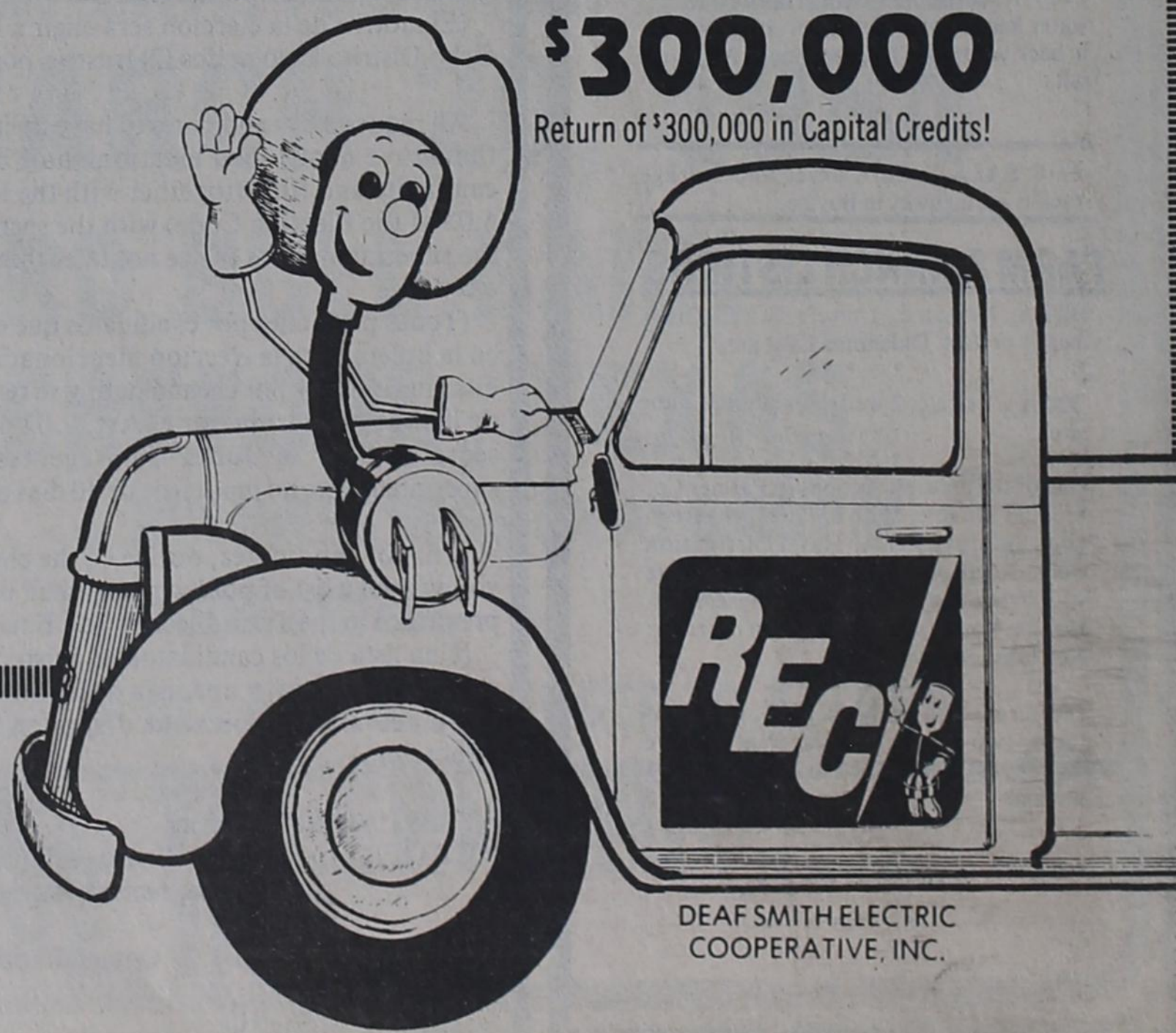
