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The action was taken five days Tootsie Herndon brought up the matter at a special Commissioners' Court meeting attended by County Judge Herb Senne and Commissioners Frerich and Pat Melancon.

At the July 5 meeting and again Monday, the Court was asked to consider entering into an Interlocal Agreement with Spofford concerning the maintenance of city streets and alleys.

Action on the matter was postponed from Friday, July 5 until Monday to give Commissioners Williams and Joe Montalvo an opportunity to voice any concerns.

Commissioner Frerich, present at both meetings, said he was against any such agreement, particularly if it involved spending any more of the Kinney County taxpayers' money.

Frerich said Spofford's tax rate is half of what Brackettville's is and that Spofford should consider raising its tax rate to pay for such things as street repair and maintenance.

Brackettville has no homestead exemption, the city has the highest tax rate in the county, and District has benefited significantly spending any more of Kinney County taxpayers' money is very unfair, especially to the older, retired people. Frerich also said Kinney County has its own roads to repair.

Melancon also expressed concern about the repair and maintenance of roads in Kinney County. County officials estimate it will take another six months to repair the roads in the county that were damaged by the flood in August 1998. Those roads can be repaired with funds from FEMA; however, FEMA has a deadline. If the roads are not repaired within that time frame, the county could lose thousand's of dollars, said Melancon.

The judge said the county has asked FEMA for an extension, that no problems are anticipated, and that the county believes an extension will be granted.



Cushman, speaking on behalf of the American Land Rights Association, told the story of the "willing sellers" in a little community in Ohio, located between Cleveland and Akron. By law, the Park Service was only supposed to buy up 29 homes to create the Cuyahoga Valley National Recreation Area. But af- 12 ter the Park Service bought the homes and farms of owners who did want to sell, the agency began going after families in a financial crisis, such as recent widows and single parents. Next small businesses and timber owners, which resulted in lost jobs. Tax money was lost, schools and churches closed, and more families moved .. Families that stayed found their children could barely get to s school, as roads were closed ) around the federal land. When PBS filmed a documentary on the town in the mid-eighties, the town had all but died. In all, more than 300 homes were sold to the federal government. And yet, everyone of the men and women who fled the town's collapsing economy was considered a "willing seller."

We have no shortage of pre-o served land in our country. The government owns one third of a the land in the United States. In) many cases, in desperate need of repair and improvement. 

# McMaster informs Rotarians about changes taking place in publishing world

Rotarian and newly-published author Frances McMaster, spoke on writing and on the changes taking place in the publishing world at the Brackettville Rotary Club meeting Thursday, July 6.

As a small child, Ms. McMaster lived in Austin, Texas and remembers exciting trips to the library where she got to pick out books to read. As she grew up, she learned to write and earned a place in an honors English class - Creative Writing - and had a poem published in the National Anthology of High School Poetry the year she graduated.

She became a psychotherapist and was in private practice in later years in Houston, Texas. It was there she began attending a writer's group every week. Members would bring something they had written to be critiqued. Most of the group was published, but she was working and didn't have as much time to devote to it. In those days, computers were just beginning to appear and she wrote by hand. She describes having papers from yellow pads with paragraphs cut and taped into the proper position as the way she edited. She and Eric, her husband, took early retirement and moved to Fort Clark Springs in 1985, and it was then she began writing continuously. Mysteries had always intrigued her, and it popped into McMaster's head one day that the Amphitheater stage would be a great place to find a body. Then, the title, "Death Plays the Lead," popped into her mind. Back to the board (the computer). When she tried to sell the novel, she found it was too short. She added characters and changed the married couple she was using as the protagonists to single people. "You have to have two to carry the dialogue," she explained, "and I thought readers would like it better if they weren't married. Suddenly, she found she had a romance side by side with the mystery. When she first started writing, to get something published, you either sent a query letter and three chapters of your book to a publisher (called "sending it over the transom") or, if you were lucky enough, you got an agent. It was difficult to get published.

Major publishers have spent very little on publicizing books they select and publish unless your name is King or Grisham. Their shelf life is a couple of weeks or so, and then it's off to another book for the publishers.

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

Big changes are rapidly arriving in the way books are published. In the "old days," people who had paid to have their own book printed often turned to "Vanity presses." They were charged thousands of dollars and then had to do a lot of the marketing themselves.

lished by Panther Creek Press in Spring, Texas. A friend and author decided to enter the publishing business and asked to print, "Death Plays the Lead," which she had read previously and liked.

A small printer was used and Panther Creek won't have to print up thousands of books which must be stored until sold. McMaster says, "A first book seldom sells a lot, so this is very helpful. I can get more when I need them, and I will be marketing them. It will be available over the Internet.

Now, books can be ordered off

the Internet through Amazon.com and other such warehouses. An author registers his or her book with them, and they take orders received over the Internet and ship out books. They also ask for a hefty discount but pay shipping cost to buyers.

Other books are available on the computer itself. In a recent article in Time Magazine, Stephen King says the response he has gotten on his web site about his cyberpace adventure, "Riding the Bullet," is that his readers enjoyed the story, but not getting it on the screen. There's something about holding a book in hand that is deeply satisfying, he says.

Simon Schuster has released Mary Higgins Clark's latest best seller, "Before I Say Goodbye" in an electronic version. She has just signed a new contract for four mysteries for \$15 million each and \$4 million for a memoir to be published in 2001.

Eakin Press of Austin, Texas and some other publishers, have new and very expensive equipment - POD - Print on Demand. It can print books as ordered. Eakin had discovered his warehouse expense exceeded the income from the books sold. He can now print a hundred or so when asked.

No one really knows how all of this will be resolved, but book lovers will be unlikely to give up the opportunity to buy and hold in their hands something that has given them hours of enjoyment, entertainment and information.
